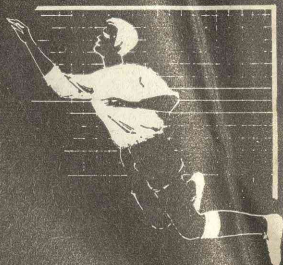

TOOWOOMBA SIDELINES

TOPPING the list of Soccer achievements this week in Toowoomba must be the win by our top Club, St. Albans, over The Gap in last Sunday's 3rd Division Q.S.F. fixtures.

By all reports the game was quite scrappy but, nevertheless, a 1-0 win has put Saints up into third spot on the table following Newmarket's win over Pine Rivers. A terrific boost to Saint's morale at this point of the season and there's little doubt they will be going all out to consolidate, if not improve that position when they meet Pine Rivers here, in Toowoomba, this coming weekend.

Our less fortunate team Willowburn, also managed to pull off a win this weekend over Booval. Not as glorious a result as Saints, and a game that gave

little hope for Willowburn's survival in 3rd Division, on the form shown, but an important two points that brings them within one point of Nerang and two from North Star. With five games to go there's still hope for our Magpies.

On the local scene, in chronological order, we were pleased to sit, listen and argue with Queensland's State Director of Coaching, Denis Ford, on Friday last. Brought to Toowoomba by our Junior Soccer Association, Denis came to 'sell' the 6-a-side game for Under 9s. Apart from two recalcitrant coaches who laid claim to having the best and most successful teams in that age-group, Denis met with complete accord on his views.

Parents of the very young were keen to see that type of competition introduced

by Toowoomba's Junior Soccer Association for the Under 9s, agreeing that all their lads really wanted to do at that age, was to get dressed up like a Soccer player and get out and kick the ball. This point was demonstrated on the Saturday morning during demonstrations aimed at convincing also, the non-believers.

He showed, with little problem, how one lad, who had only had four contacts in thirty minutes of 11-a-side Soccer, increased his ball contact in the 6-a-side version, when the lad got stuck in to make at least 24 contacts in ten minutes. No more had to be said.

Unfortunately, our main procrastinators missed the demonstration and a second was conducted. The interesting thing then, to note, was that those same procrastinators spent more time with their back to the game trying to convince parents that 6-a-side was not the answer, than they did proving their own statistics, or watching how well the young lads adapted to organising themselves.

Most parents I spoke to wanted to know when it would start so that 'Johnny' could enjoy his game more. That, I had to tell them, was up to the Junior Soccer Association. I just hope they switch on to it real fast.

Oh, by the way, Denis — I forgot to ask you about a game with your 'Colts'! On the local senior Soccer scene there were very few fixtures this weekend as we decided our finalists for the Toowoomba version of the FA Cup — the Ian Winstanley Memorial Shield, a competition that operates in much the same manner as the FA Cup, permitting the lowliest Clubs to be pitted against the loftiest. That way, every so often you get the drama of the giant killer competition, which hasn't quite been the way of things this year because, untypically, the 'luck o' the draw' worked well for the lower Clubs and not so well for the top Clubs. As a consequence our semi-final round involved two 1st Division Clubs playing each other and two second division clubs playing each other.

Now the semis have been resolved, and as could be expected, we had to end up with at least one 1st Division and one 2nd Division Club in the final. The only question was — who? Now we know.

Willowburn defeated Wanderers by a handsome 3-1, to leave First Division Willowburn in the final. Toowoomba United outplayed St. Albans to win 3-1, to leave United also in the final. So,

now the stage is set for a Winstanley final that features the top Club in the T.D.S.F. 1st Division, Willowburn against the top Club in our 2nd Division, Toowoomba United.

Altogether a very satisfying result for United who, in the past two years have barely experienced defeat. Will they pull off a surprise against our local giants, Willowburn? Sunday will tell.

Our Soccer playing ladies are meeting with a fair share of success in this area nowadays. Although slow to get going we now learn we have at least four ladies teams in the area and they are pretty confident of forming their own Toowoomba Women's Soccer Association in 1978.

Despite the evidence of male chauvenism in our favourite code I wish these ladies every success. They deserve success for having stuck with their plans, despite male attitudes to women playing soccer.

Disappointment for those lads who were getting keyed up for the Soccer Coaching course at Tallebudgera this month. Although we weren't getting the numbers we hoped for those that did apply were dead keen. Now we shall have to wait for a date in the future and I hope we haven't lost them or their enthusiasm.

GOLD COAST NOTES

THE seasons biggest crowd so far were treated to exciting tense football as Twin Towns United and Palm Beach battled out the Second Division Grand Final at the Veladrome. The game had most of them on the edge of their seats as although the score was United 4 Palm Beach 1. It was far from a true indication of the standard of the game.

