QUEENSLAND AMPOL CUP

At the Exhibition Ground on Sunday at 2.45 p.m., you will see the climax of the biggest venture ever undertaken by the Queensland Soccer Federation, when Azzurri and Hollandia line up in the Q'ld Ampol Cup Final.

When the old Ampol Cup competition, between City clubs, began to fall away it looked as if the Q.S.F. may lose their sponsors, so decided to go along with the old saying "Nothing Ventured - Nothing Gained".

The format for the new competition, which brought in Cairns, Townsville, Bundaberg and Mackay/Rockhampton, received a mixed reception.

There were those who condemned the idea because of high expenses due to plane fares to the Northern Cities. The claim was that the gates would not be big enough to meet commitments.

Never the less the Committee went ahead with confidence in the Code and the results are now history. The southern press even congratulated the Q.S.F. in being the first to offer a real State Competition.

This new set up consisted of a 16 team competition with 10 first Division and two Second Division teams in conjunction with teams from Cairns, Townsville, Mackay and Bundaberg.

In the first Round, Azzurri defeated Cairns 4-0 at Cairns — Thistle just scraped home 1-0 against Mackay/R'ton at Mackay — Germania nudged Bundaberg out 3-2 at Bundy — Hollandia travelled to Townsville to win 6-2.

While at home Polonia accounted for Hellenic 4-2 after extra time — Oxley beat Latrobe 3-1 — Coalstars beat Mert-

on 4-2 and Mitchelton were knocked out 4-0 by St. Helens.

This left the following eight clubs in the next round: Azzurri, Polonia, Hollandia, Germania, St. Helens, Coalstars, Oxley and Thistle.

Two games, Azzurri v. St. Helens and Polonia v. Coalstars were played under floodlight at Hemmant while the other two — Hollandia v. Oxley and Germania v. Thistle were played at Bundamba.

This round saw plenty of excitement when Hollandia sneaked in 3-2 from Oxley in a very torrid match and Germania drew with Thistle 1-1, and won the game by one corner to nil.

To everybody's surprise and delight the second Division club Germania had made history and won their way to the semi-finals.

The first semi-final, Azzurri versus Germania was a beauty with Azzurri winning 1-0 after Germania had tired in the last 15 minutes.

Azzurri won the game but Germania won the hearts of the crowd by their gallant display against the then 1st Division leaders, after playing a fixture the day before.

Hollandia accounted for Polonia 5-0 in the other semi, which brings us to this weekends game the final AZZURRI versus HOLLANDIA.

Who is going to win? Come along to the Ekka on Sunday and see for yourself.



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THE IPSWICH SCENE

The recent Kruger Cup intercity competition just concluded in favour of Brisbane sent Ipswich fans delving back into the past for the best combination to represent the Coal City in the last decade. I would nominate the 1957 team that beat Brisbane 8-1 at Heath Park.

Ipswich selectors named practically a Queensland team, with four players from Australia's Olympic team of the previous year. The team was:— D. Leo, G. Kathage, D. McKenna, N. Rule, A. Warren, C. Sander, G. Nunn, S. Kitching, C. Kitching, A. Pitcairn and B. Vogler.

The Brisbane team was: J. Speare, K. Proudlock, A. Duncan, R. Bedford, N. Clarke, M. Hay, F. Cleeton, G. McMillan, H. Buttress, M. Wild, P. Corcoran.

Brisbane scored an early goal by Graham McMillan but from then on Ipswich gave a dazzling display. Col Kitching notched a hat-trick, Alan Pitcairn got a pair, and Bunny Nunn, 'Chook' Vogler and Spencer Kitching scored one each.

It is interesting to note that Brian Vogler, Forrest Cleeton and Graham McMillan, although at present on the injured list since the Cardiff match, are still going strong in regular matches while Col Kitching and Graham Kathage are team coaches for Hellenic and Coalstars respectively.

In the State training squad for that year under coach Jock Pattison was

Len Jones still playing good football for Oxley at full-back. Len tells me that this season will see him complete 20 years of football with Oxley.

Another star of former years turned out briefly to help out Oxley at Ebbw Vale. Former Bush Rats and Oxley centre-half Les Verrall turned out in the second half of the reserve grade match and showed he had lost little of his skill. On the same ground but in the first division match John Verrall was doing his best at centre-forward for St. Helens to notch the goal that would have decided the issue.

For years opinions have varied as to which Ipswich club was the oldest in the district. Some gave it to Bundamba Rangers, some to Blackstone Rovers, and even Dinmore Bush Rats have come into the reckoning. I have been doing

a little research on the birth of the round-ball code in Ipswich and have come across a report in the Ipswich "Queensland Times" of 29th June, 1886, which seems to indicate that Bundamba and Blackstone share the honour.

