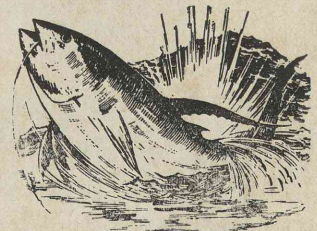

## ANYONE FOR TENNIS

**A strange heading you think for a Soccer magazine? Whilst as a sporting body we truly believe any sport at all that keeps the kids off the street is a good sport, we must admit to cheating a little with our headline.**

The tennis we refer to on this occasion is the spectacular new game evolved in Sydney by one of their top soccer clubs called Foot Tennis.

It is played two a side as in normal tennis doubles, on a court (I'll stand correction) thirty by twenty feet and marked similarly to a table tennis layout with a central net thirty inches high.

The points score is as in Table Tennis twenty-one up with five consecutive 'serves' per player. In the advent of a tied score one team must gain ascendancy by two clear points.

The game commences when the 'server' bounces the ball on the court and kicks the rebound over the net. The recipients may then allow the ball one bounce and themselves are allowed to contact the ball with head, foot or knee on three occasions before returning across the net. However, the ball must not touch the ground after

the initial bounce from the server.

The game then continues until either the ball hits the court, goes into the net outside the playing area, or is fouled by an opposition player.

The writer must confess that although the game is big in Sydney, he had never seen it played until Easter Saturday's A.B.C. Television sporting afternoon.

On face value it must take on in Brisbane. From the point of view of conditioning reflexes alone it's a winner, apart from the physical fitness angle.

It must add tremendous sharpness to a player's game when he walks on to a soccer field, also it must bolster his confidence no end.

I've seen it, I like it. I only hope now that Brisbane clubs (if not already) can find suitable venues and adapt as well as foster this interesting and exciting game.

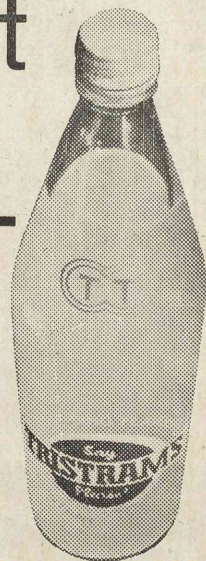

# Queensland verses South Australia

**Bruce Waddell comments on the performance of Queensland's "New Look" Soccer side**

State selectors Matt Carson, John Koumans and Cliff McClurg virtually put their heads on the chopping block when they selected the Queensland team to do battle with South Australia last week.

However they had the last laugh when referee Vince Dobinson blew the full-time whistle with Queensland holding a lead of 4-3.

Carson himself was the centre of criticism over the selection of his two second division Easts - Aston Villa charges Ron Millman and Harry Stewart.

Millman proved this criticism to be unwarranted when he stamped himself as a star of the future with a great state debut. Stewart on the other hand

was not quite as impressive, and although he too possesses potential, he seemed to be a little out of his depth on such a big occasion.

Trevor Catchpole did not show up as much as expected although he gave Keijo Voutilainen one glorious pass to enable the little winger to score Queensland's fourth goal.

The other two forwards, Wayne Walker and Ian Johnston were by no means disgraced while the latter showed outstanding opportunism in scoring two goals.

But Johnston, in many peoples' opinions, including mine, could improve out of sight if he were to do a bit more work in the middle than he does at present.

Merton Rovers' hero of last season, Len Willett to my mind was the man of the match and on Sunday's performance should have many more matches as skipper of the State side.

Fullback Gary Wilkins displayed his class again with a cool exhibition but his game wasn't too far ahead of the competent George Whittaker.

I've seen Martin Coe play better between the sticks but he nevertheless made few mistakes and obviously, like some of the others, had match jitters.

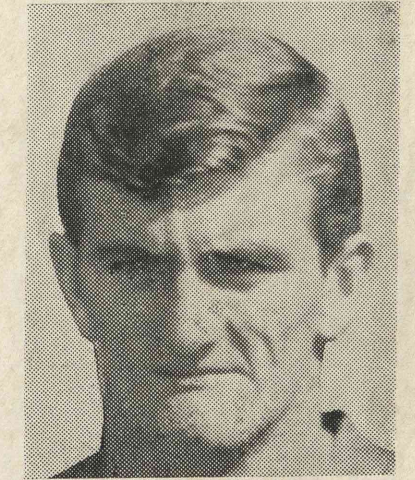
He seemed to settle down as the match progressed and could well have gained most of his confidence from the guidance of centre-half Gordon Mackie who is now apparently regarded as an automatic selection.

# INTERNATIONAL EXCHANGE

## THE LIFEBLOOD OF SOCCER

The last 30 years have seen a tremendous growth of international exchanges — only interrupted by the war years. And this is now increasing at jet-speed, very largely because of this jet-age of ours . . .

International Soccer enables nations to meet, watched and followed by millions of people to get to know each other, to become internationally minded and to form one huge international link-up.

In this link-up, F.I.F.A., the world-controlling organisation, plays the largest part and it is largely due to international exchange that an estimated 650 million people are watching Soccer annually.

Today, a multitude of international competitions is taking place right throughout the world, culminating in the four-yearly World Championship.