The game opened at a hectic pace and it swung from end to end as both sides tried for that important early goal.

Twin Towns took the lead through a Steve Ames penalty and held that lead until half-time even though it seemed Palm Beach would equalise at any time.

Greg Hage eventually got that equalizer shortly after half-time and from then on the game went into "overdrive". It was only the brilliance of both goalkeepers, Green for United and Bowles for Palm Beach, that kept the score down. At one stage Bowles came from nowhere to save a Harvey header. He then swung the ball into attack and Green, in the United goal, was called upon to make an equally brilliant save in all the space of thirty seconds.

United took the lead when Ray Johnston

latched on to a pinpoint Woodward cross and thundered the ball home first time. John Piggott added another when he ran half the length of the field and Bob Harvey made sure of it when he was on hand at a goalmouth scramble to slot the ball home.

At no stage were Palm Beach out of the game and they were best served by Mark Guest, their centre-half, and big bustling Andy Fiebig in the forward line.

A special mention should be made of Bob Keevers, United's defender, who dislocated his kneecap and played on after it was put back.

Compliments also flowed for referee Peter Holme who handled the game well.

A full round of First Division fixtures were also played and the results were as follows—

"Woodenspooners" Nerang shook the league leaders "City" by taking a point from them:

Nerang went to the lead within fifteen seconds of the opening and then fell behind by 3 goals to 1 but rallied to draw level shortly before the finish.

At Hunt Park Dolphins trounced a completely demoralised Dynamos 11-0

in a game where Dynamos displayed their complete ignorance of the offside law.

In the early game at Hunt Park, a determined Southport went down 3-0 to Palm Beach whilst Athletic travelled to Beaudesert and drew 2-2 with the home side.

The Premiership Action

THE Annerley-Redlands match started at a cracking pace, and in the first minute, Millman had made one of his familiar runs and netted, but unfortunately for Redlands it was ruled offside. Ten minutes later Morris shot over the top after good leadup work from Kelso and Deegan.

Up to this point the Annerley defence was under great pressure and in the 14th minute, Deegan was brought down and a penalty awarded and Trevor Catchpole made no mistake by cracking the spot kick past Ferguson. After 18 minutes, Annerley had their best chance when Campbell and Lovell combined, but the final shot was wide. The game came alive again 13 minutes from the break when Campbell crossed nicely from the right wing and Lovell despatched a good header from near the penalty spot.

From then until halftime both sides had chances, particularly Redlands, when Kelso created good opportunities — but shot wide — and Morris was also prominent. Michael Blackall (injured leg) was replaced at halftime and this caused a reshuffle, with Pat Blackall coming back into the defence, and he chose this time to play one of his best games.

Redlands kept up their continual attacks and in the first 20 minutes Annerley's only real chance came when a defensive header from Meagher almost went into his own net. Finally, after 67 minutes, Kelso and Morris combined to put Millman through and Redlands went to a 2-1 lead.

Eight minutes later Annerley equalised with the goal of the match when Pat Blackall came up into midfield and pushed a pass through to Gary Lovell, who hit

his shot from 20 metres out to give Karreman no chance. The final score was 2-2, but Annerley almost stole the game in the last minute when Dunlop, coming through from full back, just failed to push a free kick past Karreman. While the one point from the draw was readily accepted by Annerley, Redlands could consider themselves unlucky as percentage wise they had many more chances with their fast, free running forwards Ron Millman and Barry Kelso well supported by Alan Morris and John Deegan.

Gary Lovell scored his two goals well from limited opportunities.

The Richlands - St. Helens clash at Lions stadium was a good game with goals galore, marred by the sending off of George Williamson. Linesman Geoff Brabrook had to take over the whistle in the second half as Deiter Klose became too ill to continue. It was 20 minutes into the second half when Williamson was impeded outside the box — he was almost through the defence. Referee Brabrook awarded a free kick to St. Helens and Williamson appeared to remonstrate with the referee about the 10 yards between the ball and the wall. He was shown the yellow card and appeared to continue to talk. But then up went the red card and off went George, and yes — the referee then ordered the wall back. Back to the goals, and they were all beauties.

The first three came in the space of three minutes. "Lodger" Lawrie's lethal left foot rammed home a 30 metre free kick for Richlands. Then long and lean Gavin Johnston headed in a Williamson cross only partially saved by Walker. Then Lawrie showed he could use his right foot too when he netted a long pass from Low after drawing Jenkins out of his goal. Saints came back in the 33rd minute when Johnston's head finished off a Williamson corner. It was champagne football with goals bubbling freely. Richlands' half time lead came in the 40th minute when Lawrie passed to Graham Wilson, who sent the ball onto Low on the right. Low slipped the ball to Dench and Charlie gratefully finished off. Saints strongly retaliated and three shots in rapid succession were charged down following a free kick near the corner flag.