The original team formed in 1886 was a combination of the two, and was named "Bundanba Rovers" (note the original spelling of Bundamba). The first match was played at the North Ipswich Reserve on June 26, 1886. It seems that at that time soccer was referred to as Anglo-Queensland Rules.

A report in the newspaper of the day states: "The first match played under the Anglo-Queensland Rules came off on the cricket reserve, the contesting teams being the Rovers of Bundamba, and the Queenslanders of this town.

The game was slightly marred by the fact that no official umpire could be obtained and the players had to settle all disputes amongst themselves. The game ended in a 2-2 draw. Tunstall and Stephens scored for the Queenslanders and Sneddon and Waugh for Rovers. The report went on to add that Waugh, Dobbie, and Sneddon did good service for Rovers and for the Blues Tunstall and Hastie were best ably supported by Hudson and R. and J. Stephens.

Coalstars Football Club have plans for what should be an interesting match during the coming festivities in a few months in connection with the proposed Colour City Carnival to be staged by a committee formed to boost tourism in the Ipswich district. Coalstars hope to invite a leading Sydney team to play a game under floodlight at the Bundamba Oval.

Former Bundamba player Stewart Dedman who has been away in England was an interesting visitor last week. Stewart is stationed with his Bank job in Sydney and is hoping for a transfer north next season.

I suppose all of you read the report from overseas about the soccer referee in South America dealing with troublesome players who disputed his decisions by drawing a gun and shooting them down. Although most effective, I hope the local Referee Association doesn't adopt the same tactics. The sight of Vince Dobinson or Arthur Harper taking the field toting a pair of six-guns would be too much for most fans.

SECOND DIVISION

Germania for premiership

Germania this week continued on their merry way with a resounding win over Newmarket Postal 9-0.

As against their comparative low scoring games of late they had this one all sewn up at half time leading by seven goals.

Coach Ron Thompson of Germania paid Postals the compliment that they never gave up. They were, however, beaten by the better team on the day.

Bob Zimmerman at centre-half again stood out for Germania and Bob Maxton at inside-right turned in a sound performance.

The goals were shared between Ziggy Wehner and Bert Mohr three a piece with two to centre Neil Large and the other by Mike Melberg.

A pat on the back for the young ref. for his handling of this game (name unknown).

Next week is the first of the big clashes when Germania meet Wynnum and the latter can be expected to play desperate football in an endeavour to claw their way back into final calculations. This game could be a beauty.

Mitchelton took the short journey to the other side of Taylor Range to do battle with Gap Pastimes.

We didn't have to wait very long for the first score — a very good length corner taken by Paul Menadue found Mitchey keeper Brian Parker struggling and the ball found its way into the net.

From this point Mitchelton pinned the Gap in their own half and the majority of play was between the half-way and the eighteen-yard line. However with ten minutes to half-way Graham John found a vacant spot between the upright and the keeper and things were all square with forty-five minutes to go.

Second half again saw Mitchey in attack with more sporadic bursts from the Gap. After half an hour into this half referee Arth Harper after discussion with linesman Harry Witcherley pointed to the spot for an infringement in the in-goal area by a Gap defender. Graham John attempted the conversion and his left-footer made no mistake.

This was to be the goal which gave Mitchelton the two points at the end of a game which proved most entertaining except for lapses in the middle of the second half. Mitchey coach Al Bain took a very hard knock on the head today though after a few minutes break he continued and led his team with the indomitable spirit we have come to expect of him. For the losers Paul Menadue played very well and

Graham Simpson turned in his usual sound performance.

Arthur Harper kept the rough stuff to a minimum by keeping the clamps on throughout.

Annerley had the home game at Ekibin Oval against Wynnum this week. Although this game could still barely keep the locals hopes alive to reach the top four it was vitally important to Wynnum that they take home the points.

First score came when Ray Garner playing centre for Wynnum found the net to give the Baysiders a one-goal advantage half-way through. Billy Shaw doubled the score after interval and Wynnum were in a comparatively comfortable position. The score remained dormant until approximately quarter of an hour from the finish when for reasons best known to themselves Wynnum replaced reliable centre-half Vic Leggatt with fiery captain Arthur Creighton. Whatever the purpose of the move and whether it had any effect on the last minute of play can be only a matter for conjecture, but the score is tangible. leastways in the sense it is definite, and in those last fifteen minutes Annerley came back, found the net twice, and left Wynnum's hopes of promotion on the rocks. With only three games to go they are now four points behind the leaders and although they have amassed eighty-seven goals, their average is inferior to Germania, a formidable task indeed.

