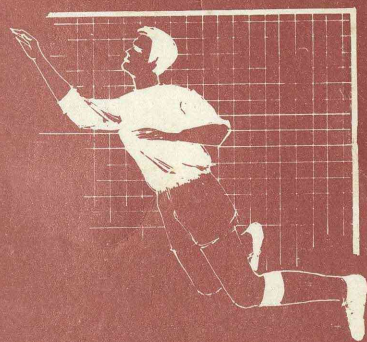
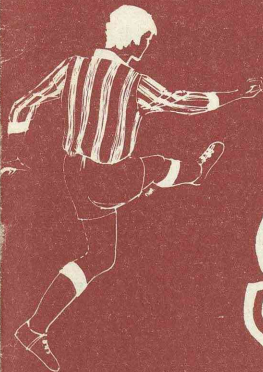

## WHAT'S WRONG WITH SCOTTISH FOOTBALL

You can talk about the World Cup, you can talk about the European Nations' Cup, but England versus Scotland will always be something different. It is now a part of the Home International Championship and more often than not it turns out to be the deciding game.

Decider or not, it is always a battle royal. As the aftermath of many an historic battle, it's excitement is fermented by fiery newspaper headlines and by two countries that assume that they possess the best footballers in the world and set out to prove it.

Let me make it clear at the outset that I expect England to win. I expect them to because of the ability, or lack of ability, of the players involved on both sides, but for two good reasons.

The first is that the competition in the Football League, from which all the England players are drawn, is as fierce as any competition in the world. That competition throws up for Sir Alf Ramsey a nucleus of at least 40 extremely talented players from which to make his final selection.

### FALLING BEHIND

It is difficult not to pick a strong team from that group.

By comparison, Scotland's League, dominated by Rangers and Celtic, with occasional interruptions from the Aberdeens of this world, lacks that depth of competition.

I would never suggest that skill for skill the players in the Scottish League are not capable of reaching the standards of those in the Football League,

but in terms of organisation and tactics their clubs are falling behind world standards.

Before anyone starts shouting about the achievements of Rangers and Celtic in Europe, I look upon the successes gained by those clubs as nothing short of miracles.

In recent years only Celtic have compared in any way with England's top ten clubs in modern tactical thinking and coaching. Rangers, recent improvement has arisen as a result of an awareness of this fact.

I have the utmost admiration for the way in which, despite the lack of top-class competition, these two clubs have been able to raise their game, when faced with the challenge from the might of Europe, to achieve incredible results.

### HEALTHY PROCESS

As time goes on though, it will become harder to continue to produce this kind of miracle.

The second reason why England will win is that at international level their selection process is much healthier. Sir Alf Ramsey has ultimate power and uses it ruthlessly to ensure that when an England player puts on that white shirt he runs until he drops.

Bobby Brown, his opposite number, does a competent job but he is still hampered by a selection committee. I am not interested whether it operates in name only. The mere fact that it is there is a weakness in international football today.

Paddy Crerand, of Manchester United, and a former Scottish international himself, was extremely critical

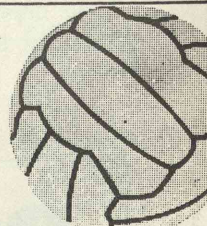
of this set up recently. Unfortunately for Scotland criticism from the likes of Paddy, myself, or any number of well-meaning fanatical Scots supporters has no effect.

The Scottish F.A. likes things as they are and apparently will continue to defend this antiquated "castle" to the death.

This results in an obvious lack of policy on the field. A year ago I thought there were signs of the Scottish team playing and working more like a top club side of the seventies.

I am afraid that it is apparent from recent selections that have been made and from several abysmal performances that they have gone back since then.

It is difficult to understand why they do not continue to include Willie Carr in the side. They have no player, Billy Bremner included, who approaches his work-rate in the middle of the field. Continued on Page 5.

### ANGER OVER WORLD CUP DRAW!

AUCKLAND: Two senior Auckland Soccer Administrators today criticised an Australian suggestion that Australia and New Zealand should meet in the first leg of their World Cup Soccer elimination immediately after the Oceania Cup Tournament in Noumea.

The Australian proposal was that the New Zealand team should go to Sydney direct from the tournament in Noumea in November to play the qualifying rounds proper of the 1974 World Cup competition.

The Auckland Football Association Tour Chairman, Mr. Charles Dempsey, said today New Zealand would not be railroaded by Australia in this matter.

"Something as important as overpiled World Cup games have to be carefully planned for, from both the playing and the financial view," he said.

"It would be impossible to go straight to Sydney from Noumea."

The Auckland Football Association Chairman, Mr. Don Mills, a member of the joint AFA-NZFA Tours and promotion committee said there were two immediate factors against going to Sydney in November.

"The first and most important factor is the injury risk in the Oceania Tournament," he said.

"The format of the competition at present calls for six games in eight days. That in itself is enough football for anyone, let alone to go on from there to a vital World Cup game."

He added that, as the New Zealand team in Noumea recently discovered, the injury risk was high on the rock-hard Magenta Stadium where the Oceania Cup is to be played.

He said the other factor was that Australia was presupposing it had the right to the first leg game.

"This is something that will have to be debated by the two countries," Mr. Mills said. "New Zealand is adamant that the first leg will be played in this country."
