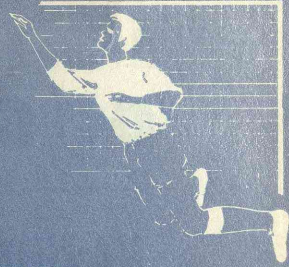

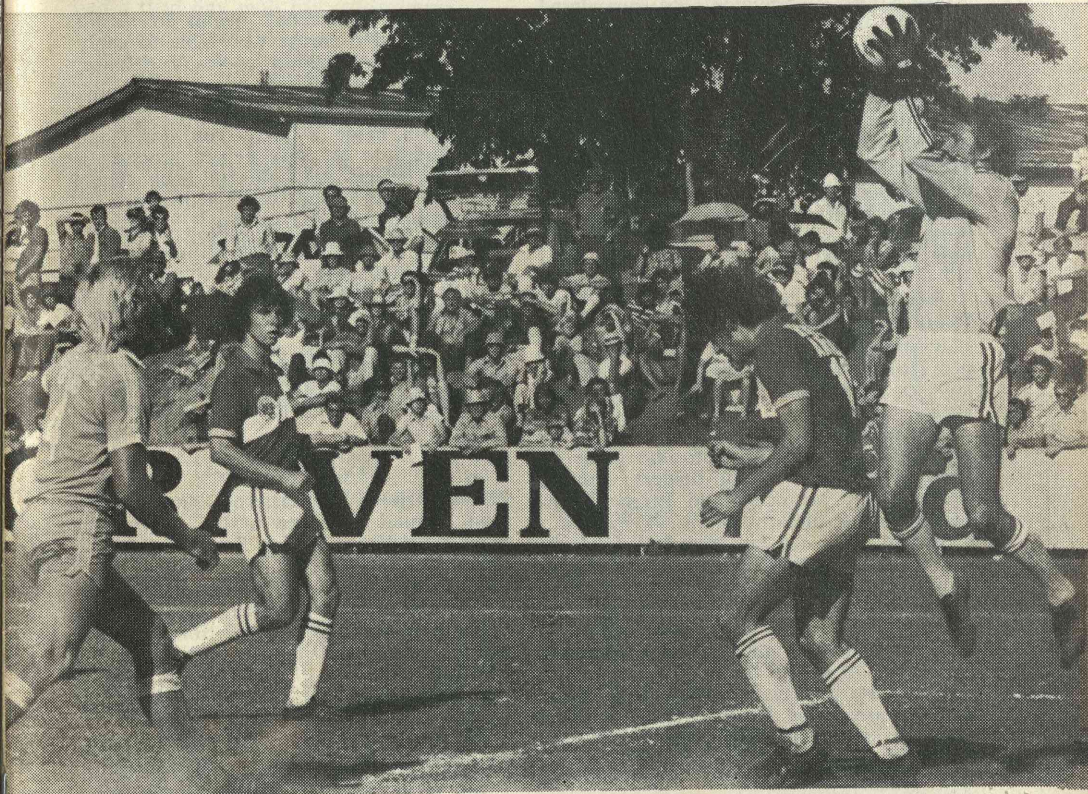

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NATIONAL PHILIPS LEAGUE ROUND-UP

City Came Back

ADELAIDE — Adelaide City squandered a great chance to go on a goal-scoring spree against depleted Brisbane City side at Adelaide's Olympic Sports field.

Brisbane City had two players in the Australian squad playing against Greece and were forced to make two substitutions midway through the game.

The Queenslanders found themselves 3 goals down after an explosive ten minute burst by the home side late in the first half, but fought back magnificently to lose 3-2.

Adelaide played patchy football and frequently looked shaky in defence.

Brisbane's nippy mid-fielder Willie Conner looked dangerous early and was the key to a number of positive moves in attack.

But when Conner was forced to come off injured 29 minutes into the game, it allowed Adelaide's mid-fielders Johnny Perin, Garry Marocchi and Brian Northcote to dictate play.

Within the next ten minutes, Adelaide played their best football to overwhelm Brisbane.

In the 32nd minute, Northcote set up a chance for Marocchi but the ball rebounded against the upright and back to Dixie Deans to slot it into the net.

Northcote was again the architect in the 40th minute when he lobbed a high ball into the area. The ball went through the hands of Brisbane goalkeeper Bob Barlow and fell to Marocchi, who made no mistake from six metres.

A minute later, Adelaide swarmed forward again and a neat combination between Johnny Nyskohus and Deans resulted in Deans' second goal.

Adelaide opened the second half stylishly and for the first 15 minutes looked like annihilating Brisbane.

Marocchi, Perin and Northcote created numerous chances for their forwards but poor finishing at critical stages let Adelaide down.

