HOW many clubs have their own newsletter — We don't know. How many clubs have sent us a copy of their newsletter - Trident Soccer Club.

GO SOCCER

Go Soccer is as much your programme as anybody else's. We naturally want to provide as much local coverage as we can in our 20 pages.

In our last edition we ran a few pages of overseas news simply because this programme is produced on a part time basis, as all clubs are well aware, and it is just impossible for one or two people to fill all those pages with local coverage.

The First Division coverage is no problem — we can cover that quite adequately as naturally most of the GO SOCCERS are sold at First Division

We are also quite aware that a number of clubs from week to week probably do not even see a copy. But all clubs know the programme exists, judging by the heatrening backing and support which resulted from a recent council meeting

Right — the club officials know GO SOCCER exists but many of your players don't. I was at a Fourth Division match on Saturday when a number of Newmarket players enquired about where and when they can obtain copies.

Obviously, club officials have not made many of their players aware that it is an easy task to make sure they can have a copy each week.

The solution is simple. GO SOCCER is available from Perry Park every Friday night and clubs only have to come to headquarters and secure as many copies they think might be sold at their games each week.

It is too much of a hassle, as we said earlier, to distribute to the clubs ourselves, but any clubs on the northside of the city, within reason, need only let me know (telephone numbers are listed above) and every attempt will be made to deliver ordered copies to the clubs concerned.

This is already done in the case of Mitchelton and Goodna, who take a certain number every week. In turn, clubs can supply us with news, preferably not week old match reports, but general clubs news, which 'can be inserted in the programme.

In this edition there is an article supplied by Eagles coach, Matt Carson, and in previous weeks, contributions were submitted by Bardon's Jim Binnie.

These people were not asked to contribute. They did so off their own bat. Therefore every Soccer player, official or referee has the right to submit copy

Tell us about your club — air your grievances about the game. Anybody with anything to say will be accommodated. Remember — it's your programme, not ours.

Juniors' Tour of a Lifetime

NET year junior players from any club throughout the State could be involved in an overseas tour unrivalled in recent years.

F. C. Green, star of Heerlen (province of Limburg in Holland) is organising a youth soccer tournament during August next year for age groups 12-13, 14-15, 16-17 and 18-23 years. The number of persons per team will be limited to 20 and a maximum of 20-teams will be accepted on a first in, first served basis.

Arrival of the teams should preferably be on Saturday, August 6 and the tourna -ment will start in the late afternoon of August 7. The finals will be played on August 14.

The cost for the full period amounts to \$120 approx. per person full board, excluding cost of laundry service. Teams will be accommodated in dormitories of schools, convents or convention centres; in general not more than five persons in a room. Bus transport from the dormitories to the playing fields and return is included.

Compatible Dutch, German and Belgian teams will be invited depending on the strength of the overseas teams. After arrival of the teams, names and ages will be checked and the necessary approval of the Overseas Soccer Federation will have to be submitted. FIFA rules will apply during the tournament, which will be held under the control of the KNVB Royal Netherlands Football Association.

Foreign teams arrange for their own accident - medical - luggage insurance. This is the chance of a lifetime for any one of the junior clubs in Queensland and various extension programmes can be organised.

Air fare in August for Brisbane - Sydney - Amsterdam - Brisbane is \$991 and Valley World Travel Company is willing to help clubs raise the necessary funds by contributing the equivalent of a return air fare to Amsterdam, which could be used as a raffle.

Let's not forget how Lions won the premiership title in the preceding three seasons, yet in the same years faded at the end and failed to take out the Grand Final.

Of course winning the premiership in Soccer, which is the only code not to have the absurdities of the final five setup of the three other football codes, where a team which wins only eight matches out of 21 can eventually win the premiership, is the prime objective.

But in this day of commercialism and razzamatazz, there is usually a lot more ballyhoo associated with the Grand Final, so that also has become a worthwhile target for City to aim for.

At the moment there seems to be a vast discrepency in the outlook of the two Cup finalists.

Lions claim their main job is to prepare for the National League, while City obviously plan to scoop the pool for the last time in the First Division before they join the League.

