

Westad Catch Up

ADELAIDE, West Adelaide joined Marconi at the top of the PSL table with a splendid 3-2 victory over Fitzroy in a tense and furious match at Hindmarsh Stadium.

Leaders Marconi had been surprisingly beaten 2-1 by Sydney City.

After a scoreless first half Fitzroy took a shock early lead but West Adelaide retaliated with three brilliant goals in six minutes.

West Adelaide who lost their first match in nine weeks last week in Brisbane, ended Fitzroy's ten match unbeaten run.

Fitzroy were desperate for a win to give them a ray of hope to challenge for the title

West Adelaide had a slight edge in the first half but saw three certain goals saved by Fitzroy keeper Peter Blasby.

He continued to thwart West Adelaide in the early minutes of the second half with a magnificent save from a Dave Pillans header.

In the sixth minute Fitzroy striker Jim Campbell shot Fitzroy ahead when West keeper Martin Crook allowed a harmless looking shot to go under his body.

The setback spurred West Adelaide and within a minute Graham Honeyman sprinted into the penalty area, beat a defender and cracked a scorching ground shot into the far corner for the equaliser.

West Adelaide went ahead 2-1 in the ninth minute when Blasby failed to hold a Pillans shot and Peter Boyle pounced on the rebound and smashed it into the roof of the net.

Hundreds of supporters streamed onto the ground and it took several minutes for the game to be restarted.

The fiercely partisan supporters had more to cheer about in the 12th minute when Honeyman picked up a rebound and drove a 15 metre shot into the net with sledge hammer force.

Fitzroy looked a beaten side but their hopes looked brighter in the 70th minute when Kenny Taylor scored with a penalty after he was brought down inside the penalty area.

Fitzroy looked dangerous for the rest of the game but West Adelaide missed two golden opportunities in the last two minutes. On one occasion Ian McGregor hit the post with Blasby beaten and seconds later he shot into the side netting with Blasby again out of position.

Pirie On Target

SYDNEY, Two headers, one in each half, gave Sydney Olympic a deserved 2-1 victory over Adelaide City at Barton Park.

Olympic withstood severe pressure in the second half and counter attacked intelligently to snatch the winner.

Olympic took the lead in the ninth minute when Billy Pirie, their goal scoring machine, sent home a spectaculer driving header from an Alan Ainslie cross.

The Adelaide strikers lacked imagination and their most dangerous chances came from midfielder Agenor Muniz, who twice sent shots over the bar.

Olympic's attack lost a great deal of punch in the 20th minute when Pirie had to go off injured.

After the break Adelaide City came out fighting and equalised within two minutes when Jim Muir headed in a Brian Northcote cross.

It was all Adelaide City after this with Muniz and John Perin dominating in mid field.

But in front of goal Adelaide were repeatedly closed down by a well marshalled Olympic defence.

Olympic relied heavily on the scheming of Ainslie and Alex Jamieson to set up their counter-attacks and in the 60th minute only a desperation lunge by Adelaide City stopper Frank Lister stopped a certain goal.

But in the 74th minute there was nothing

the City defender could do to stop Olympic taking the lead.

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Jamieson and Derek Laing combined brilliantly on the right wing before Jamieson sent over a perfect cross to Allan, who nodded the ball over the keeper into the net and sent the 2,000 plus crowd into a frenzy.

A few minutes later Olympic could have made it 3-1 when Laing wasted a great chance by hitting the ball straight to the keeper when two colleagues were standing unmarked.

Olympic won because they made the better of their few chances while Adelaide City failed to utilise their greater skill up front.

Evans Debut

MELBOURNE, South Melbourne handed out a 4-0 hiding to local rivals Footscray in their Philips League match at Middle Park

South Melbourne took the lead early, scoring two goals in the first five minutes.

The smallest man on the field, George Campbell, scored South Melbourne's first goal. South's first came after a brilliant overlap by full-back Mike Pye, which Campbell finished off with deadly accuracy

Then the little mid fielder split Footscray's defence wide open for South Melbourne's second goal.