Within the first ten minutes, Adelaide should have been six in front but for woe-ful misses in front of goal by Marocchi and

Jim Muir and a desperate off the line clearance by Brisbane City defender Frank Pimblett from a Dean' header.

However complacency began to set in mid-field and Brisbane were able to apply pressure on Adelaide's unsteady defence.

Their first breakthrough came in the 69th minute when mid-fielder Roberto Echeverria made a great run down the right and into the box before crossing a low ball which Adelaide full-back Bugsy Nyskohus mis-kicked into his own net.

They looked to be in with a chance of stealing a point in the 75th minute when a fierce ground shot from defender John Lavelle found its way through a tangle of legs and into the bottom left hand corner of the goal.

Only stout defending from Adelaide defender John Besir and Frank Lister repelled the constant wave of Brisbane attacks.

New Punch

MELBOURNE — Eastern Suburbs came from behind to force a 1-1 draw with Fitzroy in their Phillips Soccer match at Olympic Park.

East's second half recovery from 1-0 down at half-time began when coach Gerry Chaldi thrust Mark Trenter forward, and pulled Bobby Smith back into defence.

The switch added new punch to East's attack which put the Fitzroy goal under siege.

Arthur MacMillan headed off the line with goal keeper, Peter Blasby, beaten.

But East's reward wasn't long delayed. After 77 minutes, striker Ian Souness, took an indirect free kick from just inside the penalty area.

Ernie Campbell met the ball perfectly with a fierce header that gave Blasby no chance.

Fitzroy had taken the lead seven minutes before the interval through Socceroo defender, Jim Tansey.

East's goalkeeper Tony Pezzano was caught well out of position when Gary Cole completely missed his shot.

The ball finally ran to Tansey who just managed to push it past defender Kevin Mullen into the far corner of the net.

Fitzroy's performance lacked the power drive that had taken the club through eight weeks without defeat.

Slack marking in the Fitzroy defence always threatened to give East's scoring opportunities.

Hilton Silva also played brilliantly on the wing, but the rest of East's attack lacked penetration until Trenter arrived. The top of the table clash rarely lived up to its star billing.

Tempers flared right through the second half and referee McDermott of Canberra had a field day with his yellow cards.

Fitzroy's Ken Taylor was the first to be reported and his team-mate Jim O'Reilly, followed him after 70 minutes.

Two minutes later it was the turn of Eastern Suburbs defender, Henry Mowbray.

But within 10 minutes two other Fitzroy players were also reported.

They were defender Bobby Provan, and the Fitzroy captain, Pat Bannon.

Header for a Draw

NEWCASTLE — A headed goal by defender Bill Summerscales gave Newcastle a one all draw with South Melbourne in the Philips Soccer League match in Newcastle.

The home side trailed from a Duncan Cummings' goal until Summerscales out-jumped the defence to score from a corner kick in the 71st minute.

South Melbourne hit the lead in the 62nd minute after the match had been scoreless at half-time.

The game came alive when Cummings broke through against the flow of play to open the scoring.

Newcastle came back with the equaliser which triggered a final 20 minutes of exciting play.

Wollongong Moves

Wollongong could have a team in the Philips Soccer League within eighteen months, following a meeting of administrators at Fraternity Bowling Club.

Representatives of the Illawarra Soccer Association and the Illawarra Junior body attended the meeting and promised full support for the proposed new team.

Organisers have already contacted P.S.L. manager John Franks to get a run down on the financial requirements of the League.

Fraternity Bowling Club, one of the richest licenced clubs in Illawarra, is backing the operation.

The club has already written to Wollongong City Council seeking a lease on Bradon Park, a new ground being developed close to the club.

Club officials say a ground is the biggest problem at the moment.

At least two major national sponsors have indicated they would back a P.S.L. team in Wollongong, but a ground must be developed as top priority.

Fraternity club are likely to spend ten thousand dollars as an initial sponsorship to help build up a ground into a top class Soccer Stadium.

Frank has advised organisers in Wollongong to have talks with officials of the Newcastle United club.

He said Newcastle is in the best position to advise Wollongong after being accepted into the League earlier this year.

He also warned the Wollongong organisation that entry into the P.S.L. means many months of hard work, but added that if the bid is successful Wollongong would be welcomed with open arms.

Frank said a viable P.S.L. operation in Wollongong will be a big asset to Australian Soccer and he has promised to give any assistance he can.

SHOULDER'S SWANSONG

SYDNEY—Jimmy Shoulder's last duty as Australian National coach ended in a 1-1 draw with Greece after Murray Barnes converted a 77th minute face saving penalty at the Sydney Cricket Ground.

An uncombative Australian Team trailed 0-1 from the 12th minute, when midfielder Petros Karavitis drove in a glorious angled goal for Greece.

