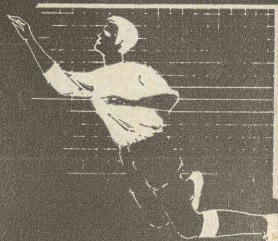

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Editorial

JUST about everyone knew the road along the Philips League campaign trail would be studded with disappointments, and the first major setback occurred last Sunday with Lions' shock loss to an injury ridden and transfer problem-plagued Canberra City.

But that is what football is all about. How many teams have gone into a match as favourites, not always a tag applied by themselves, only to emerge as the beaten side.

On the surface, Queensland's first two rounds in the League have not been disastrous. City have lost by the odd goal twice, Lions drew and then were beaten by the odd goal.

Those results are a far cry from some of the merciless hammerings handed out in early trial games. However, few will dispute that Lions SHOULD have won the match against Canberra. Their coach Johnny Warren certainly came to Brisbane with the opinion a Canberra City loss was inevitable.

Both Brisbane City and Lions already have indicated they will not be easy meat for any side and it's reasonable to assume they will not suffer heavy defeats handed out in the first two rounds to Marconi (4-0) and Mooroolbark (5-0).

Both sides face a massive task this weekend. City play Eastern Suburbs here and Lions are away to Western Suburbs in Sydney. Both of these sides are the only two in the League to have collected the maximum four points from the opening rounds

Maybe this week, with virtually nothing to lose, our representatives this time may be on the right end of any upset results. The expected negotiating for Jim Hermiston's services for the full season will be a great boost for City, while it must be remembered Lions last week fielded two players completely new to the team.

Another point arising from last Sunday's match was the performance of Jack Wood in the middle. There were little complaints from either side about his display and it threw cold water on the current talking point about neutral referees.

After watching last Monday night's edition of Top Soccer on Channel 0, it is obvious there is some concern about the refereeing situation, graphically magnified by those tell-tale instant replays.

A continued campaign by that section of the media could yet induce Philips to instigate a transfer referee system, which in the long run would be advantageous to all.

In the immediate future, Lions and City could do worse than go halves in the air fare to import a Sydney referee for their important clash here in the seventh round on May 15.

Diary of Canberra City's Upset

ELEVEN minutes: McKenzie touches ball for first time when he receives free kick from Potter, a measure of Lions' early superiority.

12: Neale passes to Niven on the burst down the left and Fagan meets his cross but just fails as he tries to bundle the ball in.

16: Neale lets loose with thundering drive, which Haynes drope under close attention from Park. Hughes belts a shot towards the net but a defender somehow blocks it. Laslo wastes a great chance when he spoons the rebound well over the top.

23: First real aggression from City as Fernandez shoots powerfully, forcing McKenzie to dive as the ball speeds wide.

33: Henderson gets a yellow card from referee Wood as he drags Neale down and cuffs him in the cheek for good measure.

36: Hughes makes a bold run down the right and crosses to waiting forwards but Henderson does well to scramble away for a corner.

Laslo takes corner and Bennett forces his way above the pack but pushes his header over the top.

39: Lions' best chance. Hughes again makes a good run and with only one defender in attention pushes a square ball to Park. His long range shot beats Haynes but smacks the upright.

43: Moulas crosses from the right and Fernandez flicks a deceptive shot but McKenzie's great reflex save keeps things square at halftime.

46: Second half begins with City the aggressors and Park comes back in defence to ease dangerous situation by conceding a corner.

50: City take their shock 1-0 lead with winning goal when Stoddart is allowed to run free through the backline. He has all the time in the world to set himself up and easily beats McKenzie with a perfect shot.

61: Bennet moves up into attack in desperation and gives a pass to Hughes, who shoots but not with conviction and it's easily saved by Haynes.

65: Harland floats a pass to Park, positioned on the far post and his header is almost in before Henderson lunges to save the day.

71: Potter also moves up and tries a long one but it is well pulled down by Haynes.

