

The year 1928 was particularly memorable.

Britain left FIFA; David Jack became the first player concerned in a £10,000 transfer of registration—Bolton Wanderers to Arsenal; and William won everything for which they played except the FA Cup. League scoring record of 60 goals in one season.

In 1938 came the Football League Jubilee, and the Football Association's 75th anniversary, and the laws of the game were re-written! Arsenal paid another record figure to get Bryn Jones, around £14,000 and a sensation at the time. A Second Division team, East Fife, won the Scottish Cup for the first time and the great Steve Bloomer died.

The 1948 Cup Final - Manchester United 4 Blackpool 2 — went into the annals as one of the finest ever seen. 1958 is a sad year to remember in football: the flower of a great Manchester United team died in the Munich air crash. Wolverhampton Wanderers

During this year four divisions were introduced in The Football League, England first played the USSR (in Moscow), Brazil won the World Cup, and the legendary Billy Meredith, of Manchester

It marked the birth of automatic promotion and relegation. You thought, perhaps, this had been in force from the start of the Second Divsion, a quite natural assumption? Not so. It was first tried in 1898, in The League's tenth