The Greeks vigorously disputed the awarding of the penalty, but Melbourne referee David Yelland had no doubt that Greek defender Petros Ravousis pulled back Australian striker Joe Senkalski.

Senkalski was bearing down on the Greek goal following a cross flighted over by left-winger Phil O'Connor.

The black bearded Murray Barnes strode up to whip the penalty into the roof of the Greek net before goal keeper Nicolaos Christidis had a chance to move.

Shoulder brought St. George's George Harris into his defence for Paul Degney, and Canberra City striker John Davies replaced Peter Sharne in the attack.

Degney and Sharne had caused a sensation by not joining the Australian team's camp on Saturday and playing for their club Marconi.

The incident also resulted in a two thousand dollar fine being imposed on the club.

The game was largely a non-event until the penalty incident, and it reflected Shoulder's attitude that the result did not matter.

After the penalty there was a nasty altercation involving Murray Barnes and Greek right-back John Kyrastas.

Both Harris and the very talented Davies had played full Philip's League matches the previous day.

Phil O'Connor left his bed to join the team and although still hampered by influenza he infused life into the Australian attack when he came on the 60th minute.

Australian striker Senkalski had been out of club football for three weeks and did nothing to justify his selection.

Goalkeeper Gary Meier and striker John Karaspyros were given the chance of a run in the second half, as substitutes.

The whole first half produced only one close effort by the Australians when Barnes' header skirted across the bar in the 29th minute.

Greek coach Alketas Panagoulis said after the match that he was satisfied with his team over the three-match tour which was a build up for the European Cup clash with Russia.

Shoulder, said he was very pleased with his team under the circumstances.

LAST Friday, at Lanham Park, Grange Thistle struggled to a 1-1 draw with a very determined Annerley. On a night that was not conducive to good football watching, being a very cold night with fairly blustery westerlies blowing, the match didn't really get off the ground.

Annerley being near the foot of the table played with more determination and aggression, (not always legal.)

The second half was not much better, Thistle persisted in long balls out of their half to no-one in particular and Annerley persisted in their appeals for free kicks.

The one and only highlight in the second 45 minutes came from an overlap down the left by Thistle's Davy Jones, and while Annerley claimed for offside on no-one in particular, Jones hit the ball from 22 metres giving John Ferguson no chance at all.

This would have to be the dreariest 90 minutes of 1st division football seen to date. Thistle were hustled out of their rhythm by a desperate Annerley, and did not at any stage look the force they should be.

All we ask is that boys play to the best of their ability without recourse to unfair play or tactics.

To ensure our older boys reach senior status with the correct mental attitude and top physical ability we have appointed Eric Thompson from our First division squad to the position of Junior Director of coaching. Followers of first division soccer will no doubt be aware of Eric's ability on the field. His reputation and per-

sonal approach have made him a winner with the boys and with many of their parents too.

As well as his commitment to the juniors Eric is coach of our Senior Colts team. This is a very young side, but, through their coach, the boys are learning an invaluable lesson for their future—professionalism.

Our ninth division side is plugging along the boys enjoying themselves immensely. They are led by a very modest Dave Plesler who describes himself as Coach, manager, trainer, orange boy and star reserve. In his spare time Dave is also our Club Secretary and, with his wife May, lessee of our Canteen.

Showing the depth of talent we have on the Mountain, our Sixth division boys are right in there nudging at the top of the ladder. Last weekend saw St. Helens travel across to meet us at home. To the delight of the local fans we toppled them from first position though they still have a couple of games up their sleeve. The result 2-1. Goals for Mt. Gravatt were an own goal by St. Helens following a touch from a Dave Costa boomer and one by Robert Christopher from a free. Ricky

Kitching from Saints scored his team's goal from the spot.

After a fairly slow start to the season our first division team is beginning to show its true colours.

Last weekend the Ipswich boys came to Dittmer to avenge their first round 3-2 defeat. The game caused a considerable amount of interest because of Ipswich's contention for the top spot on the ladder. However their hopes were dashed when John Ferguson, who had been roving in the mid-field, swooped on a loose ball and sent it crashing into the back of the net.

Although it was a good fast-moving game, neither side allowed the other many goal scoring opportunities. Only 2 real chances come to mind. One started with a floating pass from Harry Stewart out wide on the right which found the outstretched foot of Gary Bohan. The result was a roar of anguish as the ball drifted tantalisingly just outside the left hand upright. Not long after that, Ipswich were very unlucky not to pick up a point. Gavin Johnston took the ball in a position which the whole of the Mt. Gravatt defence thought was offside. However, linesman and referee were both in good position to

see the move and waved him on. His shot from twenty-five metres passed over the outstretched arms of the advancing Mark Davis only to graze the bar and pass over for a goal kick.

