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AMPOL CUP ACTION

THE Q.S.F. took somewhat of a gamble by switching the Thistle - St. Helens and Redlands-Spencer Park Cup semi-finals from Saturday afternoon to Saturday night. Then again it was probably a gamble in which they had nothing to lose.

As things turned out it was the right move, with one of the best Club crowds of the season rolling up in chilly weather to watch some good, typical Cup-tie action. Thistle fielded a reshuffled side from the norm through the suspensions of Bailey and Aponas, while Saints had their usual lineup on the park, seeing Williamson escaped a spell on the previous Wednesday night. The only notable change to the Saints formation was the inclusion in goal of youngster Greg Donnelly in place of Ross Jenkins, who reportedly asked Coach Al Warren to leave him out as he was not happy with his own form. A refreshing attitude in this day and age.

At any rate, Donnelly proved himself a very capable youngster and it was left to see if Saints could repel the strong second division push from Thistle, currently enjoying their best season, from a publicity point of view, for some time. Much of this of course has been due to the exploits of Hermiston, who had to move from midfield to defence and also the notable signings this year of Dolan and Patterson. Thistle have a strong youth outlook, judging by their treatment towards the suspended Aponas, and the inclusion of midfielder Swan and striker Clunas.

As it turns out, George Pagan's faith in this policy paid handsome dividends when Clunas headed home Pike's corner for the eventual winner in the shadows of half time. Breen kept Saints firing from the midfield and had some strong support from allies Johnston, Nielsen, Brian Kathage and the tireless Williamson. There was a little bit of needle always necessary if not inevitable in Cup football and Patterson did his block when he was hacked down by Williamson. The incident kept the Scot on the boil for quite some time, and he was particularly lucky later when he had a go at Jeff Dann, but it

was unnoticed by Dave Nugent. Linesmen not paying attention again.

Gee, aided by Lazenby, Hermiston, Jones and Allison kept Thistle intact at the back as Saints, to their credit, did not take their departure from the competition without a decent fight. There was similar stubborn work performed at the back of the Saints combine by Dann boys, Warren and the always consistent Glen McKeand. But hang on Thistle did, and their Cup final clash, now that they have made history already, against Spencer Park next week, should be a classic.

The second semi between Redlands and Spencer Park did not produce the same type of free-flowing stuff, but it was a good solid encounter if only because it was in doubt almost until the end.

Extra time specialist Deiter Klose looked certain to do the trick again until newcomer McLeod, who displayed plenty of skill in a great debut, took advantage of an Ian Johnston corner, to leave Dick Karreman helpless for really the only time during the game he looked like getting into that situation. The Catchpole boys again were absentees from the Redlands side so Meagher and his young offsider Chris Hill did enough to make it a fair claim that they did not deserve to be on the losing side. The obvious highlight was the brilliant front-running effort from Barry Kelso, who many would like to see get a chance one day in Philips League. He gave Herdle, Perry and Schneider plenty to think about and his powerful running ended with at least three almost certain goals, until Kim Wishart decided he wanted to play in the Cup final.

REFLECTIONS ON THE LOCAL DERBY

THE score is now one game apiece and the scene is set for the big one, the first round of the Philips League Cup when once again we will have all the tension and ballyhoo of the local derby. If last Sundays game is to be taken as a measure the match will be worth waiting for.

Back to last week and what did we get. First of all Lions must be congratulated for securing the sponsorship which allowed them to entertain a little bit more than usual and Tool City have to be thanked for their participation

to be thanked for their participation.

The England v. Australia game showed that the older Australian players were quite capable of holding their own and the kids loved it when they, the two teams, gave away their "caps". The girls giving out the Minties when they did, soothed down the tension and when the Brisbane City funeral parlour put on their funeral show it really set everyone at ease for what was to come.

The game itself turned out like most local derbies, just a little bit of an anticlimax. All the ballyhoo that had gone on during the week was put to the test and when the teams ran on to the field it must have appeared to the average

punter that the odds on Lions would lengthen when it was seen Murray and Henderson were not to start and Bennetts' successful stand-in, Wilkinson was also on the bench, his place and Murray's being filled by Drinkwater and Lawrie respectively. City were at full strength and in the first twenty minutes looked as if they were going to cash in on this advantage, but even at this early stage it was noticeable the Lions were far further into "professional" tactics getting up to nine men behind the ball when the pressure was on and yet still managing to pressure in numbers on the quick break.

