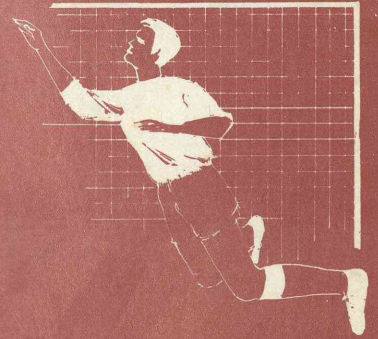

THE PURPOSE OF A MANAGER

Many people have asked what is the manager's job in the modern soccer organisation. The answer can only be an opinion, but if one cares to look at the professional organisation and apply it to their own situation, they could not go far wrong. If I were pressed I would answer in the following manner:

The managers of a team should prepare a team or squad mentally and physically for the task to be performed.

Most managers now leave the physical preparation of the players to a coach. Depending on the coach's capabilities the wise manager will delegate power to the coach, but, as he is accountable to the club management for the team's performances, he

will take an interest in the coach's work and the player's reactions to the coaching methods. Hence the modern term "Track suit manager". Again as he is accountable for the coach's performance, he should be given some say when a coach is being selected for the club. More and more today are we finding "manager-coach" set-ups coming to the fore i.e. Arsenal—Mee & Howe, Celtic—Stein & Meehan, Manchester City, Mercer & Allison, Rangers—Waddell & Wallace. I personally have found this the ideal set-up for part-time soccer as in Brisbane. A part-time manager cannot hope to be successful at both jobs. If we accept that a manager here is essentially the mental and psychological preparer of players, I also think the position warrants sole selection of the team. After all if he is solely accountable for the team's performance he should be given the right to name his players. He should also decide the tactics to be used by the players he names. Of course a manager may well debate the tactics to the coach if he so chooses, this would depend on how his personal "manager coach relationship" functions. Remember if all things are to his satisfaction (this is important) the manager should be solely responsible for a team's performance, and there can only be one course of action if a team consistently performs badly.

To sum up the manager's position is not one to be filled lightly. The days of "orange-boy", "strip-boy",

"team sheet man", have long, long gone. Today a man of tact and know-how is required, he would preferably have some knowledge of modern management, coaching, and soccer tactics and techniques, all of these skills being every bit as important as the other, but the omission of one grossly impedes the modern manager in his task.

LOWER DIVISION NEWS

Highlight of the 4th Division scene last week-end was the "top of the table" battle between the two undefeated leaders, Qld. Irish and New Farm at Robinson Park.

Irish won the match 3-1 and now as the only undefeated team in that division, must be odds on favourites to take out the premiership.

Their previous meeting produced a 2-2 draw, but this match had everything good football, brilliant goals, several near misses and a goal disallowed.

Both clubs payed tribute to referee Brabrock after the match who commented that it was keenest fought match in any division he had seen this season.

Hellenic have reached the lead in the 2B Division after their draw with Redcliffe last week.

The team is managed by former First Division goalkeeper Nana Dvornicich, who had been playing until receiving a broken jaw several weeks back.

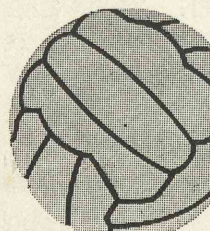

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BRISBANE JUNIORS ROUND-UP

BRIGHTON MAKING PROGRESS

Brighton District Soccer Club are slowly but surely improving their standing in the Code, especially in the Junior ranks. The Club was revived in 1966 after some years absence, with a membership of 15 juniors and one coach. Steady progress was made from that date until 1970 when the Club fielded 6 junior teams and one senior team. Included in these teams was the Club's first ever under 7 team which was successful in winning the D. Division Premiership, and the Shield, with an undefeated record. Their goal average was 127 goals for and one goal against, a tremendous achievement for any team. The under 10D team were also successful in winning the Premiership and Shield double in their Division.