The results of the day's football could not have made the Mt. Gravatt players and supporters happier but a few unfortunate incidents dulled their delight. Two minutes before half time Mike Brzowski jumped for a header. He got the ball away but came down on the leg which had caused him trouble early in the season. Although he hobbled around to finish the half he had to be replaced during the changeover. As if that wasn't enough, 3 minutes before full time, Davey Blackadder, who has worked hard to get back to peak condition, was brought down and was taken to hospital with a suspected broken leg. True to form he still had a grin on his face as they loaded him into the ambulance.

They say all misadventures come in threes and this was certainly the case for us on Sunday 18 June. To top off the field mishaps, Harry Stewart found as he was preparing to leave for home that his father's car had been stolen from outside the ground.

On the whole the day held a mixed bag of fortunes. However the boys are now putting it all together and looking forward to the future with a confidence born of winning and determination to confirm by results their management committee's faith in them in nominating for State League for 1979.

TARINGA TRIUMPH

TARINGA travelled to Runcorn to take on Souths, who, like themselves have been running a bit hot and cold, and with Souths new acquisitions, Kenny Beckett from Merton and Billy Haigh from Mt. The game opened brightly with Taringa pushing the ball around and it wasn't long before ex-Lions goalkeeper John Hardaker was brought into action. Steve Bristow suddenly broke through the backline and took the ball up to the big keeper before slipping it wide, but Hardaker threw himself wide and managed to snatch the ball back. A great save. A few minutes later Bristow had the same move and this time made no mistake. Kenny Beckett was finding old campaigner Arrowsmiths ball skills a problem and Taringa looked as if they might add to their

score, but always the crossballs found Hardaker supreme.

Glen Davis was closing Billy Haigh out of the game and by half time Souths goal chances had been few and far between, mostly isolated breaks by fast moving individuals, rather than built up concentrations. Don't know what John Ferguson said at half time, but Souths came much more into the game and began to show skills in switching the ball from wing to wing and only some good defence by Martin and Larsen prevented a score. However they were throwing too many forward and in a good move down the Taringa right flank, the ball was finally played into Arrowsmith who had wandered into the centre-forward position. The man showed his experience by playing the ball high into the "postage stamp" but was aided by a defender who deflected the ball 8 yards into the opposite corner from where the ball was heading. 2-0 and the Taringa defence now closed the gate completely, absorbing everything the guile of Haigh could dream up. In the closing minutes Bowen was forced into a great diving save that was cleared by some good cover defence. This was the dying effort and the 2-0 result stood to the end. An entertaining game, well handled by officials, who, after a "whistly" start allowed the game to "flow" as much as possible. AFTER seeing the Ipswich United game at Perry Park I was sure that I would never again see a Merton first division team perform so badly. How wrong I was. 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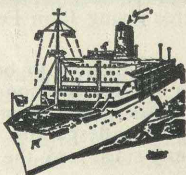
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are quite capable of good attractive football, yet they regularly come up with performances, which would disgrace even schoolboys.

Not one real chance was created by Merton. The only time the North Brisbane goalkeeper was called on for a save was in the first ten minutes of the game when he was forced to turn a Gerry Kay spectacular around the post. This was a shot from the edge of the box through the North Brisbane defence and could hardly have been described as a chance created by Merton.

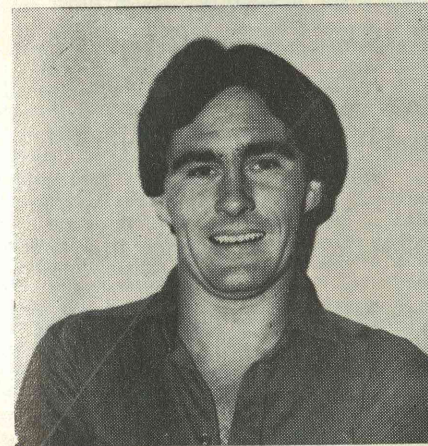

Who among us can forget that memorable Cup Final meeting between the two foes last year when City took out the Cup on penalty kicks, but not before even the kicking competition gave us more than its fair share of high drama and controversy?

How does GO SOCCER see this meeting? Three weeks ago wouldn't have fetched a penny stamp for City's chances despite their renowned fighting spirit, for Marconi were going along on their merry way, top of the League seemingly indestructible and fully deserving the title of Rasic's "Super Raiders" such was their skill, experience and of course their goal-scoring record spoke for itself. Now the story has changed some. Marconi have lost two of their last three games, Fitzroy and Footscray taking the points, and in the "in between" game Lions were extremely unlucky to drop two points to the "super team" scoring two of the goals for them and losing out on a penalty decision that was diabolical refereeing to say the least.
