WHO'S PLAYING THIS YEAR

AS USUAL most of the PSL clubs have been busy in the off-season, signing new players and discarding others. Here is a brief run down on what the clubs in the south have been up to.

SOUTH MELBOURNE:

John Margaritis is again at the helm and he has picked up three significant new players. They are former Socceroo Branko Buljevic from Heidelberg, Mendo Ristovski from Footscray, right-back Vince Bannon from Frankston City and centre-back Steve Blair from Albion Rovers. Another central defender, Arthur Xanthopoulos is back after a long absence and former Wolves player Frank Munro is fully fit after injury. Strikers Alun Evans and George Campbell are reported to be in top form, although former Socceroo forward Duncan Cummings is not training regularly. Souths also will be fielding their top two young internationals Alan Davidson and George Christopoulos.

BLACKTOWN CITY:

The new club of the PSL, where former Socceroo teammates, midfielder Dave Harding and full-back George Harris have been re-united. Harris played 26 times for Australia and was given a free transfer by St. George. Harding played for Wests originally in the PSL. Current youth international Ian Hunter has been signed from Nepean and the team's coach is Mick Jones, who has been with the club for the last seven years.

Jones has signed striker Paul Wilkinson, who scored 24 goals for Bottle in the Cheshire League last season. Other new signings are midfielder Bill Amey, ex Newcastle and Townsville United and Nepean goalkeeper Mike Harris. Other squad members are goalkeeper Bruce James, defenders Neil Taylor, Laurie Parkhouse, Cliff Pointer and Eduardo Pena, midfielders Gary Thompson and Ricky Hormazabel and strikers Alan Fisher, Jim Isatt and Neil Pearson. Former England star Bobby Charlton will be a guest player in Blacktown's opening match this week against St. George.

SYDNEY CITY:

Eddie Thomson has replaced Gerry Chaldi and most of the 1979 squad has been retained, with the exception of Alan Kershaw, who has gone to Sweden and possibly Ian Souness, who seemed likely to stay in England. Kenny Boden has

joined of course in the swap deal with Mark Trenter and Thomson has signed three youngsters, Chris and John Spanos from Perth and Graham Fletcher from Illawarra.

LEICHHARDT:

Former Dundee manager Willie Wallace is the new coach and he has already snapped up a Dundee player, midfielder John Bradley. Another newcomer is defender Colin McAusland from Melita Eagles. The mainstays of the 1979 team have been signed, including Peter Wilson, Greg Woodhouse, Peter Stone, Jim Dempsey, Ken Reed and Brian O'Donnell. Transfer listed are Eric Carruthers, Mark Samuels and full-back Warren Turnbull, who is likely to play with Blacktown.

ST. GEORGE:

Raul Blanco has signed on virtually a new team, with the only retentions from last year being Doug Utjesenovic, Rudi Gnavi, Roy Cotton, Nick Fenoughty, Dennis Duarte, Peter Terry and outstanding youngsters Paul Kay and Peter Katho's. Phil O'Connor has switched to Leichhardt, Martin Coe is back in Brisbane, George Harris is with Blacktown City, the three O'Shea boys are with Canberra, Stefan Matic went back to Yugoslavia, Rudi Della Picca to Argentina and on the transfer list are Neville Morgan, Brendan Grosse and Peter Hensman. Saints have signed goalkeeper Don Smith, who was with Brisbane City for a while last year, central defender Richard Yamine from Melita and striker Peter Beggs from Sutherland. Recently utility player Dave McIntosh was reported to have switched from Sydney Olympic.

WEST ADELAIDE:

There have not been many reports from this particular camp, where Gerry Chaldi is the new man in control. West lost David Jones to Adelaide City and Con Kambas has not agreed to terms this year. Chaldi is reported to be interested in signing former Israeli international defender Shraga Topolanski and Chilean sweeper Carlos Villazon.

