FEATURE PAGE — CONTINUATION OF MEMORANDUM ON LAWS OF THE GAME

10. (continued)

It is in the attitude to the practices which offend the spirit of the game that great differences between countries can exist. Deliberate obstruction and handling of the ball to prevent a vital movement of play, time wasting, treatment of injury, coaching from the line, appealing against decisions — these and other acts are viewed in a different light according to the feelings aroused. It is an attempt to resolve some of these differences of outlook that the International Board defines concrete examples and gives its ruling or opinion on them:—

(1) No player shall be treated for injury on the field of play. Where the injury to the player seems to be serious, the referee shall, if necessary, stop the game and signal for the trainer to come on the field and he will arrange the removal of the player from the field. If a player requires minor treatment, he should notify the referee and leave the field to receive the treatment.

(2) Referees are asked to take firm action, if necessary, by cautioning players who deliberately handle the ball to prevent a pass from reaching another player, or who handle an opponent to prevent him from reaching the ball.

The well-known instance of a full-back fisting the ball out of goal, when the goalkeeper is beaten, is often quoted as an argument that the full-back is saving a goal in that the ensuing penalty may perhaps fail, and if not, then the player is no worse off than he would have been had the first shot scored. The argument is false; the player is much worse off, for even though his action may save a goal, and may, perhaps, win the match, he has lost his reputation as a sportsman.

(3) In this category are placed a whole series of time-wasting tricks. For example, deliberately kicking or throwing the ball away, holding it or standing over it in order to delay the taking of a throw-in or a free kick and "stealing" yards when taking a throw-in. Referees must deal with these situations firmly, if necessary administering a caution to the players concerned.

(4) Coaching from the touch-line should not be allowed, nor should players be allowed to molest the referee in appeals against decisions. Referees must take a firm attitude on these matters, but it is more important that players, coaches, managers and officials in charge of teams should all co-operate

in stamping out acts which bring the game into disrepute.

The International Board is of the opinion that each National Association should concern itself seriously in the matter of strengthening the power of match officials, getting co-operation of Clubs on these matters, and in supporting them in an effort to rid the game of acts of bad sportsmanship.

(5) There are other aspects of players behaviour which affect the overall sporting spirit of the game, and which managers and others responsible for players' conduct should control. Over-exuberance when a goal is scored, exhibited by hugging and embracing, is undesirable, and it is expected that teams should restrain their enthusiasm to reasonable bounds.

The co-operation of all associations throughout the world is requested to bring this memorandum to the notice of all concerned within their organisation by circular, the Press, Association magazines, Referee Bulletins, and similar means.

FOR SOME THE PARTY'S OVER: Saturday 26/7/69 saw the completion of the season for quite a number of the Junior Fixtures, and only 2 games remain to be decided by the teams, with the extra fixture games, and then after the August break, only playoffs to go.

FROM THE CLUBS

GRANGE THISTLE: The juniors from Thistle's club had only moderate success, with 2 wins and 2 draws for the day. Coalstar's U7A's reversed a 1st round defeat by downing the little fellows from Grange 4 nil, and the U7C's and 8A's lost 2 nil to Hollandia and the Gap respectively. Mt. Oxley's record this season is depressingly similar to 1967 and 1968 and the Dunlop Park team again is in grave danger of relegation.

Oxley finished last in 1967, and escaped demotion through the increase in first division team strength from eight to ten. Last season, Oxley and Latrobe shared the last place on the points table, but Latrobe were relegated because of an inferior goal average.

Oxley will meet Polonia at Prentice Park on Sunday. They will need a super king sized display and a shock result if they are to take the two points.

With five matches to go, Oxley have eight points and are sandwiched between Coalstars (nine points) and the last team Germania, who have seven.

Last Sunday, Oxley had no answer to Azzurri, whose 8-0 win was their biggest in several years.

Polonia have maintained their position in the top four and have also reached the final of the Queensland Ampol Cup. Their football is based on a pretty reliable defence, a strong and aggressive midfield, and forwards who are always on the lookout for the scoring chance.

Oxley expect to have goalkeeper John Pizzey back for Sunday's match. This will improve the defence, but Oxley will need to pay more attention to marking and tackling the wingers. Azzurri right-winger, Gerry Schoendorfer had a field day last match against Oxley, when he was given tons of space to manoeuvre.

THISTLE CHALLENGE

Polonia, with Ed. Musial, Derek Robson and Derek Attwood forming a solid defensive trio, should be capable of taming the Oxley attack, which has scored only seven goals in the last eight matches.

On paper, the Oxley forward line of Bob Dobinson, John Taylor, Trevor Payne, Rex Evans and Alex McEwan, does not look unimpressive, but they just don't get goals, which are the things which count in Soccer.

Owen Monaghan and Alan James, Polonia's midfield pair, look like being a big headache to Oxley with their good ball control and accurate passes.

Pine Rivers hopes of a top four place suffered a temporary setback this week-end when they went under 2-1 to Coolangatta at Strathpine.

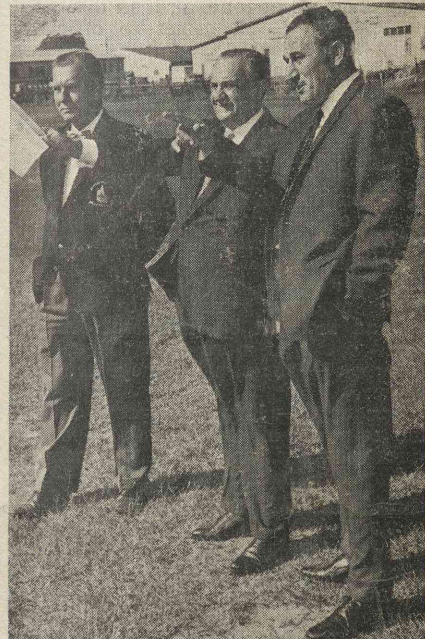
