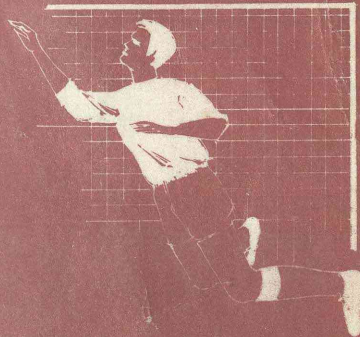

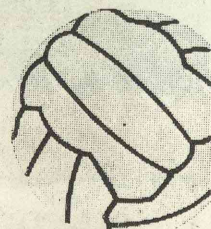

REFEREES' CORNER

There is no doubt that from the start of the season a record was on the way.

More players have been sent off or cautioned against the laws and spirit of the game this time last year. Punishments have ranged from fines to suspensions.

The disciplinary committee can do little more than to continue to inflict heavier punishments, while referees can only continue to take stern action against players.

Too many club officials shirk their responsibilities by condoning offences of their players which brings the game into disrepute.

All too often they make statements that blame everybody else but the players and themselves, concerning a lack of discipline.

Club managements from the highest to the lowest levels should take a critical look at themselves and ask the question—Can we spot much of this misconduct on the field? If they are honest, the answer surely must be yes!

RULES OF THE GAME:—

(a) Tackling with the foot lifted from the ground— This may be dangerous but not necessarily so. The sole of the foot is an effective way of controlling the ball and the lifted foot should be penalised if the referee sees danger imminent to an opponent.

If the player intentionally plays over the ball and makes contact with an opponent's leg, this is a serious fault.

(b) Tackling with two feet together— The ball acts as a natural cushion between the players. If the two-footed tackle is controlled and made from a short distance away, there is no danger to the opponent.

If it is an uncontrolled jump at the ball from a distance, then the tackle certainly has a large element of danger to the opponent.

NEWS FROM AROUND THE WORLD

More than 300 foreign sports writers, 100,000 spectators and a galaxy of stars were the trimmings of the farewell of Lev Yashin in Moscow's Lenin Stadium recently.

The match between the combined Dynamos of U.S.S.R. and a "Friendship XI" ended in a 2-2 draw.

The legendary Yashin played until the 50th minute until he handed over to his Dynamo successor Pilguy.

This was the "Friendship XI" lineup— Mazurkiewicz, Djorkaeff, Faccetti, Schulz, Meszoly, Pena, Dumitrache Bonev, Muller, Charlton, Dzajic.

Sunday football could come into being in England next season.

Nottingham Forrest and Coventry City are canvassing support for their motion to introduce Sunday football, but they are expected to receive little support from the other clubs when the motion is put forward at the English League's annual general meeting.

A storm is brewing in West Germany over the suspension of World Cup star Gerd Muller for an offence allegedly committed last January.

Muller was found guilty of striking a Peruvian player when his club Bayern Munich played in Lima earlier in the year.

The West German fans are outraged mainly because it took the local F.A. six months to compile a report and hand out a sentence for the incident.

The Moscow Dynamos, who toured Australia earlier this year have won two and drawn four of their opening six matches in the Soviet Championship.

The lead currently is shared by Kiev and newcomers to the competition, Ararat.

Famous English First Division club Chelsea, are planning extensive alterations to their home ground at Stamford Bridge in London.

When completed, the ground is expected to hold a crowd of 80,000 and will cost the club about \$10 million.

West Ham skipper Bobby Moore is fast approaching his century of appearances for England.

His international caps now number 87, and of the current national team, the closest to him are Gordon Banks (65), Allan Ball and Martin Peters (49) and Geoff Hurst (43).

AUSTRALIA v. ENGLAND F.A. BY BRUCE WADDELL

This match further underlined the differences between the full time English professional players and the semiprofessionals from Australia.

It also stressed the need for national coach Rale Rasic to spend a bit more time looking at the players from the other States of Australia, including Queensland.

If Jack Reilly is the best 'keeper in the country, then we are in trouble. Many Sydney people were of the opinion that South Australia's Roger Romanowicz should have played, considering Reilly's equally poor display for New South Wales against the English last Sunday week.

I am sure that either Mark Walker or Martin Coe would have left Reilly for dead last Sunday.

Australia held their own in the first half, particularly in midfield and defence. Stopper Peter Wilson again proved that he is in world class with his lion-hearted defence against the continually raiding English forwards.

He was well supported in the backline by George Keith, John Watkins and Colin Curren in the first half, but the latter three faded noticeably in the second half under almost non-stop pressure.

Wilson did not falter and looks a permanent national team fixture for years to come.

Former Queenslander Ray Richard's physique has developed immensely since he went to Sydney and was one of the most consistent midfield men with George Blues.

Of the forwards, Adrian Alston always looked the main danger but was not supported sufficiently by Ray Baartz, Jim Rooney and Atti Abonyi to enable him to fully realise that promise.

Australia should not be dismayed at this performance. They have proved at last that the days when we were beaten by 7 or 8-0 by touring teams are well in the past.

Perhaps if these men were to become fulltime professionals, I think that the result could easily be reversed in the not too distant future.
