

The Personality in the feature page this week is not a player. Yes, it is a "man in black". The only international we have at the moment in Queensland is a referee by the name of Vince Dobinson. Most people either like or dislike Vince, so we will see what his opinions are of his main critics, the players.

How long have you been a referee, vince?

I am in my 20th year of blowing the whistle - all of it in Brisbane.

How long do you intend carrying on?

I have got 2 years before enforced retirement so I hope to keep going till

What has been your hardest game to control?

Actually, two come to mind. The Greece v. Australia in Melbourne and more recently, the Hellenic v. Azzurri, last month.

Are today's players better "actors" than the older player?

No, not really. They are semiprofessional trying to be better players, though some could get Oscars, if they were not so amateurish.

What is your opinion of today's player?

Generally, they are fitter than the old days. I think it would be harder for most of the older styled player to keep up with this generation's method of playing, due, of course, to our new systems.

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Are referees today becoming too technical?

Yes, I must agree. But the reason for this is the players' attitude towards the rules of the game.

Have you any ambitions left?

I would love to go on tour and, if possible, get to the World Cup in 1974.

What has been your biggest honour? Easy, Getting my F.I.F.A. Badge.

Your opinion of today's standard of

Well, at the beginning of the season, I was very disappointed but over the last month I have seen players doing very intelligent work, and I think if they keep up this standard, it must rub off on other teams, so the game must improve.

Do you think our players know the rules as well as they should?

Certainly not. If they did, they would not behave as they do. In fact, I would say that 80% of today's players have never seen inside the Book of Laws.

In your opinion, who are the most improved side this season?

Merton-East — for the way they came from second bottom to second top; and Polonia — for the way they stuck to the task of getting away from relegation. In fact, they could be classed as unlucky not to make the four.

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REFEREES

GAMESMANSHIP

Football was played before there were written laws, and ways of playing were worked out which were generally agreed to be fair. The modern laws try to put these ideas into words but unfortunately the introduction of gamesmanship into the proceedings does nothing except defeat the very purpose of these laws.

Any action by a player which unsportingly attempts to influence or reflect upon the referee is a motivated form of gamesmanship and is a bad offence. Referees do have the powers to

deal with such demonstrations of ungentlemanly behaviour and it is a pity that they become subject of criticism for exercising that prerogative.

There are of course many ways in which players can attempt to undermine his authority or try to deceive him in a fashion which merely offends against the whole spirit of the game. Perhaps the following are suitable examples of the deceitful practice of gamesmanship which does frequently occur during matches.

You have all seen the player who rolls over in apparent agony after a fair hard tackle who tries to win a decision from the referee against his opponent but even if that fails, he appeals to an ignorant section of the crowd for ill-deserved applause when he resumes into the game. How should referees protect this type of player?

There are often occasions in most games when the whistle is blown for offside and the offending player reacts with surprise and points dramatically to an opposing defender, who was not in that spot when the ball was played. Equally well known are the defenders trying to work the offside trap but inevitably are caught out by their own tactics, and thereby lose a goal — then they act as if it was a referees mistake that cost the goal and behave as if the referee had taken leave of his senses! How should referees deal with these kind of players?

Worst of all is the arrogant player who believes he is superior to the referee and the laws of the game, who, when he thinks he has been fouled, decides to take the laws of the jungle to hand and chooses to retalliate violently. Was the referee being too strict when he sent the culprit off the field?

These and many other incidents of offensive behaviour are known to us all and it is here that good partisanship and enthusiasm for a team amongst spectators have their place in deciding the limits of gamesmanship and in the making or breaking the laws of the game.

Good sportsmanship in victory or defeat amongst the players and supporters are all elements in maintaining the ideals of these laws, and the image of the game as a whole will benefit. Let it be fostered and encouraged by us all.

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CHARLTON'S TESTIMONIAL BONANZA

Suddenly it's benefit time all over again, and while the new season is getting into its stride enthusiasts in almost all parts of Britain are beginning to talk about the man who seems likely to reap the greatest reward of all time — Bobby Charlton.

Saturday, 2nd. Sept. 1972.

