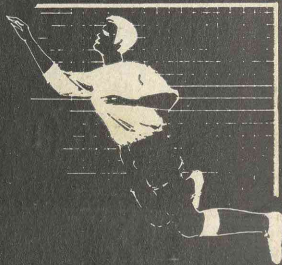

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The Coach's Viewpoint

ESTABLISHING PRIORITIES IN COACHING PLAYERS TO ATTACK

IN order to become a successful coach it is essential that priorities are established. I tend to look at what players do most in a game and then practise those things in training.

Passing over various distances and heights is obviously the major part of football in attack. Therefore work on passing in the first 20 minutes of the session, underlined with stretching exercises. As the passing practice is unopposed I am looking for the time for high quality work. In order for a team to string good accurate passes together they must understand and practise EARLY SUPPORT for the man on the ball.

I believe this can best be done in a conditioned game situation where the players are asked to play one touch football. In order to play one touch football the person about to receive the ball must have an early call from a teammate, so that he is able to play the ball as required, i.e. one touch. Another conditioned game which helps players give early support is where each man is given a number and must play the ball in sequence — 1 to 2, 2 to 3 etc. If the sequence is broken for example, and No. 4 wins the ball, he must play to No. 5 and so on. Players have to think early and must make a decision as to whether they are going to support the man on the ball from in front or from behind.

The two other priorities I place emphasis on are shooting and heading. Every session has to include 20-30 minutes of shooting practice. It's no use playing the most attractive, attacking football and then not being able to put the ball away. Heading should be practised as it is a most important part of the game. It can be practised in pairs and a minimum of 50 headers should be performed every session. It will also improve leg strength and overall power and aggression. Those are my main priorities in training players to attack. They may well be different from other coaches but no matter what priorities are established the overall priority must be QUALITY.

FOOTNOTE: I had an excellent meeting with the coaches and managers of the Northside under 7 and 8 teams. There was some real commonsense spoken and there was a strong move to scrap the Leagues and points next year. Many thanks to all those who attended.

TOOWOOMBA SIDELINES

THE gauntlet has been thrown down and, like any good defender of the faith — in this case, Soccer, the challenge has been well and truly accepted. From this day forth, in the spirit of the challenge made by GO SOCCER, GO SOCCER readers will have the dubious pleasure of learning that Toowoomba and the Darling Downs is GOing SOCCER, too.

Apart from all that, how could any aspiring correspondent fail to react favourably to the flattering remarks made by *Insideman* (GO SOCCER, 3rd June) regarding my ability with pen on paper? Smoothy!!

All joking apart, Soccer is the growing sport in Toowoomba and throughout the Darling Downs. Toowoomba's controlling body, the Toowoomba and District Soccer Federation, receives calls daily for information on Soccer, what clubs we have and where do they play. Mums and Dads seem to be encouraging junior to GO SOCCER in preference to any other game and the schools, bastions of Rugby for so long, are turning more and more toward Soccer. Obviously recent national events in the Soccer world have had some influence and for this we are grateful. However, we of the T.D.S.F. can lay claim to some of the credit, having reorganised our approach to the control of the game in this area to bring us more in line with Constitution of the Queensland Soccer Federation with a view to providing some standardisation of factors affecting the game in this sunny State of ours.

We have also adopted a policy of a gradual increase of publicity and promotion of the game which is in step with the growing confidence among our affiliated clubs that we are, after years in a Rip Van Winkle state, becoming aware of the skills of the game and its superior entertainment value compared to other major football codes. It will take some time to change attitudes that have been subjected to a one code system of reporting through the various media sources on the Downs for many years — but we are working at it.

