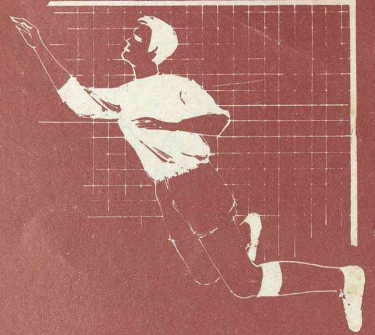

FANS COME BACK IN THE U.K.

London, as the ruthless referees' "get-tough" policy goes on irking the professional players, the football fans appear to have taken the opposite view

The total attendance at Saturday's 43 league matches was 651,595, the best for a Saturday this season, with the First Division gates also reaching a season best of 340,000.

Undoubtedly this was helped by the first game at Old Trafford after a football association ban closed the ground for two weeks, and more than 45,000 roared Manchester United to victory over Ipswich.

But it seems that supporters have been heartened by the efforts to stamp out the foul tackling and violence in professional football and are returning to the terraces.

Referees are still unrelenting and more than 50 players were cautioned, including Hull City's first booking, player-manager Terry Neill, and Crystal Palace Goalkeeper John Jackson who went into referee Ricky Nicholson's book after the game.

It was the highest number for any

day of the season bringing the total to nearly 290.

The prediction by FA Disciplinary Chairman Vernon Stokes that he will sit until mid-night to deal with offenders, seems likely to come true.

Already goals appear to be more easily scored.

While Chelsea and Coventry Shared six in the First Division, Bristol Rovers recorded their best win for five years with a 7-1 smashing of Bradford City in Division Three and Brentford zoomed to the top of division four with six goals against Hartlepool.

In Division One, Sheffield United, the surprise success of the season so far, maintained their cracking pace

with an away 3-2 win against Nottingham Forest. It was the first time they had conceded goals away from home, but they were never in danger of losing their unbeaten record.

Two goals in a minute by Currie and Scullion during the second half, ensured that.

They are still three points clear at the top, chased by Leeds, Derby and Manchester United who all won.

Leeds, playing the last of their home fixtures at other venues, sent Crystal Palace to the bottom of the league by winning 2-0 while Derby took advantage of injury mishaps to Everton to win by a similar margin.

Both Kendall and Husband were injured in the first half, husband having to go to hospital with a suspected fractured ankle, and against ten-men Derby coasted to victory.

Manchester United celebrated their home-coming with a 1-0 win, George Best appropriately scoring the winner direct from a corner kick a minute before the interval.

Chris Garland the 100,000 pound (214,300 dollar) new signing soon made himself a favourite of the Chelsea crowd by providing the pass for an early goal by Peter Osgood which triggered a goal-rush by Chelsea and Coventry.

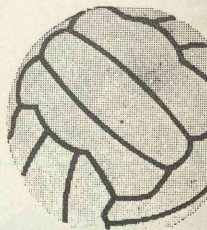

OXLEY BACK NEXT YEAR

Oxley only just scraped through with a 1-1 draw against Mitchelton in their deferred second round match at Perry Park last Saturday.

But the lone point was sufficient for Oxley to clinch the Second Division premiership, giving them the right to replace Wynnum in First Division next season.

Saturday's crowd was one of the biggest for that particular day of the season and they were treated to an exciting 90 minutes as Oxley took the lead through Bob Dobinson in the first half and Mitchy equalised with a goal from skipper Ian Kesson.

Both sides missed several easy chances in the second half, and at times Oxley were hard pressed to hold out a determined Mitchelton, which, for most of the match, matched them in football skill.

But that's history now and Oxley quite obviously will have to think about some team building if they hope to stay up top next season.

In Paul Yeuell, Jim Kirk, Dobinson Chris Black, Roy Scott, Brian Bjorkelund and Brian Barnes, coach Tony Lowndes has the basis of a good team for next year.

Scott incidentally, who won the Best and Fairest award in 1969, played on Saturday after receiving a pain killer for a rib injury.

Coach Lowndes reckons complacency was the team's big problem last year and that fault caused them to be on the wrong end of some shock results.

But it is to Lowndes' credit that he was able to keep his players together when they realised they must spend this year in Second Division and with team spirit such as that, Oxley could go a long way next time up.

Lowndes also expressed his gratitude to Oxley officials who entrusted him with full control of the team this season. They were rewarded for that confidence.

LOWER DIVISION NEWS

Mt. Gravatt entered the 2B Division grand final with a 3-2 win over Hellenic in the No. 1 semi-final on Saturday. Redcliffe downed Coalstars 2-1 in their semi. and now will play Hellenic in the preliminary final.

Polonia's 3-0 win over Bardon-Latrobe carried them into the grand final of the 2C Division. But Bardon's opponents in the preliminary final are as yet unknown as the University-Annerley semi. ended in a 2-2 draw.

This match will have to be concluded, as somebody forgot to tell the referee that semi-finals must go into extra time.

In the 3A Division, Germania defeated Olympic 2-1 in the first semi-final, and Park Rangers beat Acacia Ridge 5-4 to earn a crack at Olympic in the preliminary final.

The only other result from the lower divisions was the 3B playoff between Pine Rivers and Booval, which ended in a 2-2 draw and assured Pine Rivers of the premiership.

MERTON V. AZZURRI

Merton have a great opportunity to go straight into the Grand Final on October 3 if Azzurri's patchy form in the Cup Final last week is any guide.

Merton proved two weeks back that Azzurri are by no means invulnerable when they swept to a 2-0 lead in the final premiership match, only to allow Azzurri back into the picture in the second half.

The Azzurri forward line struggled considerably against Bardon to find cohesion but there are probably ready excuses.