Billy Rogers took Campbell's pass, beat Footscray full back Igor Hazabent, and passed to Duncan Cummings, who scored from close range.

Footscray came back strongly in the later stages of the first half but failed to make an impression on the scoreboard.

Fifteen minutes into the second half, George Campbell struck again.

Winning a free kick on the left flank, Campbell found Alun Evans, who beat Footscray goal keeper Dennis Boland with a close range header.

Evans' goal crowned an impressive debut by the former Liverpool first division star striker.

Evans played for Liverpool against Arsenal in the 1971 FA Cup final at London's Wembley Stadium.

He arrived in Australia only last weekend after being signed from English League Club. Walsall.

In spite of being three goals down Footscray refused to give up. But South Melbourne's goal bore a charmed life.

IPSWICH UNITED GO TO MAREEBA

AFTER our draw with Spencer Park last Saturday week, it was off to Brisbane Airport to catch our flight to Cairns. Everything went well until we tried to leave Townsville but they had a few problems with our plane. So 10 minutes after boarding we were asked to disembark and spent the next 35 minutes back in the terminal. These delays do nothing for the morale of the passengers. Eventually we got away and arrived in Cairns, one hour late at 9 p.m., to be met by Mareeba's coach Karl Herdle, Mr. Vinni Rossi, president on the International Club and four players, including Tony Fortnum (ex LIONS) and Warren Best (ex THE GAP).

Our party split up into six cars for the hour's drive to Mareeba, which in the dark is quite hair-raising. It's certainly a climb and there could not have been a straight stretch for at least 35 kilometres. A bit like driving up a corkscrew. Must be a beautiful drive in daylight.

We arrived in Mareeba just after 10 p.m. and were taken to the International Club where the monthly dance was in progress. As soon as we arrived we were announced and given a tremendous welcome from some 400 people. We were then introduced individually and our prseident Terry Brown said a few words of thanks and then briefly gave a little bit of the history of Ipswich Soccer. I was then called on to introduce my players who all got a great reception. For mine, I was pleased to get to our motel and to bed. It had been a long day.

SUNDAY: When we arrived at the ground there was a great crowd. About 1,000. The game itself was quite exciting with Ipswich putting together some good moves which the crowd en-

joyed. Mareeba United were more of a running side but at times they surprised us with some good passing. The game was only five minutes old when Mareeba's guest winger got away from Peter Nielsen. Wayne Warren came across in cover and stopped the winger's gallop on the edge. They both went to ground and the little fella recovered to slip the ball past the advancing Greg Donnelly. So we were 1-0 down and did the big crowd love it.

Three minutes later we received another setback when Steve McDowell in one of his strong runs tried to avoid a hefty tackle and in the process badly pulled a groin muscle. Steve Dann replaced McDowell and five minutes later Bryan Kathage was caught by a very vigorous tackle on his left ankle. Bryan decided to stay on and see how it was, as our other reserve, Ian Humphreys also was suffering from ankle trouble after our match the previous day. The game wasn't 15 minutes old when Randall McKeand was caught in a tackle and spent the match on the wing as a passenger.

A cross ball from Steve Dann was flicked on by Trevor Broadbent and our "cripple" Bryan Kathage slammed it home from six yards out, after which he was immediately replaced by Humphreys. We were still pressing and Gavin Johnston hit the bar with a good header from Martin Breen's free kick. We were now playing the game in Mareeba's half with only an occasional breakaway from the home side. Mareeba got their first corner and put us under enough pressure to win another. In the 35th minute Mareeba's defence could only partly clear a corner, which fell to Martin Breen, whose shot was blocked and scrambled away.

Only Karl Herdle's sweeping at the back

was keeping Mareeba in the game and in the 40th minute he tackled Broadbent on the edge of the box. It looked a perfectly legal tackle to us but the ref. said penalty. Glen McKeand's shot was a fraction too near Angelo Guerrero and the small keeper turned it out for our ninth corner. (rough justice). The resultant corner was kicked off the line. The second half opened with Molloy on the left wing just going wide and Randall McKeand returned the compliment at the other end. Mareeba made a change in goals and brought on the well known and experienced John Hardaker, who needed all his skill to stop a piledriver from a very immobile Randall McKeand, who had been left unmarked 15 yards out.