More importantly, we have, following our disastrous debut at Perry Park in the Ampol Cup competition last year when Mt. Gravatt ran us into the ground, realised we have a lot of homework to catch up on. To this end we have launched a campaign to start educating our Soccer

coaches in the game as it is played today and our first big step was realised last week, on 3rd June, 1977 to be precise, when Mr. Jack Nunn, President of the Queensland Soccer Coaches Federation and Mr. Fred Kingshott, our State Director of Soccer Coaching, honoured us with their presence to officially inaugurate the first ever sub-branch of the Queensland Soccer Coaches Federation, here, in Toowoomba. Our next step is to commence organised courses for many coaches, junior and senior, of our nine affiliated clubs and, in satisfaction of requests already received, for Roma, Chinchilla, Charleville, Dalby and Kingaroy, not to mention requests from schools.

There is, without a doubt, plenty of work to be overcome by our small group of Toowoomba-based Queensland Soccer Coaches.

As many players from Brisbane and Ipswich will be aware, we do boast three teams in the QSF premiership divisions. Two from St. Albans and one from Willowburn. At present, despite some years in QSF competition both clubs are giving serious thought to their policies for the future. It is obvious they must aspire to greater heights for the sake of club and Soccer on the Downs. We look to them as 'flag-bearers' to be more adventurous in the future and many discussions are taking place with a view to helping those clubs be just that, whilst, at the same time, upgrading playing and therefore entertainment, standards in the Toowoomba and District premierships.

At the moment we are quite confident that, in the very near future, we shall boast no less than three floodlight fields of good playing surface. When this comes about we shall be looking for midweek games with clubs of higher playing standards and more games for our Toowoomba representative players. We aim, ultimately, to have the Perry Park crowd sit up and take notice. It'll maybe take a couple of years, but we'll get there!!

In the meantime we are quite enthused with the idea of Denis Ford's Under 18 squad showing the flag around the State and, even at this stage, quite prepared to turn out our Under 18s, Under 16s and Under 15s against anyone, regardless of the outcome in terms of hidings — if at all. Personally, I don't quite go along with passing all the nett profits into a central fund for the

benefit of the State squad but I would go along with an 80/20, or preferably 75/25 split, with the larger percentage going to the State squad to keep 'em on the move. Any idea that will enable our lads to be seen is better than no idea. When do we start? Oh, by the way, Sunday is not, at present, our best day. That's when we compete our T.D.S.F. fixtures and many of our Under 18s are key players in teams playing in all three T.D.S.F. divisions.

I realise I haven't given much publicity to our local clubs in this first article and, for that, make no apology. I thought a quick intro to who we are would be more pertinent on this occasion. However, in case you should come up this way before I do introduce our clubs we have — Willowburn playing at Bridge Street, St. Albans at their Ruthven Street (South) Oval, Wanderers at North Park in North Street, Rockville at the McGregor Street Oval (near the airport), Toowoomba United out at Cabarlah, Rangers currently playing at the home ground of Lockyer United in Grantham, Dalby at Dalby and Kingaroy at Kingaroy.

The Secretary of the Toowoomba and District Soccer Federation, Syd Matthews, operates from Room K, Tasman Building, Ruthven Street, Toowoomba (telephone: 32 9171) between the hours of 11.00 a.m. and 2.00 p.m. any day bar Sunday. That's the day he does the rounds of the clubs, as I do.

In the meantime — here's wishing GO SOCCER and its bold six, every success and continued success. I promise to keep Toowoomba Soccer represented in GO SOCCER for as long as I remain in the area.

Dear Sir,

I am writing in reply to a couple of articles which have appeared in your letters to the editor column. Firstly, the State team selection. I find that both these people and many others for that matter, when selecting a State or representative side choose the 11 best players available (in their opinion) and leave it at that.

Unfortunately the 11 best players available 90 per cent of the time do not make the best team. The team must consist of the best players to fill specific roles in the system to be played. Playing in a 4-3-3 pattern, the midfield must be the strength of the side. It must have height, aggression, skill and the ability to read the game.

My three to meet this requirement would be Gaffney, Hermiston and Echeverria. The defence needs two tall men in the centre and these two pick themselves in Bennett and Tokesi. These two are vicious in tackling and nearly unbeatable in the air, but both are a little suspect on the floor and tend to rush in. To cover this weakness I would play two full backs whose usual role is that of sweeper. This would mean I would have the best available cover to my very good but sometimes scary central duo. These two are Potter and Wilkinson who are both very experienced players who possess a good turn of speed to come into the overlaps.