ADELAIDE CITY:

Ra'e Rasic of course is still with last year's Philips Cup winners. On the transfer list are Robert Marwe, Chris Kent, John Besir and Jimbo Muir. David Jones has come over from West Adelaide and

will partner Bobby Russell in the middle of the defence. The fullbacks again are Bugsy Nyskohus and Glen Dodds and the midfielders Agenor Muniz, Gary Marocchi, Charlie Villani, John Perin and youngster Romano Rossi. City's front runners are Dixie Deans, John Nyskohus, Brian Northcote and Serge Melta.

NEWCASTLE UNITED:

KB as usual announced their playing squad for 1980 reasonably early and the major newcomer is former Leeds United and England full-back Paul Reaney. Others are striker David Deakin from Townsville and Mark Trenter from Sydney City. Another forward, David Kambasz has been signed from local club Edgeworth Eagles. The balance of the squad are familiar faces, and comprise Phil

Dando, Neal Endacott, Brett Cowburn, Bill Summerscales, Roy Drinkwater, Arno Bertogna, Graham Heys, Joe Senalski, David Jones, John Sneddon, Col Curran, Peter Tredinnick, Howard Tredinnick, Michael Boogaard, Malcolm McCielland, Jim Preston and Richard Endacott.

Of the other clubs, champions Marconi have not suffered any serious losses and have added youth international Peter Raskopoulos from Sydney Olympic. Already Marconi are being hailed as odds on favourites to retain their title. Heidelberg United have not undergone any radical changes, although Buljevic is now with South Melbourne. At last report, Heidelberg were still without a coach, after Manny Poulakakis decided to accept an offer with Melbourne Juventus.

POTTER THE STALWART

BRISBANE City sweeper George Potter is Queensland's longest serving player in the Philips League, since its inception in 1977. Of the 78 matches since then, Potter has appeared in 76 full matches and one part-match, according to figures released last week. Of the 76 full games, 52 were with Brisbane Lions and 24 for Brisbane City.

Footscray's Jim Kondarios and Marconi's Alan Maher have played in every match, Marconi's Paul Degney in 77 and on the same line as Potter are Col Curran (Wests and KB), and Peter Sharne (Marconi).

Other Brisbane players high on the list are Larry Gaffney (69 plus 7), Steve Perry (73 plus one, with Wests and City), Jim Hermiston (72 with City and Lions), Col Bennett (72), Joe Palinkas (68 plus 4 with Footscray), Frank Pimblett (66 plus 5).

Brisbane City so far have used 35 players in their three PSL campaigns. They are (with full appearances followed by games as a sub. in brackets; Larry Gaffney 69 (7), Peter Tokesi 57 (1), Ian Rathmell 38 (4), Frank Pimblett 66 (5), Osvaldo Borzi 25, Roberto Echeverria 50 (9), John Coyne 49 (16), Jim Hermiston 20, Willie Conner 26 (15), Kevin Caldwell 49 (19), Ian Johnston 21 (10), Brian Kibbey 31 (6), John Lave'le 19 (5), Craig Wallace 9 (2), Karl Herdle 4 (4), Tom McLeod 3 (4), Ian Perry 3, Peter Nielsen 2, Ron Kidd (2), Bob Barlow 2, Mark Brusasco 7 (7), Steve Clark (2), Iain Fagan 7 (2), Eusebio Ibanez (5), Sauro Iozzelli 11, Barry Kelso 27 (6), Alan

The club which has used the least amount of players since 1977 is Marconi, with 25. Players used by other clubs are Adelaide City 33, Apia-Leichhardt 21, Brisbane City 35, Brisbane Lions 40, Canberra City 42, Footscray 34, Heidelberg United 29, Mooroolbark 26, Newcastle United 31, St. George 41, South Melbourne 44, Sydney City 35, Sydney Olympic 44, West Adelaide 32, Western Suburbs 31.

Of those clubs, Mooroolbark and Apia played in one season only and Western Suburbs in two.

Welcome to Footscray

FOOTSCRAY, who like many clubs last year were haunted by the spectre of relegation, is the first southern club on show in the PSL in 1980, against Brisbane City at Perry Park this Sunday.

