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NATIONAL PHILIPS LEAGUE ROUND-UP

Fitzroy Flatten Marconi

MELBOURNE — League leaders, Marconi, crashed to their first defeat of the season and their biggest loss ever in the Philips League, when they were beaten 4-1 by Fitzroy United.

About 12,000 delirious fans saw the home club gain revenge for last year's humiliating 8-1 defeat by Marconi.

Fitzroy stunned Marconi after only 13 minutes with a goal that electrified the big crowd.

Mid-fielder, Jim Campbell, split Marconi's defence wide open with a long ball to overlapping full-back, Jim Tansey, whose pin-point cross was truly finished off by Branko Buljevic.

After 27 minutes, Gary Cole put Fitzroy further ahead with a volley, after Marconi defender, Gary Byrne, had blocked a shot by Andy Bozikas.

Marconi were continually caught out by Fitzroy's long, raking passes.

Two minutes from the interval Andy Bozikas seemed certain to score as he raced towards the penalty area.

But with a diving tackle, Ray Richards, brought him down just outside the box.

Richards was booked for the offence but Fitzroy's disappointment turned to joy within seconds.

Striker, Gary Cole broke clear on the right in the dying seconds of the half.

Alan Maher parried his shot and then

blocked a second.

But an alert Buljevic latched onto the rebound, slipped a square ball to Campbell who cracked it past Maher from close

Fitzroy started the second half in devastating style to go four goals up with a shot from striker Andy Bozikas.

But veteran, Ray Richards, rescued some of Marconi's lost prestige with a glancing

header after 54 minutes.

In typical fighting spirit Richards, forced his way through a crowded Fitzroy area to glance home a perfect header past Peter Blasby.

Richards effort transformed Marconi and for 20 minutes they put Fitzroy's goal under siege.

the defence held, and Fitzroy slowly came back to dominate again, right through theclosing stages.

Olympic Outed

SYDNEY — A questionable free kick and a sleepy Sydney Olympic defence enabled South Melbourne to record a valuable 2-1 win at Erskineville Oval.

In the sixth minute South Melbourne were lucky to be awarded a free kick just outside Olympic's penalty area when defender Stuart Markland challenged for the ball.

Diminutive winger George Campbell flighted his free-kick around the wall, with Olympic goal keeper Herc Karakostas completely failing in anticipation.

South Melbourne took a further lead in the 29th minute.

Olympic central defender Ken Wilson stopped the ball with an outstretched arm. and Bert Lutton's delicately placed freekick was swept into goal on the volley by Duncan Cummings.

Con Davourlis put Olympic back in the picture with a rising shot into the roof of the net after he and Bill Pirie had worked a classical 1-2 movement right on halftime.

The game too often was a stop-start affair as referee Barry Wilkinson failed to keep it flowing and the Erskineville surface was far too bumpy for Philips League football.

The second half provided much more competition. Olympic however went through the middle too often where South Melbourne defenders Chris Kalafatidis and Stuart Baxter were utterly supreme in the

Pirie constantly had two men tailing him and received a poor service from his own four man midfield.

Had he moved around more freely, the South Melbourne defence might have been breached more often.

St. George played their guest goalkeeper, Ray Clemence but even the England international couldn't stop a third minute penalty by Con Kampas.

Barry Reynolds, West Adelaide's overlapping fullback dashed into the area and in a desperate attempt Neville Morgan tugged at his shirt and held him back. Referee Henry Witschge gave the penalty and all eyes wanted to see if Clemence could pull off a fairy tale save.

Unfortunately he couldn't as Kampas calmly put the ball into the bottom right

Neither side had many real chances with West Adelaide's midfield having slightly the better of possession, but wasting it just as frequently as St. George.

Saints looked totally dejected after the early goal and even the usually vibrant Phil O'Connor on the wing was subdued.





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AMPOL CUP FIRST ROUND POST MORTEM

MATCH one got underway at Perry Park on the Friday night with Wynnum coach Billy Bryant's pre-match confidence of upsetting the Cup holders Spencer Park United quite obvious. This was despite the usual allegations of team stacking on the part of Spencer Park by some Wynnum supporters. The complaints were quite unfounded as Rathmell and Lavelle have been out of the P.S.L. for some time through injury and Echeverria had been missing for some time because of loss of form

At any rate the Wynnum pessimists became even more downcast when the Echeverria-Ibanez combination struck early to enable the latter to despatch a well taken effort to put the Cup holders seemingly well on the way to defending their title. But as most of the Wynnum side has had long spells playing in first division it was not surprising that Big Billy's urgings stoked them up sufficiently to set up a 2-1 halftime lead, the first coming from Nigel Rehbock's neat header from a great left wing cross and the second a boomer from Peter Lelliott which left Bob Barlow floundering. Following the shock of Wynnum's goal-scoring explosion, the subsequent St. George-Redlands Cup tie paled by comparison. Billy Webb's team of youngsters were never really in the hunt and St. George, with Glen Berry back in the firing line, had it well sewn up with a 2-0 half-time lead.

