
QANTAS CUP FEVER STRIKES AGAIN





Nippy Dale Mortimer was also finding his legs last week, and if Hollandia decide to include the promising youngsters, Jude Kirk or Paul Ray, or even

> Ross in particular was most impressive when he came on in the second half and is not unlike in style a former top Hollandia goalscorer in Nigel McGuckin.

> Hollandia almost certainly will suffer if tough centrehalf Sunderland is again unavailable, but the work in the middle will be performed capably again by tall and constructive Van Klaveren.

On form Bardon should reach the Cup final but the outcome will be much closer than last Sunday's premiership match, providing Hollandia can produce the necessary improvement in attack.

AZZURRI v. THISTLE (SUNDAY, PERRY PARK, 3.0)

Before last week-end, Azzurri would have been rated odds-on down Thistle in this one and reach their second constructive Cup final.

But reports from Ipswich state that, with the return of Ancliffe, Thistle improved out of sight and should have beaten Coalstars by a bigger margin than the 2-1 of Sunday's premiership clash at Bundamba.

It is interesting to note that after a long spell in the goalscoring doldrums, big Ritchie Smith found the back of the net the instant that Ancliffe came back into the side.

The combination of these two and the opportunism of Pollard and Culhana will be their main asset against the tried and true Azzurri backline.

The big blow for Azzurri of course will be the possible absence of striker Charlie Dench, who was sent off last 10. Wynnum week and whose presence against Thistle would have enabled Azzurri to retain that tremendous combination up front between Dench, Johnston, Schoendorfer and Connors.

It is likely that if the worst happens, and Dench is suspended, inside forward Billy Haigh would be reinstated following his head injury, so the Azzurri attack would lose nothing in the way of constructive lead up work.

Thistle, with their four strong backline of Smith, Keenan, Dann and Allison will compare favourably with Azzurri in defence, and particularly busy will be the consistent Allison, whose blistering speed will adequately cope with the pace produced by Schoendorfer on the wing.

With Alex Anderson possibly out for the rest of the season, Thistle will have problems midfield, and will rely on Alan Bain and Jeff Cornford for possession here.

On last week's display, they could be overshadowed by Peter Nielsen. Gary Clifford and Johnston, who has been proving a tower of strength since he switched back to a deep-lying role.

Azzurri will not have things all their own way, but in view of their strong comeback to down Hellenic last week, must start favourites to move into a Cup final berth.



On the Coaching Scene

THE COACH (By Jim Binnie)

What are the duties then of the coach in the modern soccer set-up? Again this is an opinion which, if article (1) is accepted, will depend on the authority and responsibility delegated to him by the team manager The fully qualified coach must be given a free hand to prepare his players physically for the task to be performed. This is much deeper than would first appear to the layman. First of all upon qualifying the coach has been made to realise that he will only succeed in his task by using methods of training that will keep the players mentally alert and physically keen to attend sessions. This of course aids the manager in his mental task. Conversely the manager must help the coach by procuring the equipment necessary to prepare a complete programme. By the very nature of his task in using exercises that improve individual player's weak points the coach will evolve ideas of where a player should be used, and will them evolve ideas of the tactics the team could use. The manager who ignores the coaches ideas on this would be very silly. The coach must be of necessity a strict disciplinarian who because his time is limited must attend to the majority of players and pass the troublesome player on to the manager. The manager in turn must make the player see the coach's viewpoint. The coach has been taught how to chart individual progress and must pass this information to the manager to aid that man in his selection task.

It can be seen that the term used in the previous article that of "manager/ coach relationship" is now beginning to explain itself. One cannot successfully exist without the other, not on a part-time basis.

To sum up I'd say a coach is probably the most important ally a manager can have, and the manager who ignores this is in trouble before he starts; I'd say that a successful fully qualified coach has only to learn tact and diplomacy to become a first class team manager, so closely are the two jobs allied to one another.

974 WORLD CUP NEWS

Dusseldorf, West Germany, Italy, 1970 beaten finalists and current European Champions, and England, 1966 World Champions, were comfortably drawn when the European groupings for the 1974 World Soccer Cup were made here.

With host Nation West Germany, already qualified to play in the finals, the remaining 32 European entries were drawn into nine groups.

The winners of the first eight groups will qualify for the finals while the top team in group nine must battle for a place against either Peru, Chile or Ve-

The Italians were drawn in group two, where they could be troubled marginally by the much-improved Swiss side, but should have no difficulties against unrated Turkey and Luxembourg.
