

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NATIONAL PHILIPS LEAGUE ROUND-UP

Marconi Murdered

ADELAIDE — Adelaide City crushed Philips Soccer League leaders Marconi 4-0 in a crucial match at Olympic Sports

Adelaide City led 1-0 at half time and swamped Marconi with three perfectly executed second half goals.

Marconi, who plunged to their third defeat in four matches, were only a shadow of the side which looked hot favourites to win the title earlier in the

Socceroo Johnny Nyskohus shot Adelaide City ahead with a 35 minute piledriver which Alan Maher did not see until it hit the back of the net.

Nyskohus struck again in the 50th minute with a great opportunist goal.

The tiny striker sped through Marconi's defence, evaded a tackle on the edge of the penalty area, side-stepped Maher and slipped the ball into the open goal.

With Adelaide City dominating the midfield, Marconi's strikers saw little of the ball and it was no surprise when Adelaide City struck for the third time.

Scottish striker Dixie Deans sparked off the move when he brilliantly flicked a header to Northcote, who shot from ten metres but needed another as he lashed the rebound past Alan Maher in the 65th minute.

Adelaide City, content to hold onto their lead, allowed Marconi to come back into the game but their defence

But brilliant mid-fielder John Perin put the issue beyond doubt with a powerful swerving shot from a tight angle five minutes from the end.

Marconi, realising that they could salvage little from the game always looked as if they would concede another goal but Adelaide City were denied a fifth goal by some very casual attacking moves.

Marconi still lead the League by two points from West Adelaide, who went down to Brisbane Lions - their first defeat in nine matches.

Fitzroy Firing

MELBOURNE - Fitzroy strengthened its claim to a place in the Philips League top four by beating South Melbourne 4-1 in the clash at Olympic Park.

Fitzrov, unbeaten for ten weeks now has 21 points, the same total as South Melbourne, which held third place before the game.

Fitzrov's victory was inspired by the brilliance of Branko Buljevic in attack, Jim Campbell and Ken Taylor in mid field and Jim Tansey at left-back.

Fitzroy fought back gallantly after Souths went into the lead in the sixth minute when Billy Rogers scored after goal-keeper, Peter Blasby had missed a cross from Sammy Wright.

South looked so good early in the game, but gradually Taylor, Tansey and Pat Bannon stole the limelight in mid field and the match swung Fitzroy's way.

In the 23rd minute Arthur McMillan was fouled just outside the penalty area.

The free kick, taken by Bannon, was headed by Buljevic down to the feet of Campbell whose shot went into the net off the foot of a defender.

Dynamic forward, George Campbell, was the only South Melbourne player to remain dangerous throughout the match but his best shot was stopped by Blasby's diving save in the 27th minute.

South's coach, Dave Maclaren, tried to pep up his attack by bringing on striker, Bobby McGuinness for George Christopoulos, after half time.

However McGuinness had only one scoring attempt — a header which was saved by Blasby.

Fitzroy went further ahead in the 57th minute. Andy Bozikas brought the ball

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Goalkeeper, Jack Reilly failed to stop Campbell's shot leaving Buljevic to nip in and score.

Five minutes later, Campbell sent over a perfect cross to the middle where Buljevic, who had eluded South defenders, headed into the net to make the score 3-1. Fitzroy lost Taylor through injury in the 69th minute but Mike Micevski proved a capable replacement.

After some brief death throes by South Melbourne, Fitzroy struck again — this time through right back, Arthur MacMillan who ran from the half line before slamming home the fourth goal from an acute angle. Seconds earlier Gary Cole had broken away on a 20 metre run but his shot was blocked by Reilly who came out to narrow the angle.

First for Marston

SYDNEY — The difference between winning and losing was never more dramatically illustrated than when Allan Ainslie scored the winning goal in Sydney Olympic's 2-1 victory over St. George at Barton

Ainslie's goal came with just 30 seconds of ordinary time remaining.

Olympic right back Dave McIntosh produced a low cross, striker Billy Pirie could not aim a clear shot out of the mud, so Ainslie took over to net from 12 metres out.

Only ten minutes before, Saints coach Joe Vlasits replaced Rafael Tonanez with Robert O'Shea.

Vlasits' instructions were to blanket out Ainslie but the move failed due to a superlative display from Ainslie on the heavy pitch.