So Lions, if only for the sake of regaining lost prestige, will be going all out on Sunday in an attempt to appease their supporters' thirst for success.

Injury wise, there is also a lot of difference between the teams. City's only doubtful starter in this regard would be Brian Kibbey, who took a kick on the leg against St. Helens on Sunday.

Lions on the other hand earlier in the week had heaps of problems. Centre half Tony Edwards was due to front the disciplinary committee after being sent off by John Gale against Mt. Gravatt last Sunday.

The problem facing Edwards at that stage is that, even if he won an appeal against his sendoff, he still had to contend with the first caution he received on Sunday, which in fact was his third overall.

In addition Charlie Dench is still under suspension and three players carried injuries after the shock loss to Mt. Gravatt

Why City are the Top Dogs

OUR 3 - 1 win over St. Helens last Sunday now makes us officially the 1976 premiers and GO SOCCER has asked me to list a few reasons why I think it has been achieved.

If I had to name one specific factor, I probably would plump for team spirit and harmony, but of course there are many other reasons.

Another is our perfect blend of strength speed and ability and all of our players have at least one of all of these qualities.

For a start we have men like Billy Haigh and Ian Johnston, who think all the time, Kevin Caldwell a great asset on the burst and Horst Schneider, who will sacrifice himself to do anything for the team. In fact he has done a lot of the donkey work working the ball up to those three strikers already mentioned.

We've got consistent men in the midfield of the calibre of Brian Kibbey and Peter Nielsen and it's doubtful if either one has played a bad match all season.

Fullbacks Ian Rathmell and Ian Perry, apart from being great tacklers and defenders, have between them scored 10 goals so far in the premiership.

At the back we have Gary Clifford, who does all the sweeping and pushes Pedro Tokesi upfield, so much so that Tokesi is our ball winner and usually wins more possession than anyone on the park.

Without wishing to single out any one player, I feel the intelligence of Clifford at the back has played a big role in our success.

And let's not forget Osvaldo Borzi. He and the other defenders have conceded only 20 goals in the premiership. Take a close look at City on Sunday and you'll often see either Kibbey or Nielsen stranded in the midfield. But what happens they simply look to the left or right and can slip a square ball to either Perry or Rathmell.

All that fits in with our pattern of attacking with up to six or seven men. But remember that we have also been defending with the same numbers.

How has the team trained this season? They're all whingers. Anybody above that level would only be classed as just average.

The problem, if you could call it that, is that we have been winning and it's hard to sustain your energies and enthusiasm when success is there every weekend.

As far as this week goes, in preparation for the Cup Final, on Tuesday night we did all the "gits" work - hard slogging stuff. Wednesday night was spent on shooting, penalty kicks and crosses and on Thursday it was getting things wound up to finish with a simulated match.

With the premiership behind us, plus the Caruso Cup and the first round President's Cup trophy, we are looking confidently ahead to the Cup on Sunday, followed by the second round trophy and finally the Grand Final. We all feel we can take out the lot.

I was also asked to list what I thought of the other teams in the premiership race this season. Here is a brief resume:

REDLANDS: Defended as well as we did this season but it was noticeable that attacks were mounted with only two or maybe three players involved. On that basis they would mostly be chasing a 1 - 0 win.

MERTON: A good effort this year,

considering the players they lost early, and they certainly gave us three hard matches so far. I don't for one moment think everthing revolves around Steve Dolan. We for one were never greatly worried, as he didn't do much without the ball.

LIONS: Would have to be the great disappointment of the season. We have heard the old cry that they are getting ready for National League, but that's rubbish. If they are good enough, they should be winning at the same time.

ST. GEORGE: No team spirit seemed to be the problem here. Many of their players have ability but never produced it altogether. That was exemplified when we beat them 7-2 in the first round. They all played for themselves.

EAGLES: Not impressed by this team, mainly because they have tended to rely on one player, Tony Brennan. There was always too much pressure on the lad and in three meetings against us we marked him out of the game and they scored one goal — from 40 yards at

MT. GRAVATT: If only these players had the ability to match their spirit they would have been one of the top sides. They didn't trouble us at any stage, mainly

because they relied too much on body contact and strength rather than brains.

