LETTER TO THE EDITOR

Following up on the interesting comments in Bruce Waddell's "Into The Net" 18-4-69, whereby Matt Carson has devised a coaching scheme for under 19 players from the senior and junior ranks.

Let's get down to the crux of the matter and go one step further.

At one stage or another any club fostering junior teams must inevitably ask the same questions, where do the juniors go? Why do we lose so many? The answer inevitably too, must be the same.

Because at 17 these boys find outside interests in motor cars, surf and girls, and in this period of maturity these young men feel they are not juniors any more.

The question is how do we go about retaining so many potential players?

My answer is, give them senior status instead of binding them to junior foot-ball.

In all due respect to the Brisbane Junior Association, who are doing a marathon job, I feel that under 17 should be a boy's last year in the junior ranks.

This would be a great assistance to the junior association in the allotment of times and fields for older age groups. Also it would give relief to junior referees in their burdensome task of too many games to control.

Forget under 18's and after completion of the under 17 season why not bring them under the jurisdiction of the Senior Federation as a Senior Colts team.

Imagine the interest in a Queensland Colt's team playing curtain raisers to Queensland senior games. Also the spectators would surely, not be disappointed, at the prospect of viewing these potential stars as curtain raisers to our own senior teams in the comfort of our own much vaunted Perry Park. Furthermore it would bring all the players under the eyes of the State Coach and his selector.

We have certainly taken a progressive and bold step in the direction of a new stadium. Let's back Matt Carson and make sure our juniors do not stagnate, or waft away on a south coast breeze.

There must be many other interested parties wishing to improve on these suggestions. Let's hear from you.

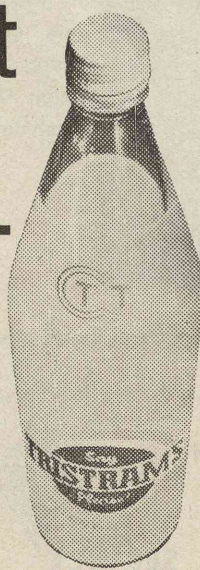

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Brisbane to Win Kruger Cup Match

Brisbane's near-Queensland side will eat Ipswich in the first Kruger Cup match of the season at Bundamba on Anzac Day.

New inclusions which make it slightly different from our successful State team are JOHN VAN KLAVEREN (Qld. reserve) and exciting personalities NIGEL McGUCKIN (Hollandia) and TOMMY BARBER (Merten Rovers).

Centre forward McGUCKIN has already slammed in five goals in only two premiership matches, while BARBER had an impressive debut on the Merton left wing last week.

The Brisbane forward line is the most talent-packed seen in the Cup for many years and the combination in the form of VOUTILAINEN and CATCHPOLE, promising RON MILLMAN, and the two new players must surely swamp the Ipswich defence.

However, MARK WALKER has every

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confidence in the ability of SUNDERLAND, GRIEG, DANN and GARY WILKINS to squash the lethal Brisbane attacks.

Midfield control rests heavily on the shoulders of DARRYL WILKINS and ROSS HALLETT, two halfbacks who are equally competent in defence as in attack.

SAINTS' JOHN HASWELL is a surprise selection in my opinion, and the Ipswich selectors are obviously bank-

ing on a return to form by the up-and-down IAN JOHNSTON.

HENRY BROWN SATISFIED

Wynnum Coach, Henry Brown, was quite elated, without any sign of over-confidence, at his team's good showing against Easts.

Wynnum have had their problems in respect of custodians however Russell Dickfos took over control again this week and turned in an admirable performance. Although they won last week the Wynnum boys seemed to appreciate the lush greenery of Heath Park against the dust bowl conditions at Mitchey. It gave them greater scope in the execution of their precision football.

They kept the game open and used the whole park. Ed Wilkins opened proceedings with a 25 yard left foot speculator and later gave Wynnum a 2-0 half time advantage with a deflection header from a Rod Merrin cross.

On the resumption Rod Merrin showed the advantage of a forward following through when after shooting with the right foot he despatched the keepers partial save with his left foot. Again Rod, as he did last week, figured in the fourth and best goal of the match. A perfect cross with Eddie Wilkins running into position to tuck the ball away beautifully to give him his hat trick for the match.

Wynnum have emerged with four points from their opening two matches and they've beaten two tough and seasoned second divisioners. In so doing they have given warning to pre-post favourites Latrobe that red is for danger and Lats might well remember this when pulling their shirts on for this particular encounter.

