FEATURE PAGE - MEET THE PLAYERS

We are re-commencing our interviews with prominent A-Grade players. The man in the hot seat this week is Merton-East and former Qld. full back Graham Meagher.

Q. Are you a one club player?

A. Yes, I have come up through the Junior ranks of Merton and would not think of changing, a great club to be with.

Q. Which person has had the biggest influence in your career?

A. No hesitation in answering that. Jock Pattison. (Eric Pattison's father). He took me in hand as a raw youngster and taught me the basic fundamentals and he was always on hand to give advice. A first class Coach.

Q. How many times have you represented Queensland?

A. Twice. Once against Canberra in 1964 and in 1970 I was fortunate to be selected to play against Manchester City at the Cricket Ground.

Q. A few of our so called stars if selected to play for Qld. would turn it down. How about you?

A. I would deem it an honour to play for Qld, the atmosphere itself is terrific plus the chance to play with good players gives one a chance to improve his own game.

Q. What of Merton this season?

A. Well we are not doing too bad. Up to last week against Bardon that is, we are a fit side but the defence is

at the moment to lax. Plus the fact, we have too many chiefs and not enough Indians.

Q. Who do you think will comprise our final four this season.

A. I must include Merton with Azzurri Hellenic and Bardon Latrobe though not necessarily in that order.

Q. Who has been your most difficult opponent?

A. An ex-team-mate-of-yours Bob Keith Jones of Latrobe. He was extremely difficult to mark, he had the ability to beat his man both with speed and footwork. He didn't have a bad shot either. I rate him just in front of Graham MacMillan, also a great winger.

Q. What is your opinion of Qld. Soccer today?

A. Unfortunately I believe it is static. No real personalities around and when we do have some, they head for Sydney, for example Ray Richards now an automatic Australian selection. I cannot offer any suggestion to improve the local scene.

Q. Do you think opposing sides are getting to spot Steve Dolan?

A. Yes you may be right. I think he will have to be protected more, till he matures, he is a great little footballer. The best I have seen for a long time. Terrific potential.

Q. Do you rate any local players good enough to represent Australia?

A. I'm sorry Bob I don't think there is anyone good enough. Firstly fitness is one thing which counts and our Sydney counterparts have this. Plus stiffer competition. I only wish we could have competition between States, then we may progress.

What has Qld. done to Rale Rasic?

The National Coach has requested from the A.S.F., permission to have 32 players in a camp for a period of one week before he selects the final 22 man party. For the Asian Tour starting on October 4.

These final 22 players will then go back into the camp for a further week for final preparation before leaving Australia. This of course only if the A.S.F. agree to the coaches request.

Now for the bit that snubs Qld. If the A.S.F. deny Rasic his request he says he will spend a few days in Adelaide and Perth to spot prospective candidates for his national team.

Don't we get a look in? It seems that way to me, I will admit that we do not have the potential that we would like to have but we have some and tell me, is Rasic going to see much in a few days in Perth and Adelaide. I doubt it.

I would suggest to our delegates to the A.S.F. that they object strongly to this latest humiliation of Qld. Soccer.

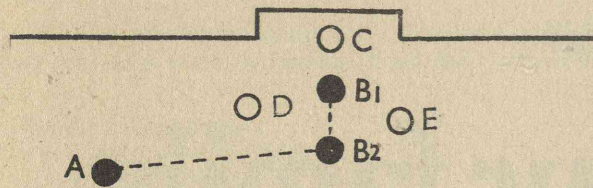

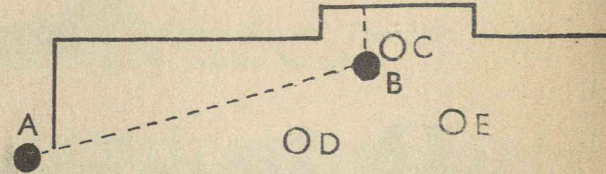
Diagram 7. — OFF-SIDE



Running back for ball.

A centres the ball. B runs back from position 1 to position 2, and then dribbles between D and E and scores. B is off-side because he is in front of the ball and he had not two opponents between him and the goal-line at the moment the ball was played by A.

Diagram 8. — NOT OFF-SIDE



After a throw-in from the touch-line.

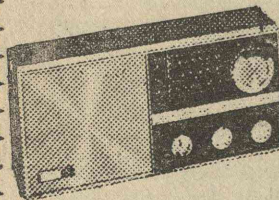
A throws the ball to B. Although B is in front of the ball and has not two opponents between him and the goal-line, he is not off-side because a player cannot be off-side from a throw-in.

