England's lone goal came from the boot of Hull City striker Chris Chilton in the 16th minute of the first half.







On the Coaching Scene By SAM MORGAN


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GEO. PAGAN (STATE COACH) & THE GAP PERSEVERANCE

How often does a player who commits a mistake during a game allow it to disturb his concentration of his game? How often does this same mistake affect his fellow mates, and how often does a mistake made by a referee change or affect a team's performance? Think deeply, before answering. My answer is, much too often. Players must be trained to accept the fact that mistakes and setbacks are part of that hilly road to success. A player must realise also his own shortcomings, and should work religiously to improve them. To measure his improvement, he should base his results on game situations, where all the pressures are present. PERSEVERANCE is itself an accomplishment and one who attains this, has gained himself the hallmark of any great sportsman. This will aid him to face up to any depression, to any barrier or to any weakness that affronts, with a positive outlook. **DIR. OF COACHES**

(MATT CARSON)

TO SPIKE OR NOT TO SPIKE? (Cont'd from last week)

Tension in the lower limbs was partially borne out by Malcolm Allison, the Manchester City Coach, who advocated the use of spikes "... if the players themselves feel they have a personal beneficial effect". However,

he says there was a time, before the season began, when minor strains and pulls were causing some concern at Maine road. Mr. Allison believes that running in spikes can have a tremendous psychological value for his players. He wonders, however, whether the actual material benefits can be calculated. The players, he admits, feel faster and stronger when running in spikes, although in actual fact, they may only improve a player by as little as half a yard in thirty or forty yards. The advantage then is purely PSYCHO-LOGICAL- the players FEEL BETTER when they use them and they are constantly kept on their toes.

We've heard the views of the physiotherapist and the coach. Now listen to those expressed by the Manager, Don Revie of Leeds United and the player, West Ham United and England skipper, Bobby Moore.

Mr. Revie says that "none of our players use running spikes for sprints, to increase their speed. We do all our training and sprints in football boots, as we feel that this is what they have got to do in a match, so we believe in doing it in our training sessions".

The number of soccer spectators who say, "THEY MUST BE OFFER-ING HIM BETTER MONEY" when a professional player joins a particular club, creates a general opinion that a player thinks of MONEY as be all and end all. Well believe me there are a lot of other factors which govern a player's decision. These are:-(a) Club Structure (b) Manager] ideally one

(c) Sole Selector] and the same

- (d) Coach (e) Fellow Players (f) Facilities
- (g) Incentive (h) Team Spirit

them.

(a) THE CLUB STRUCTURE ideally would be divided into working and finance committee and team management, both separate bodies within the club, each having its own particular duties and having a liason officer (the President) communicating between

(b) MANAGER AND SOLE SELECTOR:-

as a manager always open and truthful with players and with the character and patience to overcome the variety of characters, feelings and ideas of individuals in the team and blend them together. He must also be able to observe faults on and off the field and make good whether by psychological or practical means. The title of Sole Selector speaks for itself.

(c) COACH:-

one who understands the game, is respected by the players, easy to get on with and a firm hand at the right times in training sessions.

(d) FELLOW PLAYERS:-

are they a friendly crowd, easy to get on with and are they content to join a club where you have differences with other players not only effects your own personal achievement but also that of the team.

(e) FACILITIES:-

mainly those provided for at training sessions i.e. equipment, changing accommodations, showers and refreshments.

(f) INCENTIVE:-

anything offered as a reward whether it be a NIGHT OFF TRAINING. or an END OF SEASON TOUR.

(g) TEAM SPIRIT:-

most important of all and is a combination of all previous facets; without which a team could be struggling whether they had a couple of George Bests or Peles.

So as you can see "monetary return" is only one of the many factors involved in deciding which club you will join.

WHY?

Of all the items of equipment carried on the field by the referee the most important is his whistle. In fact, he is advised to carry two. But who said the referee should have a whistle? It is stated a linesman should have a flag, but no mention is made of whistle The laws state that to start or restart a game a signal shall be given but referees are not told what form that signal shall take. So why not a bell or a rattle? Perhaps some reader can tell us the origin of the use of a whistle by referees and when it was first used.

LAW 13 - FREE KICK

When a player is taking a direct or an indirect free kick outside his own penalty area, all of the opposing players shall be at least ten yards from the ball, until it is in play, unless they are standing on their own goal line, between the goal posts. The ball shall be in play when it has travelled the distance of its own circumference". It is important to note that all players of the opposing side shall be at least ten yards from the ball. The practice seems to be developed for a player, when a free kick is given against his team, near or in the penalty area, to marshall his team into a defensive wall. To do this he stands near the ball. By so doing he is clearly breaking Law 13.

All players should be reminded that if they do not observe the ten yard rule the International Board Decision requires that they must be cautioned and if they repeat the offence they must be ordered off the field for serious misconduct.

The Catchpoles would have to form one of the best footballing families in the State at present.

Big Gary, despite being dropped from the State team, is not putting a foot wrong in the Merton-East defence each week and Trevor's non-stop displays have earned him a berth in the Brisbane side and a place in the State squad training for the match against England.

Meanwhile younger brother Neil is on loan to Wynnum from Merton for this season and from all reports is certainly paying his way in no uncertain manner.

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