Peter Nielsen, of course had to switch back to centre to plug the gap caused by the absence of Ian Perry and Billy Haigh moved back from his usually constructive, inside forward position on Sunday to concentrate most of his efforts in defence.

So Azzurri are going to require a little more drive from Charlie Dench and Gerry Schoendorfer in particular and even Ian Johnston, who was again kept quiet last week.

Willie Connors will again be one of the dangermen. He is playing at top form at the moment and again on Sunday was the most constructive Azzurri attacker.

That four-strong Merton backline should again prove a tough nut to crack with its chief asset again the height and hard tackling always produced by Gary Catchpole, Alex Senjuschenko and Graham Meagher.

Gary Clelland certainly is not as tall as those three, but is equal with them on the score of tackling ability.

As already mentioned, Azzurri will be losing some of their midfield drive if Nielsen stays at centre half, so Haigh's authority will be sorely tested by Trevor Catchpole, a renowned 90

minute player, and the less robust but equally game, Greg Amos.

But Gary Clifford and Peter Strawson have played much better than they did last week so a return to their best could swing midfield advantage back towards the premiers and Cup-winners.

Bruno Pinti was a bit shaky last week and appeared to be bothered throughout by a leg injury after a heavy tumble early in the match and if he falters again on Sunday, the nippy Des Heath, another reliable 90 minute worker, would have a field day on the right wing.

The other Merton hopes in attack will be chiefly Eric Pattison, always a possible match-winner if he keeps his mind on the job in the same fashion as Catchpole and Heath, and the highly promising youngster, Bevan Bohan on the left wing.

Backing up this pair will be Duncan Abbott, a pretty versatile player when you consider that he has performed well also in previous matches on the left wing and at fullback.

Don't forget also that he has bobbed up with some timely goals—the winner which knocked Bardon out of last year's preliminary final in extra time, and the second against Azzurri last Sunday week.

The man who could well emerge as the hero for the premiers on Sunday is big Dave Neal, whose reflexes are just as keen as ever, judging by his two vital saves in the Cup final last week.

There are two big ifs about this match. If Azzurri can reproduce that attractive and powerful form they used to cart off the premiership, a Grand Final berth should be theirs.

But a repeat of that shaky and hesitant display against Bardon last Sunday and Merton's direct and robust style will earn them the short cut to the final instead.

HELLENIC v. BARDON

Bardon most certainly would have felt a lot happier about their prospects in this match had they managed to pull off the Cup victory last week.

They were well on top until obviously unsettled by the penalty decision. But these things happen in football and a repeat of that discontent could bring disastrous results against Hellenic.

Hellenic have been widely acknowledged by many as the in-form team of the moment and they proved their worthiness of a semi-final berth by coming back from a two goal deficit to down Saints in the last premiership round.

They are in the happy position of being able to field a side which is competent in defence, resourceful in midfield and above all has a forward line potentially full of goals.

This is where the big difference in these sides should be. Hellenic have the power to break through a capable Bardon backline but a big question mark still hangs over the ability of the Bardon attack to do the same to their Hellenic counterparts.

Stan Sander, undoubtedly one of the most courageous 'keepers in Brisbane should be the envy of most custodians with that backline of Con Petridus, Bill Maxton, Gordon Mackie and Chas. Matters in front of him.

Chief assets of that quartet are the attacking flair of Petridis and Matters, the outstanding anticipation of Mackie and the rugged tackling of Maxton.

And for sheer speed watch Matters in action, as there are not too many wingers in Brisbane that can give him a start and get away with it.

Bardon's midfield strength was well below par in the Cup with Eddie Carrigan playing in patches and Alan Sinclair obviously still troubled by his foot injury.

Gibby Rowan did not help matters by producing one of his shakiest mat-

ches of the season, but he is unlikely to repeat that effort again on Sunday.

But even if these three play at their top on Sunday, their dominance again will be sorely tested by Hellenic's Ian Fagan, Tony Murtagh and Matt Jackson.

Jackson in particular has had a great season and can be regularly seen back in defence or up front mixing the odd pop at goal in addition to his regular midfield duties.

This now brings us to the focal point of the match—Hellenic's proven attack versus Bardon's reliable set of defenders.

Martin Coe, Geoff Gault, John Hickman and Bobby Gordon produced mixed performances last week, as they combined strong and safe tackling with regular mistakes, which again repeated will prove costly.

This is where Peter Walker, Andy Tsoumbaras and Billy Fagan could have a field day as all three have the ability to snap up half chances and convert them into opportunist goals.

Bardon's early second half form against Azzurri was heartening, but that standard will have to be maintained for the entire match if they are to have any chance of gaining compensation for their Cup failure.

But most will be tipping Hellenic to advance a stage further and reach the preliminary final if they can maintain the form which swept most teams aside in the second round of the premiership.

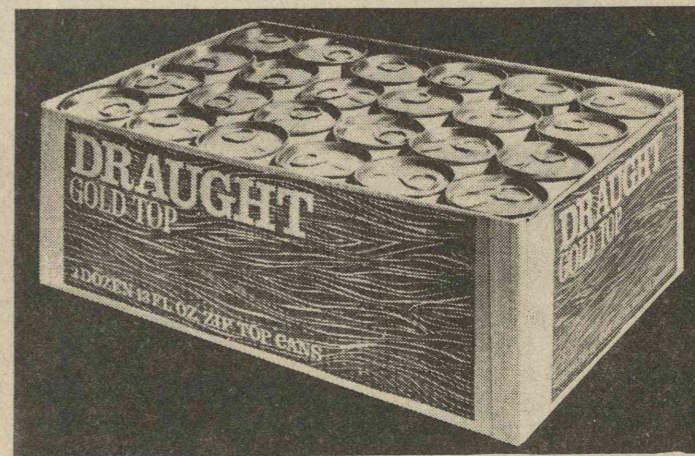
