The Coach's Viewpoint

The Personality of the Coach

10th June, 1977

TO become a good coach it is essential to be a willing learner and also to be self critical. Coaches must be willing to learn from everyone they meet — players, public, the press, the coaches, etc.

They must be willing to accept the fact that they will make mistakes but more importantly they must learn from those mistakes. After every coaching session I examine critically whether I achieved what I set out to achieve, and if not, then I want to know why.

Talking openly and honestly to the players can help in this direction. They will let you know whether the session was a success by their overall understanding (or misunderstanding) of what you were trying to achieve.

By this type of open discussion we may well discover some home truths about ourselves as coaches, for whilst as coaches, we tend to complain about players' behaviour and attitudes. But do we ever stop to consider what they think of our behaviour and our attitude towards them. Lloyd Percival, a coaching expert in Canada for the last two or three decades ran a superlative survey on exactly this question with 382 outstanding athletes.

Their responses indicated 15 positive and 25 negative behaviours of their own coaches. The list briefly represented coaching behaviours in the following fashion:

POSITIVE-

Supportive of athlete to public Calmness, relaxed Inter-personal effectiveness Reinforcing Personally attentive Treats everyone equally Not hyper-critical or aggressive Helpful with problems Knowledgeable Organised Inspirational, but low key, etc.

Often games like this fall away in standard in the second half, but not this one. Good chances were created again notably an Annerley header which rebounded from the crossbar into the 'keeper's arms, and a Richlands header which was just wide. For Wynnum, Lampitt is in a class by himself as a player, Edwards and Carpenter had a quiet debut in understanding while the goalkeeper did everything he had to. Bardon had few stars on the day, their play is too spasmodic but always there are flashes of cohesion and teamwork, which, if it blossomed would bring results. Hogg and Orford played consistently in defence while Cruse has an underlying threat in his play just bursting to get out. Not a great game but just as good as some others recently witnessed by GO SOCCER. Another very poor crowd.

P.S.—Bob Wilson has broken a bone just above the ankle and could be out for four weeks. This is a blow to Bardon as "the big man" has been one of their recent stars.

LINESMAN'S VIEW

"THAT was the week that was" is a saying that last weekend suited best our feelings on the Brisbane soccer scene. Saturday evening brought us the sad news that Brisbane City had been trounced 4-0 by Sydney Olympic in Sydney, then on Sunday Hakoah came to Brisbane to play the buoyant Lions and "donkey licked" them 4-0, in itself a bad score but the way it was accomplished was full of foreboding. The news filtered through from Sydney that an ordinary 'run of the mill English First Division side called Middlesborough with not one current international in the squad had thrashed Australia 5-0.

On channel seven's sports programme on Sunday morning we had film of the world famous Wembley stadium being taken over by a group of animals in disguise, characters who should be kept in Whipsnade Zoo with the monkeys and apes. To crown all this we had our esteemed president Bill Waddell on screen trying to convince the rest of Brisbane that all is well in the soccer world. Bill, Bob Menzies, reputedly Australia's greatest orator, would even have balked at that task, you never got off the ground, the evidence of last weekend was all against you.

For a few weeks past this writer has been sounding off about the troubles in our game. This has not meant to be destructive, but constructive, for if moves are made now we could get on a bandwagon created by the Philips Soccer League idea. Obviously it has fallen on deaf ears if our president was remotely serious in last week's interview.

TV is soccer's worst enemy. Since the advent of TV crowds have dropped all over the world in spectator sports. In

Australia crowds have nosedived since the advent of Match of the Day and like programmes. Why is this so? People are being educated to the best in soccer. Live coverages of top class soccer is bad enough but when the programmes are edited to only give a high pressure, exciting precis of what actually happened, then the local home grown product just doesn't stand a chance.

