### ONE OUT OF SIX

ONLY the last round of the premiership remaining and as GO SOCCER accumulated the fantastic tipping tally of one out of six last weekend, we'll have another go and work out the premiership and semi-final positions before they happen.

### ANNERLEY MAKE ST. GEORGE WAIT

THIS important game was spoiled as a spectacle by the strong wind blowing straight down the ground, making control difficult, but the players themselves contributed to some degree by failing to keep the ball low on many occasions.

### OVER FOR ANOTHER SEASON

Both teams have climbed steadily through the Divisions together, and it must be remembered Goodna was tipped in this magazine that one day they would be in the major league. Third and fourth places go to Pine Rivers and Wynnum. Taringa won their last match 3-0 to escape the drop, and that fate has hit St. Albans and Toowong.

SIXTH — Very interesting situation here, although Kingsridge as premiers are promoted. Rochedale currently placed second on 32 points with a goal average of 3.55, but Bayside also have 32 points and a match in hand to be played against Dinmore. Bayside's goal average is 3.22, so to earn promotion they would have to beat Dinmore by something like 7-0.

At the other end of the table, the

teams relegated are Olympic and St. Michael's.

SEVENTH — There was a great degree of uncertainty about the premiership outcome, after Adams Park lost 5-1 to North Brisbane, thereby surrendering the lead to RAAF, and subsequently lodging a protest with the management committee in regards to team stacking, that old hoary problem. But Adams Park dropped a precious point to Souths in their last match, leaving them two points adrift of RAAF. So even if the match happens to be awarded to Adams Park, they will miss the premiership on goal average, but promotion is some sort of compensation. Salisbury finsihed third and Richlands fourth, and the relegated duo are The Gap and North Pine.

EIGHTH — Annerley notched one of the easiest wins, finishing at least six points clear of the rest of the field. But there could be a dramatic finish for the other promotion spot, as after last weekend, the teams finishing in positions two to five were Redcliffe (33), Merton (31), Rochedale (29) and St. George (28).

But an earlier abandoned match between Merton and St. George has to be played. Should Merton beat St. George 3-0 in that game, they would be level on 33 with Redcliffe, but would be promoted on goal average. And even if St. George lose, they would still have to play another outstanding match, as victory there would give them 30 points, enabling them to pip current fourth-placed Rochedale for a place in the semi-finals. The other end is far less complicated with the bottom two being Salisbury and Bayside (see points to ponder).

### Mt. Gravatt Up Again

MT. GRAVATT kept on its winning way in this topsy turvy second round with a 2-1 win over Merton East. This match which did not reach any great heights in the first half, certainly ended with some good exciting football. Mt. Gravatt had a chance to go one up mid-way through the first half when they were awarded a penalty. Wim Speikerman lined up the shot and tried to place it past the 'keeper, but Chris Carroll was equal to it and got down to block the shot and eventually cleared it away.

Ironically it was Merton who drew first blood with a penalty early into the second half. Mark Davis got down to block the first attempt from Russell Griffits but he was unable to stop the shot from the rebound. Mid way through the second half Mt. Gravatt started putting

their game together and they finally broke the very good Merton defence. John Stewart put over a superb cross and John Ferguson glided it past Chris Carroll for the equaliser.

From then on both sides were committed to sustained attack and hard, and sometimes desperate defence. The winning goal came from Ian Steele. He bobbed and weaved his way through three tackles to blast the ball past Carroll. It was a good win from Mt. Gravatt and it takes them well away from the relegation zone.

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### LINESMAN'S VIEW

ALTHOUGH nothing concrete has been done about our request for an open meeting of everyone interested in Brisbane soccer, there is growing hope that an idea may be germinating that will once again prove to everyone that Queensland soccer can be a leader on the Australian scene.

Some people with foresight have suggested that a State League be formed, its function solely being to provide an interim standard of soccer between Philips League and our present standard which appears to have bottomed to a point where even the bottom team Bardon can give the top side a run for their mon-

Is State League feasible, can it work, how will it work when can it start? These are the questions that will be posed by every deep thinking person who follows this great game of ours. The feasibility of the League is surely dependent on money but it is a known fact that there is now more sponsorship money being ploughed into soccer than ever before and it isn't beyond the realms of reality that a State League concept could attract a sponsor big enough to subsidise a state wide soccer competition. Soccer is played with ever growing interest in every major centre in the state and one has only to visit these areas at any time to realise how popular the code is.

Of course to work, the League would have to attract people and surely the best way to do that would be to take the game to these centres where a select side from that district would play against the visitors. If the main centre federations ie. Townsville, Mackay, Toowoomba etc. did what was done this year in Brisbane surely the result would be the same as the result we have had. Imagine say, St. George flying to Mareeba to play a select side on a Sunday with no other soccer allowed, would the crowd be better than what St. George draw in first division just now, I would imagine so. The Brisbane sides playing in the league at home could play double headers on a Saturday night at Perry Park, or in Ipswich and there is no doubt they would attract crowds. Grange Thistle proved recently that people can be induced out of their homes in the evening if the promise of entertainment is there. So there is no doubt this League could be made to work if everyone set their mind to it.

How would it work, the knocker will tell us the standard in the country is not high enough, but the optimist would tell you that these centres could and would do their share of inducing better players to move to their districts in order that they be well represented in this new League of soccer. These people would be motivated to seek local sponsorship in order that their sides be financially well backed and this would only mean more money pouring into the code. Earlier this year a team from the north proved to our St. Helens friends that they are quite capable of holding their own in our standard of soccer. When this League could start is a difficult question but it is imperative that it be started as quickly as possible. Obviously not every club in Brisbane could play in it so there would have to be a "screaming" process done by the Management Committee of the Q.S.F. If one considers teams from Mt. Isa, Townsville, Cairns, Mackay, Rockhampton, Bundaberg, North Coast, Gold Coast, Ipswich and Toowoomba being invited and four from Brisbane a League becomes a very attractive proposition. Obviously there would be some financial risk involved and with this in mind there is no doubt some clubs in Brisbane would be looking around for "running mates" to ensure financial and playing strength. It doesn't take too much imagination to see the possibilities in an amalgamation of interests say of Merton, Wynnum and Southside Eagles to form a club, or for that matter North Brisbane, Grange Thistle and Mitchelton forming another. Surely the outcoming result of these get-togethers would produce some pretty startling results in lifting our standard, and it would also make our Philips League people sit up and take note, a most important point.

There it is then, from a multitude of different ideas and prophesies, a light is appearing at the end of the tunnel. We are at the crossroads, the direction we take will be dependent on the foresight and ability of the men we have in power at Perry Park. It is to be hoped they are capable of this great step, and we take the proper course.