ST. HELENS: I have some admiration for this predominantly young team, largely because they never knew when they were beaten. They had us down both times we met but couldn't carry on with it. Always on the go and if I were not with City, they would be a team I would be happy to coach.

NORTH BRISBANE: This was the best pre-season team we met, regarding ability and a touch of class. There were a few injury worries and misunderstandings amongst some players and apart from that could have done better. They are still my tip to make the final four behind City. Merton and Lions.

COALSTARS: A team of weekenders who don't put it together enough. Definitely not First Division material on their training habits and attitude in the field.

THISTLE: What can you say about this team. Many feel they are too good to be in this position. But they have had a lot of years and many chances to do things in the First Division. Maybe this is simply not just their year when everything goes wrong.

BARDON: This team is a combination of youngsters and some older heads and the latter found it hard to go flat out all the time. Maybe the older ones could have been younger and the younger ones could have been "older", if you get what I mean.



ALAN SHAW: Midfield—Very promising 21 year old and should have a big future in the game. Would be handy asset in First Division.

BILLY FERGUSON: Midfield — Scottish player who has extensive experience back home and toured Europe with number of junior teams.

DENNIS DODD: Midfield — As a youngster had a big future in the game in England. Formerly with Preston North End.

DAVE ROBINS: Striker — Apart from being a titleholder in motor bike riding is also most capable forward, dangerous against all defenders.

BARRY PARSONS: Striker — Tons of speed up front, a good opportunist and extremely fit, being a physical education teacher.

MIKE BAKER: Striker — Completes the strong Coast outfit and is another good opportunist. Dedicated to the game, after coming back from serious knee injury.

OXLEY UNITED

JACK LUMLEY: Goalkeeper — Has been a tower of strength this year and good inspiration to the men in front of him.

DAVE ARMSTRONG: Right fullback — Up and coming young kid who should go far if he maintains dedication to the game.

CHRIS BLACK: Left fullback — Has been with the club for some years and naturally has solid First Division experience. Good worker.

PETER WILLIAMSON: Centre half — Another player rated by Eddie Carrigan as an extremely bright prospect for the future. Improving with every match.

RAY KNIGHT: Centre half — Certainly needs no introduction and is one of the gentlemen of the game. Backbone of the defence and a great inspiration.

WAYNE CATCHCART: Midfield — Only 16 years old and has matured greatly this season. Definitely one to watch in the future.

JOHN HUDSON: Midfield — Equally as well known as Ray Knight, having played for Queensland, Bardon, Wynnum, Brisbane City and Redcliffe.

MARTY MALLETT: Striker—Another of Oxley's extremely young brigade and has served the club well all season. Works for 90 minutes.

MIKE MELBERG: Striker — Former Eagles First Division player and brother of current midfielder Ivars. Good opportunist and one who adapts himself to the job well.

RORY SHORT: Striker — Has speed

to burn and plenty of ability which will make him a good club asset in the future.

RODNEY SHEPHERD: Striker — Can play anywhere in the forward line and is a most useful utility player overall.

MITCHELTON

BRONCO BRADONOVIC: Goalkeeper — Has been with the club some 17 years and has played last few matches very well. Great servant.

DAVE ELLIOTT: Goalkeeper — Club's regular 'keeper but has been out with injury. Could return if Bradonovic is required for reserve team's semi-finals.

JOHN COFFEY: Right fullback — Youngster from the Bardon club who has defended well all season. Has a bright future.

GRAHAM MOREY: Centre half — Most aggressive player who tackles with determination. Good servant for the club.

PETER MOREY: Centre half—Brother of Graham and has given equally good service. Was in doubt early in the season after breaking ankle for the second time, but has come back better than ever.

TONY BISHOP: Left fullback—Former North Brisbane defender who obviously has solid First Division experience.

MIKE HAYES: Midfield — Another signing from Bardon and can play in just about any position. A great asset to the team.

