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# Ampol Cup—1st round

IPSWICH UNITED 1 (J. Miller) d SUN- Head volleyed home a tremendous shot SHINE COAST 0

The cup holders, Ipswich United, in the last minute of injury time defeated Sunshine Coast. The goal was scored by substitute John Miller from close in after two shots by Bryan Kathage and Brett Kitching had been charged down in the goal mouth.

Ipswich had a strong territorial advantage throughout and through chances galore should have won easily. In the 30th minute Peter Nielsen missed a penalty when the ball struck underneath the crossbar and bounced away. Midway through the second half Randall McKeand missed a sitter with the goal open and at his mercy. Credit must go to Sunshine Coast goalkeeper Mike Ponlitsas. He made several diving saves and allowing for the poor finishing of the Ipswich forwards was always in position to handle any shots on target.

Ipswich were best served by Nielsen and best players for the Sunshine Coast, apart from their keeper, were Graham Stevenson, Lyall Brice and Terry Roe.

MT. GRAVATT 2 (Hudson, Head) d ANNERLEY 1 (Cotton).

The unbeaten State League leaders almost figured in the upset result of the first round, yet managed to squeeze through against the first division Annerley at Perry Park.

It seemed a walkover was on the cards when Brian Hudson scored after only two minutes. But Mt. Gravatt once again did not carry on with the early good work and Annerley equalised through Brad Cotton to force extra time. During this period former Mt. Gravatt player Brian Lampitt looked to have secured what cou'd have been the winning goal when he bypassed Mark Davis, but Eric Thompson came from nowhere to clear off the line. Shortly after Mt. Gravatt finally grabbed the winner when Ian

**TOWNSVILLE UNITED 5** (Goeghegan 2 Houston 2, Young) d GOLD COAST CITY 2 (Cally 2)

Townsville finally scored their first victory at home this season, although Gold Coast hit the front in the first fifteen minutes United drew level, but again the home supporters were stunned when referee Klose awarded a penalty, which again enabled City to hit the front. United squared things again before the break and subsequently went on to settle the issue by piling on another three goals in the second half. They should have an interesting Quarter Final clash with Mareeba in the next round.

MACKAY 3 (Schrandt 2, Shortman) d FRENCHVILLE UNITED 2 (B. Druery 2).

Close to a thousand spectators had the misfortune to again see the demise of their State League side, but this time the damage was done, not by a fellow State League side, but by the Mackay Federation's representative side, which now is confronted with the task of meeting Mt. Gravatt in the quarter finals. The teams were level 1-1 at half time and it was two all at the end of 90 minutes, so at least the Rockhampton supporters had the added bonus of the excitement of the extra time period.

The hero for the Mackay side was Mark Schrandt, whose two goals were complemented by the well known Brisbane personality Richard Shortman, while Brett Druery scored both goals for the home side.

ACROSS THE WAVES 3 (Wood 2, Chapman) d MERTON EAST 2 (Blackadder, Dolan).

The unknown young Merton East first division side, arriving at Bundaberg with the thought of playing a State League side were soon to put the crowd's mind at rest 19th June, 1980

with their display on the field. In the first half, playing into a very strong wind and against a very experienced side, Merton were quite content to come off at half time 1-0 down. The defence knew they had just played their hardest 45 minutes this season with strong tackling games from Rod Stein and Jeff Dolan.

The second half was a completely different story with Merton equalising with a penalty in the 55th minute, well taken by Dave Blackadder. Yet again this talented little player was in position to receive the ball cut back by Bruce Rehbock, only to see his shot soar over the bar.

Merton went to the lead in the 67th minute with the goal of the match, a 25 metre volley from Dolan. The Wayes equaliser came in the 75th minute from a very hotly disputed offside decision by the entire Merton defence, which felt the decision was due to the lack of vision (which could only be corrected by glasses) and understanding of the offside rule by the linesman concerned. From this point, the Merton side had lost some of their confidence, but at no stage did they give up the fight.

The winning goal for Waves came in the 82nd minute when a well timed shot deflected off the shoulder of Dolan, catching goalkeeper Chris Carroll off balance.

GRANGE THISTLE 5 (Maelaua 4, Fagan) d INDUSTRIAL UNITED 1 (Gerritsen).

Thistle ran out winners by 5-1 over 2nd Division leaders Industrial United, after leading 1-0 at half time. Wilson Maelaua scored four and Iain Fagan one from the penalty spot for Thistle, to Industrial's Peter Gerritsen's lone goal.