Strikers pose a little problem. We lack good tall central strikers of this class so I've opted for two wingers and a small but effective sniffer. These are Conner, Morris and Marley. The reserves would be Millman, Knott, Park and Edwards. The 'keepers would be Borzi and Carroll. The omission of Dolan, Neale, Brennan, Harland and Laslo may cause some argument so I give my reasons for leaving them out.

DOLAN: Possesses a great amount of skill and speed but lacks the ability to tackle. To include him in my midfield would put extra workload on the most important part of the team. In a tough

match each member of the midfield will have their fair share of work cut out for them, without doing Steve's share also.

NEALE: A skilful player with speed and a great shot. It's a pity he doesn't believe this himself.

BRENNAN: Tony probably has more natural ability than any player in Queensland but he can't seem to put it together consistently for 90 minutes and at top level you need 90 minute players.

HARLAND: To play in top level you need skill and heart, not skill and the ability to hide out on the line for 80 minutes.

LASLO: Very similar to Brennan in regard to consistency, but lacks Tony's ability to score goals so he must rate under him.

So my team is: Borzi, Wilkinson, Bennett, Tokesi, Potter, Hermiston, Echeverria, Gaffney, Conner, Marley, Morris, with the reserves Carroll, Millman, Park, Edwards and Knott.

My second comment is about the claim that PSL is spelling doom for the local league. Surely anyone can see that for the local league to become economically sound the current structure MUST die to enable a new setup to be formed.

It's purely mathematics that a local

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league side must draw 800 to 1000 people to survive and prosper. The PSL now draws 6,000. Therefore Brisbane at the moment can only afford six teams in the First Division. Cities outside Brisbane — Ipswich, Gold Coast and Toowoomba can afford one team each.

Therefore the perfect setup would be to form a State League by dividing Brisbane clubs into five areas and form five very strong clubs. Unite all the clubs in the Ipswich, Toowoomba and Gold Coast areas, and you would then have a strong League. The Brisbane and Ipswich games could be played midweek, with only one Saturday fixture. Toowoomba and Gold Coast could have Sunday matches as they would not interfere with PSL games. I know only too well the petty jealousies which exist between local clubs and I know it would take the organising genius of John Cornell, Harry Miller and Michael Edgley combined to get them together.

I only hope that the directors of all the clubs concerned see the economic sense and agree that a little swelled pride is better than bankruptcy.

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
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
BRUSSELS — FC Bruges, the Belgian League champions, completed a double here by beating Anderlecht 4-3 in the Belgian Cup final.

ANNERLEY 1 d. MERTON 0: Not the most attractive of matches, but then again it's hard for the spectators to work up enthusiasm at 11.30 on a Saturday morning, let alone the players. Merton began in the same vein as they did in their premiership match the week before against Eagles, by having the better of things for most of the first half. The Bohan boys were missing from the side, and Merton decided to try and bolster the motion up front by taking Chris Carroll out of goal, giving him the No. 8 jersey and replacing him between the sticks with Derek Schluter.

Merton had two chances to Annerley's one in the first half. Russell Griffiths had a strong chance early but saved John Ferguson the task of picking it from the back of the net by failing to turn quickly enough to take advantage. Later he made a strong run along the backline, and Carroll almost succeeded in squeezing the first goal past Ferguson, but Michael Blackall was on hand to hook it out of the goalmouth.

In between those two chances, Mickey Rooney found a gap in the middle and sent Pat Blackall away down the left wing. His cross found the head of Dughie

Campbell but Merton managed to scramble it away for a corner. The lone goal came three minutes after the break when Rod Stein was left stranded near halfway, Campbell charged away and his shot bounced off Schluter's chest, allowing Campbell to slip it home second time round. Merton did not really deserve extra time when replacement Billy Fisher hit the upright and Mal Blard blasted well wide when a simple side footer might have done the job.

