
With the release of the first "Soccer '69" Edition for this year, may I, as President of the Q.S.S. welcome everyone to our presentation of the Soccer Season.




Latrobe-Wests and Wynnum are hot favourites to enter the final sixteen which will contest the Queensland Ampol Cup competition proper.

Gold Coast are having the week-end off with the bye in this division, however, knowing Gold Coast, we will be hearing things about them in the very near future.


