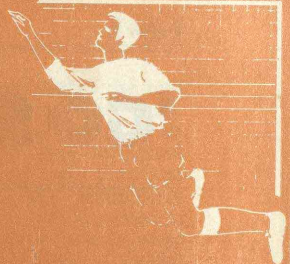

UNITED****"BRAMPTON POWER"**

TOP United striker "Mr. Magic" Duncan Brampton powered Dutton Park to a convincing 5-3 victory last week-end against fifth-placed Albany Creek.

The result of this match was important for both sides as a win for Dutton Park would mean that we would be undefeated at home this season, and a win for Albany Creek would keep them in the hunt for a final four spot.

A very confident Dutton Park took the field welcoming back from injury vice-captain "Gentleman" Ray Yates, and from a working commitment Wayne "Crash" Norris. This was the first time in five weeks that we have been able to field our strongest side, and what a difference it made.

It took Mr. Magic only nine minutes to put United ahead with a shot slotted in from an almost impossible angle. Albany Creek slammed back strongly in the tenth minute and left the United defence stunned with amazement. But there were no worries needed because only one minute later he was at it again, Mr. Magic powering down the right flank to cross a perfect ball to the flying Dane Ole Jeppersen who did the rest. Score 2-1 to Dutton Park and three goals in three minutes, good stuff for the spectators.

In the thirtieth minute Albany Creek struck back to level the scores with a disputed goal. United keeper Eric Sum-

mons if asked will tell you in no uncertain terms about this goal. The tireless "Mr. Magic" Duncan Brampton was at it

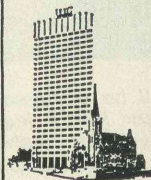
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again in the thirty-sixth minute this time sprinting down the left and crossing to "dashing" Doug Carningham who belted home number three, to take the sides into Staminade with a scoreline of 3-2 to Dutton Park.

Five minutes after half time came one of United's best goals of the season. From a free kick some thirty yards out "Iron Man" Ian Robinson stepped back and struck the ball to perfection ripping it into the back of the net. A little bit of Duncan Brampton magic rubbing off.

Eight minutes later the man himself added his second for the match with a shot that left the keeper stranded. Score 5-2 to Dutton Park. Albany Creek have to be admired for at this stage most sides would slowly give in, but not this side they came back into the game strongly and Dutton Park's keeper Eric Summons was called on to perform some brilliant saves. They were rewarded in the twenty-seventh minute for their efforts with a goal pushed over the line from one of those infamous goal mouth scrambles. Final score 5-3 to Dutton Park. All in all a good game for which we thank Albany Creek, it was a pleasant change from what we experienced a fortnight ago and it was nice to play a team that plays football.

IPSWICH ITEMS

FIRSTLY I take this opportunity to congratulate my old club Eagles on their premiership success they have just added to victory in the Ampol Cup. Well done Matt, you and your players have won it the hard way, from the front, and it's never easy to maintain that pace all the way. Many Eagles have knocked Eagles' style, and I'm one, for not being attractive. But it's certainly effective so why change something that's bringing success. All coaches in first division knew ahead of time what to expect from Eagles yet we

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still could not stop them. So let's give credit where it's due. Well done again.

Another struggle for us last Saturday against Brian Addison's boys but we still managed to take away the two points in a game that highlights my remarks this season regarding our Brisbane whistlers. We had another exhibition of weak and inconsistent refereeing from Mr. Richmond. Both teams were not innocent as frustration set in and the Ipswich dressing room was no place to be at halftime. Players were blasted for lack of self discipline and for allowing themselves to get upset and talk back. Ian Lawrie was booked for saying "you wouldn't know" from 15 yards, yet I saw the referee being verbally intimidated four times not two yards from his face. No yellow card? Bryan Kathage was booked and rightly so for a tackle from behind. Both bookings took place in the first half but how many late tackles took place in the second? No wonder this game got out of hand and ended up a shambles. This official is lucky he's not a player of mine or he would be looking at reserve grade football until he showed a marked improvement in his game. We started off giving Norths a nice gift in the 4th minute when Steve Dann misheard a call and passed back to Wayne Walker two yards out and he gratefully accepted.