Peter Tokesi cashed in on the obvious weakness in Lions defence when he outjumped a diminutive defence to put City in the lead but this only appeared to get the Lions running faster and it was no surprise when Lions prince of goal getters Geoff Morris latched on to the last pass from a very good move involving Fagan and Neale to send a low grounder past Borzi from 16 metres. Morris was again involved when Lions took the lead when he speculated with a long lob cum cross which found the City defence "away for the day" and Paul

After half time, when we were once again highly entertained by Brisbane City's penalty competition for youngsters, the game began to deteriorate not so much by usual standards but by its own first half standard. Balls began to be tried long and to be honest there are still too many players on both sides to whom the passing of a long ball is still a skill to be mastered.

The score remained the same until full time but there were still enough goalmouth incidents to keep the crowd entertained.

Individually the game was a success for Dendo, Potter Drinkwater, Spearritt and Morris for Lions and Hermiston, Tokesi, Caldwell all excelled for City with McLeod showing he'll be a real asset during his short spell on field.

City's Gaffney, Pimblett and Echeverria are still committing the cardinal error of mid field play, they all have a rest at the same time, a fatal mistake for it means the forwards suffer as well and no team can play down six men. Ian Fagan is covering an immense amount of ground in his ball winning and carrying forages but still has a tendency to give away possession by mis-passing a difficult ball when the easy one is "on."

Ian Lawrie found the pace a bit much for him and one must question his future as a mid fielder in this grade. Everyone knows he possesses a tremendous shot but not once in 90 minutes did he find himself an opportunity to us this potentially lethal weapon. Such is the difference between Philips League and Brisbane First Division.

Lions full backs perhaps shaded City's on the day, the battle between Niven and Caldwell tremendously interesting until Caldwell's supply of ball dried up. Park stuck to the task well and handled Connors as well as he can be handled, John Coyne having one of those days doing brilliant things interspersed with over anxious mistakes.

However he and McLeod looked as if they could strike upon understanding.

Paul Laslo is an enigma. Used as a central striker against Tokesi the man was behind the eight-ball from the start in the air but on the ground he more than looks after himself his trickery and

speed on the turn causing the larger defenders all sorts of problems. This marks Paul down as a true winger, but he certainly gives his all for Schienflug in his makeshift position.

Probably Lions deserved their narrow victory, if we analysed the scoring chances created by both sides Lions would be far ahead, City were always dangerous but before McLeod came on there was always a touch of desperation in their attempts rather than controlled build up.

The true star of the match however was the referree Boskovic who gave an absolutely superb exhibition of controlled and understanding refereeing.

IT'S A HARD ROAD

NERANG

MELBOURNE — Australia faces an uphill battle all the way to the 1978 Argentina World Cup Soccer finals following its 0-1 loss to Iran at Melbourne's Olympic

Australia failed for two reasons They could not capitalize on the opportunities they managed to create and they also suffered a severe attack of World Cup nerves.

It was the second sector that upset Australian coach Jimmy Shoulder more than anything else.

"The pressure that was on us in this match was a crucial factor," Shoulder

"We had players who two weeks ago in the World of Soccer competition involving Celtic, Arsenal and Red Star Belgrade played brilliant football against far better players than the Iranians.

"The big difference was that in that tournament we were the outright underdogs — we weren't given any chance.

"But yesterday too many of the players let the pressure get to them. Too many were lethargic and hesitant and you cannot afford to be like that in World Cup matches.

"They ought not to allow this sort of thing to get to them."

'The Socceroos found it hard to crack the tightly packed Iranian defence but still managed to create half a dozen scoring chances.

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And as so often happens in top level football, Iran, who would have been delighted merely with a draw, scored a goal against the run of play in the 70th minute that gave them a bonus victory.

It was one of Iran's rare scoring opportunities but they made the most of it.

Striker Hassan Rowshan gathered a rebound off Australian goalkeeper Alan Maher and cooly pushed the ball past Maher for the easiest of goals.

Iran now has five points out of a possible six in three away games in the Asian World Cup qualifying competition and must be strong favourites for a place in Argentina.

Australia has only two points from two home matches in the five nation tournament.

It is now an absolute must for the Socceroos to win both of their two remaining home matches to have any chance of qualifying for the Argentina finals.

They play South Korea on August 27 and Kuwait on October 16. Both matches are in Sydney.

Asked about Australia's chances of reaching Argentina, Shoulder said: "Obviously we haven't done ourselves any good — not only by dropping two points but also by letting Iran pick up two points.

'But there is a long way to go yet.

"We've got six matches left and there are still 12 points going begging

This is a hard group and Iran are not home and hosed by any means," added Shoulder.

The Australian performance with only one or two exceptions, was like flat beer.

The Socceroos showed little of their recent aggression and particularly in the closing stages only left back Harry Williams appeared to be as sharp as some of the Iranians.