As the season draws to a close, teams in the relegation area seem to be showing just that little extra fighting spirit in an endeavour to maintain their status in second division. Bardon this week travelled to Budapest Grovely's ground to do battle with the locals after blotting their copy book last week against Toowong. The game commenced with the Grovely boys fielding ten men, a state of affairs that was to exist until almost half time. In a very ordinary game of football there was no score until about the time Budapest's eleventh team member entered the arena of play and Warren Austin for Bardon was able to give the visitors the odd goal lead.

I personally thought that with John Fazekas now spearheading the attack Budapest may have presented a prob-

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lem for the Bardon boys but there wasn't any force there today.

Early in the second half Warren Austin again beat the keeper for Bardon to lead two nil. Some little time later from a quick scrimmage in front of goal Budapest were fortunate enough to receive a free kick through a Bardon player picking the ball up in the thought that they would be given the kick for an opposition infringement. He was premature as referee Vince Dobinson had not blown his whistle and so it went against them.

What a shot from Alex Seren! It was never in doubt — a real scorcher that left the defence flat-footed.

A 2-1 victory to Bardon to serve notice that they have no intention of relinquishing the lead they have over the lower teams. In fact on the run of games they increased their lead.

Mt. Gravatt met Dnipro today at the latter's home ground with everything to lose if they couldn't pull this one off. Under eighteens Steve Pollard, centre, Jim Johnson, right flank, and newcomer to second division Laurie Cush at right back formed the nucleus of youth in the side.

No score up to half time the closest being when Dnipro found an upright. Again in the second half they missed opportunities, one particularly close, a full-blooded drive which hit the keeper, bounced straight up in the air and eventually was cleared by Mt. Gravatt centre-half Maurice McNamara.

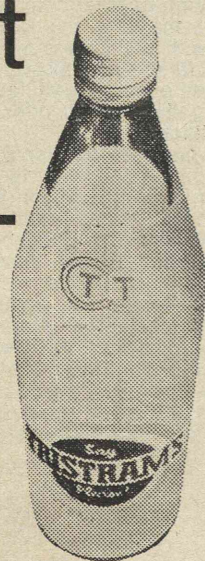
As the minutes ticked by and still no score it appeared odds-on a draw when with less than a minute to go Brian Morgan called for a through ball from Steve Pollard which nicked a Dnipro defender on the way. It had no effect on the ultimate outcome and Brian Morgan beat the keeper to give Mt. Gravatt the two points and elevate them to six points.

Toowong today were unable to complete the hat trick for the three bottom teams and their 10-1 defeat at the hands of Easts have escalated Bardon three points clear of both Toowong and Mt. Gravatt.

The boys from Dunmore Park held the red shirts for the first fifteen minutes. However, once Easts found out

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A POINT TO PONDER

When the question was raised that players be allowed to play for their various clubs as a senior in any division and when the motion was passed it was the wish of Federation that the said clubs abide by the rules of sportsmanship.

Theoretically this did appear to be a forward step. However, the inclusion in the mixture of an overdose of one element has proven beyond doubt that the chivalry of the real sportsman is a lost cause. The excess ingredient? — Human element.

I don't intend to name any teams here. As a matter of fact I don't even intend to blame any, but clubs did stack their teams (and, in greater proportion) this year for reasons best known to themselves. Were you one of those clubs and what was your basic reason? Was it because if you hadn't the other fellow would have or might have, or was it your natural desire to aspire?

As a matter of fact I could quote a well-known and well-respected lub executive who was able to tell me of a forfeit days before a game was played.

In a fifth division match this season it appears one team played eight from a higher division (their fifth divisions were escalated for the day) and their opposition forfeited their fourth division match to field the majority of these players in fifth division. Three true blue from an even twenty-two.

It appears to have got to the stage that certain teams have been forced to stack in order to compete and whilst,

when it comes to the champion of champions segment, Federation steps in and issues the edict that certain players are not eligible — it's too late — the points table has been resolved and the clubs have made it most apparent they prefer promotion to prestige.

It's most apparent nothing can be done about this situation this year but it is food for thought and I'm willing to bet that most of the clubs caught up in this invidious position themselves though they may have sought promotion would be only too pleased to receive a direction from a positive thinking executive to preclude this anomaly and in so doing provide better inter clubs relations and more important, resurrect a lost cause.