This season the growth rate has continued and the Club is currently catering for 11 Junior teams and a Senior team, playing in the 3B Division. This year's new Under 7 team who are playing in the 7C Division have scored 29 goals, conceding no goals in reply, in 5 matches. The Club has not any 'A' Division teams as yet but have 8B, 14B and 16B sides who all have A Division status in their sights.

Brighton Officials are very proud of their Club's achievements and it is obvious that if the excellent efforts to date are fostered and continued this young Club will soon be a big Club.

TEAM SPIRIT AT AZZURRI

I received the following story which I think is worth relating, as an example of good team spirit and the fostering of good comradeship, from Azzurri Juniors.

It appears that the Azzurri Under 10 team were to play a fixture at Redcliffe in 10A Division. One member of the team, John Brennan, was not feeling well, but rather than let his team down he took the field and thus ensured that they did not have to play a man short. The team recorded a win by 3 goals to 2, their second win of the season with John playing his part in the win.

In the day or so after the game, however, John was unfortunate in that he contracted Pneumonia which resulted in his being confined to bed for a considerable time.

His team mates felt that as John had made a special effort to support them, they would like to reciprocate and show their appreciation of his efforts, along, to wish him a speedy recovery, and to show their appreciation, presented him with a new soccer ball. John is well on the way to recovery and will no doubt treasure the gift and the thoughts behind it for a long time.

I think that the spirit displayed by the members of this team and by John Brennan speaks well of the training and guidance that they receive from their Club and its officials. It also shows clearly that proper guidance and encouragement will bring out the best side of any boy's character.

REPRESENTATIVE TEAM TRIALS

The trials for the Under 13 team to visit Sutherland Shire in August are now at an advanced stage, with what will probably be a final trial

being held at Annerley on June 13th.

It is certain that the team will be the best that we can field and some very good boys have come to the fore in the trials held so far. In some respects the Ways and Means Committee's views and suggestions have been supported by the results of the trials to dare. Many of the boys still in the running for selection are boys who received several nominations, from different clubs on the nomination forms which were adopted on the Committee's recommendation.

The team should be finalised in the next week or so and they will be assembled for regular training and coaching to prepare them for what will be, as in previous years, a tough demanding tour.

Trials for teams in other age groups are in the planning stage and Clubs will be advised about the details in the near future.

Attempts are being made to provide interstate competition for all age groups from under 10 upwards seven where there is no organised tour or carnival already planned.

WORLD TRAVEL IS
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REFEREES' CORNER

Why do they call the man in charge of the game a referee when nobody refers anything to him?

This is because, prior to 1890, he was always seated off this field and the game was governed by two umpires, one in each half of the field.

If they did not agree on a decision, play was stopped and they walked over to this third man and "referred" the question in doubt to him.

He then became known as the referee and his ruling was final.

When, in 1890, he was transferred to operate inside the field on his own, he retained the name of referee, but was given absolute power to enforce the laws and decide any disputed points.

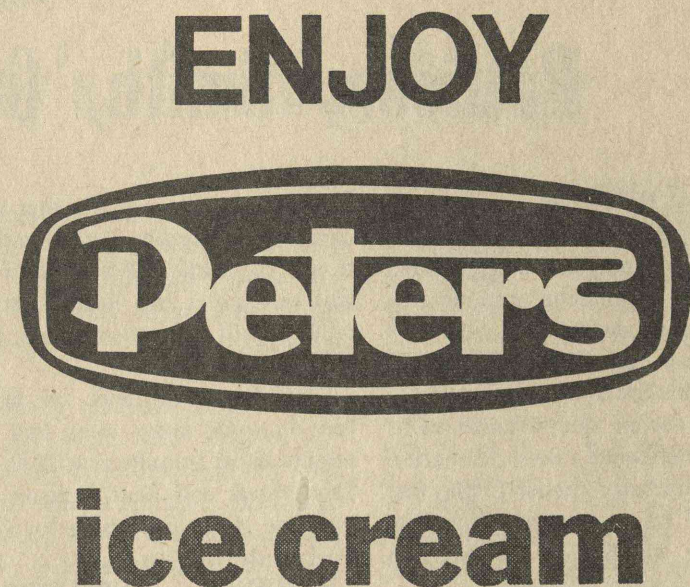
His decision on points of fact connected with the play shall be final, so far as the result of the game is concerned.