Henry Brown has a spectacular and enviable record in Brisbane football not only for his ability on the field but for the art of transference of his know-how. Already he has steered both Lats and Polonia from second to top division and he's got all the stops out this season to emulate his earlier performances.

From the Easts camp Matt Carson reports they were beaten by a better team and at the same time had great praise for young Harry Stewart who showed out exceptionally well for the losers at centre half. Don't write Easts off though, they lost the first three in a row last year and came with a withering run to emerge as the danger team of the competition.

Latrobes after their spectacular opening game last week hosted the Toowoomba team Willowburn at Gregory

Park in one of the Sunday games. It was most apparent from the outset that Willowburn's intention was to resort to completely defensive tactics.

The first goal came through a "hands in the box" and the penalty was converted by Jim Lamb Lats then suffered a frustrating period of rattling the uprights. However they advanced the score to 2-nil at half time, the second goal coming in exactly the same manner as the first and again Jim Lamb executed the conversion.

The second half followed a similar pattern with the exception that Peter Parog scored the third and final goal after finding a gap in the wall of defenders. At 3-0 Willowburn can well head westwards with the thought they really didn't do so badly.

Considering they were elevated from third division only this season and competing against a re-juvenated ex-first division club of last year they acquitted themselves quite well. Lats lost the services of left full back trainer Roy Wellsby through pressure of business. However the vacancy has been filled by reliable John Hickman. Latrobe also introduced into the attack Scotch boy Gibbie Rowan on the right wing and he passed the test with a high percentage.

Up on the top rung with Lats Wynnum and Budapest are the boys from Ekibin Oval, and even though Coach Ron White was not over impressed with Annerley's performance the end result is the thing that counts. The game was played at home against Newmarket Postals.

The first score came when the ball was crossed from the right wing to the far post where Bill Busby, quickly positioning himself, cleverly headed across the goal face where a waiting Mike Armstrong completed the movement also per medium of the head. Bill Busby needed no assistance with the second goal and again it was a header.

With the game in its early stages Bob Marshall at centre forward made it 3-nil from a goal mouth scramble and looked odds on a cricket score. However Annerley with this comfortable margin showed signs of lethargy and just prior to the half way mark Harry Harrington reduced the leeway to two.

The second half had Postals in all the attacking movements yet the only goal in this stanza saw Bill Busby accept a gift due to a misunderstanding in Postals back line. Barry Rogers is going great guns on the right wing for the winners, whilst Kev Casey is showing all his old dash and brilliance as custodian.

Postals Eddie Masters was as happy as a coach with a losing team could be. The forward line apparently is lacking a little fire. Young Ian McLaughlan showed up well again and Mike Woolmer made a welcome re-appearance to the team. Errol Barnes promoted from the lower division had the misfortune to last only ten minutes before being the victim of an ankle injury.

Budapest Groverly, flush from last week's victory over the Gap ventured out to Dunmore Park to do battle with Toowong. The action wasn't too long in coming and the Groverly forwards quickly asserted their superiority over the opposing backs to the tune of a 3-0 advantage in the first quarter hour.

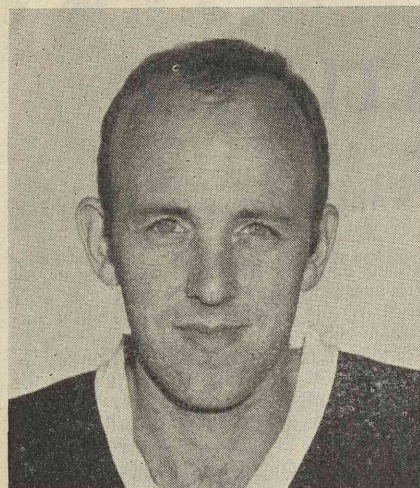
The tide was temporarily stemmed when last week's casualty Norm Hunter turned and reduced the leeway with one out of the box. He manipulated the ball down the left wing to a most acute angle and whilst the Budapest backs were setting themselves in position for the cross he let fly with a ground shot. Although the keeper was in position and balanced he had no hope of keeping this one out.

This was to be the brief moment of glory for the home team as Budapest again set about carving up the back-line. It was a most successful operation too because with only half the game played their score had advanced to a mammoth 7-1.

Centre forward John Fazekas bagged two and was matched by the inside and outside rights Alex Cpipzcer and Noel Wrigley respectively. The other goal being credited to John Balogh. Budapest made one second half change with Alex Juhasz replacing Alex Cpipzcer.

