

We have been operating for nearly seven years, in that time 300 people have taken our courses and become qualified. Of these 300 we have only 50 fully paid up members. I appeal to you all, we can only function if you come to our meetings and participate. We need coaches for schools but can't provide them. We need your support so that we can fulfill our obligations and enlarge our plans.

What progress is being made. I think everybody will agree that our qualified coaches are doing a wonderful job, especially in the junior ranks. The kids of today are being taught a lot better than when I first arrived in Australia. In the senior level I believe clubs are more organized throughout, and this is due to our members efforts.

It has improved so much here in Brisbane in the past seven years that we still hear about Bunny Nunn, Bob Lawrie, Cliff Sander, Col Kitching, etc. So if the game has improved who has improved it, certainly not the players we have at the moment, or have they. Are the present teams so bad? Would the all conquering Hellenic side of the late 50's be too much for present day sides? Who knows, the modern coaching methods might make it a little hard for them, plus the speed factor plus deep lying sweepers, plus, plus, plus, the answer we will never know. IS THE Q.S.C.F. BEING UTILISED TO ITS FULLEST EXTENT?

I say here and now an emphatic NO, and this is why I am concerned. First of all let me outline my thoughts on what our duties should be. Our job is to foster the game of soccer through coaching.

To do this all our members must be qualified to three levels, each to be taken separately step by step. They are preliminary, advanced, and senior levels. Our technical staff, consists of 6 senior coaches, and 8 advanced coaches these staff coaches are responsible for seeing that the duties of the Q.S.C.F. are carried out throughout Old.

If your child has been fortunate enough to attend our clinics at the national fitness camps on the Gold Coast, ask him what type of coaching he received, nine cases out of ten, will tell that it was better than he has had with his club. So obviously our coaches are first class.

THE DEVELOPMENT OF YOUTH

This is something that does not happen overnight. Careful planning and preparation must be thorough.

RECOMMENDATION

The future of the game rests on capturing the interest of the young generation, therefore more attention must be aimed at schools, with regular visits, at least once a month to instruct both boys and sport masters.

Close liason must be maintained between schools and publicity media. At least two teachers courses per year until all teams have a qualified coach.

To provide incentive for all juniors it is recommended that state squads be formed in 14, 16, 18, and the ultimate

The first three groups consisting of 36 selected players, with each side having 2 coaches and a manager. The under 23 group would consist of 18 players, a coach, manager and a physiotherapist. This would involve a coaching panel of seven plus the director of

The basic operation of each squad would be.

- Regular medical examination.
- Regular once a week training.
- 3. Friendly matches every second
- 4. Uniform training procedure.
- Uniform physical standard. Record all players: - Personal, Training, Evaluation, Attendance.
- Coaching Camp twice yearly for 1 week period each.
- Monthly lecture on various subjects.
- Diet and Vitamin Guide.
- Regular visits to first class games to observe.
- 11. Social activities to promote team spirit and good will.

These squads would automatically form the basis of a state team with all records kept by the Q.S.C.F.

I would like to suggest that the sooner the Q.S.F., Q.S.C.F., B.J.S.F. and Qld. Juniors meet and formulate the above plan or something similar, will be the day that Soccer will become a force in Qld. Otherwise I am afraid we will just have to continue banging our heads against that brick wall.