WYNNUM 1 d. NORTH BRISBANE 0: No Kas Biedak and no Manfred Koprek meant that Syd Tucker returned to First Division for Norths, who played all of their men who are reported to be looking for transfers. Wynnum fielded their strongest lineup for some time and looked much sharper in attack with the return of Nidge Fisher, who really should have given them the lead when he missed a good chance early. Nigel Rehbock was dead unlucky when he made a great run from the halfway line, shook off the entire defence, drew Barlow, only to see his shot hit the upright. Credit to Barlow however, for narrowing the angle.

The consistent keeper saved a screamer from Dave Large to keep Norths in things

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just after the break, but soon after fumbled a shot from Barry Parsons after he had been set up by Brian Lampitt and the former Gold Coaster followed up, a la Campbell, to score the winning goal. Norths probably would have earned extra time but for Mike Hoare saving Len Pollock's penalty, after the keeper had dragged down the attacking Alan Curtis.

REDLANDS 9 d. SUNSHINE COAST 2: Everyone hoped the country boys could show us something and even spring a boilover, particularly as the Catchpole boys had not been included. It looked quite on the cards when the Coast team's left winger Grant Thompson headed a couple just over the bar in the first few minutes. But it was not long before the Kelso-Millman-Deegan combine started moving ominously and young keeper John Boyd all of a sudden knew he was in business. "Bucky" McLean almost stole the first goal with a clever chipped free kick which Noel Hayman scraped over the bar, but Deegan made it 1-0 the other way with his equally clever lobbed shot from the left.

A great individual run and goal from McLean pulled the Coast boys level, but the cheering had barely subsided when Deegan grabbed No. 2 in collusion with Millman and Morris and almost immediately notched the first Cup hat-trick, this time utilising Kelso. From then on Boyd and the remainder of defenders completely lost their composure and the boys on the scoreboard used all of the digits up to nine as Redlands were monotonously in through Kelso, Lowe, Kelson, Millman, own goal, Morris, with Mike Evans grabbing a late consolation.

ST GEORGE 7 d. BARDON 2: Bardon could not have feared a worse start than Billy Fagan's 30 seconds penalty but with their youngsters plugging away rattled St. George (without sleepyhead Matters and flu-bound Edwards) by leading 2-1 after 32 minutes. John Davis rattled Brian Barnes enough to force a deflection past Roberts for the equaliser and the Redcliffe borrowing was the man of the moment again when Kritikou handled a shot as he was wearing the No. 1 shirt and Peter McDonald beat Roberts from the spot. Paul Mylonas made it all square again before half time but eight minutes after resumption Fagan scored No. 2 when Dave Elliott misjudged what should have been a harmless shot. All that was left in the game was some fine opportunism from Alan Marley, who added the next four. What a waste as far as PSL is concerned. After the match,

George Fraser reckoned St. George were lucky with claim: "Their last goal was offside."

RICHLANDS 0 v. THISTLE 0: As this game received the Lions' share (no pun intended) of publicity for Monday's games, most of the comments here will be confined to individual performances and, for statistical sake, the men involved in the penalty series decider. Two great goalkeeping displays highlighted the match and particularly pleasing was the performance of two of Thistle's youngsters John Clunas and Mark Aponas. There was plenty of needle in the match, with the frequent confrontations between Hughes and Jones and Paterson and Drinkwater. As for the penalties, the successful players in order were Ogdan, Paterson, Niven, Dolan, Drinkwater, Woodside — and then Venables proved just how little there was between the teams when his penalty missed by a whisker, striking the left hand upright. After Venables followed Bailey, Koraknai and Hermiston.

MT. GRAVATT 2 d. EAGLES 0: Stan Jackson claimed during the week his team rarely had beaten Mt. Gravatt, for some unknown reason, and unfortunately for Eagles that fear was realised. Mt. Gravatt had an early setback when big Wim Spiekerman reported work commitments had ruled him out but another equally experienced campaigner in Billy Haigh took his place. He in fact provided the cross which got Brad Ahern and John Bennett in such a mess to enable Mt. Gravatt to hit the lead. Just when officials

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were wondering whether to switch on the floodlights in case of extra time, Mt. Gravatt took an iron grip when Dave Blackadder finished off the job started by the Stewart boys.