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Ipswich continued to play some good one touch football and Molloy, Mareeba's most dangerous forward floated a great cross from the left wing just onto the top of the net. Ipswich began to show the effects of the weekend and Peter Nielsen began to limp noticeably, and it was here that Mareeba had their best period. They took a free kick on our left, Hughes flicked it on, Herdle headed strongly but it was well held by Donnelly.

Mareeba substituted Arancio for Wetton to bring a bit more punch into their attack. A bad cross by Broadbent saw Mareeba attack in their best movement so far when they strung together five passes to move into our half and Tony Fortnum shot just when he could have taken it a little further.

We were now playing on sheer guts and Hardaker saved well by punching three corners in a row. We were completely committed to attack and the winning goal and were almost punished for it when Makse Srhoy made a good overlap from the right fullback position but his shot hit the side netting. With 10 minutes to go Laidlaw came on for Mareeba as another new striker.

Karl Herdle was certainly leading by example and doing the work of two men at the back. It was a travesty of justice when Gavin Johnston who wasn't having one of his best days, forced Karl into making a bad back pass to his keeper. Gavin interupted, chipped over Hardaker's head, to find a badly limping Broadbent at the far post, from where he headed in the winner from only a yard out. There was hardly time for the restart. I think we were worthy winners but I would like to congratulate Karl and his club as their efforts and enthusiasm would leave a lot of Brisbane cuubs for dead.

There were five 17-year-olds in the team and I'm sure they learned a lot from the game. The bar-be-que and dance after the game was a great experience and the hospitality naturally first class. I would like to take this opportunity to thank Mareeba United Soccer Club and the International club. Gentlemen, your club, facilities, organisation, and hospitality would leave many Philips League clubs also for dead. And it was very encouraging to find the standard of Soccer in the far north is not very far behind us.

MERTON MEMOS

THIS week's report can be kept fairly short because of the holiday two of our Senior teams had due to Ampol Cup Rounds.

Only the Senior Colts had a fixture to play. They did this against Mt. Gravatt at Dittmer Park on Saturday afternoon. The first round fixture between these sides had produced a runaway win for Merton, but, this was not to be in this game. Eric Thompson has obviously put in a lot of work with his lads since that first round and the fruits of his labour are now beginning to show in this young side. They put some good stuff together at times and it was soon evident the game was not to be a one sided affair.

The first half proved to be Mt. Gravatt's. During this period the Merton

front runners did nothing to apply pressure to the green defence. Whenever a ball was lost to them they did nothing. This allowed the Mt. Gravatt boys to do as they pleased at the back, they had all the time in the world to settle things down, there was never any attempt to force them into error. Being allowed so much freedom at the back allowed Mt. Gravatt to build attacks from that area. Most of the forward movement resulted from defenders in possession being allowed time to look around, pick up players in space, and give accurate unhurried passes. This freedom at the back was enhanced by some intelligent running off the ball by their midfield and front runners. I was particularly impressed by two of their young-sters, unfortunately I can't name them because I don't know their names, but they carried numbers 9 and 11. Both displayed skill when on the ball and intelligent running off the ball.

The number 9 was rewarded for his efforts by a goal midway through the first half, after earlier being frustrated. He had previously made a good run down the right flank before putting in an awkwardly angled shot on target only to see Dave Condy fumble his first attempt before flicking the ball around the upright with fingertips at his second bite.

In fact the Mt. Gravatt lads seemed unlucky not to have had more than the one nil lead they went in with at half time. Only some last ditch efforts by young "Murph" and Ben F-A-Y-G-U-N- (that's the correct spelling isn't it Bernard) kept the score at a respectable level.

The beginning of the second half saw some positional changes in the Merton side and an obviously revised attitude, no doubt due to some strongly worded half time speech by Jim Dolan. From the outset our re-arranged front line began to challenge for the ball with the result that Mt. Gravatt defenders began to make those errors which were few and far between in the first half. The switching of Billy Fisher from midfield upfront also added that bit of thrust which had been lacking in the first half.





