The original motion was moved by Excelsior and seconded by Wynnum three years ago.

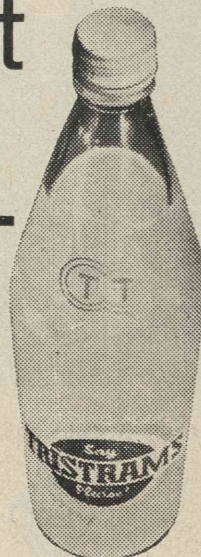
#### RETURN TRIP

**In the big three's first clash of the premiership round Latrobes just managed to get up off their muddy knees and steal a major when it appeared they were fighting desperately to salvage a point against Wynnum.**

The game opened with Wynnum in attack and continued in this vein until they were eventually rewarded with a good goal by Frank Sowden midway through the half.

Conditions were far from good but Wynnum were playing attractive football and they maintained the one goal advantage through the first half and into the dying stages of the second stanza.

Ten minutes into the second half Latrobe were reduced to ten men when Derek Carpenter was given a breather by referee John Carlin and directed to the shower for alleged retaliation. Wynnum were still top team and Lats. were trying desperately to get into the game.

With eight minutes to go the balloon went up for Wynnum when opposing right winger Gibby Rowan scored an under the bar and out again goal. This gave the reds tremendous heart and they rallied strongly for Jim Lamb to give them the lead just a few minutes later.

They held on desperately and got the referee's nod to enter two points on the debit side of the ledger.

I don't think any team that plays most of the second half with ten men and comes from behind can be considered lucky, particularly when the other team has played the better football. Yet Wynnum, on the other hand, are most unfortunate not to have saved a point. Still, that's football, and the end of the competition is still way beyond the horizon.

Although on the losing side Vic Leggatt and Arthur Creighton were nominated turning in the big performances.

## BUDAPEST LOSE FAZEKAS

Budapest Grovely maintained their lead on goal averages in the competition with a sound though scrappy 4-0 win over Newmarket. Ian Wilson opened the scoring after 20 minutes when he finished a Noel Wrigley corner off per medium of the head. Joey Hinterdorfer emulated this performance some quarter of an hour later from an opposite side corner by heading in at the second attempt.

John Fazekas went off injured in the first ten minutes and whether this had an effect on the Grovely boys is open to conjecture but they weren't playing football. 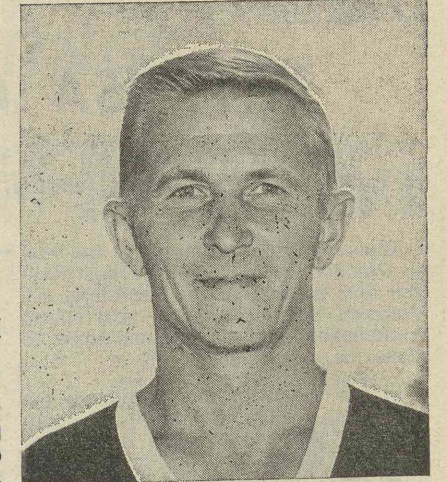
Merton's forwards hold the key that could give them victory over Germania at Heath Park on Saturday.

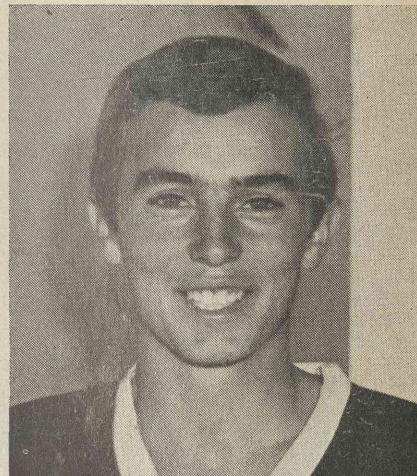

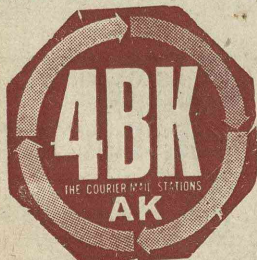