The club eventually finished in 10th place in 1979, but only a point above Sydney Olympic, who are back in the New South Wales State League.

Since the PSL began, Footscray have not been able to annex a trophy to grace their mantelpiece, so what of their prospects this year under new coach, Rocco Ille.

Ille was an outstanding player with the Sydney club Yugal so he will undoubtedly know what top football is all about, but his biggest problem seems to be the lack of adequate replacements for Mendo Ristovski (now South Melbourne), Joe Palinkas (Brisbane City) and fullback Andrij Ristic, who has gone back to Yugoslavia.

There is no doubt that Footscray have always possessed some brilliant individual footballers, but it is not often that they have put it all together at the same time.

In defence, Ille will be relying heavily

on goalkeeper Dennis Boland, one of the best in the country and the centre-back combination of Jim Kondarios and former Heidelberg sweeper Jim O'Reilly.

In the midfield, much of the workload will fall on the shoulders of the thoughtful Zoran Ilioski, and probably former Socceroo Peter Ollerton, who flitted between attack and defence last year.

Joe Picioane is always a player to watch if he receives the right support and Footscray claim they have the best left-winger in the League in Vladko Lujic.

The only new signings announced have been local Melbourne players, left-back Chris Petrov and midfielder Charlie Mc Kendrie.

Footscray then will be largely unchanged from last season's lineup, but that does not mean Brisbane City are certain to open up with two points.

City's record against Footscray at home since the League began has been quite impressive, but the Melbourne side is such an enigma that they can never be taken too lightly. Other clubs have done that in the past and duly paid the penalty.

GRANGE THISTLE NEWS

1980 brings a few changes on the Lanham Park front. On the tangible side the new clubhouse is, of course fully operational and fully licensed, and as a consequence makes life much more comfortable when watching games.

The main field is currently looking the best for many years and Pat Rankin and his boys have put in many long weekends over the summer to achieve this. The second field also has good grass and will be widened before the season commences, to bring about a closer standardisation of sizes.

On the coaching side, we now have George Pagan and Tony Buesnell looking after the State League and South East squads. Tony was fulltime Director of Coaching in Rockhampton at Frenchville for a number of years, so is no stranger to the State League scene. Jim Balish and Bevan Chantler have the Colts A and B under their respective wings, whilst the 6th Division is now being coached by "wee man" Sandy Woodside. He has a particularly large squad at present, what with the Colts age limit being dropped to U-19 and the usual new faces, but Sandy is still smiling, rather too many than too few.

New additions to the State League squad playing staff include 3 Solomon Island representatives. Wi son Maelaua, a striker, Ben Sokeni midfield/striker, and Sam Ata a defender. These boys came to Brisbane as a direct result of Thistle's end-of-season trip to the Solomons in November last year. They look to better themselves in their football careers and who better to do it with than the inaugural State League Champions. Each of the players had a run in Thistle's pre-season tournament preliminary matches culminating in the final last Sunday.

In this tournament sponsored by Schweppes, Thistle secured Brisbane City's PSL team, Lions entered their South East team, all four of the Brisbane State League clubs, and Ipswich United, with the remaining five places going to leading Brisbane 1st Division clubs.

Brisbane City, as was expected, led their group to go into the final, with Ipswich United running a close second to go into the play-off for 3rd and 4th prize money. In the other group, Thistle fought off a spirited challenge from Lions to also go into the final.

Runner-up in this group was not decided until the final night's preliminary

matches. Southside Eagles were leading on goal average after their Monday night match, leaving Lions requiring a clear 3-0 win in their last match on Friday night. The end result gave us Southside Eagles playing Ipswich for the minor placings.

Last Sunday a full day of soccer was played at Lanham Park with marching girls displaying their talents between games, culminating in the Final itself.

The final was played before a record Lanham Park crowd and Thistle took a shock lead in the 7th minute through Ben Sokeni. City equalised before halftime through David Ratcliffe and took command after the break.

