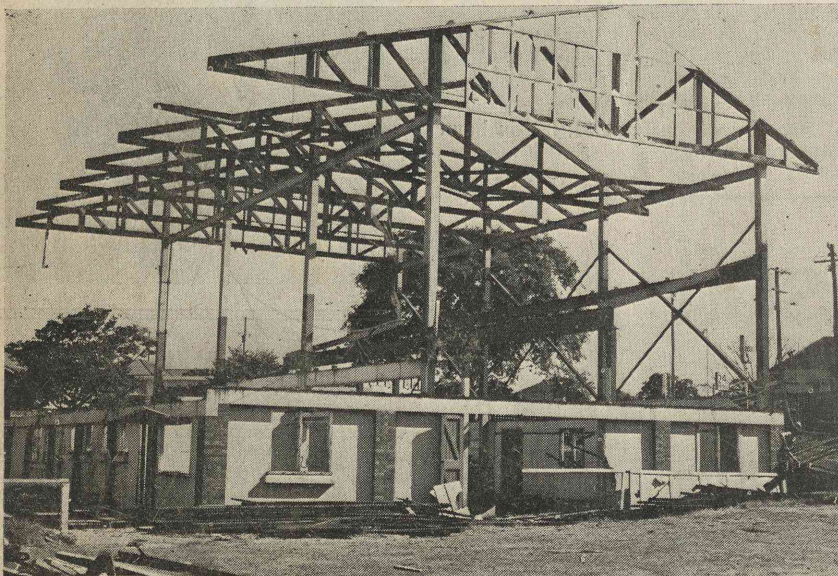

On this occasion they conceded three goals to the 'Rivers and were let off lightly, as the Strathpine boys missed chances galore.

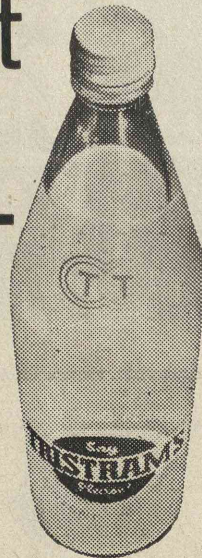
If 'Rivers can learn to take advantage of the openings they create for themselves they cannot fail to be a force to be reckoned with.
