Unlucky City

SYDNEY — Dave McIntosh, Sydney Olympic's full back turned striker, crashed in a splendid 65th minute header, to give his team a 2-1 win over Brisbane City at Wentworth Park.

A cross deep to the far post from Greg Allan on the right touchline saw McIntosh meet it perfectly to give City goal keeper Kim Wishart no chance of a save

McnItosh produced a lionhearted display taking up good positions and laying off some telling passes.

The win gave Olympics 13 points out of 16 over the last eight games — a stunning reversal of their early season efforts.

The game was an energetic encounter in which Brisbane City were unlucky not to score on the bell.

With the Olympic defence standing off, Kevin Caldwell produced a scissors kick to two unmarked team mates four metres off the Olympic goal mouth.

Somehow goal keeper Gary Meier emerged hugging the ball in a sea of dust.

Alan Ainslie, Olympic's success of the season, opened the scoring with a tenth minute goal. He gained possession and after a short run struck a successful rising 30 metre shot towards the top right-hand corner. His goal, as with McIntosh's winning shot, was indicative of an absence of tight marking in the Brisbane City defence.

In neither case was a real attempt made to cover up the ultimate scorers. In the first half Brisbane City made several clear chances through Kevin Caldwell and John Coyne, without being rewarded.

Olympic found the net from another McIntosh header in the 53rd minute, but the goal was disallowed due to a foul on Coyne. The City's goal came from fleetfooted Barry Kelso who knocked the ball home following a right wing cross that bounced off the crossbar back into play.

A Bad Break

MELBOURNE — Brilliant Scottish winger George Campbell broke his right leg in South Melbourne's 5-0 victory over Adelaide City at Middle Park.

South's club doctor Jim Drakopoulos said Campbell had broken the leg just above the ankle. Campbell was taken to the Alfred Hospital for treatment.

Campbell, bought from Scottish club Aberdeen for \$20,000 this year, was carried from the field by opponent Zoran Matic ten minutes after half time. In the 62nd minute Adelaide City's Dixie Deans, top scorer in the League last season, was sent off the field by referee Nick Karlic. Deans had been protesting strongly against South Melbourne's second goal, headed home by Stuart Baxter from a cross by Margaritis Hagegmanouil.

Adelaide City players claimed their goal keeper, Peter Marshall was fouled just before Baxter got his head to the ball and that the goal should therefore be disallowed.

South Melbourne played with only ten men for a six minute period of the first half when Baxter left the field for a pain killing injection. Baxter had received a heavy knock on the ankle which had been giving him trouble for some weeks.

Alun Evans put South Melbourne into the lead in the 35th minute by heading home a cross from 16 year old Steve Kakantonis, who was playing his first senior match.

Deans put the ball into the net for Adelaide City after a pass from Agenor Muniz but Karlic ruled it off side. Goal keeper Jack Reilly made a brilliant save from John Perin before South Melbourne went two goals up with Baxter's fine header in the 62nd minute.

Adelaide City replaced young Phil Russo with Robert Marwe but in the 79th minute South Melbourne went further ahead with a powerful and accurate free kick by Chris Kalafatidis, standing in for Frank

Munro, who was serving a one week suspension.

In the 85th minute Evans passed to Duncan Cummings who steadied before shooting the ball under the body of diving goal keeper, Marshall for the fourth goal.

Only a minute later Evans made it 5-0, shooting just under the bar while falling backwards.

This will provide Gutendorf with the chance to sort out Australia's best age players to form the nucleus of his national A squad.

The team will leave Sydney on November 23rd for matches against New Zealand, Taiwan and Fiji.

If they win through the first round eliminations they will travel to South America in February next year and if again successful to Japan in July for the World Youth Cup Finals.

With the current rash of top class youngsters playing in the Philips National League the cream should provide Gutendorf with a sound base on which to build the Australian World Cup Team.

Flagging Interest

BRISBANE City has received a directive from the QSF banning the use of flags on sticks at Perry Park. We have also been asked to confiscate such flags from supporters at our home games, but we are in some doubt as to the legality of such action

We are not sure how flags (or is it just the sticks?) have been found offensive but assume it is because they may have a potential for use as weapons, or may obstruct the view of other spectators, or perhaps threaten the safety of players running into the ground fences.

If it is the first reason, it is true that flag sticks could be dangerous in the wrong hands — but so could ladies highheeled shoes and so are beer cans. It would be difficult to remove all potential weapons from a football ground. In the second count it has to be said that with the present numbers attending Perry Park it is all too easy to shift if there is any obstruction to one's view. On the third, a ban on flags protruding over the fence would seem most reasonable, but by the same token this concern for safety could have prevented the erection of the dangerous metal supports for the grandstand roofing which are so close to the touchline.

In any case Brisbane City complies with the request and asks its supporters not to bring flags on sticks to Perry Park, despite our opinions that flag waving is an integral part of the football scene throughout the rest of the football world.

Brisbane City — Change or Sink

BRISBANE City's sad tale of woe continues. In two seasons of national soccer, our representatives, under a cloud of bad selection, or indecision, or both, have had a succession of men at the helm of their football operation and if we are to believe

the actions of the City hierarchy, all have been failures.