"PERHAPS"



AFTER taking "Insideman" to task over his ideas for the re-vitalisation of the Code in Queensland (see Letters to the Editor), I was struck with the realisation that at least he had had the guts to say what he thought was needed. I then compared myself to all those other people we seem to have in our midst who are prepared to criticise suggestions made by others without coming up with any constructive alternatives. I had condemned such people in the past, and yet here was I doing exactly the same thing. Therefore, to support my own principles, I felt that I should also be prepared to come up with suggestions and give people the opportunity to give me some stick as I had done with "Insideman". If we could get enough people interested enough to make suggestions we might "perhaps" come up with something which could be used to the betterment of our common interest "Soccer". So here goes.

Firstly, I would suggest that the Federation tread like a pussy cat in relation to State League. I think State League is an

excellent idea, but I don't think the stage is yet set. I would hate to see it flounder because of inadequate preparation. I believe that the instant success of Philips League was due entirely to the few years preparation prior to launching. The launching was not even considered, in any seriousness, until the proper form of sponsorship was assured. Should State League commence with the "ad hoc" sponsorship apparently now available, and fail it could, and very likely would, sound the death knell to sponsorship of any magnitude for Soccer in this State.

Therefore, I would submit that a concerted effort should be made at Federation level and supported at every level, to gain overall sponsorship. The support I envisage would be an undertaking by members and affiliates that the sponsors' logo would appear on every Soccer shirt worn in the State, that the sponsors product's be prominently advertised on every soccer ground in the State and in every soccer publication, a plug for the sponsor in all club and Federation media adver-

tising, and so on. An approach such as this to any large sponsor would surely be more attractive than the present fragmented, cap in hand approaches. The prospect of such widespread and constant advertising must attract bigger sponsors and larger amounts of sponsorship.

Assuming that such sponsorship has been assured, the composition of the League should be considered. The present proposal of a Statewide competition right from the outset with the prospect of large travel costs eating up almost all available finance leads me to consider the alternative of staged development, e.g.

Stage 1

Formation of a number of Sub State Leagues based on the geography of the State, i.e. Southern Region, Central Region Northern Region made up of say eight teams each. This stage to be given perhaps two years to consolidate, generate local interest, and give some indication of team performances. The smaller areas to be covered in this initial stage would reduce travel costs and allow the finance saved to be used in team building etc.

Stage 2.

Formation of The State League from the top four teams in each Region at the end of the Stage 1 period, the remaining teams going to form the nucleus of strong local competitions, or perhaps, a State 2nd division with promotion and relegation right from the outset.

In both Stages an annual Statewide knockout similar to the Ampol Cup could be undertaken. The two Queensland Philips League sides could be invited to take part in this to stimulate interest, as could Representative sides from centres not included in the State League.

I would not propose that State League become a "closed shop", it must be possible after the initial Stages, for a Club not originally included, to aim in that direction. In this regard I would propose a system similar to that in England be used. The Club finishing at the foot of the League 2nd division would be required to seek re-election, and would be required to compete with others seeking election. Election and re-election applications would be judged on merit with the most meritorious being successful. In this way not only team performance would be required, club management and progress would also come into contention.

Having decided what form the competition should take, we come to the selection of participants. To rule out any

suggestion of Club partisanship, favoured selection, or any other form of funny business, selection of the participants should be by an independent body. I would suggest hired Management Consultants to screen nominations by aspiring clubs. Possible terms of reference could include, Existing amenities, Present avenues, and volume of, income, Potential for future income based on existing amenities and real assets, Quality of Club Management, based on past performance and standard of development attained, and lastly playing strength. I make playing strength the last consideration as I would envisage applications from Clubs in lower divisions at present, and of course if playing strength was one of the major criteria the Country centres would have to take a back seat right from the start since it is obvious that the playing strength in Brisbane is stronger than in those centres at this stage.

