

City Crash

SYDNEY — St. George gained a morale boosting 2 nil victory against Brisbane City at Barton Park.

Both Saints goals came in the second half after a very lethargic first 45 minutes.

Dashing Saints winger Phil O'Connor had a hand in both goals and was by far the best striker on the field on the day.

In the 46th minute he zoomed off on the right wing and hit a fine cross to Carlos Mendez, who chested the ball back to Rudi Gnavi.

The Argentinian schemer then delicately drove the ball low and hard into the net to set Saints on the winning way.

St. George dominated the second half with Brisbane City attacking only spasmodically and ineffectually.

Seventy fourth minute substitute Zoran Durisic assured Saints of victory when, in the 82nd minute he scored an excellent second goal.

Again O'Connor did all the ground work by beating his fullback on the right flank and sending over a high cross.

Although the ball was deflected partially away by a defender, Durisic gathered it in and after hurdling two tackles drove the ball high into the roof of the

Altogether it was far from an entertaining game and both sides should share equal blame for this.

Neither side played to any set pattern and it seemed as if all 22 players were playing it "off the cuff".

It was only when St. George broke from this pattern and started to utilise O'Connor along the flank that they began to look a real threat.

Brisbane City relied heavily upon Willie Conner and Roberto Echeverria, but both were easily blocked out by a well marshalled St. George defence.

SYDNEY — How Sydney Olympic sighed for striker Billy Pirie as they stumbled to a 1-1 draw with Footscray at Wentworth Park.

The brilliant Scottish striker arrived in Perth with tourists Dundee last Thursday, and plays his first match for Olympic against Eastern Suburbs next Sunday week.

Throughout the match Olympic made seven dangerous chances to Footscray's three, and were even the more creative of the two sides when Footscray were putting the game together fluently in the first half.

Olympic came storming back after the break but a brilliant display by Footscray's Dennis Boland in goal denied them just reward for their labours.

In the 63rd minute Boland had just a fraction of a second to sight Allan Ainslie's pile driver that had goal written all over it, but he did so superbly with doubled fists.

Footscray coach Cedo Cirkovic was bitter over the actions of his imported fullback Zoravko Lujic, who twice handled the ball and was sent off for ungentlemanly conduct by Newcastle referee Alf Rodway with 37 minutes remaining.

The first ball he stopped was full of danger, but the repeat performance involved a useless dive across the turf 40 metres out from goal.

Former Greek international Con Darvoulis showed great skills and must be a tremendous power when he later links up with the high scoring Pirie.

Footscray's first goal was belted home in the 24th minute by striker Joe Piciaone.

Jim Kriaris anticipated to perfection for a great run up the right. He squared off the ball, Olympic goal keeper Gary Meier mishandled, and Piciaone put his side ahead from the rebound.

Throughout the first half Olympic's long balls were being easily won in the air by the Footscray central defence of Jim Kriaris and Jim Kondarios, but after the resumption an entirely different situation arose.

Footscray faced a more judicious blend

of long balls and passing movements into space, and one 58th minute burst was rewarded with an equaliser from Derek Laing, the outstanding Olympic player of the day.

12th May, 1978

Alec Jamieson went strongly along the right to cut the ball across the box and Laing picked his spot when for once goal keeper Boland was on the ground and fully committed with three defenders caught running back in a vain attempt to cover.

Olympic then asserted their superiority with a number of patient buildups.

A goal appeared just a matter of time but Boland's goal keeping kept them at bay.

ADELAIDE — West Adelaide beat Eastern Suburbs 3-2 after an inspired and exciting second half at Hindmarsh Stadium.

Trailing 2-1 and looking a beaten side at halftime, West Adelaide took Easts by surprise with their tenacity and resolute determination.

Despite a confident start, West Adelaide found themselves on the receiving end of punishing tackles and fell into a heap trying to match Eastern Suburbs aggressiveness.

The home side took the lead in the 20th minute when Easts goalkeepr, Tod Clarke, failed to hold a blistering drive from West Adelaide midfielder, Peter Boyle, and Victor Bozanic tucked away the subsequent rebound.

With Socceroo Murray Barnes a dominant force up front for Easts, the Sydney side were on level terms within two minutes after a tragic error by West Adelaide stopper, Lacki Vagianos.

Vagianos attempted to pass across goal but the ball was intercepted by an unchecked Barnes, who slipped it past Wests goalkeeper, Martyn Crook.

Barnes, given too much room to make his moves, made it 2-1 after 37 minutes when he positioned himself alongside the West Adelaide defence and ran through to accept a cross ball and score easily.

By this time Eastern Suburbs had unsettled West Adelaide's ball playing style through a number of physical clashes, their chief culprit being Barnes.

The tactics made Eastern Suburbs look good and they appeared to have the game under control at half time.

But in the second half West Adelaide's acting coach, Neil McGachey, made three positional moves which swung the game dramatically.

McGachey switched himself from midfield to sweeper, Bozanic dropped into midfield and tall Dave Pillans went up front to bolster the attack.

Bozanic immediately provided the driving force Wests needed in midfield and was chiefly responsible for Wests equalising goal in the 53rd minute.