We pulled one back through an Ian Lawrie goal from 12 yards out when Norths defence failed to clear. Norths went further ahead when the ever dangerous Len Pollock forced Ian Humphries into a rushed tackle out on the sideline. He skinned Ian neatly and cut into the backline where he saw Jock Krawcie coming in, putting an inch perfect pass onto his head, enabling Jock to tuck it away in great style over Greg Donnelly's head. A great goal and it was skill all the way.

Norths Gary Bray did his job well when he tucked a Jeff Dann rocket round for a corner at full stretch. Norths got caught pushing up in the offside trap, Bryan Kathage strode away down the middle and rounded Bray to knock it into the empty net.

Lawrie also broke clear and with only the keeper to beat his chip was off target, leaving it 2-2 at the break. Our passing didn't improve in the second half, we crowded one another and I lost count of the hospital balls we gave each other. Donnelly did well to get down to a Pollock shot on his near post, Lawrie went close when he outjumped the defence but headed over and Walker was

unlucky when his header came back off the crossbar.

But Lawrie eventually put us ahead with a great angled drive which zipped in at the near post. Both teams from then on were ragged and the game deteriorated as a spectacle. There was no control whatsoever and one foul led to another, and so on. The players from both sides have a lot to answer for but I'm afraid Mr. Richmond your inconsistency brought it all on. We will certainly be working at our game and talking about our self discipline during the week at training. Our last League game is against Richlands on Friday night and we will want to make sure of wrapping up No. 2 spot.

Our reserves went down 3-1 at Wynnum to 10 men and this now puts the premiership beyond us. In a game in which we had ample possession to win we simply threw it away. Saints went into an early lead but we gave Wynnum one back when a slack back pass left our keeper stranded. John Deegan was the brains behind most of Wynnum's moves and Saints just could not keep him quiet. Murray Kitching tried hard all day winning tackles and trying to keep his forwards moving.

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We missed a penalty and numerous other chances, but that man Deegan set his side up for another two goals aided by some bad Saints defence. The best we can hope for now is second place, providing we win our last two games.

The game was marred by an over zealous whistler and the stop-start conditions began to tell on both teams. Although having a man sent off with 10 minutes to go, Stars hung on for the draw.

With two Ipswich teams involved, surely this match could have been played at Coalstars ground, giving the Ipswich public the chance to see the best of our junior talent. The leadup to this match was farcical as the Saints lads had to play four matches in eight days. Sounds like the senior team's run in the Ampol Cup. Saints had more possession than Dinmore but by playing long balls we isolated our front men and could not get

up to support them. Saints had 12 corners in this half but could not get past the little Dinmore keeper, who had a great game.

Dinmore had five breakaways and almost scored every time through their lively front men. Dinmore had only two corners but from the second a shot beat the keeper and in the fullback's haste to clear he handled and John Greenall scored from the spot to make it 1-0 Dinmore at the break. We at last started to string the passes together to give John Miller the chance he needed to level the scores from 6 yards. John Kitching stroked home the second goal to put us in front and substitute Bob Maclot made it 3-1 near the end, when at one stage extra time looked certain. The young lad who controlled this game was the best referee I have seen for a long time and could teach some of the senior men a thing or two.

Thistle defence was starting to get confused as a number of players appeared to get in each others way. They failed to clear and Ron Millman capitalised on this confusion making it 2-0. Within 3 minutes Alan Marszaleck made it 3-0 when he out jumped the defence to head in a corner. That made 3 goals for Eagles within 5 minutes.

With 10 minutes to go, John Patterson for Thistle ran the ball down the left side of a casual Eagles defence for Brian Sampson to side foot it into the net to make it a more respectable 3-1 final score.

This was a game of two distinct halves. At the break one would have said that Thistle should win comfortably as they threw the ball around with great alacrity

and attacked in depth. But Matt Carson must have said the magic words to the Eagles players as within 10 minutes of the restart Eagles had the match won with 3 well taken goals. ROVERS CAPTURE TITLE

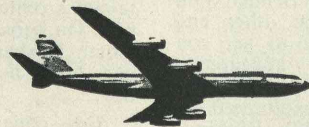
THIRD DIVISION — A brilliant save in the last minute by the Rovers goal-keeper denied Salisbury the Third Division premiership last Saturday.

