


Northern soccer supporters and officials have expressed unreserved support and praise for the introduction of the Queensland Cup competition. Among the comments received by Soccer News, were the following:-





SHOCKS ARE POSSIBLE

Three interesting pairings in the Brisbane section of the Queensland Cup first round games could provide a few Cup-tie shocks this weekend. Double headers will be played at the Exhibition Ground on Saturday and Sunday, and exciting clashes are expected in all four matches.

ST. HELENS v. MITCHELTON

Friday, 10th May, 1968

The early game on Saturday, which will have the honour of being the first to be played in the competition, should provide promotion chasing Mitchelton with a chance to assess their prospects against first division opposition.

St. Helens, who play an orthodox direct brand of football, should not have too much trouble in subduing Mitchelton's attack, but their own vanguard has not been clicking either, and neither side is likely to win by more than two goals.