83: Lions getting really desperate as Morris cracks a shot towards Haynes, but again he does well to save even after the ball had taken a deflection.

REPLYING BY ACTION

ONE of the biggest surprises of Brisbane City's initial Philips League squad was the inclusion of one Karl Herdle, one time Southside Eagles and Bardon-Latrobe defender.

When Herdle played for City in their trial games, many were heard to comment: "Surely he won't be playing in the League team."

There were other uncomplimentary remarks like: "If he were still with Eagles, he'd be flat out getting into their premier-ship team."

But Herdle did play in the opening League match against Marconi and his job in marking skipper and national team member Jim Rooney was carried out perfectly under instructions from Ian Kesson.

Rooney was reported to have said after the match: "Who was that bloke with the beard. He never let me alone all day."

Herdle followed up by scoring one of the goals in City's brave fightback against St. George in Sydney last weekend. He must be more than happy about being able to reply to criticism without having to utter one word.

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Coach's Viewpoint CUT OUT THE ABUSE

OVER the past six months, more than 500 people have attended some form of coaching course in Queensland. This is obviously going to greatly affect future standards within the game as the majority of those who attended deal directly with youngsters.

However, although the standard of play will inevitably rise, it will be of little or no use if the shouting and abuse by parents and coaches from the sideline is allowed to continue.

Soccer is a game of balance, composure, vision, good technique and decision-making. Is there any way that unnecessary shouting such as "kick it down the field" will promote the above qualities.

Certainly Not! Some children seem to be playing from fear rather than for enjoyment. Drastic action must be taken by junior clubs and by the southside and northside junior committees.

Junior Canadian ice hockey had the same problem as we have here now. Various methods were tried to stop parents shouting and screaming and by far the most successful was the threat to remove any child from the game whose parents were persistently shouting abuse.

As a result, most parents stopped the habit and allowed their kids to get on with the game. In my opinion, if this method is tried here but does not work, then referees should start to abandon matches. (Especially if the coach refuses to be quiet).

I would not suggest such a drastic measure if I did not feel the situation was serious. To all those people who are involved in junior soccer please remember it's the kids' game so let them enjoy it.

Having seen several First Division Games it would be interesting to know why some of the local talent is not being snapped up for Phillips League.

Why spend so much money when there are players like Colin Knott, Tony Edwards, Ron Millman and Steve Dolan living on our doorstep. Maybe they wouldn't be up to the standard required, but I still feel they should have been given the chance.

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This Week's Visitors—Eastern Suburbs Hakoah Football Club

EASTERN Suburbs was formed in 1939 (which makes the Club one of the oldest in N.S.W.) when a group of recently-arrived refugees from Germany and Austria got together to resume a sport they had to abandon in Europe, what better name to bestow upon their fledgling team than "Hakoah Soccer Club" in honour of the world-famous Jewish-sponsored sporting organisation in Vienna.

At first they played on open pitches against any team that would give them a game. After the war (during which many of the players joined in the war effort) they qualified for the Sydney Metropolitan League, then into the Southern League and, in due course, as the club grew in membership and playing strength, into the N.S.W. Soccer Association Second Division.

In 1956 both the first grade and reserve teams won the Premierships and Cup Finals and Eastern Suburbs was the only 2nd Division Club to qualify in the State Cup, winning and drawing with 1st Division Clubs before being eliminated by the eventual winner. Even in the 2nd Division, attendances at Hakoah matches were greater than most 1st Division at the time.

But when promotion was denied the club, Hakoah took the initiative in 1957 in the formation of the N.S.W. Federation of Soccer Clubs; eventually the vigorous and progressive policy of the State Federation spread inter-State, leading to the establishment of the Australian Soccer Federation.