Therefore consciously or unconsciously, our spectator who gets out of his armchair and along to Perry Park wants the best that's available. Philips League promised this and the fans responded, as in the post Perry Park opening, people turned up in their thousands. Just as it happened in the past, so will it happen in the future, unless the players and clubs come up with 'the goods'. People will gradually drift and it won't be long until we are back to the status quo. Looking around Perry Park last Sunday it would be correct to say the rot may have already begun. Lions treasurer could probably verify this. A game which should have attracted the season's biggest crowd based on recent results, visiting team's record, and weather conditions failed to 'make it' and worse still the match itself did nothing to enhance any match attraction of the future.

On Saturday Eagles drew 300 people, at the most, to Perry Park, an ethnic backed club going-well, the week before North Brisbane drew 50 or so to a game when they were league leaders. This is going well? we think not, but what's to be done, as we don't want to gain the reputation as a knockers magazine. The writer doesn't think that any one man has the answer either but he feels it

is time the many brains that are in soccer get together and work out some master plan for soccer's future in this State. People today being 'brought up' on the best of everything are going to be won back to our code only by the best of everything and this can only be achieved through a union of ideas and novelties. It has long been the boast of the Queensland Soccer Federation that they are progressive and the most unified of all State associations. Surely it is time to validate this boast and get this union to work for us.

A special committee should be set up to look into soccer at all levels. The men of the management committee do not have the time to do this sort of thing as most of them have committments to their own clubs and the general business of Federation. A few years ago a group was set up but for some reason or other finished up on the heap. Volunteers should be called for and people with knowledge but not other commitments asked to be on the committee. This group could interview and sift through ideas and information gleaned sift through ideas and imformation gleaned from all levels of the game and co-ordinate all the 'good oil' into a working plan to be presented to the management committee and council for ratification or otherwise. This would have to be done in would take the rest immediately as it would take the rest of the season to do this mammoth task, but at least by next season soccer as a sport would have guidelines laid down to assist everyone in the game to work towards a common goal. This would surely be much better than the dog eat dog subterfuge that is going on just now.

Progress is a word covering a multitude of variables. Every AGM brings forth a President's report claiming progress in the code. How can true progress be measured?

There are knowledgeable people in soccer involved with clubs who claim their clubs are having good years. They will measure this success in the performance of the team in a league.

They will measure success in the amount of money their balance sheet shows at season's end. They will measure success in the fact that they can go into the transfer market and buy whoever they want on the local scene from other struggling clubs. They will measure success in the amount of players they can keep happy and win competitions at all levels. What they will choose to ignore is that they may have achieved all this success, but people are not being lured to watch their matches and this is the only true measure of progress in any type of professional sport.

There are two types of soccer, professional and social, and the two have completely different philosophies to follow. Social soccer demands nothing, other than participation of a few people who set out to enjoy themselves by being involved in the sport. Professional soccer demands an end product, that of providing the best possible entertainment for the money charged at the gates. If the end product is not good enough these gates will fall, if it is good enough they will rise. There are many ancillary arguments but this basis is an inescapable fact.

Brisbane professional soccer is at the crossroads. Decisions have to be made and made quickly, if they are not we will finish up with two professional clubs and an awful lot of social clubs. Unfortunately



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this interferes with the structure needed to bring youngsters through the ranks and when this happens the professionals are left with no option but to import, surely the nemesis of true progress.

Let's take a leaf from the Americans, the South Australians and the West Australians. Let's get organised now, from the top to the bottom. Let's lay down the master plan that will enable all soccer people professional or social to contribute and share in the "bandwagon" of Philips League Soccer. Soon it may be too late.

Goalkeeper joined in 1975 and the Club won its first Championship. Frank Donachie won the \$1,000.00 Goal Scorer Award. During this year the Club moved its home ground from Olympic Park to the Fitzroy Cricket Ground.

The team started the 1976 Season without two of its top players, Frank Donachie and Sam Cook and was able to reach the Dockerty Cup Quarter-Finals and also finish in fifth position in the Premiership Ladder.
