



An interesting and unusual incident happened during a recent First Division game, which I believe is worth recalling for the benefit of readers.

The Referee had temporarily stopped the game for an injury to a player. In accordance with normal procedure, under Law 8, the Referee dropped the ball where it was when the game was stopped, which happened to be in the penalty area. Immediately the ball was dropped to the ground so also did the goalkeeper who flopped right on top of it! To many, including some of the opposing players, it was thought that the goalkeeper's action was illegal, but this of course is not so.

To clear up this part of Law 8 furthe perhaps I should firstly quote from the

"After Any Other Temporary Suspension: When restarting the game after a temporary suspension of play from any cause not mentioned in the Laws, provided that immediately prior to the suspension the ball had not passed over the touch or goal-lines, the Referee shall drop the ball at the place where it was when play was suspended and it shall be deemed in play when it has touched the ground; if, however, it goes over the

touch or goal-lines after it has been dropped by the Referee, but before it is touched by a player, the Referee shall again drop it. A player shall not play the ball until it has touched the ground. If this section of the Law is not complied with the Referee shall again drop


You will notice the Law clearly states a "dropped" ball and NOT as so many say, a "bounce" ball. The next important point is that the ball is in play when it has TOUCHED the ground - if the ball is played before it touches the ground or it rolls over the goal-line or touch-line without a player touching it, the ball will be dropped again.

Finally, to clear up a misunderstanding which apparently seems to be in the minds of many players and that is, that there should be one player of each side at the dropping of a ball by the Referee. This is not true for the Law does not say that at all. You could quite easily have no players within the vicinity of a dropped ball or, for the sake of any Lang Parkers, a good resemblance to an all-in