The first of three Ampol Cup ties on the Sunday, opened with Thistle moving the ball around man to man and it wasn't long before they opened the scoring,

How can a referee who is 10 yards from an incident take a decision from a linesman who is more than 40 yards from the same incident? Who's in charge of the game? Also, when are our officials going to stop panicking about time—don't they have stopwatches. When the watch is stopped no one loses and the injured player can be treated properly. I had two players who stopped full

I had two players who stopped full blooded drives in their private parts. Anyone who has played this game and sustained this injury knows how painful it can be, and there is nothing worse than a referee pressuring a trainer to either get the player on his feet or off the field.

Anyone knows the player will want to stay on the field whether he's right or not. Again I say stop the watch and no one suffers, and players, who are the lifeblood of this game can be taken care of. Intimidation does not earn a referee respect so in reply to the official who spoke to me on this subject, when I see a ref, have a good game I will only be too pleased to go into print and say so.

Letter to the Editor

Dear Sir,

Thank you for printing my previous letter. Your "Insideman Replies" seems to indicate that I have struck a raw nerve there somewhere.

My intention in writing my last letter was to bring across my belief that the benefit gained from a few school teams cannot be compared with the gains club football receives from junior soccer. That benefit is not only brought about by the players that do make it from the junior ranks into senior football (and there are quite a few of them) but also by the club supporters, members, referees and administrators that have come from junior soccer and will continue to come from there in increasing numbers.

Junior soccer is the only growth area in Queensland soccer at the moment. Let us understand the meaning of this and try together to reap the benefits. Some people here seem to have a very deepseated inferiority complex—anything made or grown somewhere else is hailed as an

instant success, while the local products are bypassed and denigrated. So the statement by your "Insideman" that our "dream of Australian players for Australian teams is just not on" is assured of spontaneous applause from this section.

But I still believe that our future PSL and State League stars 10 years from now are playing junior soccer right here now in Brisbane and Ipswich and not school soccer in England. If the English school competition is the success it is made out to be, why pray tell, Mr. Insideman are there so many Irish, Scottish and players from other nationalities (yes, even Australians) playing first division soccer in England. The accusation made most often against our junior soccer setup is that too much pressure is applied to the junior players. Yes there is pressure, no denying that, but that pressure varies greatly between clubs and even between different grades in each club.

So each boy, and in the lower grades the parents, decide where they play and how much pressure or discipline they are prepared to take. Movement between clubs is unrestricted up to June 1 each year. Soccer above all is a team sport and junior players must be taught to accept the discipline and responsibility each position in the team requires. Surely Mr. Insideman does not suggest this does not apply to school soccer also.

Honestly, Mr. Insideman, do you really believe that at the age of 15 or 16 junior players should be good enough to replace players of 20-22 or 24-26 who have anything from two to eight years of top football behind them? What sort of system could possibly do THAT? Perhaps a "healthy school competition?" Certainly not Mr. Insideman but in saying that we are getting very close to the crux of our problem and that is not the pressure applied, but, I believe, the quite unreal demands that some of our senior soccer people put on the junior sector.

At the age of 15 or 16 these boys should not have to compete for the top spots in the teams but senior officials should make available to them, the expert training and coaching that is needed to help them realise their full potential.

I believe this is the job of senior and not junior clubs. No, Mr. Insideman, I do not agree with your assertion that junior soccer is a failure nor has anyone who has heard me talk, ever told me I was an orator, clever or not. I might not see the distinction between a few trees and a forest but I have seen a lot of

soccer players, and I know, they all start the same by kicking a ball around and loving it.

This is what we are trying to do at the junior level, to provide as many as possible with the opportunity to play soccer. If the senior soccer administrators do not take advantage of this system, why debit us? Why blame us if a 15 or 16 year old is told by seniors that he is "just not good enough" and chooses to go surfing? Yes, I do have suggestions, which I fell might help us improve our standards although I fear they will hardly get any further than you and me (and perhaps the Police Commissioner Terry Lewis):

- 1 Abolish rep. teams before under 15 age group.
- 2 Junior soccer should not run any teams past under 16 age group. Senior clubs should be responsible for training and running teams from under 17 upwards.
- 3 The Queensland Coaches Federation should work out a test. A level of desirable achievement should be worked out and all boys encouraged to reach this level.