When the cash from sundry efforts up and down the country is linked with the testimonial affair at Old Trafford, this month, and Wembley's projected showpiece it's estimated that nearly another \$200,000 may be going into the family bank account.

Which is an awful lot of money even in this day and age, though definitely indicative of the tremendous respect in which this friendly, balding character is held not only by the thousands who flock along the Chester Road for all Manchester United's home games, but by lovers of the game everywhere.

SUSTAINED PERFORMANCE

There have been many great players at other periods, yet few have equalled the tremendous, sustained performance, or won the fantastic support rightly claimed by this winger-cum-centre-cum midfield-cum-anywhere in a top flight career extending over seventeen years.

Perhaps it was escapism from brother Jack's "great bloody hole in the ground" down which all other men in their Northumbrian colliery town worked, that provided an extra driving force for the open-air life, though it was only after the youngster had said he wanted to join United "because it's my type of club", and Dad had been talked over by Jimmy Murphy that he was allowed to leave the north-east.

That was in the autumn of 1954. He was rising seventeen, after first seeing the light of day in a terraced home in Ashington, on October 11th, 1937, and picking up the vowels at Bedlington Grammar in between playing for East Northumberland, then England boys in five internationals.

FOOTBALLING FATHER

To-day, Robert Charlton is a footballing father with a family and home in Cheshire's stockbroker belt, skipperextraordinary of Manchester United, holder of the Esteemed Order of the British Empire, possessor of F.A. Cup, European and English championship medals, and over a hundred caps.

medals, and over a hundred caps.

A mouthful? Yes, and so is the description of the full cap trail from a Hampden debut on April 19th, 1958, to subsequent matches against Portugal, Yugoslavia, Russia, Italy, Brazil, Peru, Mexico, USA, Sweden, Spain, Hungary, Luxembourg, Austria, Argentina, Bul-

garia, France, Czechoslovakia, East Germany, Switzerland, Uruguay, Eire, West Germany, Rumania, Finland, Netherlands, Norway, Poland, and, of course, Scotland, Ireland and Wales.

No wonder the F.A. presented him with a silver salver in commemoration of a hundred appearances in the famous white shirt of England, with its distinguishing badge of lions rampant, and it was also a timely thought to attach all the national flags to it, though I could never understand why Holland's colours were missing.

The international slant is best provided by Sir Alf Ramsey, who inclines to the view that although the United star has become a good reader of the game, he was often totally inspired by a simple desire to get at the ball without first examining the prospects.

On that particular theme the England boss says: "He was a good player, then a very good player, but not a great one until during our match against Yugo-slavia in May, of 1966, when the England attack broke down on the left-wing, and, instead of instinctively chasing the ball, he suddenly halted as if remembering something, and looked all around him.

BRILLIANT INDIVIDUAL

"Then, when the Yugoslav defence switched the ball across field, and began breaking away with their own attack, Bobby was there, looking to see if there was any danger from the blind side, and had become a great player who was always gifted, but, on maturing, was not only a brilliant individual but also a collective team man."

They say he has never sold a fan short, and so far as I'm concerned that can certainly be applied to his own club for right from the first days of clobbing along the corridors underneath the railway stand there has been complete obedience to official dictums, and, unlike quite a few I could name, never a moment's unnecessary trouble for anyone.

PLEASANT FELLOW

Perhaps that has been due to the firm and careful grooming of Busby and Murphy, and, while blossoming like a floret, continual remembrance of the injunction of Bert Whalley, that pleasant fellow of a coach who died in the German snows at Munich, and always said to him: "If you get into trouble it doesn't do you any good or help the team, and it's simply pointless to get sent off, so always try and make certain you are never on the wrong side of the referee."

Most who have studied his play talk about the effortless control, mastery of the chest-high balls, and the graceful spin away from the tackle, but the red-blood types particularly like the way the ball is hit when going for the target, it's the blockbusters they feed on.

One of the nicest things to happen through those decades was, I think, the tribute paid by the Brazilian F.A. on the occasion of his hundredth cap. They persuaded Sir Stanley Rous, former F.A. secretary, now President of F.I.F.A. to act as messenger and carry a special memento of their appreciation. It was inscribed in twin languages thus: "This is being presented to the most popular footballer ever to have visited our shores."