Midfielder Jimmy Rooney had an uncharacteristically bad day with many of his passes going astray, although he ran all day and kept plugging away.

TOOWOOMBA SIDELINES

WILLOWBURN, Toowoomba's 1977 1st Division Premiers are now also the 1977 winners of the Ian Winstanley Memorial Shield, having beaten a very spirited and hard working Toowoomba United by 5-1.

As high as the score may appear, it barely reflected what was a final full of Soccer and continued pressure from both sides. Willowburn excelled because they had more accurate strikers than Toowoomba United and strikers that shot from well out of the goal area. United's strikers suffered from too much enthusiasm when near the goal and less ability in retaining complete control of the ball when in the area.

This stage of the season brings a certain sadness with it. The premierships have been decided and there is no league table to record with the possibility that teams have altered their positions by a mere fraction of a percentage. In fact, I find the wrap up session, as it could be called, quite depressing and look foward, once again to the resumption of the next Soccer season.

Not that we have finished with Soccer in Toowoomba. Far from it!

Our top Toowoomba clubs, Willowburn and St. Albans, are much happier this week following Sunday's 3rd Division Q.S.F. games where, just for a change, no local team lost.

St. Albans only managed to draw with Pine Rivers and are still, therefore, only one point ahead in third place and only one point ahead of The Gap. This obviously makes Saints position that bit more precarious and they will have to be even more determined to win their remaining games. Willowburn, following their defeat of Booval the previous week, came up with, for them, a rare double in winning for a second week when they downed Nerang by 4-3. A good result for The Magpies who need every darn point they can get to remain in 3rd Division. In 5th Division Saints produced one of those miracles they are capable of when defeating third placed Pine Rivers by a handsome 4-1. A good win for Saints who, like Willowburn in the 3rd Division, need every point they can get to stay in 5th for 1978.

As the T.D.S.F. premierships are over more attention is being paid to our teams in the Brisbane competition and, so far, they are keeping local fans happy with their performances. We hope they keep up the good work.

Those points all but gave the premiership to Willowburn, robbing Wanderers of the honour at the conclusion of the competition. By the constitution this appeal has to be heard by the Council at their next meeting on 5th September. It will be interesting to hear how they decide. Until that decision has been made there seems little point in satisfying a recent request from a local Club for the final tables to be published in GO SOCCER. LINESMAN'S VIEW

THIS week we would like to pay tribute to the most maligned men in soccer, the men in black, the men who can never be correct in their difficult decision making, the men without whom there can be no game, the referee. The man we wish to pay tribute to is a man who has reached the pinnacle of his profession, a man who must surely be in the running for the greatest of all competitions, the World Soccer Cup in the Argentine next year.

Tony Boskovic is the name. Last weekend he treated our potential bomb like a damp squib, so much so that we often wondered if he was about to drop off and have forty winks out in the middle.

What makes this man tick? he was in stature the smallest man on the field yet he dominated the proceedings as would a giant, a colossus, with no more fuss and bother than the local clergyman would have at his annual tea party.

He was a walking, living textbook example to every experienced or novice referee and any of our Brisbane officials who could have, and didn't, watch him should be made to explain why.

What did we see in Boskovic that we don't see every week. First of all was the relaxed confidence of the man, at 1.30 p.m. when he could have been "lording it" up above in the boardroom the man was stretched along a bench in the referee's room enjoying a cat nap while all around him the frantic build-up to the local derby, the match of the year, was taking place. He spoke quietly and amicably with everyone who addressed him and never once did he look to be in any other frame of mind other than that of an official going out to handle a junior match.

When the game started he was very quick to point out to John Neale that he was in no frame of mind to stand any nonsense when Neale fouled Hermiston right in front of the Italian "gallery."

The yellow card was produced in a manner that let everyone see it and yet it was not flouted into the players face as a badge of authority.

No doubt the quietly but firmly spoken words contained the necessary inflection for this effect, but Neale was the only one to hear them. Just as quickly as

he was at the scene of the "crime" so did he quickly withdraw and continue to control this game in a manner befitting Australia's top referee. The man obviously knows his football you note the use of the term football - not "rules of football" and it was quite amusing to see him blowing up a foul, and upon being faced with a suitably irate player putting on the big act, quickly and quietly signal a hand ball offence (supposedly on the referee's blind side) and shake his head, turn away and wave play on. It would probably be correct to say that inside 15 minutes every player on that field knew that this was one not to be trifled with and as a result the game flowed back and forth for minutes at a time without a stoppage.