Three times previously in the second half Ainslie had Saints under almost unbearable pressure.

His inswinging corner kick in the 50th minute deceived the St. George defenders, allowing Alec Jamieson to head home Olympic's first goal.

The game produced some good football in spite of atrocious conditions and proved that the new Barton Park is a big asset to the code. The opening goal fell to St. George winger Peter Hensman in the 36th minute.

A piece of Phil O'Connor trickery along the left wing confused the Olympic

He unloaded to Hensman, who swept the ball in from only two metres out on

down on his chest and pushed it to the far post, covering his shot with his body to make certain of the result.

> O'Connor played much the same role for St. George as Ainslie did for Olympic.

> Saints managed to camp in Olympic territory for a deal of the second half but their finishing lacked venom against a determined Olympic rearguard.

> Although Olympic failed to feed Billy Pirie with enough of the ball, the club's latest coach, former international Joe Marston, had reason to be more than satisfied with the result.

Perry Park - The Future

WHAT lies ahead of Perry Park, an establishment, that back in 1969 seemed to be the greatest step forward our soccer had taken. The next few years seemed to bear out this confidence and crowds of 3,000-5,000 were commonplace with clubs like Hellenic, Azzuri, Merton Latrobe and Hollandia providing entertainment and excitement that added something to the stadium and made the future look rosy. However at that time none of the above clubs had their own grounds, Heath Park and Spencer Park being little better than training grounds with next to no facilities for the public.

However we were in the affluent 60's and these clubs, along with Grange Thistle, St. Helens, Coalstars were all looking ahead and eyeing up the future when it would be reasonable to expect that clubhouses could return revenue, and with this in mind "miniature clubhouses" were built, and clubs began to establish committees within their organisations whose job was to seek out ways of establishing bigger and better facilities for their members.

Today, ten years later, we have Richlands, Spencer Park, Lanham Park, Bundamba, Ebbw Vale and Heath Park, all developed or nearing development, to an extent unthinkable a few short years ago. Mt. Gravatt having levelled Dittmer Park will no doubt be looking at a clubhouse now and their committee is too well organised to be retarded for long. These clubhouses, like it or not, will become direct opposition to the headquarters at Perry Park and a huge question mark now has been placed against the future of the

ground and facilities at Abbotsford Road. Southside Eagles and North Brisbane are purported to be State League possibilities and there is no doubt the fact that these clubs have no home ground will not act against them as one would imagine, but in fact they will be encouraged to use headquarters as a home ground. However the question then arises, would any of these clubs generate the support needed to supply the income required to keep up the stadium and it's environs or converse to that how long will it be before both teams backed by wealthy ethnic clubs, begin to look around at vacant grounds near these clubs and think of developing them. It does not take much imagination to see North Brisbane playing at a revamped Dunmore Park, a bare 400 yards from the Polish Club or Eagles using Pineapple Park which is almost on the back steps of the German Club.

The present legislation that says Brisbane City and Lions must use Perry Park cannot last forever, people, normally regulars at Perry Park are gradually drifting away and nothing is being done to stop the rot. The Management Committee look to the two clubs and the clubs look to the Management Committee, the eternal impasse. While crowds of 4,000 were coming along Perry Park was the logical choice, but now that the crowds have dropped off, City and Lions must be looking at cost-savings, revenue return, and the feasibility of using their own grounds. These two clubs, travelling around Australia, have visited, seen, and talked to officials from clubs, where every cent generated at a home game is ploughed back into the club's coffers.

Compare this with Lions and City. Not only are they paying rent for the ground but they have absolutely no income from food, drinks or any other revenue return centre normally associated with a soccer crowd. They are in fact subsidising Perry Park to such an extent that their supporters are at present paying for the seat cover to the tune of 50c a head. With normal profit margins on food and drink the loss in profit to each club would easily run into \$2,000 a week from a normal 3,000 crowd. Can our two Philips League clubs afford this loss of income?, this scribe thinks not and feels, with the near completion of the clubhouse in Newmarket and the crowd capability at Richlands it is only a matter of time before the "big two" call enough, not necessarily because they want to but because they have to. Another argument arising is, that with both grounds Spencer Park and Richlands, being in high density population areas both clubs on the long term would draw more people on a Sunday afternoon than they do at present. The housed population around Spencer Park is enormous and with Inala on Richlands doorstep who can argue with conviction that both clubs would not get more than the present 2-3,000. Economically a crowd of 1,500 at either ground would return more finance to the club, as both clubs would "pull" every dollar spent by spectators into their coffers and here is no doubt that would more than make up for the gate takings of the extra 500 spectators.

