Lee is very well served by his colleagues, Colin Bell, both for England and Manchester City. Having played together for quite a long time developed a fine sense of understanding. But it is still surprising how often they appear to think in unison, one moving for a pass at just the right time into exactly the right place—the other knowing precisely where and when the other wants to find the ball! City's penalty kicks himself as well as While his opponent attempts to retaking them. In possession of the ball adjust his balance Lee has flicked the ball up and over the defenders left foot and brought the ball back onto his own favourite peg and from there he blasts a terrific shot, aimed at the far post but swinging in there late in

Joe Mercer and Malcolm Allison know better than anyone just how versatile Lee is and for this reason they often play him a little deeper in midfield when Bell is unable to play. There, Lee demonstrates his basic understanding, his ability to lay a pass, and from there too he can make frequent breaks forward in search of his goals. But his assets are best used, not in a half and half role but up front. All Lee needs is the ball at his feet and the further forward he is when he gains possession; the fewer opponents there are between him and a shooting position, the greater will be the chance of him scoring.

Lee's left foot is not exactly a swinger, indeed he scores quite a few goals with it, shooting while moving

into the penalty area with the ball under control from right to lett. But his left foot goals are invariably scored from close in. pushed with the inside of the toot rather than driven. But with his right toot, Lee can be lethan anywhere within 25 yards of goalshooting first time, nitting the ball while on the run at top speed or flighting a ball that dips late behind a keeper who is off his line.

Perhaps his most devastating weapon is not surprising that they have is the ability to make the ball swerve 'in' when hit hard with the inside of his right foot, and it is used quite often in goal attempts from any angle. But in particular this knack is very useful when Lee is off on a run from midfield and moving from right to left. When forced out wide on the left, he can suddenly check, stopping dead.

#### THE PROBLEM OF MISCONDUCT

(Compiled by J. CARLIN, Publicity is guilty of an act of misconduct Officer, Australian Soccer Referees Queensland)

Saturday, 25th March, 1972

It is with thanks to the "A.S.F. News" that we give you, in part, an article recently written by Denis Follows. Secretary, Football Association which if sufficiently effective would inevitably benefit all concerned with our game in Queensland.

"It is a simply accomplishment to read through the Laws of the Game but it is not always quite so easy to appreciate fully the meaning of these Laws and the problems with which the referees are faced.

In a sincere desire to eliminate misconduct, violent and ungentlemanly conduct, the Football Association issued advice to its 255 full member clubs in the form of a notice, as under, to hang in the players' dressing rooms. The Football League gathered its referees together and \( \) instructed them to apply the Laws in relation to misconduct in a stricter manner. These actions have had certain effects on the game which are now appreciated by those people who are involved.

AZZURRI v. MERTON Sunday, Spencer Park 2.45 p.m.

The 1970 and 1971 grand finalists, Azzurri and Merton East are tipped to figure in yet another closely contested match at Spencer Park on Sunday.

Merton have not defeated Azzurri since 19th April, 1969. But eight of the 10 premiership and Cup clashes since then were touch and go affairs. Four matches ended in draws and four were won by Azzurri by single goals - 1-0, 2-1, 1-0, 2-1.

Neither coach, Nereo Saftich (Azzurri) nor Matt. Carson (Merton), would have been satisfied with his team's performance last weekend.

Azzurri chalked up two points by defeating Bardon Latrobe 2-0 on Sunday at Perry Park. However, Bardon repeatedly surged through the Azzurri defence and the victory was attributable to the appalling weakness of the Bardon strikers, who squandered scoring chances, and Azzurri's ability to make most of their fect ball for Ron Millman to score. fewer chances.