Twelve minutes into the second half Lawrie netted his third with a low, angular first timer from well out, the ball speeding to him from a clearance kick that was off target. Five minutes after the send off, Richlands increased their lead when Dench cut in from the left and sent over a pass to John Ogden, who had only to tap it into the empty net. A bit of hard luck for Saints in that one, as they were down to nine men as Jeff Dann was getting attention on the sideline. But the goal of the match came in the last minute, when Peter Nielsen sent Johnston away on the half way line. By sheer speed and footwork he left Drinkwater and Senjuschenko standing, and after rounding the advancing Walker, found the back of the net to complete his hat trick.

LINESMAN'S VIEW

A FEW years ago Martin Luther King, the late, great American civil rights worker made a speech which began "I have a dream." This catchphrase has echoed round the world and became widely used. This week we make no apology for adapting it to our use.

"We have a dream." We see two strong, dynamic, successful Clubs carrying the banner of Brisbane in the Philips Soccer League. We see the ethnic backgrounds of these two Clubs being submerged to their rightful place in the Club's history, the beginning. We see talented administrators from other ethnic groups being asked to assist in the running of these two businesses in order that they can be said to be truly representative of the city of Brisbane and all her soccer supporters. We see both Clubs become the motivation and target of every young player in Queensland and a day in the not so distant future when both Clubs will have as their nurseries every soccer Club in Queensland. Then and only then will Brisbane flourish as a soccer centre on the Australian scene.

"We have a dream". We see a small, compact, number of healthy, liquid semi-professional Clubs where the cream of our coaching talent will be employed to coach the cream of our youthful talent to the standard required for entry into PSL. We see these Clubs running only one senior team and one Colts team, being extremely selective in their choosing of talent and rewarding only youngsters who are dedicated to bettering themselves.

We see these Clubs playing, not in opposition to PSL Clubs, but in harmony with them, supplying curtain raisers on Sundays so giving the public double headers or playing under lights and combining to entertain the public, not split them asunder by forcing choices upon them. We see these Clubs communicating with Philips League Clubs, with amateur Clubs so that nothing is hidden or designed to upset the natural step ladder to top success that has to be scaled by the ambitious youngster. Then and only then will our semi professional Clubs become what they should be, the final preparation ground for Philips League.

"We have a dream." We see all other Clubs becoming the true competitive area of soccer, the birthplace of the embryo professional soccer player, the amateur leagues and all their varying standards.

We see the ambitious youngster being initiated into open senior soccer with all its trials and tribulations that only the dedicated will overcome. It will be here as an amateur young player will be given one year to absorb the standard. At the end of that year the boy will have to make a decision, to stay or go on to better things. The decision will no doubt be influenced by the Clubs performance.

The successful, well administered Club, being promoted, will have a better chance of holding an ambitious talented lad, as it faces the challenges of a higher division. Hence the competition for both parties. No blue forms retarding the boy who wants to advance. The lad will not wait for a Club that is tardy.

Conversely the progressive Club will, or should, discard the lazy and disinterested. However, the side who sees a youngster leave them and go on to prove himself in a higher division should not feel slighted, they have contributed to his education, reward indeed.

Then and only then will we have the amateur base so essential to the well-being of soccer, the foundation upon which all else is built.

"We have a dream". We see a day when all suspicions jealousy, slander and mischief are put in their proper place. We see a day when the wastage of talent and mone-

A Rule I'd Like to see Changed

IT is rule concerning the forming of the wall 10 yards from the ball when a goal-threatening free kick is taken. How often do you see the referee "shooing" the defenders back like a lot of noisy "chooks" (even in overseas games).

This would be my change. Let the referee place the ball on the spot from which the free kick is to be taken. He then designates the 10 yard mark, and if the defence infringes, the ball is then placed 10 yards nearer the goal. And if that takes the ball into the penalty area, then a penalty should be awarded.

Yes, it's a drastic change, but would we see more penalties? I doubt it. Knowing that the rule was there would ensure the wall formed in its correct place. Incidentally, why can't the referee move the ball, now, as the rule stands, to where the wall should be formed. To my way of thinking it comes under "ungentlemanly conduct" — the player or players are not following the referee's instructions. What do other readers think?

I was compelled to write this (although I've thought about it for years) after the George Williamson incident at Richlands last Saturday.