So we come to the posed question. What is the future for Perry Park. In the present day stadiums are an enormous cost factor hanging round the necks of people involved. Lang Park, the home of Rugby League is a dead loss financially, the new stand simply rehousing, at a higher level, people who used to sit in the other stand. The ground does not now fill to capacity even on a Qld. v N.S.W. game and clubs are forced by some obscure legislation (that threat again) to use it on the weekend. Ballymore, on a Saturday afternoon club fixture resembles the Myer bowl in Melbourne, the shouts of the players echoing all over Herston from the empty stand.

The Rugby Union people, always the shrewd businessmen, have already recognised this and now promote the Queensland team as a weekly drawcard, a really shrewd piece of management. We in soccer cannot compete with this set-up, we cannot even fix up one game for the Queensland team, never mind a series of games so the saving of Perry Park as a soccer stadium doesn't appear to lie in Ballymore's actions.

Australian Rules have long since given away the idea of headquarters and simply hire another mausoleum, the Cricket Ground, whenever they want to put on a big show. This is another shrewd piece of thinking and shows a great deal of common sense on the part of the people who encouraged the "big clubs" of Rules to

set up their own grounds.

So it could be said "Headquarters" have become a tremendous drain on the financial resources of any federation. Perry Park has not been the success everyone thought it would be. No doubt the City Council have seen what was an evesore converted into a place of relative beauty and businessmen have another place where they can gather to swop yarns and drink a few drinks and eat a nice meal. But as an asset to soccer it has been a failure, perhaps we have saved on office rent etc., but after 10 years existence the growth the stadium was supposed to generate has not eventuated. Can it be saved? The only way would appear to be by electing a committee of management to market the place, as a business utilises its' assets to make profit. Wembley Stadiums Ltd., do this and make money from their vast ground, it is only a matter of time before Lang Park and Perry Park will have to do the same. Then and only then will the place begin to pay back the enormous amount of money it has drawn out of soccer in direct and indirect "taxations" made on clubs through their own Fed-

Another two years will see every big club in Queensland battling to use their own grounds in their own areas. We should not wait till then before mounting the rescue operation.

WHAT A FIGHTBACK

A tremendous fightback and meritorious win for Mt. Gravatt in the first division at Lions Stadium last Friday night. Down 2-0 and with only 25 minutes to play, and their efforts hardly win inspiring even the

most ardent supporters had practically given them away. One young lad near me said: "There'll be nothing to cheer about when this match is over". And a more sedate follower in a green beanie hopefully remarked: "If we could only get one goal things might happen." And how they did.

The match to me was played in three main sections. For the first half it was all Richlands. They cut holes in Mt. Then Gary Bohan, through hesitation, muffed a chance and seconds later hurried his shot which flew high and wide. Ian Steele was robbed by Alan Venables when a shot appeared to be forthcoming.

The third session was the second half which was almost all Mt. Gravatt as they kept up a repeated barrage. Rod McKenzie made a brilliant save from Gary Bohan but Richlands also hit the bar with the keeper beaten. And then things happened

all in 11 minutes. Referee Dave Nugent awarded Mt. Gravatt a free kick when they appeared to have the advantage. It was taken by Thompson, who found Bohan right in position and his boot right on the target. Goal No. 1. Ten minutes later, second half replacement Harry Stewart sent over a cross which enabled Steele to score from close in. Goal No. 2.

And a minute later, Bohan made full amends for his earlier misses — it was the winning goal and according to Mt. Gravatt's bench surely one of the best of the season.

Hard luck, Richlands, you played well and with a bit of luck might have salvaged a draw. And now for the things that help to make or mar a football match. Why was there no public address system operating? Why was the match scheduled for 8.30 p.m. when there was NO early match. It started promptly at 8.30, so no blame to the referee.

To Mt. Gravatt, your strip under artificial lights is far too wraith-like — it and the jersey numbers are almost a perfect camouflage for night matches. It makes your players at the far corners of the field difficult to distinguish and not only for my old eyes but also for your supporters. There were different opinions around me as to who actually scored your final two goals. And thanks "bench" for your help in settling the matter. Thanks also to Richlands in this regard.

