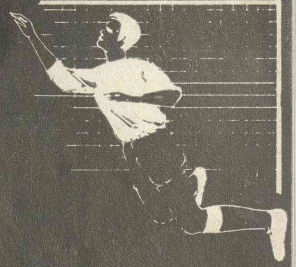




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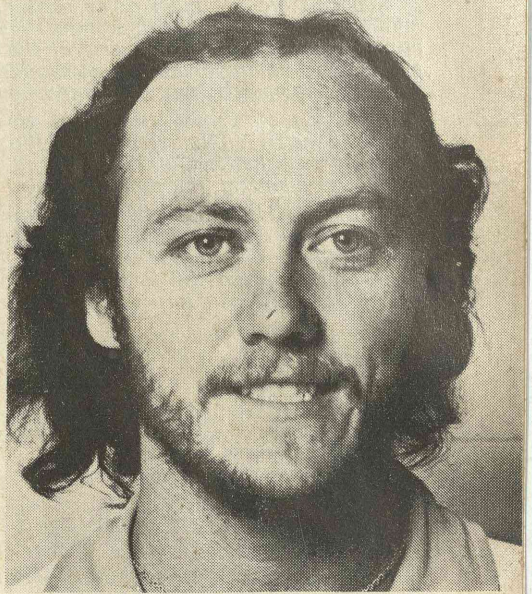
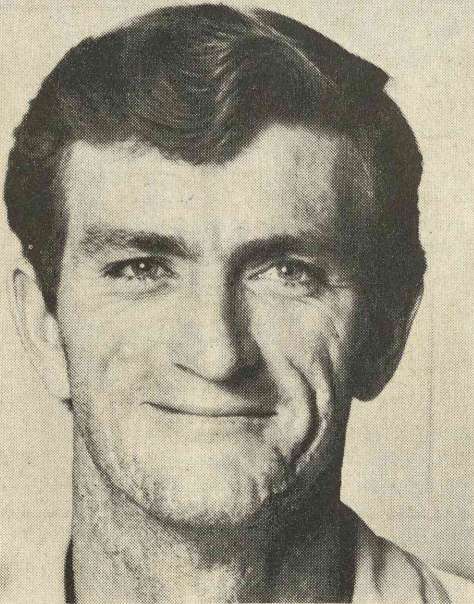

BRISBANE City and Lions were criticised from all quarters for their promotion, or lack of it, of their early Philips League matches.

And if you think the local clubs were short on promotional gimmicks, they nevertheless leave Melbourne for dead, if last Saturdays match between City and South Melbourne is any guide.

We were informed by a spectator he "thought" the curtain-raiser in progress was an under-19 match between Mooroolbark and South Melbourne. "A pretty dilapidated scoreboard gave no indication as to who was playing let alone what the score was.

One of the lines in the curtain-raiser was being run by a man in "civilian" clothes, presumably a club official, judging by the way he threw down the flag and walked off the field at Middle Park when the referee awarded one of the teams a penalty.

Just before the main game started, there was an announcement over the PA, informing the crowd of the team lineups, but these were barely audible. An apparent press box at one end of the ground was almost over-run by what were presumably South Melbourne supporters and at least four of the writers present watched the match from the press box balcony.

Officials of visiting teams are treated respectfully by the home teams here. They are given V.I.P. treatment in the Perry Park board room. City officials last Saturday were left to their own devices once they arrived at the ground and watched the match standing amongst the crowd in the outer.

City and Lions have learnt the error of their early ways by at least advertising their matches and providing entertainment in the form of junior or six-a-side games just prior to the 3 p.m. kickoff. Although more could yet be done in the promotional field, don't rubbish the Brisbane clubs. At the moment they leave at least one of the southern counterparts for dead.

Congratulations to GO SOCCER for being a well presented and essential magazine for all soccer followers, and sensibly priced so all can afford it.

It is my belief that the Philips League, while it may possibly benefit soccer overall, is having a detrimental effect on first division games. Saturday matches, small media coverage and change of name of two clubs, are some of the things that have led to a lack of "atmosphere."

