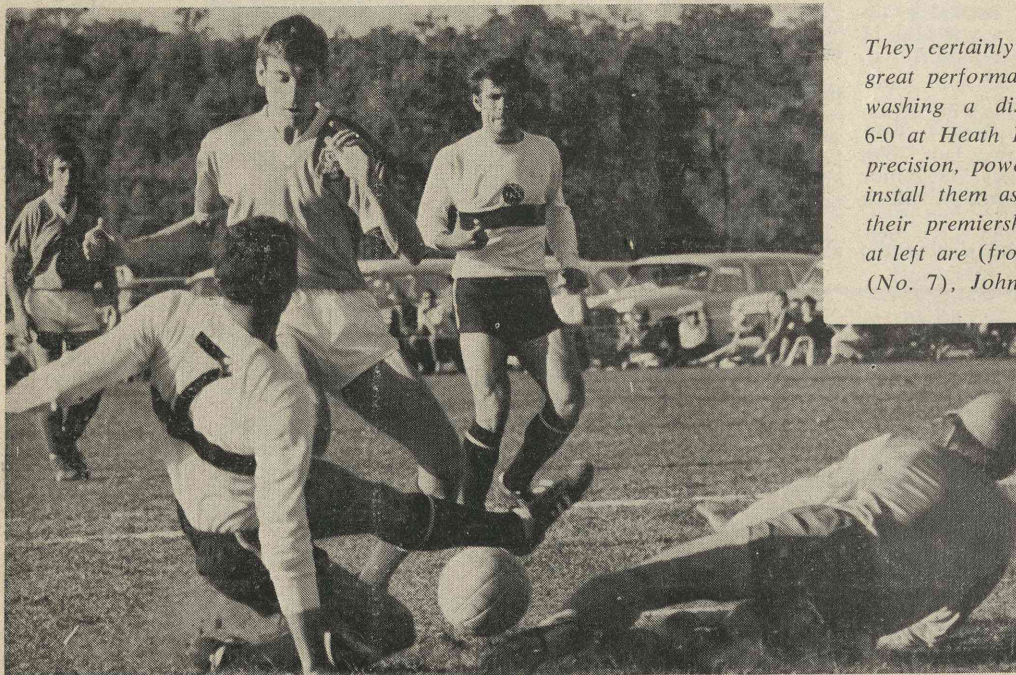

The new Federation was formed at a meeting convened by the Queensland Soccer Federation and chaired by Mr. Bill Waddell.

Officials appointed to manage the Federation are: President, Mr. W. Stevens; Secretary, Mr. E. (Dennis) Stone; Treasurer, Mr. H. Mounney; plus delegates from each affiliated Country body.

The first duty of the new body is to stage an U-15 years intra-State Carnival in Cairns during August.

A play off is already under way to find two teams to represent the South-East section of the State.

Teams in the play off represent Brisbane A, Brisbane B, Ipswich, Gold Coast Toowoomba and Stanthorpe.

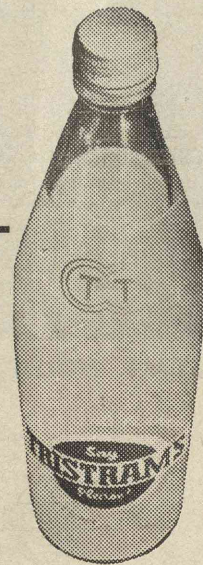

Hugh Montgomery will be absent with a couple of cracked ribs, but the nippy Dale Mortimer should again be fit enough to take his place in the forward line.

Hollandia have two promising youngsters in Paul Ray and Paul Lennon, but with a couple of matches under their belts, must be close to endangering their Junior status.

Gary Wilkins is sure to miss Darryl midfield, but he's backed by that outstanding quartet of defenders.

Ernie Deavin has filled the breach as an attacking full back now that Wilkins has moved upfield. Peter Steen and John Van Klaveren are as reliable as ever and Ben Mollee is doing a great job in the centre half spot vacated by Phil Sunderland.

Oxley centre half Roy Scott is maintaining his form and will have to really sustain it on Saturday. In fact the entire Oxley defence put up a good performance in their narrow 2-3 loss to Hellenic at Carina.

Les Jones is a better full back than forward and Brian Bjorkelund and Eddie Hillier are holding plenty of leather in the middle of the field.

The big improvement in the Dunlop Park attack is obvious by the result of their 'new blood' Jock 'Hellenic' Taylor, and Trevor 'Coalstars' Payne.

Rex Evans has been promoted up front and last week hit paydirt with Oxley's first goal. Alex McEwan and Bob Dobinson are the wingers and the former in particular, could help to provide what would be one of the biggest boillovers of the current season.

dividends for Merton, but the forwards were up against tough opposition with Hollandia's Ben Mollee, Peter Steen, John Van Klaveren and Ernie Deaven almost the proverbial brick wall.
