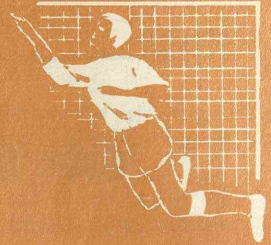

STATE LEAGUE REACHES HALF WAY

ST. GEORGE 0 v SOUTHSIDE EAGLES 0. Halftime 0-0. Certainly nothing to write home about in this match, during which St. George had the better of things in the first session. John Bennett was in fine form dealing with shots from John Deegan and Steve Konstaninou, after the latter had built up some good understanding with Paul Mylonas. Ross Kelly at the other end had only one real save to make in this period, from a good header from Kenny Gordon. Eagles came right back into the picture after halftime, and with St. George again playing without Tony Edwards and Barrie Fairbrother an upset looked a distinct possibility. But Eagles, although they made several openings, could not capitalise on any of them, with perhaps newcomer Neil Van-kerkvoort the chief culprit. He shot a couple wide of the target and also hit the post once following a powerful long range effort from Gordon McAndrew.

St. George bounced back late with two solid chances to take both points but on each occasion Deegan let the opportunities slip.

MAREEBA UNITED 3 (P. Trovalusci 40th, 55th; Kristens 56th). Halftime 1-0.

Gold Coast were well in the picture for the first 20 minutes as an over confident Mareeba seemed to think they already had the game parcelled up and were trying to sew it up in the first five minutes.

Trovalusci soon started the goal scoring in action five minutes before the break when he rifled home a shot, after Mick Boot's pass had eluded three City defenders. Mareeba had further chances in the 41st and 44th minutes, which might have provided a barnstorming halftime scoreline. Trovalusci added his second 10 minutes after the break, with yet another powerful drive, which gave the keeper no chance, when Boot chipped cleverly around the wall from a free kick. Only a minute later Ted Kristens motored down the left and slashed in a blistering left footer for the goal of the match

From then on it was all Mareeba for the remaining period, during which they really could have added at least another three.

MT. GRAVATT 2 (Ferguson 17th; Hudson 67th) d IPSWICH UNITED 0. Halftime 1-0.

Ipswich United had their imposing away record shattered after never really being in this game against the leaders.

Mt. Gravatt scored first with a tremendous team goal. Bevan Bohan took a throw in on the right and it was laid back to him by Phil Thompson. Bohan then switched a 50 metre pass across to Mal Bland who nodded back to Ferguson who cracked the shot home with his left foot from outside the area.

Mt. Gravatt could have been two up in the 35th minute when Bland knocked over an inswinging corner which Bevan Bohan headed down, but Gary Bohan's shot hit the upright. Finally the clincher resulted from more combination between Bevan and Bland, which set up Gary Bohan, who waltzed around Wayne Warren, but again the shot failed to reach the target as Greg Donnelly lunged.

Fortunately Brian Hudson was following up and finished off. Ipswich later had their best chance and there weren't many.

Ritchie Wilson pumped in a long ball which Bryan Kathage headed down for Randall McKeand who also was unlucky to see his fine shot meet the crossbar.

GRANGE THISTLE 2 (Maelaua 9th, Hill 24th) d ACROSS THE WAVES 1 (Bromfield 78th). Halftime 2-0.

Thistle put together a scrappy second half, after appearing to have the match well in hand by half time with a two goal lead. Both of them resulted from corners and were finished off respectively by Wilson Maelaua and big Danny Hill. Steve Dolan had a great first, producing some of the best form since returning from his nagging leg injury. He was ably

supported by some intelligent football from Kenny Swan.

Thistle eased up and Waves came surging back. And there was hope of at least a salvaged point when Gary Bromfield, who worked hard throughout, took advantage of a rare lapse by John Ferguson. Brian Kibbey led Waves well in the second half and was well backed by the consistent Ron Kidd. The result at least should give Waves some heart for when they meet Thistle at home again in the quarter final of the Ampol Cup in a week's time. TOWNSVILLE UNITED 2 (Montgomery 25th; Houston 52nd) d FRENCHVILLE UNITED 0. Halftime 1-0.

Once again the home team disappointed a healthy local crowd by failing to score, although they should well have done. The match never rose to great heights and Frenchville did not help their cause with a poor exhibition of passing. Townsville hit the front in the 25th minute

following a free kick on the left, which ricocheted off Rocky defender Patrick Leatham. Steve Cunningham did well to prevent an own goal but he could only palm the ball out and it fell nicely for United's top player in this game, Hughie Montgomery.

Frenchville's only real chance in this half was a long and low drive from Cliff Arnold, which was gathered in by Phil Figgins. Not long after half time, Townsville went two up, the move starting with a neat through pass from Ian Boyce. The Rocky defence appealed in vain for off-side as Frank Houston carried to round the keeper and score.

Only six minutes later, the goal which would have spurred Frenchville on went begging, when Tommy Pike failed to convert from the penalty spot. Left back Shane Sargent did his best to spark a frustrated Frenchville with some sustained aggression.

Glen Nahuysen, with blood dripping down his shirt continued on unperturbed and completely dominated his territory for 90 minutes. To me that's class.

Tom Arrowsmith in midfield tortured his bodyguards with composure and the ability to out zigzag them and pass the ball through skillfully.

South Star scored one goal which was to last them through out the game, and tried every trick in and out of the book, in desperation, even spat on one of our players. 2 minutes into the second half a perfectly timed shot gave Clint Argent Samford's equaliser. 4 minutes later Steve Schafer got into the action and despatched no. 2. Samford were determined to put more goals through and knew they were not going to be beaten. From a corner 17 minutes before full time tall Dan Smareglia leapt above the fullbacks and helmeted home a winner.

To prove that skill will always overrule an exceptionally aggressive opponent it took Mike Benson to demonstrate that to his 2 shadows, and left them still grappling while he scored our 4th dazzler! It was nearly time for the boys to lick their wounds, and head for home but Steve Schafer wasn't quite content he slammed an unstoppable left foot, which connected from outside the penalty area No. 5 for Samford.

What has soccer come to when an enjoyable afternoon is turned into a disaster.

JUNIOR Soccer Players have a chance to win a great range of prizes and at the same time raise funds for their clubs in this year's Dribble-a-thon.

Some of the prizes which can be won are English and Scottish Club badges, leather Soccer balls, equipment bags, shin guards and Soccer boots.

Organised by the Brisbane Southern Districts Junior Soccer Association, and conducted by each of the Association's Clubs, the object is to raise funds for Clubs with boys demonstrating one of the basic Soccer skills — dribbling a ball over a maximum of 20 laps.

Donation cards and instruction sheets have been distributed to each of the Association's 6,000 players.

Apart from a prize for boys who raise as little as \$12.00 and prizes for those who raise \$25.00 or over, prizes are available for the top fund-raising team (including Coach and Manager), top ten boys, and number one boy.

The three fund raising Clubs will receive cash awards of \$250, \$100 and \$50 respectively, with similar cash awards to the three clubs with the best team average fund-raising effort.

Clubs must have their DRIBBLE-A-THON completed no later than the last week-end in July.