Salisbury went into the game needing a win, and not a draw as reported last week, to leap-frog Rovers, who led the competition by one point, and take the title. The game was played in a typical

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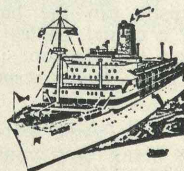

EIGHTH DIVISION — The player the opposition usually have three men mark Peter Wybranowski, did it again last Saturday when he slammed five goals in Salisbury's 8-nil win over University.

"Wybo", who was returning after a serious injury three weeks ago that saw him carried off the field unable to walk after a kick to the kidneys, was in brilliant form and dribbled, side-stepped and shuffled around the University defence. None of his goals could be singled out as they were all "typical Wybos". He received the ball about 30 yards out beat defenders, beat them again, turned went round in a circle, beat the defenders one more time then flicked it onto his left foot and blasted it into the goal giving the goal-keeper no chance.

NEW IDEAS — A NEW APPROACH

A FEW interested people have asked us to summarise and perhaps itemise some of the problems and proposed solutions we have had discussed in GO SOCCER during the year. We are only too pleased to do this and can only hope some good may come out of our work.

PROBLEM

First of all we had the decline in PSL attendances. Lions tried many and varied ways to overcome this, spending money on players, spending money on promotional gimmicks, advertising, and last but not least, performing extraordinarily well in the competition itself. They were not successful though it could be argued that their Kentucky Fried Cup was an extremely successful innovation, for the first time directly involving juniors with PSL. Due to circumstances beyond their control their Saturday night experimentation lasted only one week and again the outcome was debatable as a decent crowd turned up but not enough to spark great enthusiasm although it has been proven overseas that people, being creatures of habit, take time to change.

Whether a run of games under lights, tied to a great advertising effort, would have brought success remains conjecture. City, always a directly well supported team did very little out of the ordinary to try and win the battle for lost fans, depending more on a forlorn hope that the team would start winning, usually a "green light" for their fans to roll back. They must surely realise by now, no one can guarantee success in this company without expenditure of thousands on class players.

SOLUTIONS

There is very little doubt that given the same effort as expended last year the chances are good that they could lure regular 2,000 crowds to their ground at Pine Road. Already work is being done to upgrade facilities but there is no doubt a big question mark will be placed against the ground's capability of handling 3,500 people, and cars, should they all decide to come forth on a "big day". That is Lions problem of course and one that will have

to be looked at by the committee of workers.. Buses running from Inala would help but parking has to be the big question, where does one put 1,500 cars out at Richlands? City will play again at Perry Park, apparently on a Sunday afternoon, hoping again that the winning team will "come up trumps". At the moment there is little indication of any change in the status quo although it has been suggested that some big name players could be on their way, a surefire way of getting people back in the short term.

During the season we had good constructive letters from obviously interested people who suggested many improvements. Some of the more noteworthy were suggestions that a playground for children be established on some of the waste ground over on the "river side" of Perry Park. Also many calls were made for flood-lit soccer at twilight, creating a family atmosphere with loads of barbecue style foods at reasonable prices, so that mum, dad and the kids could have a night out and all do their own thing yet still be home by 9 p.m. Many calls were made for all soccer to be played before Sunday's P.S.L. matches so that players and officials from other clubs could attend the "Big Match". All these suggestions had merit but as of yet apparently little or no effect where it matters most!

PROBLEM

Soccer administrative organisation is rapidly declining in effectiveness. Everyone who wrote in to GO SOCCER seemed to agree with this, although, as is their right, the solution ideas varied greatly. That the administrative organisation is stretched is pure logic, every year that passes sees an ever growing Federation of Clubs, which in turn means an ever growing work load on a few willing shoulders, and this is surely a malfunction of the management committee who apparently sit and watch this gradual breakdown of performance without any thought or deed for betterment.

SOLUTION

There has to be a complete restructuring of soccer's administration. The Q.S.F. Management Committee, once elected, has to immediately set down guidelines for a new operation based on proven business principles. No man is an island and no management committee can hope to achieve all that is needed for a growing soccer game unless responsibility is delegated both downwards and outwards. Suggestions

have poured in for breaking up the present giant into manageable "sections some district, some material, and there is no doubt a marriage of both ideas could be more effective than the status quo.