The elegant midfielder charged into the area, crossed a low ball and it ricocheted off Easts stopper, Steve O'Connor, and into his own goal.

Three minutes later West Adelaide took the lead when Ian McGregor rose high in the box and superbly headed a McGachey free kick over the head of Clarke and into the top right hand corner of the goal.

Although Easts desperately tried to get back into the game they were frustrated by West Adelaide's persistence and eagerness in midfield and defence, to win the ball at all costs.

ENGLAND ELIMINATED

MANCHESTER — Yugoslavia won a place in the final of the European under-21 Soccer championship by holding England to a one-all draw here.

The Yugoslavs won the first leg semifinal 2-1 and so qualify on aggregate 3-2 to meet East Germany in the final.

An eight-man Yugoslav defence soaked up formidable pressure before, with seven minutes to go, Halilhodzic, who scored both Yugoslav first leg goals, put the visitors ahead to the dismay of the 24,423 crowd.

Defender Steve Sime went upfield to equalise next minute but England's final efforts to get the goal which would have taken the match into extra time was frustrated.

BUENOS AIRES SIDE ATTRACTIONS

BUENOS AIRES — The roar of Jackhammers and heavy lorries grows louder as new hotels to house World Cup Soccer fans spring up all over Buenos Aires.

The City now has about 22,000 hotel beds and expects about 3,000 more by June 1, according to Antonio Gomez, president of the Argentine Hotel Federation. About 45,000 foreign tourists are expected in June for the Soccer Circus.

But will the fans be able to afford the prices being asked? A survey shows that hoteliers are asking from 30 to 60 dollars a night for a single room. Making lodging in Buenos Aires quite expensive.

Soccer fans are advised, however, not to sleep in the parks. It is illegal, the police are not very tolerant and it gets very cold in Buenos Aires in June. The prison cells are not heated either.

But there are still two bargains left in Buenos Aires. One is beefsteak, which can be bought for two dollars in almost any restaurant. The other is the Colectivo or Passenger Bus.

These colourful machines crisscross this sprawling metropolis of some eight million people day and night. One can travel from one end the city to the other for about 12 Aust. cents. Journeys of less than 12 kilometres (eight miles) cost less than 8 cents Aust.

In a hurry in Buenos Aires, the Colectivos, painted in a wide variety of colours, tear through even the worst traffic.

Few motorists dare challenge them for supremacy on the road. The City fathers have also set up special lanes for Colectivos only. It is sometimes faster to travel by bus than taxi, especially over shorter distances.

There are so many Colectivos here that commuters in Buenos Aires mucst be among the most spoiled in the world. Is a Colectivo dirty? Does the driver look surly? Ignore it another will be along immediately.

The interiors of the Colectivos, which are privately owned, are art masterpieces. The owner drivers paint their dashboards with wavy coloured lines and impressions of the Madonna or they line the driver's area with photographs of Saints, relatives or Soccer stars.

The Colectivos began their lives as

taxi cabs which used to pick up passengers on a fixed route at the start of the Depression in 1929. They were described then as collective transportation. Although they grew into mini-buses in later years, the name Colectivo stuck.

If Soccer fans prefer walking through the city, they might be surprised at a popular local lunch-time activity bankwatching.

Every working day between noon and 2 p.m., scores of people can be seen standing in front of banks and currency exchange shops, some just stare and frow others calculate busily with pencil and paper and others shake their heads in apparent disbelief.

They are examining the latest rates of interest being offered by the competitive banks and the latest peso to dollar exchange rate.

At one point last December, the banks were offering up to 12 percent interest a month on 30-day deposits. The bank watching and the apparently insane interest rates reflect the fact that Buenos Aires is probably the inflation capital of the world.

Things are getting better, however. The inflation rate now averages about 14 per cent a month compared with 30 per cent a month two years ago.

When the banks close on the week-ends, Soccer fans can join in another popular tourist activity — A visit to Recoleta cemetery where the rich, famous and noble of Argentina are immortalised in stone and marble.

GOLD COAST COMMENT

THE only major soccer played on the Gold Coast over the Labour Day weekend was the inaugural tournament at Stephen's Trotway. A disappointing crowd witnessed a great days football, from North Brisbane, Mt. Gravatt, Southside Eagles and the hosts Gold Coast United.

It was intended that six teams would be competing but Ipswich United and Grange Thistle had to withdraw because of injury problems. The final between North Brisbane and Mt. Gravatt was a typical Cup final - hard, fast and open. The standard was that much better when the conditions were taken into account. It was the first time football had been played under lights at the Trotway and it is obvious that they are not up to the required standard and will have to be improved before any more is played.

The first half was practically all Mt. Gravatt with Eric Thompson dominating the mid field and Ian Steele prominent up front but despite this it was North Brisbane who had the best chances, through Wayne Walker and Len Pollock. North Brisbane scored first after a goalmouth scramble and a half clearance. Pollock got the ball at the edge of the box and weaved past a couple of defenders to give the goalkeeper no chance.