The poor reporting of the game be-

tween Annerley and Spencer Park United on 23/4/77 prompts me to submit the following, as Annerley are now only one point behind the joint leaders in first division.

For the first 10 minutes, United had all the game and looked like running away with it, but by midway through the first half it had settled into an even, and very good game.

At half time the score was nil all. United started the second half the same way as the first, but Annerley managed the first goal, from a free kick by Rooney, the ball deflecting and then going in off the upright. Not to be denied, United came back strongly and scored from a deflection which gave Ferguson no chance.

After that, Annerley scored the two best goals of the match, a left foot drive into the top of the net from Michael Blackall and a great shot from Wendell Henderson from about the same position as he scored the previous week against Bardon.

For Annerley, Tom Gray had a great first half, but did not see too much of the ball after that, while Dugald Campbell was splendid up front. The defence was very sound, as usual. For United, Clifford and Perry were competent and cool under

Dear Sir,

We often read in the local press of the irresponsible idiots that stretch head high wires across mini-bike trails. I hope that your readers, being a sporting breed, condemn these people for the despicable characters they are. I am sure that we, as soccer fans, would lynch anybody trying to do this type of thing to one of our players, especially if it happened to be a junior player.

However, it seems that the members of the Brisbane Junior Soccer Association are trying to knock off or dent the heads of the under 7 & 8 players by insisting that the crossbar of their goals

remain at the ridiculous height of 4 feet; headheight for the majority of boys in that age group.

After some protests the Association has conceded that the hazard exists by their alteration of the rules governing the 6-a-side games to be played by this age group. The new rule allows only the goalkeeper in the goal area. (I can see many arguments here: was little Johnny inside or outside the goal area when he scored).

This change of rules goes some way in eliminating the hazard; but in no way protects the goalkeeper who may back into the crossbar, or worse, pick up the ball and stand up while directly under the crossbar.

Most parents realize that some element of risk is involved when their children play the noble game of soccer, but I believe they have the right to expect those people who formulate the rules and set the standards of the game to do so in such a manner as to remove every unnecessary hazard from the field of play.

May I as a concerned person use the facility of your pages to appeal to the Brisbane Junior Soccer Association to change their minds on this subject and increase the height of the crossbar before a serious accident occurs.

THE PREMIERSHIP IN REVIEW

NORTH Brisbane's win over Richlands was meritorious and well executed.

The "Windmills" rotated but the driving force they rotated was too weak to blow through the visitors' defence. Walker, Ogden, Mangan and Koraknai were no match in height for Norths' back four. Richlands needed taller Windmills to catch the breeze on Saturdays play.

In fact Laslo must have wondered if the Windmills were being titled at by the Quixotic Norths — he was literally and actually smothered every time he moved into attack. Norths' display was a credit to Syd Tucker. Barlow was not tested throughout the game so much did Dobinson, Curtis and Shortman dominate and negate Richlands' attacks.

"Dobbo" was in brilliant form and he repeatedly turned defence into attack with long raking runs up the right. Koprek had a good game but was replaced late in the match by Jim Kirk who showed his appreciation of the run by slamming in two pile-drivers which were just wide.

Bobby Ford and Eamon Rodden completely dominated midfield play and although Richlands bottled Biedak and harassed Steele, it was Len Pollock who became the danger man and finally scored the winning goal seven minutes from time. Steele ran the ball wide on the right. Richlands' defence was drawn, expecting him to move closer, but he sent over a deep and wide cross which eluded all the Richlands players, and the unmarked Pollock headed it home.

Richlands were always in the game. Dando showed his class with some outstanding saves and Alex Senjuschenko has lost none of his touch. Alan Venables had a quiet marshalling game but Gerry Walker appeared lost as a striker. The youngsters in the side will surely profit from their experience.

Eagles are back in fourth place after their setbacks against St. George and Norths — at the expense of St. Helens, who probably expected something a little better after securing the three City or United men, Lavan, Williamson and Breen. It's not often however a team can field

a newcomer, let alone three of them, and expect them to immediately meld into the side. They should pay their way before the season is over.