During the 20 years of Federation Competition, Hakoah has won a number of honours on the playing field, including the following:

- 1959 WON the Federation Cup
- 1961 WON the Grand Final Championship
- 1962 WON the Grand Final Championship
- 1963 WON the Federation Cup
- 1965 WON the Federation Cup & the Australian Cup
- 1966 WON the Grand Final Championship

- 1968 WON the Ampol Cup, Premiership, Grand Final Championship and the Australian Cup (Hakoah was the only team to win the latter more than once).
- 1970 WON Premiership
- 1971 WON Premiership and State Cup
- 1973 WON Ampol Cup and Premiership
- 1974 WON Premiership
- 1976 WON State Cup

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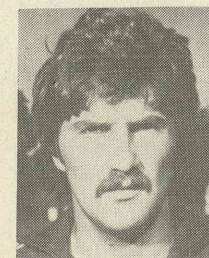

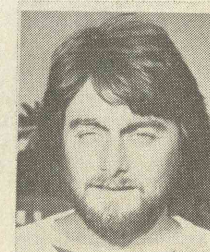

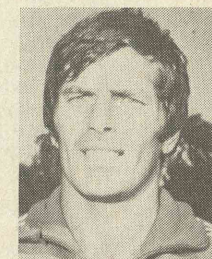

LINESMAN'S VIEW

SUNDAY last is a day most Lions people will want to forget. This was the day when all of us in Brisbane thought Lions would start their home campaign with two points against a Canberra City side depleted by suspension and transfer hold-ups. However as is usual at times like this it was not to be and this week GO SOCCER would like to discuss Lions failings with a constructive motive in mind.

There is no doubt in anyone's mind that individually Lions were a much superior side so we are going to have to delve deeper into the pros and cons of their performance in order to discuss their failings.

First of all we all know that Canberra City came to Brisbane in search of one point, two if they were lucky, they took two, but one wonders if it was so much bad luck that beat Lions or was it another factor. This game should have been won in the first thirty minutes when John Warren pulled the oldest trick in the book by using an "oldie" to settle his defence.

After they had held the seige he used two youthful substitutes who ran their hearts out for the remaining hour and hustled and harried Lions into a tangle of indecision.

Secondly, knowing these to be the tactics of desperate men the onus falls back on the Lions players and it is her GO SOCCER feels something is amiss in this Lions line-up.

Prising open a defence which has as a simple instruction "destroy by any fair means" is not an unknown thing in modern soccer and has spawned a special type of mid-field player, one, who like a computer, must take in, analyse and supply a constant barrage of ideas, any one of which will suddenly bring forth the key to the lock.

Sunday's game showed up a lack of this type of player in Lions team structure yet GO SOCCER wonders if these players are not already in the side playing in other positions.

George Potter came to us a sweeper and is playing very well there, we wonder

if George with his obvious skills and experience may not be better used as a schemer in mid-field.

He showed on two occasions on Sunday that he can also be a punishing finisher. Little George Morris also showed that once he is match fit he could have the skill and verve plus the confidence to take on men that is required on occasions such as last Sundays match.

These men could be the answer to Lions lack of flair in mid-field. Of course it could be argued, who is to replace George as sweeper, no doubt anyone who has seen Iain Fagan perform there would rate him worth a try, and from all reports Drinkwater is also an accomplished sweeper. John Neale came to Brisbane as a flank runner and proved to be devastating at just that. He is skilled enough to hold his head up in mid-field but it's when he moves out of there at speed and uses the space to pass or drag a defender he becomes that something extra.

Lions on Sunday did not read from start to finish the fact that Malcolm Haynes was vastly superior in the air to any of their strikers, not surprising considered his 6 foot-odd advantage.

On five occasions in the 90 minutes he was tested on the ground and on three of these was found wanting. This should have been analysed and worked out in 20 minutes by the Lions mid-field who had more than enough possession but it wasn't to be and there was something pathetic in watching Col Bennet trying to be in two places at one time to capitalize on the endless supply of lobbed crosses into the goalmouth.

This type of game requires a target man of huge physique and exquisite heading skill and a lightning sharp feeder to pounce on the laid off ball. Lions do not have these type of strikers, so other methods should have been tried much sooner.

