

AZZURRI v. HELLENIC (Saturday, Spencer Park, 2.45)

With both sides unbeaten in their last four premiership matches, the stage is set for probably the most fierce clash in recent years between these traditional rivals.

Azzurri firmed even more strongly as premiership favourites following their impressive recovery to down Bardon last Sunday, but the form of Hellenic, who have won 3-1, 2-1, 5-0 and 3-1 in the last four weeks, speaks for itself.

Whether the Azzurri defence can hold this extremely productive Hellenic set of forwards on Saturday remains to be seen.

But although big David Neal was a little shaky last week, fullback pair Matt Hosie and Bruno Pinti were in top form, along with hard-tackling stopper Ian Perry.

The scheming of Ian Johnston completely dominated the second half of the match against Bardon and Hellenic will have to assign a watchdog to patrol Johnston, (Matt Jackson would be the ideal candidate), if they are to prevent a repeat performance.

Johnston's midfield power should be countered by the constructive Tony Murtagh and Ian Fagan, although the latter's passing last Saturday surprisingly was a little off target.

The difference in attack could be the deciding factor in this match and at the moment. Hellenic's Peter Walker, Andy Tsoumbaras and Billy Fagan appear to be playing with just that little extra determination.





On the Coaching Scene



AGGRESSIVE & DETERMINED ATTITUDE TO THE GAME (SAM MORGAN)

Any of our first Div. players must to the game to win the ball from a pass or in a tackle, and this applies to the game at any level even school boys or youth. You must have required determination to win in any situation in defence or attack. Without determination- make no mistake- vou will lose. Which inevitably brings us to the fundamentals of the game. Individual skill is a must, and can only be achieved by dedication in repetitive preferably under expert guidance. Allied to this skill must be a willingness to work hard for the team, never to shirk or hide away, and at all times to be determined to fight (fairly) for every possible goal even when the odds are stacked against you. You will not win every ball, or every game, but the harder you try within your own physical limits the more often you are likely to succeed. Dedication to fitness and to developing personal skill, unselfishness, a readiness to work hard for the team, and a positive, aggressive attitude to the game


these are the steps to a successful Soccer career.

PSYCHOLOGY AND THE SOCCER PLAYER" By J. Jansen – Assistant Senior Coach – The Gap Pastime

How many Coaches, Managers and Players repeatedly voice statements such as "it is all in the mind", or a player will say "I cannot put my mind to control a player's performance. I can assure you that the minor points in life, if properly attended to and carried out, will automatically build up a healthy psychological attitude towards your game, because this attitude is based on equanimity, rising to the occasion, concentration, sportsmanship, being able to accept both victory and defeat sensibly, and of course the most important of them all, personal efficiency

To enlarge on this subject. A player should regularly attend the Training

sessions stipulated. He should, for his own satisfaction, carry out each exercise by always aiming for the programmed number of time for each exercise, with no fuss and no delay. He should be clean and tidy. Being clean and tidy is a modest form of mental discipline and helps morale— a psychological benefit. He should attend to such minor details as making sure that his boots are properly laced. His personal appearance, such as entering a field of play properly attired, with socks secured and shirt tucked in, also counts. He should make sure that his hair is either out short or is tied securely so that it does not fall into his eves at a crucial moment. He should assist people around him when the need arises to create team spirit. He should keep his bag neatly packed so that he avoids a last minute scramble. There is nothing worse than a player being so disorganised that he forgets where things are. The confusion caused in his mind could be sufficient for him to start off in a game on a so-called "off day". These "on days" or "off days" are normally caused by the state of mind one is in on a particular day, due to such influences as bodily function, skin irritation, or upsetting remarks or actions of other people. These are minor points in life that we must face up to. If one's mind is in a state of preparation, these small irritations will be easier to accept.

These points, although they may seem unimportant, will assist a player to develop a healthy psychological attitude in his game.

PROFESSIONALISM & INCENTIVE By Jim Binnie

The other week Jim Bell (Coalstars) touched on a problem faced by most clubs in Brisbane: how to supply incentive to a team when money is scarce. There is a way. Clubs must look to business for the answer, for all these problems exist in everyday situations

Some time ago in a poll conducted with tens of thousands of workers, it was found that money is not the overriding factor in keeping a worker, or player, happy. Job Satisfaction is the foremost factor. Therefore the way is clear to clubs. Keep your players happy.

This, of course, has to be done in a subtle, yet definite, manner, and the best way is to look to the professionals for the answer. Run the clubs or teams as near to professional lines as you can and the players will react to the "bigtime" atmosphere that is being created.

A professional is something definite, but professionalism is not a black and white thing, but rather a frame of mind. The little extras required to create this atmosphere don't cost a lot but rather someone to police and watch that the atmosphere once attained does not stop.

I do not wish to dabble in club politics, but it must be remembered that these people, the players, are entertainers and should be treated as such. After all people are now paying good money to watch soccer and are entitled to see good play. So club managements should examine their set up and decide whether the players are being given a professional environment to practice their skills in. I can assure any interested party it bears fruit in the long term.
