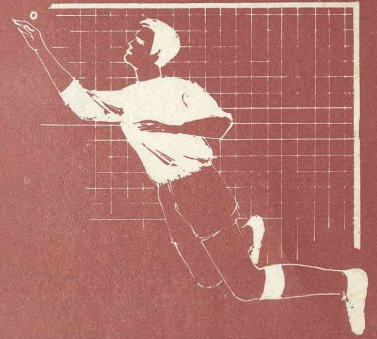

SOCCKER ON THE BRAIN

A new breed of Soccer intelligentsia has begun to dispel the theory that football carry their brains in their boots.

In the U.K., Soccer's I.Q. is getting a lift from the graduates who have made a big impact on the professional scene.

Tell some of today's idols that his brains are in his boots and there's a chance that he'll whack you with his degree.

Two men qualified to do so are Liverpool teammates Steve Heighway B.A. and Brian Hall (B. Sc.), who already have achieved the greatest aim of any footballer— playing in a Cup final at Wembly.

Heighway, 23 years old and one of the discoveries of last season, left Warwick University less than a year ago to become a professional with Liverpool.

He is a remarkable exception in the modern, pressurised game, where a long apprenticeship from the age of 15 is often considered essential.

There have been other graduates who have made their marks in Soccer. But those few have been more like Brian Hall, Heighway's Liverpool teammate.

They served some time in professional football before making an impact on the game. Hall, at 24, has finished his third season as a professional with Liverpool.

Before that, while at Liverpool University, he had a number of years with the Anfield club as an amateur. Alan Gowling, 22, followed a similar course to Hall.

He has spent a number of years with Manchester United, as an amateur, then as a part-time professional, and now as a full-timer after finishing his

studies at Manchester University last Summer.

Blackpool had an Oxford Blue in their defence last season as they struggled for First Division survival.

Peter Suddaby, St. Asaph and St. Edmund's Hall, was a colleague of Heighway with top Northern amateur club Skelmersdale United last season.

There are other cases, like Gordon Taylor of Birmingham city, who put football first and joined Bolton Wanderers from school.

It was in his spare time from football that he studied to get his degree.

Two men of letters on Luton's books as professionals are striker Peter Phillips (B.A., a Cambridge Blue) and halfback Alan Guild M.A., of St Andrews University.

In Scotland they aptly call Aberdeen "The Dons" with their defenders Henning Boel, Tommy McMillan and Martin Buchan, studying languages at college after training sessions, while Steve Murray is taking a correspondence course in advanced Maths and Science.

The Liverpool pair and Gowling have been asked—"Are they setting a trend?"

Heighway—"Ability will come through no matter what the age. The more people there are at University with ability, the more will come through if they decide the money is good enough to make them give up an academic career. I was not good enough at 15, and there must be a lot like that.

I've found no disadvantages because of my late start in the game. It depends how important mixing is to you. It doesn't worry me because I've got a lot of interests outside the game to go my own way.

I admit to my own surprise at my

Soccer progress. It breaks every rule in the book because you are led to believe that a professional footballer needs years of grooming before he is ready.

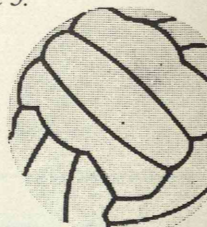
Alan and Brian are a bit different to me. Alan has been serving a kind of apprenticeship in football even while he has been studying. Brian is in his sixth year at Liverpool.

Am I the exception or is this going to start a trend? If the ability can be spotted at 15, it is likely to be grabbed later. I think if you have the ability, you will be grabbed sooner or later".

Hall—"I've watched the Liverpool University side a couple of times recently while they were being coached by Ian St. John. I was impressed with them and felt they had one or two decent players.

Throughout the game nowadays there is a tendency towards better education at all levels. Of course this isn't peculiar to football, as it's happening throughout life.

I feel even more grammar school boys will come into the game. One of the big attractions is of course the money, and I was talking to a chap the other day who did maths with me at uni. He is a genius and is going to aim for a Ph. D., and I asked him "What about a job?" His reply was that football and he can't get a job. It may be short and sweet but it's wonderful".

That's the silly part. We earn all this money in football and he can't get a job. It may be short and sweet but it's wonderful".

Gowling— "I think there are greater opportunities for lads now who have a university education, and just have to wait.

I don't find any difficulty mixing with professional footballers even though their world is made up of completely different types.

I am convinced that the security of education is a great advantage as we can approach the game with confidence, knowing that we have something to fall back on if things don't work out as we planned. If I could do it. I would like to stay in the game when I retire on the coaching side, because I fancy teaching young people".

FOOTNOTE— Professor Gowling has recently completed a thesis on the socialisation of the professional footballer. As he says, it gives him something to do in the afternoons and keeps the old grey matter working.

Despite their Cup loss to Azzurri on Sunday, Thistle should have little difficulty in dealing with the unpre-

Their drubbing at the hands of Polonia shocked most observers two weeks back, but because of their unpredictability, they could well upset Thistle without causing too much to a shock.

On the Coaching Scene