THE GOODNA SCENE— ACT II

SUCCESS appears to be the name of the game, whether it be in E Division of Junior Soccer or the Philips League. We have had, and are having, our share of success at both senior and junior levels.

Obviously success is paramount at senior level for a club to acquire and maintain support. Irrespective of how much we admire and support our kids, general support and the subsequent financial success comes through success at senior level. Therefore a quandary arises. Who are the most important? The juniors or the seniors?

Who are providing the better football — a comparatively unsuccessful team at A grade level or a successful team at E grade level?

It is apparent, to this scribe, that the way to an easy life as an administrator in the Soccer world is to have no ambition and to be content to have success in the lower reaches of the code. It seems that the greatest complaints are aimed at those teams who, through the efforts of their players and administrators have reached the top of the ladder and are not having too much success. The complaints emanate from ill informed parents to players, who, finding themselves able to cope with top grade football, are ever ready to blame unmercifully, the less able player for the lack of success.

Suddenly, from being a successful B grade team they are a not so successful A grade team, and apart from themselves or their sons, are dills, a successful coach from the previous season is an idiot, the administrators shouldn't hold their positions and the club is liable to fold at any moment. What rubbish. What these detractors forget is that Soccer is a team game. There is not a team in the world that does not have its share of good players, mediocre players and players who shouldn't be in the grade. But the most successful teams are those who can recog-

nise these problems and who know the strengths and weaknesses of their individual players.

After all, it is pointless making a defence-splitting pass to the wings if it is known the outside man does not have the speed to collect the pass. The fault does not lie with the man receiving the ball.

It particularly depresses me when I hear of a good junior player wanting to leave a team because they consider they are too good for the team. I would suggest, in one respect, that they are not good enough. They have definitely forgotten that Soccer is a team game, a game of patience, and a game that, if an attack fails, fall back and try again. It's a game of animated chess. It is just as true that in the majority of cases it is the reliable work horse that wins games and not the brilliant individual.

That leads on to junior coaching. Are we trying to do too much in this respect. Time and time again we hear of clubs decrying the fact that qualified coaches are unavailable and if they are lucky, a mum or dad will take over the coaching of a team. We should be honest and admit that the majority of junior players are not going to make the grade as senior players. Therefore would it not be better to select the boys who apparently have what it takes and concentrate on them.

The rest of the lads can still have their game of football without the rigours of coaching, which in many cases, is beyond their comprehension. This suggestion obviously has its good point. It will relieve clubs of the necessity and anxiety of searching for coaches for all teams, it would relieve pressure on the less able player, it would relieve clubs of having to provide extensive coaching facilities and it would allow the player

of above average ability to receive more specialised coaching at a level other players could not cope with. It also has its drawbacks. What about the late developer. What about the player who has little ability but is keen to have coaching.

It is my belief that in each case the lads will eventually fall into the first category. I would be pleased to hear Denis Ford's viewpoints on these ideas. You may feel from the foregoing comments that all is not right at Goodna. Wrong. We are performing particularly well, playing some good football at all levels and suffering very little from growing pains. The Fifth Division are currently feeling very weak, having to be held up by every other team in the Division and the Seventh Division are playing ducks and drakes — doing everybody like a dog's dinner at home and giving it all back away from home.

Five of our junior players have so far been selected for representative teams this year. Congratulations to them and their coaches.

The club is holding a bumper family day on Sunday, June 19 at their ground, Kippen Park, Goodna and everybody is welcome. There will be fun for all — sideshows, rides, novelty football and netball matches. The Ladies' committee is to be congratulated in the excellent job it has done organising the day. Last month we introduced our first team to you and now have pleasure in introducing the lads who are trying very hard to take their places (some have already succeeded).

MARK SCOTNEY, goalkeeper (16) — A boy who has come up through the junior ranks and is potentially a very reliable 'keeper.

