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FEATURE PAGE — MEMORANDUM ON THE LAWS OF THE GAME

A memorandum entitled "Application of the laws of the Game" was circulated to all National Associations by F.I.F.A. on the 9th February of this year in an attempt to bring about greater uniformity in the understanding of the laws by Coaches, players, Referees and of course, the Spectator, who is usually the first to complain.

In this section each week, we will convey this memorandum to our readers under ten different categories, so we would advise everyone to study the contents and gain maybe a little more understanding of some of the special differences in the application of the laws of the greatest football code in the world.

1. DANGEROUS PLAY

Football is a game where body contact occurs and the laws are framed so that the players can play without danger to themselves if their opponents respect both the letter and spirit of the laws. In some countries in membership with FIFA certain acts are considered automatically by both players and referees to be dangerous and are penalised WHETHER THEY ARE DANGEROUS OR NOT. Each incident must be judged by the referee as it happens and the question of danger rests entirely on his opinion. Such actions must be penalised regardless of the intention of the player.

The following are some examples where countries differ in their interpretation of what is dangerous play.

1. 1. Tackling with the foot lifted from the ground:

This may be dangerous, but is not NECESSARILY so: the sole of the foot is an effective way of controlling the ball and the lifted foot should be penalised if the referee sees danger to the opponent in the manner in which it is done. If the player intentionally plays over the ball and makes contact with the opponent's leg, this is a serious foul.

1. 2. Tackling with two feet together: The ball acts as a natural 'cushion' between the players. If the two-footed tackle is controlled and made from a short distance away, there is no danger to the opponent. If it is an uncontrolled jump at the ball from a distance, the tackle has certainly a large element of danger to the opponent.

1. 3. Tackling by sliding: This is done by one or both legs outstretched and the same considerations as

for the two-footed tackle apply. The player tackling in this way knows that if he misses the ball he may bring his opponent down, in which case he should be penalised for Tripping and not Dangerous Play.

1. 4. Tackling from behind: If the tackle is made for the ball there can be no offence of tripping, but it may be considered as dangerous play.

1. 5. The 'Scissors' Kick: This is a clear example of the importance of judging an action according to the situation in which it is performed. A player who kicks or attempts to kick the ball in this way with no other player near him cannot be penalised for dangerous play. The same action with a player nearby would be very dangerous.

1. 6. Dangerous play against goalkeepers:

Whilst kicking or attempting to kick the ball whilst in the goalkeeper's possession is universally considered to be dangerous, raising the foot to block the ball as he kicks it from his hands is equally dangerous though it is not always penalised. Attempts to kick the ball powerfully as it is about to come into the goalkeeper's possession are also a common source of danger to goalkeepers.

2. JUMPING AT AN OPPONENT A player sometimes jumps at his opponent as if to head the ball in order to prevent his opponent heading it. This player is guilty of the offence of Jumping at an Opponent.

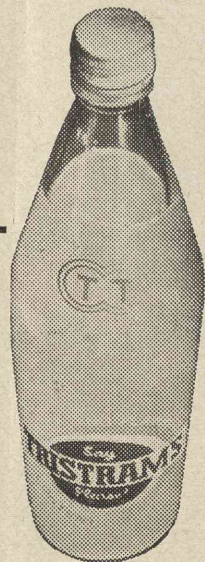
3. USE OF ARM The use of the arm by players to hold off an opponent is increasing. Such action must be penalised as "Holding".

4. OBSTRUCTION Whilst the obstruction law is generally well understood and applied, the following are aspects where lack of uniformity is apparent:

4. 1. Playing distance: This is determined by whether the player concerned CAN play the ball at any given moment IF HE WISHES TO; if the ball is beyond his control in terms of distance and he is preventing his opponent from playing it, then he commits the offence of obstruction.

4. 2. Charging from behind: A player who obstructs his opponent but commits no offence because the ball is within his playing distance may be charged from behind. This means a charge in the region of the shoulder, but not in the back itself; any kind of charge near the spine is obviously very dangerous and is forbidden in all circumstances.

This was a tense and rugged game in which Mr. Referee had to do a little bit of writing, however Forrest were to lead 1-0 at the half time whistle.

Both teams played hard footie, with the odds leaning slightly Uni.'s way and early in the second half, right winger Will Arunden attempted a central-cross, which fooled the goalie and went in for the equaliser.

Forrest wing halves were more settled in this half and distributed well and spirited attacks by Uni. showed the Forrest 'keeper to be a cool one under trying conditions.