During the interval Toowong revised their tactics and resorted to solid stonewall defence with Bob Maynard controlling the rear guard action. Budapest, I suspect, were content to rest

English winger Tommy Barbar adds spice to the Merton attack, and it will be interesting to see if Len Willett is once again played in the role of a roving inside left.

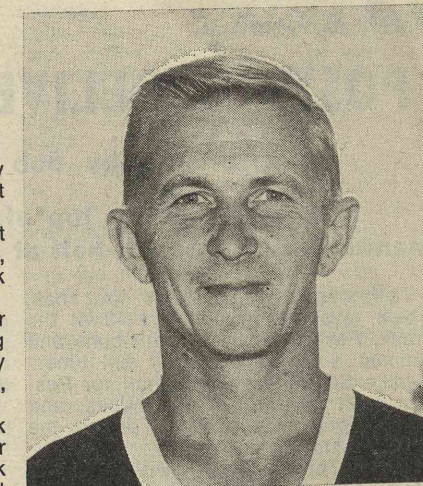
Trevor Catchpole, whose opportunism against Azzurri gave him a much awaited taste of success, should snap back into his devastating goal scoring form of last season.

It seemed that whilst Ivan Doolan was keeping goals in the first half, Jim Ridge scored Acacia Ridge's first goal, and at half-time it was decided to switch Ivan into the goals, and Jim Ridge into the forwards, and when the second goal came, which enabled Acacia Ridge to register a 2-all draw, who was the scorer? First half 'Keeper' Jim Ridge. In this game Stephen Teague was nominated the best player for Acacia Ridge and D. Schumacher for Oxley.

OPINION

A Notice of Motion to rescind the decision of September 5, 1966, which called for the abolition of National Names by the end of the 1969 season, has been set down for hearing at the Council meeting of May 12. The decision, either way, will affect Queensland Soccer for many years to come.

Firstly, the voting procedure in itself conjures up an interesting possibility. Federation voting powers will give all First Division clubs two votes to the lower division's one. Supporting the motion will be five nationally named First Division clubs joined by Grange Thistle who are insisting on the retention of Thistle in their name. Six lower division clubs can also be expected to support the motion so that theoretically the voting strength will be 18 for and 21 against.

But the possible absence of outlying clubs, Coolangatta, Gold Coast United and Pine Rivers, and due to work commitments, Queensland Newspapers could further cloud the issue.

If this position eventuates, this major decision could be decided by four affiliated bodies, namely, The Brisbane Junior Soccer Association, The Queensland Junior Soccer Association, The Queensland Federation of Soccer Coaches and the Queensland Branch of The Australian Soccer Referees Association, which each commands 2 votes.

Looking at the pros and cons of the case the National Clubs do indeed have a healthy argument. Migrants have contributed to a very large extent to the phenomenal growth of Soccer in recent years. Due to a natural verve and exuberance in their native game—due to an injection of businessmen and business methods into club management—due to hearty backing by their respective National Club Organizations who assist their countrymen greatly in the myriad different problems of assimilation, the history of Federation shows a predominance of National Names taking out major trophies.

The basic argument is of course that they will lose the support of these Organizations AND their supporters (who have been known to chip in handsomely when the going gets tough) leading to a Standard Decline and ultimately a slackening off in attendance.

On the other side of the penny the following questions are asked.

What happens to the thousands of people who tune in each week to watch TV Soccer, come out in their thousands

to view an international (Manchester v. Queensland drew 30,000), felt a glow of pride when Australia triumphantly toured South East Asia—do these people simply give away local Soccer because to a large extent they cannot identify with Migrant Named teams?

IS THERE A HUGE MARKET LYING UNTAPPED BECAUSE THE AVERAGE AUSTRALIAN IS FORCED INTO THIS POSITION? AFTER ALL IT IS HUMAN NATURE TO IDENTIFY.

Are there not 800,000 reasons in Brisbane, and many more thousands in the country—for this is a State decision—for finding out whether this situation really does exist?

IN THE ULTIMATE RESULT IS THERE ANY REASON FOR INALA NOT BEING KNOWN AS HOLLANDIA LOCALLY AS MUCH AS GRANGE COULD BE KNOWN AS THE THISTLE LOCALITY?

The success of the Motion will of course see no change in the present natural rate of progress, but if it is defeated Queensland will be placed in a unique position.

We would then have the chance of leading Australia in a question that has vexed Administrators nation-wide. AS A PURELY AUSTRALIAN PRESENTATION WITH AUSTRALIAN NAMES CAN WE BRING IN THE PUBLIC THROUGH THE GATE?

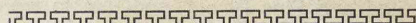

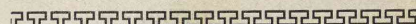