Iain Kesson who took the club into PSL lasted half a season before he was ousted for reasons that have never been made quite clear though from reports

been the basis for the 'resignation.' Ever present Nereo Saftich saw the season out but long before the new season, Nereo, always a shrewd judge of football environment, made it plain the position was not for him. Then came Luicano Nesti, a coach proven at junior level, but completely new to the tricks of the trade with the senior 'stars'. Nesti did not last and a hurried 'behind the scenes' arrangement saw the young, untried' inexperienced Denis Ford take over the reins, splitting his time between Federation business and Brisbane City business.

This however could never have lasted, anyone who has ever managed a senior soccer team knows how time consuming that job can be, so only a few short weeks ago Denis resigned his Federation position and went 'full time' with City. Now he has gone, despite the continued guarantee of club employment and long time servant Dave Neal and player Ian Rathmell have taken over but what they can achieve is purely academic, if they win a few they'll be heroes, if they lose so what? This is professional football, PSL vintage 1978, Brisbane style.

Brisbane City now find themselves at a crossroads. With a new seasons preparation not so far away, to where do they turn? With their record as employers, no coach with any sense would dream of joining them unless of course the money and contract were very heavily weighted in the coach's favour. In the present soccer economy 'heavy' contracts are not readily accessable to Brisbane clubs so it would appear the 'mythical' top man from overseas or interstate just may not be available for one of two reasons - fear of short term employment on the part of the coach or, conversely, fear of being 'taken' on the part of the club. So it would appear that avenue is rapidly closing for City.

On the other hand there is the local market but to be honest it is hard to see anyone on the local scene with the inclination to go to City other than with the hope that by some miracle he could work some magic and make a name for himself. 'Fairy tales' are what City need like the proverbial 'hole in the head,' so where do they go from here?

City have to go back to square one and start all over. For two seasons now all the worst faults of amateurism have shown themselves to the shrewd observer. The constant changing of coaches is only the tip of the iceberg, the Hermiston fiasco showed immaturity, the unswerving loyalty to players who obviously were just not PSL standard, nice, but completely foreign

at the time team selection appears to have to the harsh world of professionalism, the continued perseverence with a first division side containing players obviously there for many reasons other than the intended one, the making of PSL players, the continued isolated policies, all have combined to put a huge question mark behind the policies governing the operation of the club.

> City must look inwards at their corporate structure. The club, long dependent on income from their kind and generous supporters, now finds itself subject to pressures caused by the desertion of some of these supporters who, long used to success are now finding the hard world of national soccer a bitter pill to swallow. The Italian community have rallied in the past but the creation of a 'phoenix' is much more difficult at PSL level than it was in the limited world of Brisbane soccer, so, if success is to be gained again, changes must be made.

> A man must be found who can apply business thinking to the 'football operation' within the club structure. Working to a predetermined budget he must set up a system that will give a reasonable chance of success, not only on the short term but on the long term. Full time coaches are an expense that no club can really afford. They are a luxury until the players themselves are full time and how much better would it be to see three men employed part time working a squad en-larged by some outstanding youngsters, thereby giving our technically 'lesser' players the concentrated preparation necessary to lift them to higher degree of readiness. Just think how much more could be achieved by a coach working a squad of six players during a three hour session. This is the way it is at professional level. All it needs is a co-ordinator, a relatively simple matter of organisation.

The directors, committee or whatever, having selected a man, given him his position charter, his budget, his authority, must then get on with their job, leaving him to his. As an employee he is only bound to communicate with his superior and it is his superiors job to report back to the board.

They, the directors, should be fully employed in setting up a business structure that will stand on its own despite results that may emanate from the soccer field. If the team is playing well and pulling crowds the revenue should be looked upon as a profit from the budgetary investment made on the football operation. This in itself could be an incentive to the coaches and players to perform, especially if a percentage of this profit was earmarked as

performance bonus. — Another business

So come on City. There are too many involved in your club who are highly intelligent people, or hard working individuals, for the club to struggle on in a manner that can only have one end. The Brisbane public showed last season that they will swing behind you but they will not tolerate for long the happenings of this last season. The message has to be change, change or sink into mediocrity, and how tragic if this club, once the most successful of all, so attractive and competitive on their day, sinks out of the national scene because of an amateurish soccer outlook from people, so successful in their own fields but oh so sadly lacking in the technical skills of running a soccer team. Find your man, take time in selection, then get behind him by giving him your support and the best way to do that is to get on with your own part in the total play, letting him do his, it is necessary for all in Queensland soccer that you succeed.



Mt. Gravatt are near to great things. They can play football and two moments of concentration lapse cost them the game. Mark Davis, so brilliantly dependable in goal, tried to clutch a ball in a goalmouth melee and, remembering the previous goings on, this was an invite to disaster, and so it proved when he was bustled into dropping the ball.

Then Eric Thompson, always a threat in the air, went forward for a corner kick and left Millman in the care of 'defender' Mickey Rooney. This too proved costly as Ron, who turns good defenders well, found Rooney an easy piece of cake and rocketed away to set up Brennan for an easy goal.

That was the game that was. Never what it could have been, unfortunately, but both teams showed that with improved discipline they could lift their performances considerably. The same could be said of the officials who must shoulder some of the blame.