Big Glen McKeand had his usual solid game for Saints and he, like "Ringo" Verrall has given the club great service over the years. How Johnny Verrall must have been tempted to drag Tony Brennan down as he swerved his way towards Ross Jenkins, just before scoring Eagles' second goal. Turns out he probably should have, even though it might have earned a yellow card.

Brennan is a delight to watch with his blistering speed off the mark, as Wayne Warren will testify. At one stage he was waiting to tackle the flying centre forward, then next instant was at least five yards

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in the lurch as Brennan suddenly stepped on the accelerator.

Eagles' backline looks a little more steady with Alan Marszaleck moved back although Saints still made openings, once when a cracker from Williamson was well saved by Bennett and another time when Dann was unlucky to hit the upright with Bennett beaten.

Annerley supporters are ecstatic about the team's form on its return to the first division. Some even compared the win over Spencer Park the equal of Brisbane City's over South Melbourne in the Philips League. But United obviously have problems and without taking anything away from the Blues, it will be interesting to see what they are made of when they come up against teams like Norths and St. George, the premiership pacesetters.

Merton's worries continue with their loss to St. George, leaving them in the dangerous second from the bottom spot. But reports of the match indicate Merton could or should have led at least 3-0 by halftime.

Billy Haigh's boys from Mt. Gravatt have really hit their straps and young John Ferguson is probably still dreaming about his hat-trick at the Maramba Stadium. Wynnum don't appear to be playing with a lot of luck and it seems they are scoring well enough, but are giving Billy Bryant some problems at the back.

As if Bardon aren't in enough strife, they were forced to call on a couple of "old boys" plus two more from Mitchy for their match against Redlands, and looked to be in the picture when Ross Denny equalised in the first half. But Ronnie Millman and John Deegan, backed by Chris Hill and Don Bowers continue to run strongly for the Reds, enabling them to come away and retain their solid middle of the ladder position. This week is another split round and after picking only three out of six in round seven, GO SOCCER'S tipster pushes on undaunted.

There appears to be only two teams which could be placed in the "certainties" category — St. George to beat Bardon and Norths to keep up the good work against Merton. The remaining matches are raffle jobs.

The best draw prospect for round 8 is the Mt. Gravatt - Eagles match with the likely winners, St. George, Norths, St. Helens, Wynnum, Annerley.

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CITY'S DAY OF GLORY

BRISBANE City 1, South Melbourne 0. The dream of all supporters came true last Saturday at Middle Park when City collected Queensland's first victory in the Philips League, a win thoroughly deserved in the opinion of many Melbourne officials and press writers.

Forget about Peter Ollerton carrying an injury. That's bad coaching to play him in the first place, and at any rate he did not get any freedom with Hermiston and Tokesi in such top form. National coach Jim Shoulder was at the match and must have been impressed by the big defender, who won everything in the air, allowing Hermiston to do all the mopping up behind in his usual professional style.

City looked ready for a big match from the moment Larry Gaffney tested Reilly with a boomer in the fourth minute. Two minutes later the pressure was on again when Coyne and Johnston combined quickly to take a snap free kick and win a corner.

City had one moment of concern after 11 minutes when South Melbourne full back, the main instigator of their attacking motion, broke away into the area and Borzi was at full stretch positioning himself before the shot cannoned off Hermiston for a corner.

South Melbourne made little headway up front with the centre back pair well supported by Rathmell and the ever improving Lavelle and midway through the half, Reilly's brilliance kept Johnston out.

Johnno and Willie Conner provided the leadup before the former shot from the edge of the box. Reilly looked as if he was going to let it float out and then had to hurriedly retreat to only just flick it over the bar.

Graham French broke through for the home side as City appealed for offside but referee Bob Henderson played on and Borzi threw his big frame at the striker's feet to bring off a typical courageous save. Only minutes before, Reilly had pumped a long ball downfield and one

of the linesmen raised his flag for offside, then almost immediately pulled it down again.

The Melbourne attack built up until Gibson was eventually fouled just outside the box. City marshalled forces for the free kick but the linesman had finally grabbed Henderson's attention, and the Scottish referee upset the home crowd when he brought play back to finally award City the free kick for the earlier offside infringement.