Their second goal was bad defence on the part of Mt. Gravatt. Gary Fisher gave away a needless free kick and then deflected Pollock's shot into the net.

Mt. Gravatt pulled one back with the best goal of the day. A move that began with Thompson and involved four other players finished with Steele laying the

ball back from the right hand side of the box for Harry Stewart to slam a left foot 20 yarder into the back of the net. Mt. Gravatt had their chances to equalise but failed to do so and North Brisbane ran out winners by two goals to one. North Brisbane were best served by Pollock, Walker, Bray and Curtis while Mt. Gravatts best were Thompson, Steele and Stewart.

The lessers final was between Gold Coast and Eagles, which United won 2-1 in another close fought match. The preliminary matches between Mt. Gravatt/ Eagles and North Brisbane/Gold Coast also produced some good football. Although a scoreless draw, the Mt. Gravatt/ Eagles game produced fast, open attacking football and the fact that the scoresheet was clean was due to the excellence of rival keepers Mark Davis and John Bennett.

The game was decided on the American "shootout" with Mt. Gravatt scoring once from their five and Eagles missing the lot. The Norths/Coast game finished 3-1 in the former's favour, with all four goals stemming from defensive errors. A Ricky Mangan blockbuster crashed against the crossbar in the first couple of minutes and if this had gone in it would have probably given United the lift they needed.

The games were interspersed by exhibitions of shootout, sprinting and a fast-est goal as per the demonstration on the Big Match the other week. Dave Robbins from Gold Coast United scored the fastest goal, putting the ball in the net in 4-9 seconds from the kickoff. Robbins also won the sprint by finishing half a vard in front of Tony Brennan.

Ernie Bargewell made it a clean sweep for United by almost keeping a clean sheet in the shoot outs. He only let one goal past him while Mark Davis (Mt. Gravatt) and Gary Bray (North Brisbane) let in five.

Dear Sir,

I would like to take this opportunity and reply to an article in GO SOCCER (April 28) headed "The Quiet Revolution". In it, your Insideman puts the whole future of soccer on the shoulders of big name players, who are supposed to have invaded

and converted the schools to soccer.

He ignores the efforts put in by parents and the kids themselves in convincing headmasters and teachers that soccer is the better team sport to play, not to mention the part played by these "certified type" coaches, who, supposedly unloved

by the kids, unskilled and not having a big name, armed with only a "blackboard" have carried the banner of soccer so far without the benefit of the sums of money lavished on our fine "imports".

He goes on to assert that school soccer is a far more acceptable form of competition than our present junior setup, which as everyone is supposed to know is far too competitive and interested only in amassing trophies. He is completely unaware that since all our junior soccer players go to school also they form the bulk of the school representative teams and school soccer not only provides opportunity for boys to play, but also provides more trophies for those boys who are supposedly sated with rewards already. I agree that these are many facets of junior soccer as administered by our clubs at present, that can be improved on.

But we would be foolish to pin all our hopes on schools and abandon our present junior setup, which after all has brought us a long way from our dependance on overseas imports. This after all is the aim of junior soccer in Australia, to provide Australian players for Australian teams. The reward for junior players that keep going is the knowledge that even if their ability is not recognised by local clubs, they have the opportunity to play soccer for any club in the world.

So strength to the administrators of junior soccer. May their reward be the knowledge that they are the ones who will make soccer the greatest game in Australia, as it is in the rest of the world.





Those who stayed away missed some of City's most constructive attack of the season, admittedly against some pretty mediocre opposition from a young and inexperienced combination.

Coach Saftich had made a couple of switches — Echeverria sweeping and Hermiston at left back and Conner being free to roam on the left wing.

For forty minutes City attacked almost non-stop with constant switches from wing to wing but with nothing to show on the scoreboard until Frank Pimblett laid on a glorious ball for Conner, who had suddenly bobbed up unmarked in the box from where he meticulously deflected the ball past the helpless Meier.

12th May, 1978

The pressure continued until half time when the scoreline read Brisbane City 1, Sydney Olympic 0.





BARCELONA, SPAIN — Dutch Soccer ace Johan Cruyff said farewell to football with a dazzling last display of the skills which earned him the tag of the best footballer in the world.

A crowd of 90,000 packed Barcelona's stadium to see Cruyff, 31, play the last competitive game of a 14 year professional career, which has brought him almost every honour the sport offers.

The lithe, boyish-faced Dutchman led Barcelona, already Spanish Cup winners, to a 1-0 victory over Valencia and second place in the League behind Real Madrid.

Cruyff, who played 238 matches for Barcelona since joining them in August, 1973, was not able to crown his farewell with a goal.

But he did the next best thing, laying on the decisive goal for the Brazilian Bio after a typical jinking, dribbling run which left three defenders bemused in his wake.

Astonishing ball control, intelligent direction of the game and a fierce acceleration of pace were his hallmarks and he unwrapped them all.

Cruyff's retirement was long announced and despite being courted and cajoled by managers and fans alike he has remained adamant that it is his last competitive match.

Cruyff, who won world fame with Ajax of Amsterdam before being transferred to Barcelona for a world record