Industrial had their best chances in the first 20 minutes of the second half when they frightened the prickles out of Thistle by scoring one goal and missing the uprights by mere centimetres on a number of occasions. Peter Gerritsen missed a sitter when it would have been easier to score and which would have made it 2-2. That was the turning point as Thistle didn't give them any more gifts and controlled the remainder of the game to run out easy winners.

# New Zealand World Cup effort flounders

ANY hopes New Zealand holds of extending Australia in next year's World Cup eliminators diminished during the Kiwi's recent internal mini-tour.

After the debacle in New Caledonia, coach John Adshead unceremoniously discarded most of the Oceania cup players and replaced them with a well-balanced team of seasoned veterans and promising youngsters.

On current form, it comprised the best available players in New Zealand .

Opposition came in the form of regional selections — hastily cast together, young, enthusiastic, full of running, but lacking in skill. Their standard perhaps best equated with Fiji "B".

In its first match, New Zealand scrambled a 1-1 draw with the Southern Region thanks to a late goal by Glen Adam.

Two days later Central Region defeated the national selection 2-1. The only bright spot in an overall abysmal performance was a superb solo goal by Nigel Debenham, playing his last match before embarking for Sydney and a trial with Marconi.

The misery of this performance was compounded by news of the Socceroos' win over AC Milan on the same day.

The two match tour was hurriedly arranged to replace the visit by Queens Park Rangers. The English Club's requirement of \$28,000 for a four-match itinerary was well beyond the New Zealand FA's resources.

This fact aptly illustrates the two main problems of New Zealand soccer - inept administration and lack of finance.

The NZFA is in perpetual economical strife, relying for its survival upon club affiliation fees (currently \$80 a senior team), government hand-outs in the form of Ministry of Sport and Recreation grants and the sympathy of bank managers.

Nationwide raffles, mystery envelope appeals and attempts to recruit sponsors have failed miserably.

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Viewed realistically, a World Cup compaign is a luxury New Zealand cannot afford. Realism however is not a commodity over-abundant in NZFA circles, particularly since judgment has been clouded by the euphoria of last year's victory over Australia.

The programme perseveres in the hope that the World Cup spotlight will give the game here a much needed promotional boost, while the financial bonanza all World Cup finalists can anticipate pro-vides an incentive the NZAF cannot ignore.

The Oceania Cup and the internal tour proved conclusively that PSL based play-ers will form the backbone of any viable New Zealand combination.

Adshead was expected to contact Dun-can Cole, Richard Wilson, Johan Verweij, Mark McNaughton and Roy Drinkwater while attending Australia's centenary match against England.

He no doubt hopes that the appetites for international football of Cole, Wilson and Verweij has not been blunted by the fracas of their contract difficulties.

The NZFA doggedly refused to accept FIFA's ruling that the contract clauses stipulating a \$10,000 transfer fee is invalid and is seeking a meeting with officials of the world body in July.

Deprived of income from Brisbane Lions and Canberra City, the NZFA looked inwardly to boost its coffers, fining Rothmans National League club Gisborne City \$200 for displaying the name of its sponsors on playing kit.

Incredibly, the NZFA forbids this practice - now acceptable in all other soccerplaying countries, yet tolerates clubs, incorporating the name of its sponsors within its own.

Two other Rothmans League clubs, Blockhouse Bay and Wellington Diamond United, each were fined \$250 for nonpayment of money to the League travelling fund. At the time of writing WDU is suspended from the league until the debt (\$2,500) is paid.

Naturally it would be cynical to claim that the NZFA is imposing large fines on offending clubs in order to finance the World Cup campaign. However feasible attempts to raise the massive costs of such an undertaking have been ominously unsuccessful.

Beset by incompetence and lack of money, the New Zealand World Cup effort is floundering. Shou'd New Zealand overcome all its difficulties and qualify for the World Cup finals it will no doubt utilise a cheap mode of flying to Spain — on the back of pigs!

In the 20th minute R.A.A.F. headed in the opening goal. At this stage I thought Samford Rangers were never going to get it all togther, therefore when we

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





### SAINTS REVIVE

SYDNEY — St. George ploughed through the mud at the St. George Stadium to rise from the bottom of the table with a well deserved 4-1 victory over Blacktown.

Neither side was prepared to play negative, defensive football, despite the difficult greasy conditions. Near misses and goal mouth incidents at both ends kept the match in a state of bubbling excitement.

Blacktown should have taken the lead before St. George had even touched the ball but Ian Hunter carried the ball too close to the goalkeeper after only 15 seconds and missed a simple chance.