It is only through international exchange that huge earnings are possible for so many club teams all over the world and, most vitally, for the national organisations in every country.

The record crowds which usually attend the encounters between national teams provide the F.A. of each country with the vast amount to spend on the nation-wide strengthening of the code. It is this income mainly which provides for the maintenance of existing and the creation of new grounds and stadiums . . . It helps to support the vital Amateur and Youth administrations, thus encouraging their continuous expansion.

It maintains and compensates representative teams for all preparations and fixtures involved.

### INCOME VITAL

For a vast majority of First Division clubs throughout the world, the income from international exchange, whether at home or abroad, is absolutely vital to their successful existence. Their total income from purely domestic games is completely insufficient to cover their budgets. Australian Soccer must be aware that only this international exchange and nothing else will enable our administrators to gain substantial funds so vitally required for developing Soccer on a nation-wide basis.

It requires, inevitably, a readjustment of the existing national competitions, resulting in some curtailment and even elimination of certain "local" games and contests.

At long last, Australia will see leading overseas teams in action here, showing superior quality and inspiration for our youngsters.

This will create tremendous interest.

Now a full opportunity exists to link up by regular international exchange with our ASIAN neighbours and to participate in some of their current competition. A tremendous increase in Soccer popularity has developed in Asia during the last five years.

From a most vital national point of view, this offers us a unique chance to create international goodwill.

Making full use of these opportunities will inevitably lead to fully organised and disciplined PROFESSIONALISM as the front rank of Australian Soccer. Hence the highest standards can be achieved.

This requires more planning and more expenditure for the benefit of the code as a whole, if we want to capitalise on the opportunities awaiting us.

The importance of international exchange was clearly stressed by Sir Stanley Rous when he addressed the F.I.F.A. Congress at Santiago.

He said: "Inter-League matches, Continental Cup and other competitions should be considered second in importance to matches between the National Associations of various countries.

"Matches at international level bringing together as they do, the best players of the countries competing, must remain the top priority because of the wide impact they make on all the people of a country . . ."

Finally, as part of this new exciting entry into the international arena, we shall vitally require the extended use of suitable grounds right through the nation. In many cases, overseas teams will only be able to visit us during the later months of the year to national and international competitions in which they are regularly involved.

Thus Soccer will have to become a summer sport also with many games played under floodlights. Being a most spectacular game under floodlights it will surely attract vast crowds.

# JUNIOR JOTTINGS

IT'S ON AGAIN: The long wait between seasons is nearly over and once again it is my pleasure to bring to you all the interesting things that happen in the Junior ranks, and it is my earnest hope that the few Clubs that assisted this column last season with their club news, will once again give me their support, and the remaining Clubs will realise that this is their chance to bring to the attention of all Soccer supporters, the highlights of their Juniors activities.

If you have anything in the way of Club Histories, unusual happenings, coming events, game descriptions etc., to pass on, give me a ring at 551102, anytime after 5.30 p.m. on Saturday and Sunday nights.

On Saturday 12/4/69 at 8.45 p.m. the season's fixtures commence when 22 little boys run onto the field at Lanham Park to contest the first game in the U9 'B' Division, between Grange Thistle and Gap Pastime, and from then until after 4 p.m. 279 teams will strive to post their first points on the Premiership ladder. The remaining 11 teams will gain their points the easy way, by drawing the first byes of the season.

Of the 279 Junior teams registered this season, 83 are being fielded by four clubs, Annerley 21, Gap Pastime 21, Mt. Gravatt 21, and Redcliffe 20, whilst Queensland Newspapers and Budapest Grovely are the low markers with one team each. Annerley, Coalstars, Hollandia and South Coast United have at least 1 team in every age group, and the Gap Pastime Club has five teams in the U7 competition and 3 teams in each of the 8-9-10 year age groups, whilst the strongest age group is the U9 year olds, who are fielding 34 teams in the three Divisions.

With the adjunct of Carina as the Headquarters for the Juniors, the season promises to be a "Boomer" in every respect, and I wish each and every Club all the success they could wish for themselves, throughout the coming Season.

Some readers may recall that last season, there was some confusion as to who were the U12 'A' Premiership winners, when Coalstars had some difficulty over loss of points, which put them on the same step of the points ladder as Mitchelton and Mitchelton won on a playoff, but lost the Premiership when Coalstars had their appeal against the loss of points upheld, and were awarded the Premiership. As a Curtain Raiser to the Queensland —

South Australia Game, these two teams once again clashed, and I managed to get the first report of the Season from the manager of the Mitchelton team, Stan Devantier, and this is how he saw the game.

Quite a good game so early in the season, and if this is any indication of the quality of the football this 13 year old group can play, then there should be some good games played in this Division during the season. Mitchelton opened their account after 10 minutes, with a good goal from Tony Bailey, and later in the first half after good team work another goal came from the foot of Tony. Coalstars applied the pressure after the first 20 minutes and at half time the score was even at 2 all.

The second half found both sides a bit weary, due mainly to the very hot conditions and the hard play. Mitchelton scored the only goal in this half and ran out winners by the odd goal in 5. Good scoring opportunities were missed by both teams through over-eagerness, but all in all it was a good game and I feel sure it was enjoyed by all the spectators.