The man uses logic such as the time when, with Lions leading 2-1, Geoff Morris decided to do a bit of 'professional' time wasting by slowing his usual dash down the wing to something less than walking pace. When dumped unceremoniously and just as professionally by Hermiston's hip, Boskovic just shrugged his shoulders to Morris's appeal and waved Hermiston into attack. Needless to say Geoff didn't try that trick again.

Logic, although technically Hermiston maybe committed a foul, Morris probably deserved what he got and it certainly wasn't a dangerous foul so why stop play. A classical piece of top refereeing this and one that certainly put a stop to the time wasting. Result, mission accomplished.

Boskovic has developed his physical aptitude to a high degree. With the ball flying from end to end he could have been excused for lagging behind a bit, but we doubt if the man even broke sweat during the ninety minutes. He delegates a tremendous amount of responsibility to his linesmen, a move which no doubt endears him to his fellow officials, but we would bet that in the minutes preceding the match and the first few minutes of performance this shrewd operator sizes up his co-officials and delegates accordingly. It is to the credit of both linesmen last week that he appeared to accept their every signal without question and yet never once were we subjected to the usual barrage of abuse that is the usual lot of our weekly line officials. Another sign of the man's overpowering authority.

Does the man have a weakness? On last weeks display we doubt it very much. he is a referee without par in Queensland and it is suffice to say that as he quietly left the field he still found time to smile and talk to a youngster who spoke to him.

Tony Boskovic, on behalf of GO SOCCER thank you for a tremendous experience. Come back again any time, you are a true aid to the entertainment value in soccer.

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
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READERS' FORUM

It was with amazement that I read the article in your August edition signed by Mr. Ian Rasmussen. It seems obvious that Mr. Rasmussen wrote that article with complete ignorance as to the true facts of the matter. It is my opinion and the opinion of the Directors of the Brisbane City Soccer Club that most of Mr. Rasmussen's comments were unfounded and in most cases untrue.

Mr. Rasmussen is obviously not aware that Brisbane City paid the sum of \$9,000 to Grange Thistle for the privilege of using Jim Hermiston for Philips Soccer League matches. CANBERRA CITY CLUB HISTORY AND INFORMATION

CANBERRA City is as new as the League itself — it, too, started from scratch

Twelve months ago a group of Canberra citizens — public servants, business men, and journalists among them — met to consider entering a team in the League.

And today the team is a reality.

Canberra City is not the League's strongest team — but it is likely to be one of the best-balanced, a promising mixture of experience and youth, and of local and imported talent. Leading the task of recruiting and training a whole new team is manager coach, Johnny Warren, 33, M.B.E. — Australian soccer's most famous native son.

Over 40 times capped for Australia Warren's signature on the dotted line was a great coup.

Warren is no stranger to challenges and leadership responsibilities — he captained Australia in 1967 to 1971. But he considers his task with Canberra City his greatest challenge.

His strategy is to form a "solid foundation" in the first season and build on that. To do this he has collected a cosmopolitan squad That is appropriate because Canberra, with a quarter of its 200,000 people having migrant origin, is the most international city in Australia.

Canberra City players are drawn from Australia, Argentina, Britain, Hong Kong, South Africa and Fiji.

But the Club has a solid native appeal, too. It is the only Club in the League with an Australian President, Australian Secretary and Australian-born manager-coach.

What's more 14 of its squad of 32 players are also Australian born, and they can polish and improve their skills under the watchful eye of Warren's assistant coach and former St. George stablemate, Vic Fernandez, in Canberra soccers First Division.

Fernandez, of course, throughout the 1960s as a St. George player was known to Sydney soccer fans as "Mr. Football"

Canberra does not have the big-city budgets of teams from the other capitals,

so Warren and Club executives David Dillon, president and Hal Leslie, secretary have been spending carefully. The team's chief sponsor is Brian Pollock (Ford) and other local financial help has been arranged.

The most expensive and promising signings so far include goalkeeper Ron Tilsed (Arsenal, Portsmouth and England's mini-World Cup team), Brian Stoddart, South Africa's leading goalscorer last season and his brother John, Jock Brown, a Scot who also starred in South Africa.

Also signed from a top South African Club is Tony Henderson, 23, an Englishman and centre half, 6ft 2inches tall who plays the game hard and tough.

Local signings include Ivan Gruicic, from Croatia who was previously with South Coast United and Essendon Lions, and former A.C.T. captain and last years player-of-the-year, Mike Black.

For the first season of the Philips League Canberra City play home games at the Manuka Oval — at present Canberra's premier oval and the place where last year Australia played Hong Kong.

But next year the so-called "Cinderella" team expects to play on the finest soccer ground in Australia.