His jurisdiction begins from the time he signals for the kickoff and his power of penalising shall extend to offences committed when play has been temporarily suspended or when the ball is out of play.

He shall however, refrain from penalising in cases where he is satisfied that by doing so he would be giving an advantage to the offending team.

A good point from the referees (last sentence) but why do so many of our referees refuse to play the advantage?

The Fagan brothers are doing a ton of work every week and a 90 minute effort from Peter Walker, Andy Tsoumbaras and Matt Jackson could even see Hellenic pressing for a semi-final berth with two points.

THISTLE v. MERTON (SUNDAY, PERRY PARK, 1.0)

The premiership hopes of both these sides rest in the balance with this match.

Merton suffered a setback when they went down to Hollandia after leading at halftime last week and Thistle, unbeaten since May 9, are clinging grimly to their premiership lead.

Following his two brilliant goals against Hollandia, Eric Pattison appears to have returned to his best form and will be Merton's main hope of breaking down Thistle's compact defensive wall of Smith, Keenan, Dann and Allison.

Allison in particular, one of the most underrated fullbacks in Brisbane, is having a solid season and his clash with nippy Des Heath on the Merton wing will be one of the highlights.

Thistle are an infinitely better side when the top two strikers Ritchie Smith and Jim Ancliffe "fire" and they certainly did not do this against Bardon on Saturday.

And they will not get the chance again this week apparently, as Ancliffe will be in hospital for surgery- a blow which could seriously affect Thistle's chances.

If Ancliffe is missing, Smith will depend on a rapidly improving Steve Pollard, who lately is getting among the goals, for his support.

The Merton rearguard of Gary Catchpole, Alex Senjuschenko, and Graham Meagher struck a horror stretch in their second half last week, and it is highly unlikely that such lapse will be repeated.

With Ancliffe out and Pattison back to form, those differences appear to point to a return to the winning list for Merton.

POLONIA v. HOLLANDIA

(SATURDAY, PERRY PARK, 3.0)

Now in dire straits with regard to the relegation issue, Polonia will lean heavily on their two constructive men up front, Owen Monaghan and Syd Tucker.

Presuming that Hellenic are now heading out of the relegation mire after their win last week, Polonia must battle for points in an effort to stay level with Wynnum until they meet that team on August 1, in a match which could well decide who will vacate First Division next season.

But Polonia have far too good a side to be in their present position, so Hollandia will not want to approach this clash with complacency.

It is not beyond Polonia to win, but their big problem will be to overcome the "Wilkins bogey", as Gary and Darryl are tying up the midfield for Hollandia with Sven Anderson and are even playing just as vital a role up in attack.

Derek Attwood back in the side will add a bit more solidity to the defence and if Big Frank can produced a safe pair of hands as he did against Azzurri last week, Polonia can quite easily prevent a repetition of Hollandia's productive display which yielded four goals last week.

Tucker's ability in the air will provide Polonia with an asset sadly lacking in the past, and his clash with the equally safe Phil Sunderland in the Hollandia backline, could prove to be the turning point of the match.

Alan James and Derek Robson will be a definite threat to the Wilkins' midfield authority, but they are in such great form it is hard to go past a Hollandia victory.

But Polonia weren't disposed of too easily by Azzurri so mark this one down as a likely upset result.

But they are by no means certainties— Coalstars have an irritating habit of striking top form and then flopping badly in their ensuing matches.

On the other hand, Wynnum had the measure of Hellenic in the first half last Sunday until they faded no-

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ticeably when Hellenic started to apply the pressure.

Henry Brown will have to find a method of installing into his side the value of sustaining for the whole match, the promise they show in the first half of their matches.

No doubt the return of young halfback David Jones will help to provide the extra effort required.

Main hopes rest with Frank Sowden, Neil Catchpole and Glen Merrin up in attack, but their advances should be well matches by Coalstars' trio of Ian Davis, Kevin Caldwell and Wally Kitching.