RITCHIE PUTTOCK: Midfield — A good ball player and gives his strikers a good sight of the ball from the midfield.

BEN LERKENFELDT: Striker — Very experienced and was once with Latrobe when they were in 2nd Div. Fast, with good ball control and powerful shot. Has hit top form last three matches.

PHIL CRUSE: Striker — Played for Queensland against A.C.T. in Canberra this year before switching over from Bardon. Good aggressive young striker and starting to find the back of the net regularly.

BARRY ANDERSON: Striker — Another with First Division experience, played formerly with Bardon and St. George before coming back to his old club. Ironically was a member of the Gold Coast side which won promotion to First Division some years back.

TREVOR GODDEN: Goalkeeper — Solidly built custodian who impressed many with his displays in the past when club was in the First Division. Very safe under extreme pressure.

PETER EDWARDS: Centre half — Probably one of the club's best known players, as he has been in State squad on numerous occasions but unlucky not to make final lineup. Always plays a big game.

PETER LELLIOTT: Centre half — Big aggressive player who has scored many

fine goals in the First Division. Likely to be used in the backline for this game.

TED KRISTENS: Midfield — Former St. George player who works non stop for 90 minutes each week and is a great boost to attack and defence.

EDDIE WILKINS: Midfield — Playing most effectively in the middle this year after being more widely known in the past as an attacking striker. Has plenty of experience.

DAVID LARGE: Midfield — One of the four players in this team signed from St. George and has proved naturally to be a real bargain. Works hard and capable of scoring many goals.

NIGEL FISHER: Striker — Busy little forward who is usually most dangerous when lurking on the right wing. Possesses powerful shot and needs to be patrolled closely.

JOHN BRIDGE: Striker — The fourth of the quartet from St. George and his aggression up front has played major role in the club's promotion aims this season.

BRIAN LAMPITT: Striker — Another with wide First Division experience with good ball control and great left foot shot. Thinks all the time and provides the brainwork in attack.

IAN BALL: Midfield — Most consistent player who has been with the club a long time and likely to be on the bench for this match.

GLEN MERRIN: Striker — May also be a reserve on Saturday but is an ideal left winger with powerful shot and speed to burn.

LEV YACHIN— "The Black Panther"

28th August, 1976

BETWEEN 1950 and 1970, the name Lev Yachin was synonymous with Moscow Dynamo.

The legendary Black Panther — socalled because of his black outfit and remarkable agility — remained unchallenged during most of this period as the outstanding goalkeeper in Russia.

And, in the eyes of many good judges, he may have been the best goalkeeper the world has seen.

A one-club man, Yachin remained with Dynamo throughout his career, winning five Soviet championships, the last in 1963. In 1956, he was a member of the Russian team which beat Yugoslavia in a riotous match in Melbourne to win the Olympic gold medal. For almost 15 years he was an automatic choice for Russia, playing in three World Cup Series, including the 1966 finals in England.

The year 1963 brought him his greatest triumph; he was elected European Player of the Year and played for a FIFA Rest of the World XI against England, at Wembley. Although England won the match 2–1, Yachin produced one of his greatest displays. So daring and skilful

was Yachin at the peak of his career that he would often play virtually as an extra full back, standing 10 or 15 yards out of his goal to cut out dangerous centres or attacking movements.

Married with two daughters, Yachin's second most memorable match was the farewell game for Sir Stanley Matthews, at Stoke. One of his most cherished souvenirs is a photograph of himself and the great Hungarian winger, Ferenc Puskas, carrying Matthews off the field after the match.

Yachin represented Russia 75 times, and played in the 1960 and 1964 Nations Cup finals.

CHEEKY CHAPPIES

MANCHESTER United's young stars are now being completely ignored by the British press. Before the recent Cup final they sent out a circular to all newspapers: "Any interview with a player will cost you \$40." Replied a spokesman of the soccer writers: "Who cares about their views? It's our opinions that the readers want to know." Then, for good measure, they slapped a ban on Manchester United players, totally blacking out news on Old Trafford.
