



## CIRCUIT TRAINING Fred Robins (St. Helens Coach)

We know that circuit training is a should be as prepared for the END of method of fitness training that aims to increase muscular strength and endurance and circulo-respiratory endurance. That is when the coach incorporates it into his training schedule, but what I would like to do is help the player who would like to keep a general fitness through the close season without using up too much of his spare time. The term "circuit" refers to a num-

ber of carefully selected exercises arranged, and numbered consecutively, about a given area. Each number exercise within the circuit is referred to as a station. This arrangement allows the performer to progress easily from one exercise station to another, doing a prescribed amount of work at each station, until the entire circuit has been completed. In most cases the circuit is completed two or three times, and the time of the total performance is recorded. Progression on the circuit is indicated by decreasing time required for performance, increasing the work load, or a combination of both.

Space prevents me from drawing up a schedule of exercises, plus a chart that is required to achieve the best results from the circuit, but I will endeavour to explain it.

First the exercises required to make up the circuit is usually eight (8). You may wish to do more, but I would not have less than eight.

- 1. The arms, shoulders and upper part of the body. PRESS UPS.
- 2. The abdominal muscles. SIT UPS.
- 3. The quadriceps and hips. STEP UPS.
- 4. General. BURPEES.
- 5. The body. ROWING.
- 6. The lower leg. FORWARD AND BACK JUMPING.
- 7. The abdominal muscles. LEG RAISING BEND TO THE CHEST.
- 8. General. FULL SQUAT JUMPS. Continued next week.

#### **FAMILY TRADITION**

The first member of the family to take up this association was one Bob Archibald, who was Reg's grandmother's brother, and who played for Bundamba Rangers back in the 1890's.