Young Caldwell continues to justify the State selectors' faith in him with his football each week. A few more years under his belt and added experience and he could easily solve our forward line problems of the past.

Wynnum will be depending on the defence of Geoff Rogers, Vic Leggatt and Peter Edwards to counter this trio and if Catchpole and company can get going, Wynnum could keep the two points at home.

But winning form is good and Coalstars will be hard to toss if they can at least maintain that form of the last three weeks.

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On the Coaching Scene

WANTED COACHING NEWS

Every week I ask my FELLOW Coaches for news to do with coaching in general. I certainly have the regulars and I thank them very much for dedicated assistance in making this column as interesting as possible.

I must say I was very disappointed last Friday, as I travelled to Bundamba to give a Soccer film show (18-6-71) and the support was extremely disappointing. But by the same token I wish to thank those who supported the show. I also wish to thank the Headmaster of Bundamba State School for his very kind support in allowing me the loan of the school projector. Thank You Mr. W. Adams. Last, but not least, I would like to take this opportunity and wish me old mate Don Leo a speedy recovery from the flu.

DIR. OF COACHES (MATT CARSON)

I have had many inquiries regarding fitness tests for players. I have checked out step-up test, and the following is the simple test made to test a Player's recovery power. Any points which do not conform to the following make the test invalid.

No. 1. -Player made to rest 15 mins before test. -Pulse rate noted prior to test.

No. 2. -Player made to step up on to bench which "must" be twenty inches high.

No. 3. -Player must step up & down at the rate of 30 steps per min.

No. 4. -This must be maintained for "exactly 5 mins".

At one minute intervals, a count of pulse rate over 30 seconds must be noted. Time taken to get back to resting pulse rate must be determined, also recovery power of player. The Q.S.C.F. has proper charts made up to assist any body interested in doing this test.

A better and easier test is to make Player run exactly 1½ miles. The time noted, tells player's fitness.

e.g. 1st. run 7 mins

2nd. run 6 mins.

COMMENT: player fitter and faster.

e.g. 3rd run 7 mins 22 secs.

COMMENT: Player unfit—slow

Labouring—not trying?

COACH TO FIND OUT REASON

The simple test proves that if a Player is fit he will record good times. If not fit, times will be slow. Any big differences in times must have a reason.

Redlands need help regarding assisting them in coaching, what happened to your fellow coach BILL. Let's take this serious matter up at our next meeting.

DIR. OF COACHES (MATT CARSON)

After the defeat by the F.A. Tourists up went the old cry. We must be more professional, something must be done. The question I now ask when are we going to be professional. Professionalism must start with the clubs. There are Players here in Brisbane being paid good money to play soccer and their attitude to it is disgraceful. I've seen Players asked to be put on a contract so they can get a few dollars

from the club. This is wrong. A Player, if he is good enough, should be able to negotiate with a club for his services and vice versa. Professionalism is something to aim for and the rewards must be worth while. Clubs are carrying too much dead wood. Clubs should prune their staffs. Keep only the players considered to be an asset to the Club. Let the others go free. They in turn will improve the lower positions. Clubs with Junior teams must also realise that this is their nursery. Therefore, I would keep only Juniors I consider good enough to make the first team. This would or should start from 12 yrs. and upwards. I believe if a boy is good enough he should be played where his club thinks fit. If he is good enough at 15 yrs. of age for Senior football, he should play there. There are also too many clubs in Brisbane. First & Second Div., with reserve grades is sufficient. Both to be professional. An all age Amateur league is a must. Clubs with contract players must realise that they pay wages so the players must do as he is told. You don't ask, you tell players. Clubs should endeavour to employ Manager-Coach on full time basis. Steps should be taken to try and find a sponsor who would help to create the incentive to produce better football as a spectacle. For E.G. \$1,000 for the team who scores the most goals in any one game. The emphasis must be on attacking football not defensive. I could go on and on but space is limited. Let's think hard about our future. Forget the past, let's be ruthless and more positive otherwise we may as well pack in now.