Furthermore it would be most interesting to hear club views on this matter. I have no doubt Mr. Harry Mourny will be only too pleased to accommodate anyone desirous of offering their twenty cents worth.

APPEAL AGAINST SENTENCE

Tomislav Stefanovic, suspended for life by the Brisbane Disciplinary Committee on August 6th, out of an incident arising from the third division match, Forrest United versus Germania on 3rd August, has appealed against his sentence to the Queensland Management Committee. His appeal will be heard in the committee rooms on Monday, 26th August.

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Queensland Ampol Cup Preview

It's anyone's guess to collect the coveted Ampol Cup at approximately 4.30 p.m. on Sunday afternoon at the Exhibition. Will it be Azzurri skipper Bruno Pinti or Gary Wilkins, the Hollandia leader?

A few weeks back Hollandia looked a good thing but recent developments in all Premiership matches have only confused the issue. Firstly Azzurri has shown a marked all round team improvement particularly in the goal scoring department where the majority of their problems this season have lain.

Nine goals without reply in their last three matches has changed the team from often turning defensive after obtaining a 1-0 lead to now attacking all out to increase that lead. This was seen to the fore last Sunday against Thistle when after popping in a penalty mid-way through the second half, two forwards in particular, Gerry Schoendorer and Dave Sargent, kept up the pressure although unsuccessful against the strong Thistle defence.

Schoendorer has developed into a real asset of late and his speed and

elusiveness will be invaluable on Sunday. The "wog" is the big worry for Azzurri at this stage as both Ron Clark and David Keen were sidelined at Spencer Park because of the epidemic.

Defence is no worry for Azzurri as Matt Hosie has never been in more superlative form in the middle and has been receiving great support in cover defence from Johnny Mengotti. Fullbacks Bruno Pinti and Nereo Saftich could have been labelled a little suspect last Sunday and against nippy wingers Mal Swindells and Keijo Voutilainen will certainly have their work cut out for them.

However the reliable Clark should be fit for this week to come back in as fullback to put Azzurri's mind at ease in this regard. Azzurri hold a distinct advantage in midfield with their roving centre-forward Eddie Patterson and the energetic Peter Neilsen. Many feel that the latter could become an "above average" half-back with just a bit more concentrated effort in his matches.

David Keen, as mentioned, must be considered a doubtful starter but an equally big problem must be Ross Kelly's ankle as he was carried off the field after last Sunday's ninety minutes. Fortunately he has an outstanding deputy in Graham Kruger should he be needed. If Azzurri look to a match-winner it could come in the form of big winger John Daley but I feel he will have to lift his game on Sunday to be as big a menace as he was in the early part of the season.

The Hollandia camp on the other hand must have "butterflies" concerning their potential matchwinner Ray Richards, a sorely missed absentee against Coalstars.

Working back we find amateur linkman Hugh Montgomery in constructive form. The word amateur applies only to his status and not his standard of play. His partner Darryl Wilkins combines a perfect mixture of defence and attack. If anything is going to stop a forward showing by the Azzurri attackers it's going to be the Hollandia backline — have a look at this for strength:—

Gary Wilkins, Phil Sunderland, Peter Steen and one of the most clever fullbacks in Brisbane with distribution — John Van Klaveren. One weakness in this system is seen when Gary often forges down the wing in attack, like many international fullbacks we've seen here, but is not covered adequately by the others and thus leaves a great gaping hole on their opponents' left wing.

Sunderland is the pivot and his clearances either at ground level or in the air are always carried out with confidence. Custodian Bill Jamieson is reliable between the sticks and should give Hollandia few anxious moments there. Now comes the difficult part — going for a winner. Honours in their two premiership matches have so far been even with each having a 1-0 victory.

With so many draws bobbing up lately, another deadlock would not surprise but despite the fact that I think either team is capable of pulling it off, I'll rely on Hollandia's greater goal-scoring prowess and tip them to narrowly win their second major trophy.

The main outcome of these lectures would be the benefits obtained by our local referees who were well attended on each occasion and we are confident that the lessons learned by our officials will undoubtedly reap in an even higher standard of efficiency by all our referees, in the not too distant future.

Our thanks go out to Mr. Ashton and to F.I.F.A. for giving us this wonderful opportunity that was kindly afforded to us by the ruling world body of soccer.

Footnote: It was a pointer to all football clubs that "Rags" Tatters brought the entire playing staff of Hollandia direct from a training session to listen to the concluding night of the lectures. Apparently our leading soccer club realise that they are not satisfied with their standard and have still got room for further improvement of their game. There is a message hidden here for the remainder of our clubs who are struggling well behind in the ability and standard of our reigning champions!