SPECIAL ATTENTION

The ancient State of Jalisco, in the South Americas, heard of that event, and, when World Cup planning awarded England games to Guadalajara paid special attention to Charlton, then made him their Sportsman of the Year, and the Governor praised his sportsmanship and fair play.

From those dizzy heights, and after breaking Billy Wright's cap record, he flew home - just in nice time for attendance at the homely little monthly meetings of the Manchester United Fan Club, which he chairs, and was told they'd decided to give him a silver dish as THEIR token.

TRIUMPHS AND PLAUDITS

Yet, despite all these triumphs and plaudits, he remains the same rather shy person he was when flying back from one of those early internationals in Ireland. Huddled up against the window, he hardly spoke a word until we approached Manchester. Then he turned to me excitedly, and said: "That black patch down there is Old Trafford, just alongside the Chester Road."

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

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Soccer Fanatic Makes Good

At 18 years of age Trevor Francis, the wonderboy of British soccer has come of age. Now the soccer public in Britain are waiting to see if this young player can produce the kind of form which has earned him such lavish praise over the past two seasons.

The Birmingham City striker, who has the Jimmy Greaves type of intuitive flair for scoring goals, now faces his make or break test in top grade company

in the First Division.

He has scaled every hurdle with consummate ease since his introduction into the Birmingham first team as a shy, nervous 16-year-old. The result is that he is now valued at nearly \$400,000 and it is little wonder that the Midland club have given the Plymouth-born young ster a new and bigger four year contract.

If Birmingham are successful it could transpire that Francis will be the highest paid teenager in British soccer. This is the kind of rise to fame that young boys, Francis among them, dream about when they begin to play soccer.

SENSATIONAL INTRODUCTION

His father, who had a short spell as a player with Plymouth, relates: "Trevor has been football mad all his life. He was only seven when he used to disappear to collect autographs every Saturday. He used to go out at nine in the morning with a pasty and a bottle of pop and we didn't see him again until six o'clock at night.

He would watch Plymouth play in the afternoon and the rest of the time he would be waiting around trying to get the players' autographs. Once I remember he trailed Sir Stanley Matthews all over the place before getting him to

Francis, who still collects autographs, demonstrated then the kind of dedication and determination which is now a feature of his play. There is little doubt that many young players would have disappeared from the game if they had received the same attention as Francis has been subjected to since his sensational introduction into the game.

Manager Freddie Goodwin apprec-

iates the kind of pressure under which Francis has to operate. He says "Our main job is to convince Trevor that he is not a failure if he doesn't score

great goals week after week.
"In the First Division he is going to find it even more difficult but we have a great deal of faith in his ability."

TOP CLASS COMPANY

Francis, who wowed the critics on Birmingham's short North American preseason tour, appreciates the kind of

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problems which could be facing him and Birmingham in the months to come. He says in his soft South-West burr: "It's always been my ambition to play in the First Division. I honestly didn't think it would come so quickly. Only two years ago I started the season in the third team and then my ambition was to play in the second team.

'A great deal has happened since then. I've helped Birmingham into the First Division and I've played for the England youth team. Personally, I feel that I'm now better equipped to take care of myself in the Football League than I was a few months after stepping into the first team. I've grown a couple of inches and put on a little weight. Generally, I feel a lot stronger and I'm looking forward to playing in such top class company in the months to

It will be in these early days that the

critics will observe whether Francis can maintain his climb and develop into a fully fledged England player. If he can display his noted goal flair there is no reason to doubt that he could be on the verge of England's team by the time of the 1974 World Cup Finals (always supposing that England qualify!). He is a player of rich ability allied to a high degree of personal confidence in his own performances.

With this kind of outlook he is obviously a player who is going to go far in the game and Birmingham City are naturally hoping that he carries the famous Midland club along and together they can savour the fruits of success. He is a player, like Greaves, who can spot a goal opening in a blink of an eye. He wheels and turns in a flash and before the opposition realises what is happening he is slotting the ball home.