As said before the onus to open the door falls on the mid-fielders and it is here GO SOCCER feels the need is greatest. We at GO SOCCER know that Lions have the talent from Leo Schienflug down and no doubt will work out their problems but all we are saying is that at the moment it's a little too stereotyped, too predictable.

Some on lads, next week is a new ball game, be a little more swashbuckling in your approach to the game. No one minds tight defensive football when the opponents are a well drilled outfit like Hakoah, but remember the unusual can be made to

pay off when tried occasionally, and the Brisbane public is right behind you no matter what you do so go to it on Sunday, enjoy your game and it may surprise you what can happen.

In the promotion field Lions certainly improve on City's non-effort the week before. "Doctor" Robin Nedwell was a step in the right direction, the balls into the crowd were good and the junior presentation well done, but it still wasn't enough.

Colts football is not everyone's cup of tea but even at that, between 2.15 and 2.45 we had the junior parade which took about 5 minutes. In show business there is an old saying given to young performers. It is "When you think it is good enough and big enough *double* it and you're nearly there."

Remember this Lions and City, you're in show business now and the bigger and better the show, the bigger and better the crowd.

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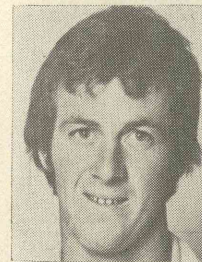

SYDNEY ST. GEORGE v BRISBANE CITY

LAST Sunday Brisbane City travelled to Sydney to take on the mighty St. George, one of the expected front runners of the inaugural Philips League. Remembering of course the humiliation of a 7-0 lesson a few weeks back and with nothing more than an exciting if unsuccessful match against Marconi to bolster their confidence one could have forgiven the boys if they had felt just a bit like the dragon of yesteryear, there for the slaughter.

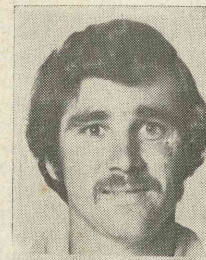
And so it looked for forty-five minutes, City were tentative in their approach, carried the ball too often, mis-placed the final pass, lost possession at critical moments and by half-time found themselves 0-2 down to a superior, well drilled opponent. The goals both came from "dead ball" situations, one a free kick which was flicked from near post too far and thence to the net, the second a pile driver of a header from 14 yards when a swerved, driven corner kick was met by an unmarked forward. City were by no means out of it at this stage, but their raiding was sporadic and individualistic and Harris received a caution for professionally fouling Caldwell when he was right through. Connors was also pleasing the crowd with his skilful forays,

but the old story remained to be told at half-time, an uphill battle.

Just after half-time a third body blow was dealt when rather unluckily another floating swerving free kick was deflected onto a St. George forward for a tap in.

Here St. George coach Schaeffer made his first mistake. He brought on two forwards in search of goals. His second mistake was in underestimating the fighting spirit that has always been inherent in Brisbane City sides.

Ian Kesson substituted Coyne for Connors and immediately this man's professionalism began to show. City built up a move involving Gaffney, Caldwell, Johnson and Pimblett with Coyne making a great dummy run dragging the defence and creating space for Karl Herdle to move in for the final pass. Herdle took his time and despatched his shot past Coe from 18 yards before being closed down on by three defenders, who nearly closed him up for good. He was then replaced by Lavelle and the fight back continued unabated. Connor followed corner and one was cleared to Lavelle who passed to Coyne who laid back to

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Johnson unmarked at 18 yards. We all know what he can do with them and he did it, simple uncomplicated cannonball into the top corner.

As the saying goes the fat was in the fire now and it took a super save from Coe to keep City at bay. Once again the boys came out of it all with great credit and no points so City's record now reads played 2, lost 2, credits 110%.

THE PREMIERSHIP IN REVIEW

ST. GEORGE, the team which started the season in a blaze of glory with two 3-0 results then faltered against United and Wynnum, hit their straps again last weekend to end Southside Eagles unbeaten run.

The return of Alan Marley obviously made a big difference to Derek Mann's team and he was under a considerable amount of pressure for most of the match from Eagles' robust Greg Jackson.

