Any peculiarity in a game does not mean that a particular interpretation of the Laws can be made to match it. The referee who whistles an advantage or hinders play by standing too close to play does nothing to convince us of his good knowledge of the game.

Authority is sometimes lost due to a discrepancy in the co-operation between the referee and linesmen. Final decisions are made, in every case, by the referee on his own responsibility. The linesmen help to recognise offences which occur outside the referee's field of vision. This does not mean. however, that the referee divides his concentration and energy between himself and the linesmen. His decision alone is valid and so if he wishes to guide the game well, he must take the responsibility wholly upon himself and not try to divide it.

Undoubtedly the referee of to-day, bearing the whole responsibility for casting judgement between two rival parallel groups under the eyes of critical spectators, is in a more than difficult position.

Daily training in the form of gymnastics and the stimulation of the circulation is essential in view of the increased stamina required. The referee is, in most cases, past the age of peak performance, and must, therefore, train more often to remain physically fit. The moral attitude and preparation for each match is also very important. To prepare himself properly, he must acquaint himself with the peculiarities and motivations of the game to be directed. He will have a good basis for his performance only if he is really well prepared and estimates each game as his hardest so far. Every player and team has to know right from the kick-off what their game will be like and what they hope to achieve by it. Further-more, the first few moves can determine whether or not they will play confidently during the rest of the match. The referee should likewise be in the picture right from the onset and be fully equipped to have his top performance, i.e. he must begin his task with all his concentration and observation. Every game produces something new and unexpected, demanding absolute energy and effort at every moment.

In these times so rife in criticism and sensation, the demand for final and absolute recognition of every decision of the referee is really utopian.



Officials, coaches, indeed everyone concerned with the good name of Soccer or any other sport should actively discourage bad sportsmanship; especially when it takes the form of physical violence or vocal objections using foul language. All of us should discourage objections to decisions. Whatever happens, the decision of a referee is final. Most mistakes in refereeing are either unintentional or because of the lack of experience by the referee. How would we, as soccer players, be if we had to referee a game, yet we are supposed to know the game backwards. We should regard decisions as an ever-likely handicap. Appealing against a decision can be done in a legal, unemotional and civilised way.

I feel that a self-analysis after each game would help a lot of present-day players to become better sportsmen. Modern trend is that we all blame

everybody else for the defeats including our own team mates, coaches and referees. This leads to depression within oneself. Consequently it will affect one's own performance. Such negative feelings will curb good sportsmanship.

Set an example. Take a positive attitude in the next match, and give a display of good sportsmanship!

SPENCER KITCHING SPEAKS OUT

It is with this thought in mind that I ask them to contact the Queensland Soccer Coaches Federation and through one of their courses fit themselves more so, to assist us in our endeavours to improve the game of Soccer in Queensland.

The article by Jack Nunn of page 10 is a repeat from the Go Soccer issue dated April 24. An incensed Spencer Kitching replied to the Coaches Federation by letter and as this letter has now become available to Go Soccer, here is Kitching's reply—

Having just read the column "Do they fade away" in this week's Go Soccer, I felt compelled to write to bring to your correspondent Jack Nunn up to date on certain facts of which he is obviously quite ignorant.

This weekly paper is circulated quite freely among Soccer followers, and many people reading this would form an opinion entirely opposite to the truth, which Mr. Nunn, with a little research, may have found out before coming into print and naming people.

I personally have been asked why this is true, hence one of my reasons for writing.

Speaking for myself as one of the ex-players named, I would like to state that over the past five years, I have been in direct contact with school and club junior teams, and at the present time am coaching the St. Helens United Under 11A team.

In the previous season I was coaching the Ipswich Under 10 representative team, which won its section of the Inter-city series, and they defeated Brisbane in the final, to remain undefeated for the season. The Brisbane team consisted of lads who previously that season had played in the Australian Under 10 championships conducted in Sydney, going through undefeated in the series against Interstate representative teams, only to be beaten in the play off for the final on goal average.

I hope this is not taken for what is commonly called "blowing my own trumpet", but as an attempt to show that I and others are trying to put something back into the game which we all support.

Besides myself, other players from the period in which I was playing, who are presently actively engaged in the junior side of the St. Helens club include Al Warren, Les McCrea, Graham Kathage and Brian Vogler.

Cliff Sander and Col Kitching are another two who also have put in years of work with our juniors, Cliff being forced to give it up because of work committments and Col relinquishing all positions with the club when he became State senior selector this season.

Brian Vogler, whom your writer hopes "doesn't" drift out of the Soccer scene", has been actively coaching junior boys of this club for past seasons now and at present is coach of the club's Under 12A team.

The St. Helens club over the past few seasons has built up a total of 15 junior teams playing in the Brisbane junior competition and as you can realise this does entail a considerable amount of work to see that these boys are properly catered for.

The president of the junior section of this club is Allen Pitcairn, another former State and International representative of my playing days, and is another who is putting much of what he received back into the game.

As you can see, I am only speaking of past players from the Ipswich area and more specifically, members of the
