THE start of the National League is only some six months away, yet widespread confusion, bewilderment and rumours have everybody guessing about what is going on.

There still has been no decision made yet about whether Lions and City will remain in the First Division or when First Division matches next season will be played.

Amazingly, there is some suggestion that some of the Clubs not in the National League are planning to stage their premiership matches on Sundays, in direct opposition to the League.

The National League will be struggling to survive if it does not have the support of everyone, and that includes all of the First Division Clubs next season.

By playing premiership matches on a Sunday, not only will they help to take away a portion of the expected League match attendance, but the Clubs reported to be interested in this crazy scheme, will find themselves the recipients of little or no publicity.

It is quite obvious that National League matches next season will take precedence over any other games in Brisbane's two morning newspapers.

The best Clubs playing premiership matches on Sunday can expect in terms of publicity will be to have simply their results recorded at the end of the National League match reports.

By playing on Saturdays, their matches would be covered extensively by the two Saturday newspapers in Sunday morning's edition.

The Clubs wishing to play on Sundays will only be hurting themselves and the National League - in short, Soccer in general.

That type of backward thinking should be knocked on the head right now.

Another disturbing rumour concerns the reported plan by Lions and City to stage only one match - the National League match - at Perry Park next year every Sunday.

Admittedly that works overseas, but let's face it, we've got a long way to go before we disregard the paying public to that extent.

Most football supporters want to go out on Sundays just after lunch. There won't be many of them prepared to pay expected increased admission charges just for the privilege of watching only one game.

Some of the First Division Clubs are prepared to offer their matches as curtainraisers, naturally for a set proportion of the gate. There should be every effort made to make this a reality, or people who want some value for their money won't bother turning up at all.

It's Anyone's Guess

WRITING the First Division preview each week would be the hardest task associated with GO SOCCER.

With the final four situation so delicately poised anything could happen in the final two rounds.

And had we listed our selections for last weekend's matches they would have been — Thistle, Merton, Lions, Eagles, Bardon and City, giving a grand score of one out of six. Nevertheless we'll have a look at round 21 and see what happens.

CITY v BARDON

Poor old Bardon no doubt will feel the wrath and fresh outlook City may have engendered during the week now that St. George have ended their long unbeaten run.

City probably will not play as badly as they did on Sunday for the rest of the season, although Brian Kibbey may be out and Ian Perry hobbled off against St. George last week after carrying more bandages than a Johnson and Johnson packet.

Kevin Caldwell no doubt will be used from the start this week and Bardon's stocks will be raised by the return of Karl Herdle to the backline. They certainly need it judging by the way their defence was no where to be seen when Matt Jackson scored last Sunday. City to win.

ST. HELENS v MT. GRAVATT

It is quite obvious no one can now take Mt. Gravatt too lightly. It's a pity this run started so late or they would have been a real semi-final prospect.

Jimmy Rogers has the youngsters stirred up at the right time of the season and they will be keen to go one better to add the St. Helens scalp to those already collected from Merton, Lions and Eagles.

Some reckon Saints have played better away from home this season and certainly those last two efforts at headquarters have been full of merit.

Saints now can relax a little with the worries of relegation behind them and could be the ones to stop this mini-streak from Mt. Gravatt. Saints in a tight one.

EAGLES v REDLANDS

The pessimists have been saying for some weeks that Redlands are in the top four on sufferance, but there's only two rounds to go and we find them still hanging in there grimly onto third place (on goal average).

This match obviously means a great deal to both clubs, Two points to Redlands would see them safely into the top four, while a loss again for Eagles would almost spell the end to their hopes.

Not having seen either team in action last weekend, Redlands' effort in sharing the points with Lions was commendable, if only for the latter's game Ampol Cup effort the week before. Redlands should win another tight match.

At this stage, Thistle supporters may find some solace in the fact that they have a better goal average (.608) than both Coalstars (.439) and Bardon (.509). All they have to do of course is keep winning. But we'll stick with the original selection — a draw.

NORTHS v ST. GEORGE

Now that St. George have gone this far and topped it off with the win over City, it's doubtful if they will want to let Norths now stand in their way.

There were some mighty big efforts from some St. George men last weekend and a repeat of that would be sufficient to give them two points again.

But Norths, while never setting the world on fire at any stage this season, have always been "thereabouts" and could not be taken too lightly, particularly as they still have a rough show of making the four. St. George to make it two in a row.

A MATCH WELL WORTH SEEING

"DULL and uninteresting" is how one newspaper summed up last Sunday's premiership match between City and St. George.

All we can say is that some people must be hard to please, although from comments heard after the match, most spectators there would have disagreed with that description.

Admittedly City played below their best form but that was a natural reaction expected after the club had secured the premiership, Ampol Cup and also beaten their traditional rivals St. George in the challenge match some weeks before.

Basically, it was damn good entertainment. The match had just about everything — the underdogs got up to win and in the process ended a City winning sequence which had lasted just on six months.

There were plenty of goalscoring chances, hectic battles in the goalmouth. and there was certainly nothing "dull and uninteresting" about Ian Johnston's brilliant diving header which hit the upright or Iain Fagan's crashing free kick which shook the crossbar.

For those who like a bit of needle in a match, there was also enough in that department to satisfy, although at one stage a rash of free kicks did have somewhat of a disjointing effect.

Interest was maintained right throughout the match as St. George hung on desper -ately to win a match which must have meant a lot to them, with City equally desperately trying to preserve their magnificent record.

The game was also a personal triumph for the players like Peter Roberts, John McGinlay, Ricky Bow, Mike Makrillous and Gordon Mackie, who had sat patiently in the wings while their club experimented with the five Cypriot imports. And didn't those men relish the opportunity.