Just near halftime, City bombarded the Melbourne goal with a series of raids, which ended when Gaffney found the side netting. Two minutes into the break, the forceful Johnston, rated City's top striker by Melbourne officials, put Conner through a gap, but Reilly again pounced on the swerving winger's shot.

Reilly produced his best save of the match in the 65th minute when Johnston and Coyne combined to find Hermiston, but the big fellow's attempted shot screwed to the left to Pimblett. He hit it first time and Reilly became airborne and horizontal to save the day again. Finally the reward came with 15 minutes to go.

Hermiston found some space on the right, moved to the backline, drew the

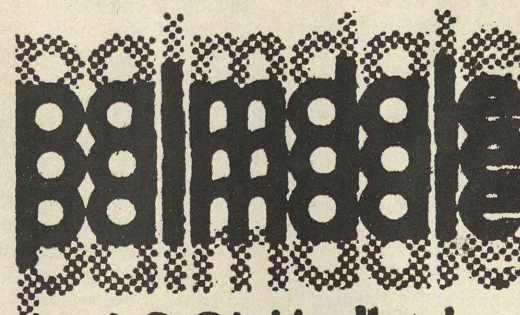
Why? That is the question GO SOCCER must seek the answer for and if doing so helps this Lions side get on the tracks it will have been worthwhile.

Twenty two players came on the field under some fanciful, created pressure and proceeded to play accordingly with the result, the game never got going much to the growing dismay of the big crowd, the two coaches, the club officials and no doubt the players themselves. Players know when a game hasn't "taken off" and this if anything makes matters worse.

To the players, coaches, officials I say "What the hell are you worried about?" STARS WHO WILL SHINE FOREVER

BILLY WRIGHT

ON April 11, 1959, fair-haired, 35 year old Billy Wright led England against Scotland at Wembley and became the first footballer in the world to make 100 appearances for his country. Five caps and a few months later he decided to bring his fabulous career to an end.

A player of deep dedication and high ideals of sportsmanship he earned the admiration and respect of everyone in the game. He joined Wolves in 1939 as a 14 year old groundstaff boy, developed into a very accomplished wing-half and later centre-half and in 1948, then Wolves' skipper, took over as England's captain, leading the side in 90 of his 105 internationals. After retiring as a player he managed Arsenal for a spell and is now engaged in television sport.

League appearances: 490 (still the Wolves' record).

Honours: 105 England caps; 90 as captain (1946-1959).

He led Wolves to three League Championships (1954-58-59) and the F.A. Cup (1949). Footballer of the Year 1952.

JACKIE MILLBURN

"WOR Jackie", idol of Tyneside and a great favourite wherever he played. Member of a famous footballing family that includes Bobby and Jack Charlton, he joined Newcastle United in 1942 as an unknown and quickly shot to fame as an aggressive, goal-hunting centre forward with the speed of a sprinter. In 1957, at the end of a great career, he became player-coach to Linfield but in 1963 was appointed manager of Ipswich Town. A year later, however, he resigned and has since played no active part in the game he served with such credit.

League appearances: 354 (179 goals); won three Cup medals (1951-52-55), scoring in two of them.

Honours: 13 England caps (1949-56); 10 goals.

LEN SHACKLETON

ENTERTAINER extraordinary whose impish, unpredictable and sometimes unbelievable ball skills earned him the nick-name of "The Clown Prince of Football."

An individual in everything he did, yet he was a little genius, a master of all the

soccer arts who loved to tantalise opposing defenders with his cheeky magic to the delight of his many fans. In 1936, aged 16, he joined Arsenal's junior staff but soon returned to his native Bradford to begin his first class career at Park Avenue. He was transferred to Newcastle in 1946 for £13,000 and scored six goals in his first match against Newport County (13-0). Two years later "Shack" moved to Sunderland for £20,050 where he remained until injury forced his retirement in 1958. Although regarded as a brilliant inside-forward he played only five times for England because of his individualistic disregard for officials and authority.
