

FEATURE PAGE-THE POWER GAME

to your magazine expressing concern as to where Brisbane soccer was heading. I observed at that time that in the final four we had two teams playing direct fast "power soccer" while two, though tending towards defence still retained the traditional style. It is final four time again and we now have three and a half teams converted to the power game. I say half for I believe Hollandia to be in a transitional phase between skill and power, having the physical size in their side for power, but neither the determination or dare I say "killer instinct" to submerge their skills for the sake of strength and speed. I feel this indecision will be the "rock on which they will perish". However I feel that it would be correct to say that Brisbane is now in the grip of "Power Mania" at all levels of the code, be it coaching, playing, refereeing, administration, publicity and unfortunately "crowd reaction.". The latter is the most tragic but I do not believe the present "crowds" are a true reflection on what the majority wants.

The reader may ask "What is this leading to??", The answer is simple, the article is aimed at proving Brisbane soccer is on a downhill path leading to a point where world soccer is today. The problem is, soccer here is not big enough to stand the explosive troubles that have wracked the game around the world these last ten years, and now is the time to make the necessary changes to reverse the trend. We must have no petty back biting, all facets of the code must

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One year has passed since I wrote combine to push the game back where

Soccer is basically, and essentially a game of skills. These skills, five in number, when mastered in all aspects by the individual and allied to physical conditioning and tactical coaching, produce soccer tradesmen. These tradesmen are in turn entertainers and in my time I have had the pleasure of watching some of the greatest of them in action. Twelve years ago in Glasgow I stood among 127,000 people (who supported neither team) and stared, wondered at, and finally continually applauded for over 30 minutes the finest display of soccer skill I have ever seen. I refer of course to the Real Madrid v. Eintracht game when we had 22 tradesmen playing for Europe's top prize. We had ten goals and a referee who was reduced to (in his own words) "a necessary spectator who started the game when required". Recently I watched 10,000 people in Perry Park rise to Scotland's team of skill, Dundee, who gave us a lesson on ball control etc. etc. Mind you, this team lost their builder, one John Prentice, a soccer purist, last January because he could no longer stand modern soccer mayhem. His skill team could never win a trophy.

Many readers must remember that day when 30,000 packed the Ekka to watch Best, Charlton, Kidd & Co. show us why they were world class, not by hacking and kicking, but by using skill allied to professional training. All these mammoth crowds came saw and appreciated SKILL. What are these five skills? For the uninitiated they are. All aspects and types of HEADING, KICKING, TACKLING, DRIBBLING, BALL CONTROL.

Where do these skills stand in the modern game. My next statement won't endear me to many but it has to be said, and the reader must think long and deep to understand.

Fear is causing these skills to disappear from the game". Managers and coaches, afraid for their jobs now put results before ethics and self satisfaction. They do not have the patience, skill, or most important belief in the principles of their discipline to properly direct and teach their players. They have taken lesser players and converted them into power machines who fit the systems designed to breakdown, or by pass, all the fine points of the game, but get

The administrators (who initially cause this managerial fear by demanding instant success) panicked by the resulting falling crowds, have turned a blind eve to the tough stuff using the excuse

"physical excitement will bring back the crowds". What have they got? In one word, Hooliganism!!, and the resultant mob violence that has served to keep the ordinary fan away from the game. Physical excitement is a fleeting emotion, pleasure and satisfaction are more common human traits and these should be catered for. So it can be seen, fear of losing jobs, games, points, money, crowds, and finally physical fear on the part of the ordinary fan have combined to put world soccer

on its present level. However, all is not lost. Manchester United, refusing to panic, encouraged skill and despite a "trophy drought" remained Englands greatest crowd puller. Ron Greenwood's soccer academy at West Ham flourishes and despite living in the relegation zone play to capacity crowds every week, crowds paying to watch skill. Real Madrid tried to convert to power and Spanish soccer, once regarded as the finest, fell by the wayside, and they have now formed new policies to bring back the great days. Even Don Revies soccer machine, Leeds Utd, are now emphasising skill in an effort to lift their static support numbers. Individually Best, Law, Cooke, Gray, Charlton, Cruyff have all survived the "hatchet men" to form a nucleus of targets that the younger player can aim at, and so lift the game from the

doldrums. What has this to do with Brisbane? Today we are our usual ten years behind world trends. When Alf Ramseys automats won the World Cup in 1966, all the little men in world soccer jumped on the bandwagon. That is where we are today. Managers and coaches seeking results have converted formerly very good footballing sides to the Power Game. That they have done so may be pardonable under certain circumstances (club administration pressure), but the answer "it brings success" is completely contradictory to all that is ethical in coaching manuals. Players have stifled their talents to fit the power and pace systems. What soccer judge can say Matt Jackson, Eric Pattison or Billy Haigh, to name a few, are supplying us with the silky smooth soccer of which they are capable, and in fact were purveying two or three seasons ago. No doubt they are fitter, but the flair has vanished. Flair is a word used in world soccer magazines, in fact soccer critics search the British game for "flair", like desert travellers seeking water. Many Australian critics ask what

flair is, it's simply the ability to do the unexpected, in short, soccer brain.
Willie Connors and George Fraser who two years ago were being lauded and praised for their skill and potential have today been kicked into the oblivion of reserve grade soccer. How long before Stevie Dolan joins them? Fred Robins gave youthful talent a go this year and was almost bulldozed into second division. The press has taken to praising young men who have lots of potential but are so obviously lacking in three of the basic skills as to be laughable were it not so tragic. Scottish readers must remember Kichenbrand and how he finished, then draw their own comparisons. The administration are in no man's land and it appears players can do anything and be fined. Who pays? Referees no longer police the laws and some appear to have taken the attitude "the players can kick hell out of each other but don't let them answer back or else". Then the crowds, what crowds? Live T.V. has robbed us of the statistical evidence as to the rise or fall but it has also shown Brisbane the hooligans punching up on Perry Park terraces, twice in two weeks it has shown us cans thrown at players on the park and some of the players have not been outdone in their efforts. Yet we have administrators who say we don't have violence in soccer. Shades of the ostrich. Some may laugh in their armchairs at the goings on, but they are safe there, these hooligans will ultimately keep people away from Perry Park. Let's cater for the skill hungry thousands who flocked to see Man. Utd., Dundee and Santos. Let us learn from others mistakes and get the game cleaned up and in doing so opened up. Only the top administration can do this and if they refuse they are leading us to a long drought of skill. I among others don't think Brisbane soccer can

One does not require to be sufficiently experienced as a coach or manager to fully realise that a player who cannot control his emotions is in fact a handicap to his side yet when you look at various selections made each week it is suprising to see some clubs persevering with this obvious burden still in their team!

can test the character of the individual and the quality of the game. Bad temper has no place in sport, and one lesson this game should teach is that a loss of temper usually leads to defeat – it is most certainly destructive of any meaning of the word sport.

This test of temper is very exacting in the game of Soccer. The need for the individual to control his temper and his aggression is an important part of the discipline of the game. Remember, always, that this is a team game and the whole team is let down if one member loses control.

The need for a co-ordinated team effort is one of the ultimate desires of every coach and the way an individual makes his contribution on behalf of the whole team reflects upon the sportmanship and the success or failure of his side during a particular match.

The ideals expressed by these words are vital to the spirit of the game and are part of its appeal, for it is hoped that they stimulate an aspect of human nature which is always operative - Commonsense - Now is the time to pay close attention to this factor once more.




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
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