Mt. Gravatt: This club had nine wins, 12 losses and three draws last week-end, and one game worth mentioning was the U15A's win, when they got their revenge over Easts 2-1, giving Easts their first losing game. Gordon Petersen and Glen Saunders scored for the winners and Willie Connors notched Easts goal. 7A: Although these little fellows went down to Gap 10-1, they had the distinction of scoring the only two goals that have crossed Gap's line. Azzurri v. Merton Rovers

On Sunday, Azzurri hope to move a step nearer to winning the only major Soccer trophy which has eluded them since they reached top company Soccer in 1960.

Azzurri will meet Merton Rovers at Heath Park in the 2.45 semi-final of the Queensland Ampol Cup double-header.

Azzurri reached the final of the Ampol Cup five times between 1960 and 1966, but lost four times in a row to Hellenic and then were defeated by Grange Thistle in 1966.

The change in format in 1968, which made the Ampol Cup series a Queensland wide competition, failed to lift the jinx on Azzurri last year.

Azzurri, as usual, reached the final but bowed out again losing 1-2 to Hollandia in the final.

Merton, the Soccer champs of 1962, 1964 and 1968, have had a poor run in the Ampol Cup series. Their only Ampol highlight came in 1963 when they reached the final which Hellenic won 3-2.

This Sunday's semi-final will be a crowd pleaser if the match is as entertaining as their premiership meeting at Spencer Park last Sunday which was drawn 3-all.

Merton were quick to capitalise on two defensive errors of Azzurri in the second half and firstly Eric Pattison, and then John Gordon, showed opportunism to score and give Merton a 3-2 lead midway through the second half.

The Merton attack spearheaded by

Eric Pattison bothered the Azzurri defence all afternoon and Merton were a transformed team compared with the team that lost 0-6 to Hollandia in the debacle a week earlier.

Pattison seems to like playing in the Queensland Cup series, because he has scored 10 goals in Merton's two Cup outings—five against Germania.

Ian Johnston, leader of the Azzurri attack, has hit top form and his two goals last week were slammed in with tremendous power and accuracy.

The midfield players, John Mengotti and Peter Nielsen (Azzurri) and Harry Stewart and Geoff. Green (Merton) turned in impressive performances last match, and their displays on Sunday will have a big bearing on the result.

Gary Catchpole, Merton centre-half also can expect a big task in coping with Ian Johnston, while Matt. Hosie seemingly will have a big job in attempting to tame Eric Pattison.

A thriller looks certain, and even on Heath Park, I feel Azzurri may have enough edge to come out on top.

Azzurri have the better recent record. They are unbeaten in seven matches, while Merton have won only twice in their last seven games.

A tremendous "new-look" Thistle side has a great chance of reaching its second Queensland Cup Final at the Exhibition on Sunday.

again. But this year they have first to dispose of one of the most unspectacular, but consistent teams in the premiership competition — the all white Polonia.

Thistle axed three players last week and deservedly grabbed a point off Hellenic at carina, and in so doing, displayed a tenacious, come-back quality which has often absented itself from the Thistle camp.

Keith Rigby is undoubtedly one of the safest custodians in the game, but last week inexplicably misjudged a harmless drive from Mick Papasavas, giving Hellenic a gift goal.

The Thistle defence formation is identical to that of Hollandia and consists of "Bluey" Smith, who needs to steady his clearance kicking, Barry Dann, always strong in the air, Owen Lane and Barry Allison.

Lane had an impressive debut for the season on Sunday and should mould into a very reliable halfback.

Another newcomer, Mike Culhana joins Peter Clemiston as the two link men, taking Jeff Cornford's place, who successfully moved into the attack.

Roger Paget was pretty quiet on the left wing but is a better player than that. He should be one of the big dangers to George Whittaker's defence with Ritchie Smith and Vic Wyer, if fit.

The Polonia forward line looks to be at its lethal best and Wayne Walker and Syd Tucker form a tricky pair of wingers.

Tony Lowndes and Roger Clark will spearhead Sunday's attack and they've got the clever Owen Monaghan to give them a good sight of the ball.

Polonia's big trump card is a superior midfield advantage now that Alan James back with the experienced Derek Attwood and Eddie Musial complete a tough defence which has conceded only 18 premiership goals. Lastly, the one to match Rigby's job, and there's not much between the two, is the spectacular but safe Frank Romanowski.

Polonia are now big chances of disturbing Hollandia's premiership hopes and although they lost 1-2 to Thistle in their first round premiership match, they appear to me to have less weaknesses in all departments.

So I'll reluctantly tip Polonia in a close one, but Thistle must know by now that when I go against them, they usually meet with success. So who knows? Referee — Vince Dobinson

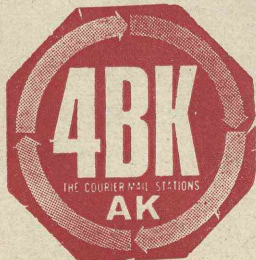