PAUL BACKEN, goalkeeper/defender (20) — Has been with the club for the last two seasons and equally happy as fullback or in goal.

DIDI PABRIX, defender (23) — Nick-named the Windmill because of his running action. A very steady and much improved player.

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LINESMAN'S VIEW

AS there has been no official reaction to the repeated appeals coming from all quarters for an investigation into the Soccer scene future Insideman has taken to interviewing a few concerned people and this week puts their combined ideas in front of the public so that they may judge for themselves.

One of the favourite remedies common to most soccer pundits is the fact that some division should be made between amateur clubs, that is those clubs that have no desire to pay players and semi-professional clubs, that is clubs who are willing to, budget for, and have the income to pay players and the back-up to enforce this willingness. In this simple, straightforward remedy there is a mountain of good common sense. We will theorise and expand on it.

Let us imagine the two Philips League clubs, City and Lions playing on a Sunday and not participating in any other Division. They could "adopt" a nursery team, for example Lions could "farm out" their reserve players to two or more First Division or Second Division clubs, say St. Helens and Coalstars who are in the district. City could do the same with say North Brisbane and Grange Thistle. All First Division and Second Division players could play Philips League on loan thereby giving them a maximum pool of reserve talent and giving every player in those Division a goal to aim for. The Philips League sides are catered for.

First Division sides and Second Division sides would consist of all clubs willing to be completely semi-professional. To ensure this a minimum wage would be agreed upon, that is a fee that all players would be entitled to, upon signing a blue form! This would mean clubs would be very selective and from a cost factor would probably only run ONE team. Before the scoffing starts just ask any present Reserve Grade player how his game is progressing. For the discussion let us assume sixteen clubs could prove the financial backing to maintain squads of fifteen or so players on a minimum of ten dollars a week.

Their budgets could be prepared and the committee would know their commitment, for a season. To enable this money to be earned gimmicky soccer would have to evolve. All semi-professional soccer would be better played mid-week or under lights as Saturday is a dead loss to any club desirous of attracting a crowd. Why fight the races? Clubs in districts could discuss possibilities in double headers, joint committees could then afford some

promotion gimmicks to lure people. Most important each club would have minimised costs, and each coach could concentrate his entire energies on fifteen players thereby under the process of best at top downwards a natural ladder through the leagues for promising youngsters.

The cynic will ask what happens to clubs not prepared or able to bear the burden of financial expenditure in semi-professionalism.

It is in this area self examination is most needed in the soccer world. Saturday should be given to social football and social football or amateurism should become its own sphere. Taringa are probably our foremost amateur club and one has only to visit their ground to realise how well their hard working committee has done. However for the purpose of this discussion it must also be said they are as far away from winning the first division as the earth is from the moon. So why bother. The men in soccer with the same views as our Taringa friends should have their own "world" to compete in. They should have their own amateur First Division, their own Queensland Amateur Cup, their own set of rights and wrongs and always the right to enter the semi-professionalism ranks if desired. The fact that they do not appear to want these things has always amazed me as it does not require a great deal of foresight to see the possibilities in a state-wide amateur cup competition. The scope would be unlimited and how much better than what they have at the moment. After all

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who'll win the Ampol Cup. Any bets on Taringa? I think not.

Summing up then, what has been proposed by our questionnaire and its answers.

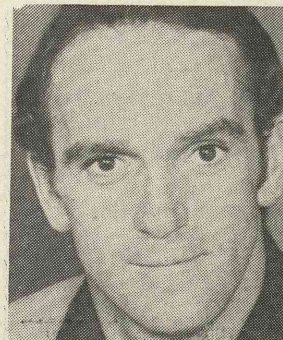

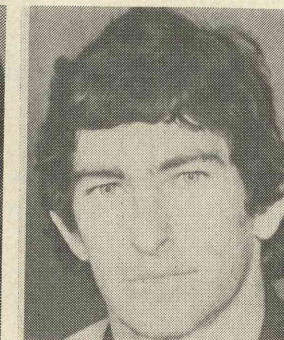