CLUB NEWS

FARCICAL MIXUP

I have grave fears for the State League next year when at present the Queensland Branch of the Australian Soccer Referees Federation cannot organise officials for senior games in the Brisbane area.

An unprofessional and farcical situation arose at Salisbury last Saturday, July 1, when for the second time an Eighth Division game between the home club and Newmarket could not be played because an official referee failed to show.

The problem originated two months ago when the teams were due to play each other on May 27, in what was then a second place versus fourth place game.

Both teams prepared for the game and did warm-up exercises while they waited for the referee who was presumed to be late. After waiting a considerable time it became apparent he was not going to show.

Salisbury in an attempt to have the important game played, offered a referee, who although not being qualified, was extremely conversant with the rules of the game.

Newmarket refused the referee as would have any other team in the same position.

Unsure as to what action was to be taken a Salisbury official telephoned the Queensland Soccer Federation who advised the game would be postponed and played at the end of the season if it had any bearing on semi-final or relegation places.

Although angered at the time because

the postponment allowed league leaders, St. Albans to pull further away from the rest of the teams, Salisbury officials later agreed it was the best decision in the circumstances.

7th July, 1978

The farce began when the Q.S.F. advised Salisbury on Tuesday, June 27, the postponed game would be played and the following week-end instead of the scheduled bye.

Many of the club's players, knowing this would be the only week-end free for some time, had made arrangements to go away or work.

After much inconvenience the Salisbury coaches got a team together, so a forfeit could be avoided. It cost one player \$25 in wages and others the loss of deposits on Gold Coast units, when they decided to forego planned activities to play soccer.

Their dedication and loyalty received a massive knock when the referee again failed to show.

Newmarket were equally disappointed as their players also had cancelled previous plans so they could play in the game.

The failure of the referee to show is even more unbelievable when it is known not more than a handful of lower senior division games were played that day.

It may be understandable a referee would not be available if a full round of games was being played, but according to my information, ignoring first division games, only nine senior games were played in Brisbane last Saturday.

The question must be asked, who is to blame for this bungling which is little more than an insult to the clubs and players involved?

I have also been told it could well be the same referee who was assigned to the original game and the replay.

Will he be suspended for in what my opinion is ungentlemanly conduct? I strongly doubt it.

Surely there must be some comeback to ensure this situation is not repeated. for as it is, the players concerned could not be blamed for not respecting the referee when he does not respect them.

NOTE—No particular individual referee is to blame as the match was overlooked by the ref's appointments panel. — Editor

SENIOR COLTS

Salisbury Senior Colts showed some of the best soccer they have played all year yet lost 3-0 at Coalstars, last Sunday. Although in the end the Ipswich team deserved to win, the scoreline flattered their performance and failed to show how much Salisbury were in the game, especially in the first half.

The game opened at a furious pace with both teams eager for the ball and once receiving it, willing to spray it around the wide park.

The Salisbury midfield of Dave Grunwald, Mark Brigden and Scottish import, Joe (Tommy) Docherty, matched Coalstars in every department and at times, early in the game, dominated the field.




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LIONS v WEST ADELAIDE — A post mortem

John thundered an unsaveable header past the non-plussed Crook. The writing had been on the wall earlier, for twice Neale had found himself in the same position and hammered shots in only to see them deflected for corners, and no doubt the young keeper was wondering where leftback Tymczyczyn was "hiding" during these goings on. A tremendous goal to win a tremendous match and with it being scored even full back Wilson and Laslo on the wing who had been having "so-so" matches, seemed to grow ten inches in stature and in the last twenty minutes began to show us what they really can do, and we had a Lions eleven who off their own bat took on and completely outplayed the Westad eleven who had been unbeaten for ten weeks. Neale completely exhausted and cramped by his efforts was replaced by young Harry Stewart on loan from Mt. Gravatt, but unfortunately the youngster did not get much time to show what he could do, though his few touches showed a style and brain that warrants further investigation. Lions, we at Go Soccer salute you, but warn you, you have now set a standard and we, your public, will not accept less. You are capable of taking on anyone in Philips League, this game proved it and we want more of this type of football.