Having selected participants there must be consideration of the remaining clubs. Local or maybe Regional competitions could be set up. These clubs could then set their own objectives and set about attaining them. What objectives they set would be left to them, if they decided to aim at the top they could set about getting there, if they decided to be happy with their lot, prepared to act as feeders to the State League clubs, then they could set about the best ways of doing this. This decision would be theirs and should not be forced upon them by complete exclusion from a "closed shop".

We come now to Administration. What I would propose would be three levels of administration.

1. Queensland Soccer Federation—

Responsible for overall management and supervision.

2. State League Council—

Responsible for management of State League affairs and policy affecting State League only.

3. Regional Council—

Responsible for management of Regional affairs and policy affecting Regions only.

I would propose that overall policy decisions be made at Annual General Meetings, or Special General Meetings of the Queensland Soccer Federation, which I would see as being composed of equal representation of all bodies. I would see some measure of autonomy at the various levels in relation to their own affairs.

I know that the drastic reorganisation that I propose would be creative of num-

erous transitional problems, not the least of these being Transfer and Retention of players. This is why I have advocated a policy of hastening slowly. When we enter into the reality of State League we must do so with as few problems as possible. Therefore we must have time to identify these problems, investigate them, and formulate sensible and acceptable solutions. This cannot be done in the few remaining months before the birth of the State League under the present proposals. This is why I advise the "Federation" to tread like a pussy cat.

I would like to comment on two articles appearing in GO SOCCER, Vol 3, No. 18 dated 30th June, 1978.

Firstly the item in Points to Ponder comparing the present Merton-East side with 'the rampaging Merton teams of the past ten years." This description is somewhat inaccurate. Merton teams of 1975, 76 and 77, could hardly have been described in those terms. There are reasons for this apparent decline in the playing strength.

The major reason for this decline is the change in policy adopted by the administration of the Club. Prior to the 1974 floods the power that were followed different policies to those now in vogue. During those halcyon years Merton East teams won honour and glory by having good playing sides, BUT, that's all they had. To my knowledge the face of Heath Park had not changed in twenty-five years. The old green shed, the disgraceful toilets and the one playing field were exactly as they had been when I arrived in this country in 1949.

In the period mentioned we saw the birth of the Queensland Soccer Federation, an immense increase in the number of kids playing soccer and a massive increase in the number of Clubs, but no progress in the provision of facilities to cater for these ever increasing numbers, BUT, we had one of the best playing sides in

This Arthur about face situation was

24 Diamond Street, Holland Park changed with the inception of progressive policies. With the re-direction of Club finances to the development of the Heath Park complex, the amount available for the purchase of, and payment of exaggerated playing fees to players was drastically reduced.

> Now we have a largely inexperienced side with a large home grown content, BUT, we are well on the way to having one of the best complexes in Brisbane. Sure, we still have lots to do, but the complex now includes two full sized playring fields (in use), two junior sized fields (in use), one full sized field (under development), two all weather tennis courts (under development), a club building which includes: four dressing rooms (including referees), an office, canteen, clubroom and bar, three storerooms, adequate toilet facilities and a tractor shed cum workshop. As an adjunct to this we have a mobile kitchen from which the best hamburgers in Brisbane are dispensed. Add to these features sufficient floodlighting to allow almost the entire 16½ acres to be used for training purposes and it is not difficult to see where the odd shilling or two has been spent since 1974. A concrete cricket pitch has also been provided for use during summer months.

All of this has been an investment, not only for the Club, but also for the Code. It will not be long before we are again able to devote more finance towards the improvement of our playing strength preparatory for the return to our usual position at the top.

All of which leads me to the second article on which I would like to comment, "Where to Queensland" written by that

master of 'clanger droppers' alias Insideman.

Some of the phrases he uses to espouse his support of his 'faltering, striding, walking, galloping,' into this professionalism, or the 'new' game, as he so originally puts it, are echoes of those used in the early sixties, which led to the birth of the Queensland Soccer Federation. It was said then that "Soccer in Australia is on the verge of professionalism".