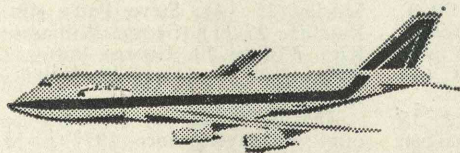
Further goals by Ratcliffe and Barry Kelso (2) put the issue well and truly beyond doubt. Thistle battled on gamely and almost pulled a goal back through Kenny Swan in the second half, but in the words of skipper Steve Do'an after the match: "There's no doubt who was the better side on the day. 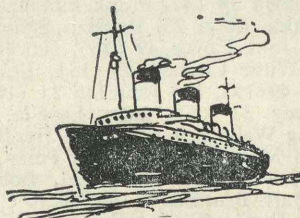

HAMBURG, WEST GERMANY — Peter Nogly, Captain of West German Soccer League champions Hamburg, signed a three-year contract with Canadian club Edmonton Strikers, Hamburg manager Guenter Netzer said.

He said Hamburg had given Nogly a free transfer in recognition of his 11 years of service to the club.

No details were released of the money which Nogly, a defender, will receive with the Strikers.

Netzer said that Nogly would leave Hamburg at the end of May to enable him to play for his new club for three months, from June 1st.

He will play for six months each in the following two years, using the interviewing time to qualify as a Soccer trainer.

ANOTHER CHANCE

LONDON — Soccer's wayward star George Best, who has admitted he has a drink problem, was back in training with the Scottish club Hibernian last week, hoping to keep out of the limelight and get on with his job.

Club secretary Mr. Cecil Graham said in Edinburgh: "I had a meal with George and his wife last night. The boy just wants a bit of peace and to be kept out of the limelight if at all possible. He loves to play football, and wants to play. He is looking very fit."

Mr. Graham said Hibernian had stipulated that Best must arrive in Edinburgh on Wednesdays and train with the team on Thursdays and Fridays before a game. But he added: "This may be altered to fit in with the player's treatment for drinking."

After arriving with his wife Angie on a flight from London, Best watched a television programme of particular interest to him.

Called "Just for Today", It was the story of English Football hero Jimmy Greaves, who, like Best, fought a battle with booze.

17 days ago Best was told by the club's chairman Mr. Tom Hart to pack his bags after an admitted drinking session.

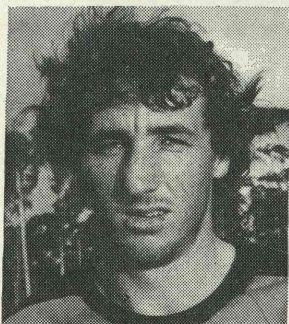
But Mr. Hart later said the club was willing to give Best another chance.

FOREST FLATTENED

LONDON — European Soccer Cup holders Nottingham Forest last week suffered an upset to their preparations for resuming the defence of the trophy in Wednesday's quarter-final against Dynamo Berlin of East Germany.

English First Division Forest lost 1-0 to bottom club Bolton, whose shock success was only their second victory in 28 league matches this season.

A first half goal by Neil Whatmore proved to be the downfall of the European champions, who go into the first leg of their tie against Dynamo at Nottingham in erratic form.

Forest recently reached the final of the English League Cup but were knocked out of the Football Association (F.A.) Cup and have won only one of their last four league games.

Arsenal had a more successful buildup to their European Cup Winners' Cup quarter-final against Gothenburg of Sweden here on Wednesday.

The London first division team beat Stoke 3-2, with Alan Sunderland getting Arsenal's first goal to become the division's top scorer with 22.

David Price and Liam Brady completed the scoring as Arsenal sounded a warning to their Swedish rivals for the first leg clash by maintaining consistent form.

Arsenal, the F.A. Cup holders, are already through to the quarter-finals of that competition and have lost only twice in their last 14 league matches.

In the battle for the first division championship, Manchester United's bid to take over at the top from Liverpool failed miserably when they were thrashed 6.0 at Ipswich.