If P.S.L., State League, and First Division were taken as "professional" clubs, that is clubs willing to pay players sums of money for playing and training, a total of 18 clubs would be accounted for. This would leave approx. 48 clubs as a bulwark of amateur clubs and these could be split into North and South sections as we have in the juniors. These three areas of Soccer, Professional, North Amateur and South Amateur could be organised and controlled by sub-committees elected by the clubs involved and presided over by a member of the Q.S.F. Management Committee who would keep them running within the policies set down by that body.

All the many arguments that are constantly raised about promotion and relegation are simply so much eye-wash,, no-one wants to interfere with progress and the matter of progress is a matter of constitution, easily managed by the parent body. Amateur clubs can be and will be successful, one has only to look to Tar- inga to see what can be accomplished. Once acquired, philosophies and policies can be altered to start the move to the top, again only a matter of constitution.

PROBLEM

What has to be done with Perry Park, the showpiece of our sixty odd Federation members. Must it become a white elephant?

SOLUTION

Soccer is now a nine month a year game. Many players playing in the lower

grades for fun would play all year round, so why not borrow their exuberance and look at the possibilities inherent in making the game a year long event. P.S.L. has to be played in winter, climatic conditions in THE SOUTH make it impossible to play the sport in high summer so also do the travel distances make it cost prohibitive for night football. Impasse? No, there is no real argument against playing State League football in summer, in fact the benefits far outweigh the drawbacks. Enumerated they include:

1. No competition between P.S.L. and Q.S.L..
2. Perry Park utilisation every week/ annum.
3. Player availability between P.S.L. and Q.S.L. clubs (limit of 3/club).
4. Better soccer conditions for players.
5. Better soccer conditions for spectators.
6. Only football code played in summer.

These are but a few of the advantages, the only disadvantage heard of is, what to do about mosquitoes???

So we could have Perry Park being used by clubs every weekend of the year. If previous arguments were accepted we could have "big matches" such as Amateur Cup Final, Amateur League play offs, First Division play offs, Perry Park Cup for all P.S.L., Q.S.L. and First Division clubs, the list is almost endless and yet no one has trod on anyone else's toes a necessity in this game of ours.

All the previous writing has come from ideas generated in this year's GO SOCCER magazine by letters and articles from you, the reader. Will they have an effect? Time will tell.

MARCONI'S REVENGE

SYDNEY—Rising above the reluctance of their players to take a disputed penalty kick, Marconi defeated premiers West Adelaide 2-0 in the Philips League preliminary final at Marconi Oval.

Marconi now find in a grand final win if they can overcome Eastern Suburbs-Hakoah on Sunday after a season which promised much but produced little.

Bundled out of the Philips Cup by State League side, Croatia-Sydney, they squandered a six point lead to run fourth in the League.

Now by virtue of a 3-2 semi-final win over South Melbourne and the well deserved 2-0 victory, they stand poised to fight for a reversal of their season's "Almost but not quite" record.

The excitement came in the second half and grew when West Adelaide defender Con Kambas brought down Peter Sharne in the 59th minute.

West Adelaide vigorously disputed Melbourne referee Chris Bambridge's decision, complaining that the tackle took place outside the penalty box with Sharne diving inside.

Then in the strangest incident seen in

Sydney this year, the Marconi players took almost two minutes to decide the kicker.

The straw fell to a reluctant Roberto Vieri, whose hesitant approach led to West Adelaide goalkeeper Marty Crook saving a low shot at the left hand post.

Crook let the ball run however and Bert Mariani followed through to turn it in for a goal.

Leaving the goal and Sharne's later close-in scoring shot aside, Marconi had the ball in the West Adelaide net three more times only to have them ruled "No Goal".

West Adelaide Midfielder Peter Boyle received a caution in the 19th minute but Barry Jones and Peter Ollerton were judged offside following the free kick as Mariani slipped the ball into goal.

Seven minutes later Vieri picked his spot out the ball had crossed the back line previously.

And in the 63rd minute Sharne's back-header went in but referee Bambridge disallowed it again for offside.

