



MEXICO — WORLD CUP 1970 ******************

Despite the fact that the Mexicans are hosts for the 1970 World Cup they are taking the European challenge seriously.

They have just recently completed a European tour designed to give them experience against all types of European

The results left room for improvement — but it was noted that Mexico had three dangerous forwards in Aaron Padilla, Enrique Borja and Ernesto Cisneros, who could well be the men to watch in 1970.

ENGLISH SOCCER

A survey on goals scored in the past five completed seasons shows Manchester United as the league's leading goalscorers with 436 goals, they are followed by Queens Park Rangers with 413, and Southampton and Hull City with 408. The lowest goalscorers are Orient on 246.

The only player to score 50 goals in a season in post war soccer is Terry Bly who scored 52 goals for Peterborough when they gained promotion from 4th Division.