Three goals from Paul Mariner, two by Alan Brazil and one by Dutch international Frans Thijssen underlined the tremendous improvement by Ipswich. They were bottom of the table four months ago and are now third.

Their winning margin might have been bigger but for the fact that United goalkeeper Gary Bailey saved two penalties in the first half. The Manchester club stay in second place but champions and leaders Liverpool moved two points ahead of them by beating City neighbours Everton 2-1.

There was a sad note to the game because of the death while watching the match of "Dixie" Dean, a former Everton

and England star who scored 473 goals in 502 matches at League and representative level.

A current England player whose goal-scoring has won acclaim this season was in form again. Midfield man Glen Hoddle got the first goal in Tottenham's 2-1 win against Leeds, while Mark Falco scored the winner which lifted the London side from 14th to 11th spot.

Tottenham manager Keith Burkinshaw praised Hoddle. "If England has a better midfield player I don't know where he is. He has only got to keep playing like that at under-21 and senior level and the whole world will take notice."

Aston Villa moved up a place to sixth after beating Derby 1-0 with a goal from Allan Evans, while Middlesbrough also improved by one position with a 2-0 victory against Wolverhampton, which took them to eighth.

In the fluctuating battle for promotion in the second division, Chelsea took over at the top when they beat Cardiff 1-0 with a goal from Clive Walker.

Birmingham, who beat Swansea 1-0 on Friday night, are in second place, level on points and with a match in hand.

AFFAIR ENDS

SYDNEY — The long drawn out "Giampaolo-Valeri" affair, which threatened to tear Canberra Soccer apart, ended with the signing of the pair by Canberra City.

After several eeks of controversy Inter Monaro and Canberra City agreed on a transfer fee of \$40,000 for the two players.

Sebastian Giampaolo and Walter Valeri signed with Canberra for a cash payment of \$40,000 to Inter Monaro.

Giampaolo, 21, and Valeri, 28, who played for the State League club last year were approached by Philips League Club, Canberra City, during the off season.

This triggered a stream of accusations from both sides, with Monaro officials claiming Canberra had signed the two strikers without first getting a clearance from them and the N.S.W. Federation.

On the other hand, Canberra claimed an original transfer demand of \$52,000 as an unrealistic value of the two strikers.

Several appeals were made to the N.S.W. Federation, and though the fee was reduced, Canberra remained unhappy.

The scene was set last week for yet another appeal, which would have kept the two players out of action — for either club — for several more weeks.

However, earlier this week Monaro and Canberra re-negotiated.

At first it was reported Monaro would loan the two players to Canberra City for the year to allow them to make up their minds where they wanted to spend their Soccer careers.

Then it was revealed that the two clubs had agreed on a transfer.

CLIVE SPEAKS OUT

LONDON — Lack of discipline is spreading to all sports, International Soccer referee Clive Thomas has warned.

The English first division referee, who officiated at the last World Cup in Argentina, suggested that referees and umpires in all games may soon need to get together to discuss their difficulties.

Thomas said: "Referees are the men who have to make the decisions and, if they are not backed by authorities, then sport faces big problems.

"What worries me more than anything is the dissentful manner in which players in all sports react these days. It is not only in the physical contact games. I was appalled by some of the things I saw during England's cricket tour in Australia."

Figures support Thomas. The Rugby League disciplinary committee this week will deal with a one-month pile of 11 sending-off cases, as well as more than 30 'yellow card' offences.

English Soccer has had 91 dismissals already this season, well on the way to

surpassing the 1978-79 record haul of 126.

Violence in Rugby Union came to a head at Twickenham 11 days ago with the sending off of Welshman Paul Ringer and now the Welsh Rugby Union is demanding a "much higher standard of self discipline" from its players.

Thomas, a keen Rugby supporter, recently pronounced his "total disgust" with the violence at Twickenham, but added: "I was more annoyed with the establishment for not coming out in support of the referee, David Burnett.

"People claim he was biased, because he was looking out for certain players with a reputation. But I applaud him for his professionalism. If he knew some use illegal tactics, then he was right and proper in his action.