Above all, it would help no end, Mr. Insideman, if perhaps with your assistance we could organise a meeting at which all interested parties from the senior and junior levels could find out what they really expect from each other, discuss their differences and maybe even come a little bit closer in understanding their different points of view.

I certainly believe that all of us have in the love for soccer something that is far greater than anything dividing us.


One of the men who played a major role in the two victories, scoring twice against Olympic, and who also was one of City's best in the unlucky loss to Lions was centre forward Alan Marley.



CHASING THE DOUBLE

(LIONS v EASTS HAKOAH)

LIONS went on to Perry Park last Saturday night to see if they could do "the double", having beaten Hakoah 3-1 at season's beginning. Hakoah went on knowing that defeat would see Lions climb over them in the league table, so there was no excuse for a non-game. Brisbane people not yet convinced that soccer is a much better game played at night (in our climate) did not turn up in their usual numbers to watch the game but that is to their detriment for the teams put on a real professional show, Lions great defence performing like a well oiled machine, Hakoah's attack orientated players pitting their immense wealth of ball talent against this veritable rock. Brisbane soccer has come an awful long way this last twelve months and Philips League games, at this particular level, are now reaching a level of technique and skill as to be on a par with many of the games we see on T.V. They must not be as exciting as these professionally edited highlights we see pushed on the Big Match, but the discerning spectator will see many, many features that could be straight from the magic box. This game was no exception, and to be critical for criticisms sake would be doing soccer a dis-service. Mistakes were made, these always are part of any game but "Go Soccer" would like to pass comment on what might have been, not by cutting to ribbons, but by constructive thoughts.

Lion's defence is now a tight, well knit unit, not the back-four, we are talking of the total philosophy of defence where everyone drops back behind the ball, gains possession, and begins to attack again. The great clubs of the world now employ this tactic and it requires a tremendous amount of discipline and understanding to perform. Lions have this. However it also requires a tremendous amount of quick movement of both player and ball if successful attack is to be achieved and it is here Lions are failing to be consistent not so much by bad play as by, we feel, personnel being used in wrong positions. Last Saturday night saw Geoff Morris reinstated to the forward line in name but not in position as he, Morris, is now habitually playing so deep as to be another midfielder. This leaves the forwards extremely narrow in attack and also slows the build up. Alan Hughes playing in mid-field is a player who loves to hold a ball and attack a man, a trait probably instilled

in him as a youngster in his native Scotland. Saturday night it was a trait that cost Lions possession time after time, again choking the attack. John Neale who recently gave us glimpses of his true form, on the wing against Dundee, was also played in mid-field where his work rate is tremendous but lack of "tight situation" ball skills again causes occasional problems. To see Spearritt time and time again move forward and never receiving good returns is most frustrating and in fact could cause the accusation of "negative soccer players" being levelled at Lions. Gyula Vincze has worked wonders with this unit, against City he saw fit to employ Ontong and Laslo on the wings giving the side pace and aggression where it mattered. The team won 1-0. Against Hakoah we felt the same could have been achieved and it was not until Ontong came on late in the second half the Lions once again began to show the necessary surge, on the break, to get behind the defence. Unfortunatly by that time Fairbrother had tired from his constant bombardment against O'Connor and the surge did not have the required effect. There is not far to go for this team, we feel with Neale, Ontong or Laslo used on the flanks, Morris teaming up with Spearritt and a "first time" pass-ing Hughes this eleven would "break" with the necessary pace and aggression to deliver the goods.

Hakoah are a side on the verge of greatness. Every player is a top class tradesman and if any criticism is to be laid it must be again at player deployment. These last two seasons has seen the "conversion" of Murray Barnes to a mid-field player ostensibly to come from behind and pick up goals, but Murray like most Australian born players does not really have "the vision" to consistently capitalise on this play. Such is the man's grace, speed balance, heading power and aggressiveness that he is the most natural centre forward in the Hakoah side. Their game is simple, uncomplicated, highly skilled and so natural that the moving of Campbell to his natural wing position, Barnes to centre forward, and the skilful Watson into midfield would give this team a balanced, powerful, hard-hitting look that it doesn't have at the moment, and that is tragedy indeed, this team deserves so much more than it gets at present for all its good work.