Four minutes later Hunter hit the cross bar with a fierce drive and this early aggression from Blacktown stretched the St. George defence.

The St. George midfield of Peter Stone and Mark Barton was in sparkling form all day, whilst Bill Griffiths showed courage and skill which gave him not only a goal but a hand in two others.

After 14 minutes Griffiths squared a ball to Ernie Campbell, who netted from close range.

Two minutes later Campbell returned the compliment by setting up Griffiths only three metres from the line, and he made no mistake to put St. George twoup.

Blacktown came back mainly through the eforts of Ricci Hormazabel.

After he had hit the woodwork and forced St. George keeper Michael Fraser into two brilliant saves, Blacktown reduced the leeway in the 28th minute.

Fraser missed a high ball from a corner kick and Cliff Pointer had a simple task to head the ball home.

Play swung from end to end at a furious pace for the remainder of the first half without either side being able to add to their tally, despite the many chances which came.

After the interval St. George exercised more midfield control through Stone and Campbell, both of whom covered an immense amount of ground both in attack and defence.

Blacktown struggled valiantly for the equaliser but could not break through to create clear chances.

As they pushed forward in the heavy conditions they exposed themselves at the back and were always vulnerable to the speed of Griffiths and Dennis Duarte.

Griffiths set Duarte up for St. George's third goal in the 75th minute and Stone capped a fine game when his drive was deflected into the net with only minutes remaining.

--oOo-ADELAIDE --- Adelaide City continued their drive up the Philips Soccer League table with a determined 2-0 win against Leichhardt at Olympic Sports Field.

While the win kept City in touch with the top four, the loss added to Leichhardt's relegation worries.

City began the match in an aggressive style and almost scored in the eighth minute when Justin Fashanu headed powerfully, but Leichhardt's goalkeeper Greg Woodhouse made a fine save.

City opened the scoring five minutes later when Colin Barnes headed in a corner from Aggie Muniz.

Leichhardt abandoned their defensive tactics after this setback and put City under pressure for long periods.

Leichhardt's Terry Butler wasted a good chance in the 33rd minute when he headed wide from a good position.

But Fashanu wrapped up the match for City in the 47th minute when he accepted a long pass from John Perin and slammed a great shot past Woodhouse from the edge of the penalty area.

## BECKENBAUER: IS THE KING NEAR THE END OF THE ROAD?

Franz recalls the circumstances of that debacle. "A long, hard season was finished and we had won the championship. Then we had a couple of exhibition games here. At that point ,they (the front office) should have given us two week's rest and then a week of training before starting the tour. Everyone was exhausted." Noting that the tour occurred in autumn (when German teams are in peak condition), Franz added, "I warned our management but they wouldn't listen."

While the calibre of NASL play is not yet on a par with the Bundesliga, it has improved markedly in the time since Beckenbauer first joined the world's most famous team.

"When I came here I wasn't very expectful of the quality of soccer because Europeans thought it was very bad," Franz observed. "But when I arrived I was surprised at the level (of play). Now the standard is much better than two years ago," he concluded.

Beckenbauer still has one more season remaining on his Cosmos contract. Conceding that he is nearing the age when "you play more with your head than with your feet," he is leaving his options open. If his health prevails, he looks forward to playing beyond the contract's expiration.

Good news for Cosmos fans and bad news for their foes? Not necessarily.

When queried as to whether he would consider joining another NASL unit that was struggling to gain popularity, he smiled. Asserting that he will assess the future with an open mind, he stated that only returning to play in his native country has been ruled out.

What gratifications remain to be garnered by a player who has been voted footballer of the year on both sides of the ocean, collecting championship trophies for every employer along the way?


Sitting in his apartment overlooking Central Park, Beckenbauer gazes out the window from the 21st floor. Down below scores of youngsters are playing the sport he loves. "When I first arived, I almost never saw the children playing soccer," Franz observed.

Beckenbauer turned and flashed the smile of a man enjoying the greatest satisfaction of all.

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"Football is a simple game and you can't learn all about it from books. What you can learn about though are the various arts and sciences which a top coach or trainer must call upon to do his job wellto be a professional in fact . . . We need — football needs — highly professional courses of study backed up with opportunities for practical experience before men are allowed to take charge of super athletes. The days of the dabblers should have been put behind us twenty years ago but they weren't. There are still clubs who think that super players are produced by running footballers around a field and playing the occasional practice match of five a side game, and for that service some clubs pay a manager and a small platoon of coaches thousands of pounds a year you can't blame the coaches for taking it though can you?"

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