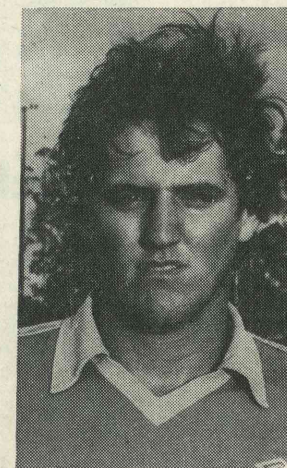
"I do exactly the same in football, I speak to my linesmen about the players we are in charge of on that particular day. Some say it is being prejudiced, I say it is experience and learning."

Another Boost for Australian Soccer

Australian soccer will benefit from an initiative by the FIFA, the governing body of world football, to launch a world-wide system of soccer academies.

FIFA announced today that one of 16 proposed academies will be established in Australia in December of this year.

The world-wide programme is sponsored by Coca-Cola as an integral part of the company's soccer involvement.

Each academy will accommodate soccer students from as many as six nations with seminars designed to instruct officials on world class methods of coaching, administration, marketing and press relations.

Australia has been nominated to accept students from Oceania countries. All delegates who successfully complete the course will receive a FIFA Instructor diploma.

Included among the guest speakers will be a national team manager from a leading soccer nation plus an international sports journalist.

The first academy will be held in Morocco in May with celebrated doctors and referees adding their expertise to that of other instructors.

The initiative is seen as part of FIFA's plan to raise playing standards in those areas most in need of development.

FIFA — Coca-Cola World Youth Cup Attracts Big Entries

Ninety-four nations will compete in the third FIFA World Youth Championship for the Coca-Cola Cup.

The finals of the competition, now designated by FIFA as an official world championship, will be played in Australia from October 3rd to 18th, 1981.

Sixteen countries will qualify for the tournament in Australia from their own continental championships to be played between April 1st, 1980 and March 31, 1981.

Sir Arthur George President of the Australian Soccer Federation, said, "We are grateful to the FIFA President, Dr. Havelange, for conceiving this magnificent tournament and to FIFA and Coca-Cola for permitting Australia to stage this world event."

Paul Barrow, Director of Sports Programmes for the Coca-Cola Company

said, "We are happy to support an event which gives young players from so many countries the chance to develop their talent and to compete with the best players of their age in the world."

"It is also a pleasure to see countries entering the championship in similar numbers to the FIFA World Cup itself".

The Youth Championship started in 1977 in Tunisia where the USSR won the Coca-Cola Cup by beating Mexico, the runner-up.

In 1979, the young players of Argentina echoed the World Cup triumph of 1978 by defeating the title holders, the Soviet Union, at the finals in Tokyo, Japan.

As in the past, there will be six teams from Europe in the finals, three from South America, two from Africa, two from Asia, two from the CONCACAF (Football Confederation of North and Central America and the Caribbean) area plus the host country.

ELTON'S UPSET

LONDON — Elton John said he was considering moving his second division Soccer club out of its home town, Watford.

John, who has taken Watford from the Fourth Division to the Second in four years as chairman, said he was "Absolutely furious" after a local council rejected a 15 million Stg (30 million Australian dollars) ground development plan.

"The council seem to think that I can finance the venture myself, but I would have to keep making records into my retirement to find 20 million.

"We have paid out at least 30,000 Stg. (60,000 Australian dollars) in feasibility studies and architects' fees. We have been misled all along the line.

"We want to be a big club with a top class ground. These improvements would have put us on the Soccer Map".

Watford Council denied that they had wasted the club's time and money.

"We refute those allegations totally", a spokesman said. "We would be very sorry if the club had to leave, but we refused planning permission for two important reasons.

"First, they wanted the Council to spend three million Stg. (six million Australian dollars) buying the land scheduled for the complex and then lease it back at a peppercorn rent".

A proposal to build a shopping complex to pay for the stadium was also against council policy, he said.