Marley played a minor role in St. George's first goal when he was fouled near the sideline then Alan Marszaleck was utterly dismayed to see his attempted clearance slice past John Bennett following Billy Fagan's free kick for the foul.

Little Billy nearly jumped out of his skin when he cracked in that drive from the edge of the area to give St. George a tearaway 2-0 lead after only 10 minutes.

But in between those two goals, Eagles should have equalised. Ken Gordon has his critics but he delivers some splendid through balls during a match, and one such pass found Brennan lurking outside the area.

Brennan headed towards Jeff McCreadie and at the last minute lost possession momentarily, forcing him to miss a chance he usually snaps up with relish. He made amends later with a clever chip over McCreadie's head, with the right pass again coming from the slender Gordon.

Bad luck cost Jackson his first goal of the season in the dying seconds before halftime, but it was McCreadie more than anyone who kept St. George in the picture after the break. Many felt if Eagles could have grabbed an early equaliser, their busy midfield formation would have exploded on another goal-scoring rampage.

But the tall and safe McCreadie put a stop to that with a great diving save off a Marszaleck header in the 22nd minute, then later, just before fulltime

When McCreadie was caught out, there was the agile Colin Knott to chase Brennan's shot like a greyhound and scoop it from the goal-line midway through the half. Both teams on that performance, will be in the firing line for most of the season.

With Merton, Bardon and Mt. Gravatt slipping further behind the other teams coming into the last round, the Heath Park match between the first two took on much more significance.

Bardon had reasons for leaving in an unhappy frame of mind, after losing big Bob Wilson in a contentious second half dismissal and conceding the winning goal to Mal Bland, a goal Bardon supporters claim was tinged with illegality.

Richlands, now the only undefeated side, had Philips League squad big guns Phil Dendo and Roy Drinkwater in their team which downed Redlands 2-1. It is interesting to note that the First Division sides of both League clubs occupy the top two spots on the points table.

Redlands relied heavily on the long pass to the flanks, and as a result, the dangerous Ron Millman was almost completely cut out of the game by a Richlands defence which read the conditions well for coach G. V.

Ian Lawrie's goal was a gem but was surpassed by the brilliance of Barry Kelso's lone effort. Many feel the tall lad with all the attributes of a successful striker has a big future ahead of him.

At Spencer Park, St. Helens looked certain to snatch a point from United, until Glen McKeand's careless pass set the United attack in motion. Midfielder Steve Clark found Brian Kibbey and he in turn passed to George Williamson, who is an improver with every match and he finished the job with five minutes left.

Before that, midway through the second

half, Kim Wishart was forced to pull off three great saves in two minutes to deny the efforts of his former Ipswich team mates.

With much of the highlight focused on the pacesetters at the top, it is easy to overlook the great progress being made by Annerley, who have rattled up an impressive six points in their First Division comeback so far. Goals from Ian Guthrie, Dugald Campbell and Barry Jackson has only further compounded Billy Haigh's worries at Mt. Gravatt, scorers of only one goal in five outings. Could be Haigh is itching to make a playing comeback.

Ian Steele and Kas Biedak led the North Brisbane advance at the Maramba Stadium after Graham Davison and Eddie Wilkins had each scored to bring Wynnum back on level terms.

Syddie Tucker's outfit is by no means flashy, but they are getting the job done and will give Eagles a run this weekend.

That match, at Perry Park, should be one of the highlights this weekend, with Eagles probably helped down a little to earth by their slump against St. George.

Annerley are certain not to let Bardon impede their impressive progress when the two meet at Richlands, while at Cleveland, the home side will be keyed up for what has been known as the Merton v. Merton clash.

Saints at home will fully test Wynnum and at Spencer Park, Billy Haigh will probably be hoping for a miracle against his old side.

The other top match of the round is at Goodwin Park, where St. George just might go one better and completely wipe out all talk of unbeaten teams, at Richlands' expense, now they've taken care of Eagles.