Sharne's goal was the product of a fine pass from Ollerton and a 25 metre angled

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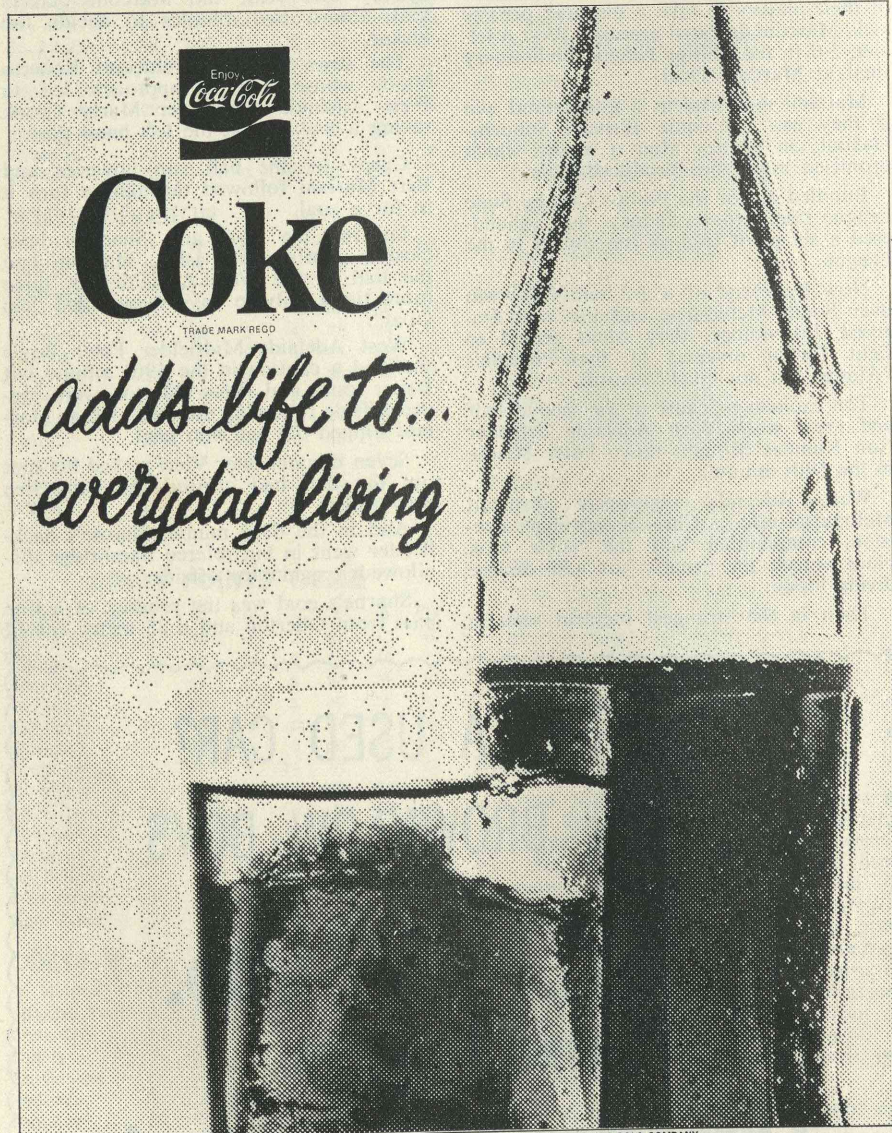
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shot from John Russell that rattled the cross bar.

Goalkeeper Crook pushed it out but Sharne was on the spot for Marconi's second goal. It certainly was not West Adelaide's day.

They struggled up front with both injured players David Pillans and Ian McGregor ineffective, while skipper Neil

McGachey was handicapped with an unsound knee.

On top of that right back Barry Reynolds simply could not fathom which way the brilliant Sharne's loping strides would take him.

The man who did the damage for Marconi however was the wily Vieri, who was a class above the rest of the players on the park.

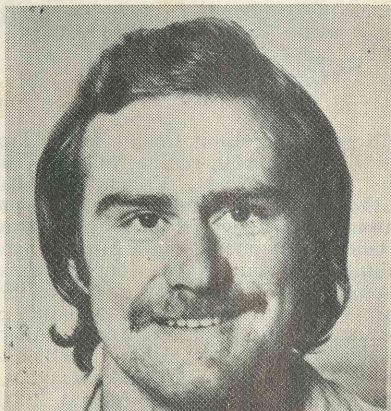