Often spectators (and players) have voiced their wrath at offside signals indicated by linesmen and decision by Referee, especially when they are not in a correct position to do so, whilst the match officials are.

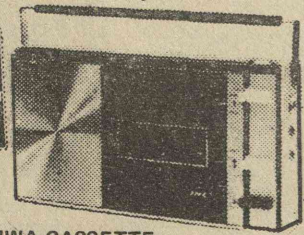
In order to clarify what is repeatedly considered a controversial decision in the eyes of spectators, players and match commentators, I have this week given you easy to follow illustrations in diagram form, and also explanatory notes on "offside incidents" which may give rise to doubt depending mainly on your view of play and your knowledge of the Laws of the game.

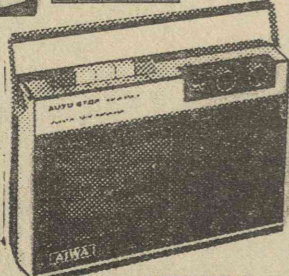

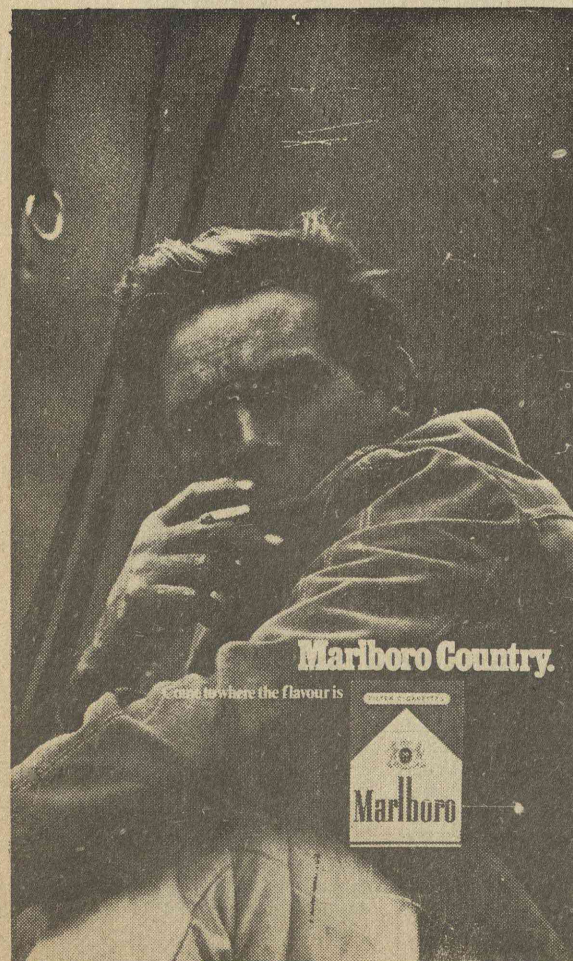

For the losers Nils Larsen and Geoff Nevill played well and Jack Speare nominates that although Taringa were beaten today they played much better and are due to make a come back.

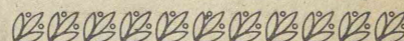
Annerley and Germania met this week at the formers home ground and Jim Thornton gave the boys in blue a 1-0 half time lead.

Perry Dunlop showed up well for Annerley at centre half ably supported by Geoff Bradbury and Greg Young.

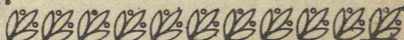
John Ferguson converted a penalty to give Annerley a comfortable 2-0 victory in a cleanly contested game.

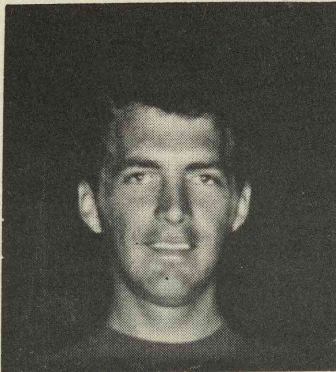

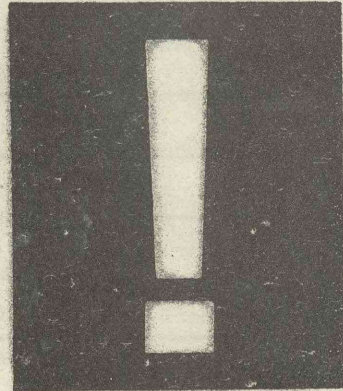