References were made to the 'Victorian' attitudes of the now defunct Association. It was said then that the game was stagnating. It was said then that there should be a group of Amateurs and a 'Professional Group.' The 'Association' was supposed to take care of the Amateurs, and look how long it, and those clubs choosing to remain in that category lasted. Have we progressed much since that big change? I think not.

Insideman attempts to generate sympathy for poor old Lions and Brisbane City, who he says "are sitting on a tightrope having committed themselves to budgets of thousands of dollars" — Does he think that those Clubs who have undertaken development of complexes, such as described in the earlier part of this letter, have done so on budgets of cents and bottle tops? Lions, Brisbane City and those Clubs moving towards State League are not the only ones who have budgeted in thousands of dollars, and those others must surely be given some say in the protection of their investments.

This would apparently be denied them if Insideman had any say in the matter. He states that Club delegates to Federation Council, "well intentioned men who give freely of their time, would have as much idea of the problems facing Brisbane City or Lions as they would have of flying a Concorde jet, yet in our 'wisdom' we ask them to vote on policy that may, or may not, have disastrous consequences to the financial stability of both these clubs". WHAT OF THE FINANCIAL STABILITY OF OTHER CLUBS — does he advocate that that should be jeopardised just so these two clubs can be safe? It would appear so from his writing.

Brisbane City and Lions both knew, or should have known, what lay ahead of them when they moved towards Philips League. They knowingly and willingly took this step without any commitment from other clubs that they would go to the wall to ensure their survival. No one forced them into it and if they were not

prepared, then they should not have taken the step.

He goes on to liken Club delegates to employees of Mt. Isa Mines. I find this comparison ludicrous, clubs are not employees of the Federation but shareholders in it. Even the directors of Mt. Isa Mines are bound by the wishes of the majority of shareholders and every shareholder, no matter how small his holding, is entitled to a vote at meetings.

His next-remark is equally ludicrous, and to be dammed offensive. He refers to the democratic system now used at Federation Council Meetings as 'this malignancy that is eating at the very entrails of the game". What he refers to as the malignancy is in fact the entrails, for without the Clubs there would be no game of any consequence.

It would seem that all the present day problems befronting our code are caused by the little clubs, if one was to take notice of Insideman. I would remind him that the problems to which he refers are not isolated to our code or country. Falling attendances at sporting events are occurring in most sports in many countries Financial problems are besetting administrators at all levels in almost every sport. Perhaps Mr. Insideman hasn't yet heard of the economic recession, poor little rich fella. Perhaps this too is the fault of the 'malignancies' after all he's blamed us for just about everything else.

He suggests that 'the rest' as he chooses to call the majority of Clubs, should be content to sit back, spend heaps of brass, provide training and coaching facilities for countless numbers of kids, so that his few selected glamour clubs can reap the benefit and go on to bigger and better things.

I would suggest to him that the objective of all clubs, large or small, is to eventually get to the top of his imaginary pyramid. If, as he seems to advocate, Philips League and State League become 'closed shops' then the avenue along which they can progress would be non-existent. Incentive and ambition would dry up and die and so would the clubs. I don't suggest that some of these clubs wouldn't do this anyway, but those clubs who have been prepared to make an investment to provide a solid base from which to launch themselves upwards should not be expected to wither up and expire.

Insideman's apparent philosophy towards 'the rest' is a little reminiscent of that followed by a man once referred to by the late Charlie Andrews as "that little Teutonic upstart", who also promoted the

idea of a super race, with subjugation or extermination of 'the rest'. I didn't agree with his ideas Mr. Insideman, nor do I agree with yours.

Insideman did provide one moment of light relief in his article by suggesting that it doesn't take money to attract the right players, and that players will move to the best run clubs simply because they are the best run clubs. That gave me the best laugh I've had all season and also gave me some indication of how little he knows of many of the players in this

game we follow. Furthermore, there are very few players of any note willing to 'give' of their time and knowledge, forfunately we have some of the few who don't require to hear the banknotes crickle before they 'give' anything. Which returns me to to the very beginning of this letter as one of the reasons for the comparatively poor performances of Merton East sides in recent years. BUT LIKE MacARTHUR "WE WILL RETURN".