Highlight of the match was the performance of Fagan, who has now proved centre half is his best position. How cool and resourceful he was in those last thrilling 20 minutes. Iain's had his critics in the past so it's even more heartening to see him reply with Sundays performance. He was certainly GO SOCCER'S Player of the Week.

And finally, enough credit cannot be given to those City players who walked to the St. George gate after the match to offer their congratulations. Their attitude was in complete contrast to that of some of their supporters. Let's not forget that the longer you keep winning, the harder it is to swallow defeat.

FOOTNOTE: Sometimes we like to think that everything we say is not taken in vain, and there were two important points to come out of Sundays match:

1. There were NO Rugby League progress reports announced over the P.A. and 2. Peter Roberts WAS pinched for going outside the area in the last few minutes of the match.

THE under 16 championships held every year in alternate States is regarded as a prestigeous tournament—a type of World Cup between States. Every State enters this tournament with high hopes of winning the trophy and for the future.

Queensland's hopes were shattered the first day when after travelling from Brisbane airport in early morning, we arrived in Melbourne at approximately 11.15 a.m. We then found we still had a two hour bus ride facing us, and upon arrival at HMAS Cerberus at about 1.40 p.m., we could not get a meal.

After lodging in our dormitory we attended a welcome parade, leaving insufficient time for the players to rest up before meeting a "fresh" Victorian side.

This is not meant to be an excuse in any way for losing the game but rather as a warning for teams to take precautions when they travel to future tournaments. I feel sure that in the future with the support of clubs and Soccer supporters, Queensland can grasp this national under 16 title.

The next tough match our boys faced they had won, until one of the so-called top referees awarded two penalities against us. I might add he was the only man on the ground who felt the penalities were valid.

During all this, the squad suffered eight injuries, two of which were concussion cases and yet the boys still gave Queensland 100 per cent and ran themselves into the ground.

To all the boys, congratulations for your efforts. The winning of the Sporting Teams' trophy certainly proves this point. And finally our thanks to trainer Mike Watson, who worked on the injured from morning to late at night. Without him we would have been lost. The final placings after the seven matches played were: Northern New South Wales 12, New South Wales 11, Victoria 9, Western Australia 6, South Australia 6, Queensland 5, Australian Capital Territory 4 and Tasmania 3.

This match follows up the Brisbane side's 6-0 win over Sutherland last Tuesday night at Newmarket, and if the local team is successful again, it will capture the annual trophy played for between the two centres, which Brisbane has not won for about 20 years.

Those four players plus Neville O'Sullivan, Brett Kitching, Paul Fagan, Graham Judd and Tony Leckie were the nine Brisbane under 13 reps. for Queensland in the National titles.

For the record, the goalscorers in the team's most recent 6-0 win over Sutherland were Kitching (2), Fagan, Innes, Glen Vander Ryken and Keith Marsh.

There is every chance the Brisbane under 13's will play the Brisbane under 14's as the curtain-raiser to the Cumberland Cup Final at Perry Park.



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ASTON VILLA—"BETTER" THAN LEEDS!

ASTON VILLA are way ahead of Leeds. Sunderland leave Derby trailing behind. Blackburn have a clear edge on Manchester City.

No, we're not talking about the present ability of these teams. For instance, even the most fervent Aston Villa fan couldn't honestly say his side are now better than Leeds.

But if you look back through football history, getting an overall picture of the game since it began in its organised form in England, you'll see that Villa have a much better record than Leeds, while Sunderland have been much more successful than Derby and Blackburn Rovers are ahead of Manchester City.

Although they won promotion to the Second Division last season, there's no doubt that Aston Villa have slipped a long way since their great days of many decades ago, but in their heyday no other club could match them.

Just look at the Midlands club's record since they became one of the original twelve members of the Football League back in 1888: League Champions 1893-94, 1895-96, 1896-97, 1898-99, 1899-1900 and 1909-10; F.A. Cup winners 1886-87, 1894-95, 1896-97, 1904-05, 1912-13, 1919-20 and 1956-57.

That's a total of six League titles and seven F.A. Cup wins. By comparison, Leeds have collected the Championship once and last season brought their first F.A. Cup Final victory.

True Leeds came very close to clinching the League and F.A. Cup "double" last term, but even then Villa can point to greater achievements. They did gain that particular "double" in 1896-97 . . . and they've twice had a Championship "double" — winning the League in two successive seasons — in 1895-96 and 1896-97 and 1898-99 and 1899-1900.

Derby County's impressive form last season brought them their first-ever Championship and they've succeeded only once in the F.A. Cup — in 1945-46 whereas Sunderland have been League Champions six times, in addition to collecting the F.A. Cup on one occasion. Sunderland's best days were in the years immediately before and after the turn of the century — they had title triumphs in 1891-92, 1892-93, 1894-95, 1901-02, 1912-13, plus another in 1935-36, while collecting the F.A. Cup in 1936-37 but although they weren't so dominating after their glory days, they still held at one time the proud distinction of being the only club never to have played outside the First Division.

Relegation along with Sheffield Wednesday in 1957-58 ended that unbroken run and in recent years they haven't been a powerful force in the game, but judged overall they've been one of England's most successful clubs.

Similarly, Blackburn are one of soccer's all-time greats. They can match Manchester City's two League Champions — Rovers were top in 1911-12 and 1913-14 and have had six F.A. Cup triumphs to City's four.


Blackburn, currently languishing in the Third Division, received a special trophy in 1885-86 after collecting the F.A. Cup for the third consecutive year, then won twice in a row — 1889-1890 and 1890-91 — before gaining the trophy once more in 1927-28.

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
