Killer Cole

MELBOURNE — Gary Cole reached his 50 goal milestone and added two more in leading Heidelberg United to a 3-1 victory over Brisbane City at Olympic Park.

It was Cole's third hat-trick in six games

— a feat unmatched in the Philips League.

In the fifth minute, Cole raced clear of Billy Wilkinson on a through ball from Jimmy Rooney to score his 50th goal in League and Cup games since the start of the PSL in 1977.

He turned and ran onto the running track fists raised above his head in a victor's salute to the crowd.

Brisbane City equalised in the 42nd minute through Barry Kelso, who raced past John Yzendoorn and bounced the ball in off the bottom of the post.

The goal was the result of a defensive mistake by Pat Bannon whose attempted square pass had hit Ke'so on the shoulder, giving the giant striker his opening to score.

But Heidelberg regained the lead only two minutes later when Cole headed his second goal after a free kick by Jimmy Rooney.

Theo Selemidis preserved Heidelberg's lead just after half-time when he headed a shot by Larry Gaffney off the goal-line

Jamie Paton could have put Heidelberg further ahead after a square ball from Jim Tansey but goal-keeper Martin Coe made a brilliant save.

Then after playing a series of one-two's with Jim Campbell, Cole hit the side netting with a powerful shot.

Campbell headed into the net after a corner but the goal was disallowed because of a foul by Paton.

Brisbane City stepped up the pace and had Heidelberg pinned into defence during the Queenslanders' best period in the second half.

Heidelberg goal-keeper Yakka Banovic had to save good shots by Kevin Low, Joe Palinkas and Kelso, who was City's best player by far.

But Cole ended any hopes of a Brisbane comeback when he goaled with a 20 metre dipping shot in the 75th minute.

Saints Crash

SYDNEY — St. George suffered their third heavy defeat in a row in the Philips League when they crashed 4-1 to Adelaide City at the St. George Stadium.

The Saints' defence has now conceded 14 goa's in three games and again looked paper-thin.

Adelaide's first goal came after only 13 minutes when John Nyskohus neatly flicked home a shot from five metres after an excellent through-ball from his brother, Bugsy.

St. George rallied and equalised through a Roy Cotton penalty in the 38th minute but this respite was short lived.

Minutes before the break Glen Dods strode through St. George's defence to score Adelaide's second goal and give his side a 2-1 half-time lead.

Adelaide started the second half sensationally when after just 30 seconds they scored their third goal and sealed the result.

Mid-fielder Bobby Russell almost casually trotted along the left flank before sending a perfect cross to John Nyskohus.

The tiny striker darted free from his marker and rose perfectly to meet the ball and send his second goal crashing into the net.

With the game dying out and St. George resigned to defeat Nyskohus completed his

hat-trick with a penalty after a handball by defender Dave McIntosh.

ADELAIDE — West Adelaide wiped out the memory of last week's big defeat by Sydney City with a resounding 4-2 win over Blacktown at Hindmarsh Stadium.

West Adelaide tore away from Blacktown in the second half after the scores had been tied at 1-1 at halftime.

Blacktown did West Adelaide a favour in the 17th minute when defender Bruce Stowell turned the ball into his own goal after West Adelaide striker Manecas had bustled into the penalty area.

Blacktown forward Ian Hunter equalised in the 32nd minute when he drove a square pass under West's goal keeper Martyn Crook .

West's had to wait only one minute in the second half before regaining the lead when John Kosmina smashed the ball into the net from eight metres after a piece of enterprising play from George Koulianos.

Wests went further ahead in the 60th minute when Vic Bozanic thundered a free kick into the far corner from 30 metres.

Blacktown's James Izatt reduced the deficit with a headed goal a minute later.

However, West Adelaide's Portugese star Manecas wrapped up the match 4-2 in the 71st minute with a dazzling goal.

The brilliant mid-fielder ripped into the penalty area and despite having been tripped he regained his footing to slam a sizzling ground shot past Blacktown goalkeeper Bruce James.

Mighty Maher

SYDNEY — Marconi goalkeeper Allan Maher was the toast of the club when he pulled off two brilliant saves late in the match to give his team a 2-2 draw with Footscray at the Marconi Stadium.

Marconi dominated the first session, but Footscray's tight defence and midfield caused the champion's speedsters to run out of attacking space in the second half.

Playing with only two strikers, Zdravko Lujic and Dragan Vasic, Footscray were heartened when Joe Picioane smashed his 64th minute header from Zoran Ilioski's right wing corner into the Marconi net.

This equaliser spurred Footscray into greater efforts but it was Maher who twice denied them the opportunity for maximum points.

The former socceroo goalkeeper faced Belic's 74th minute snap shot and held the ball with his outstretched left hand on the ground, without allowing it to force him over the line.

Five minutes later Lujic broke away sweetly down the left flank, but once again Maher distinguished himself with a save from a low drive.

The first half was all Marconi, who led 2-1 at the break. Bertie Mariani, who played in defence ahead of John Russell, gave the ball away in the 13th minute but seconds later he was instrumental in helping to set up Marconi's first goal.

Marconi left-back Paul Degney regained possession, Mariani took control and passed to \$15,000 recruit Peter Raskopolous, who hammered home a glorious 20 metre shot.

Late in the match Mariani received a deep gash in his foot after a tackle, and needed 15 stitches in the wound after the game.

With Marconi on top, Footscray rightback Igor Hazabent accelerated ahead to smash home a 20 metre low drive that took a slight deflection along the way.

At this stage Marconi's tightly marked winger, Peter Sharne was consistently fouled with crude tackles but referee Doug Rennie appeared a little lenient with the offenders.

Marconi went ahead with another glorious goal in the 34th minute. Gary Byrne revel ing in his creative midfield role, passed the ball to Peter Brogan near the right corner flag. Brogan's splendid centre was headed home by Eddie Krncevic.

Marconi should have gone into the half time break another goal ahead but Mark Jankovics failed from a pass from the hard working midfielder Raskopoulos.

The second half was all Footscray's, but they ended up with nothing better than a 2-2 result.


