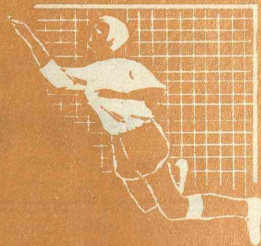

**Lions Pick up Point**

SYDNEY — Philips Soccer League leaders Sydney City dropped a valuable home point in a 1-1 draw with an aggressive Brisbane Lions at the Sydney Athletics Field.

However, the Sydneysiders still managed to open a three point gap at the top of the table after their two main challengers Heidelberg and South Melbourne went down in shock losses.

Sydney themselves looked set for a surprise defeat when after barely 11 minutes Lions took the lead.

A free kick from defender Jim Hermiton floated to the left of Sydney's penalty area, from where Johan Verweij sent in a perfect cross.

Nuggety striker Ron Millman rose to meet the ball and sent a searing header past a hapless Tony Pezzano in City's goal.

The action came thick and fast as both teams built up quick attacking moves.

Lions' midfield of Steve Hogg, Mark McNaughton and Alan Hughes was the equal of City's for most of the game,

with Hughes' ball control and dribbling a feature of the game.

In the 35th minute, panic unexpectedly struck Lions' defence when a back pass from Col Bennett was nearly intercepted by Mark Trenter, forcing Tony Scanlan into a desperate, scrambling save.

A minute later the continued confusion brought disaster for Lions when Kenny Boden was allowed to waltz into the penalty area.

Bennett again was the culprit. When he reacted it was too late and all he could do was cut down Boden in a Crude tackle.

John Stevenson took the penalty and sent a low, driven shot past Scanlan for the equaliser.

Lions were not finished though and hit back time after time with dangerous counter attacks.

In the 40th minute McNaughton beat the offside trap and sent over a glorious cross for Verweij.

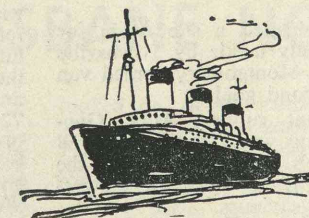
But just as the striker was about to connect, City's stopper Steve O'Connor, flew in to head the ball away.

**SOUTHSIDE EAGLES** produced a major shock in the League yesterday with a last gasp 2-1 win over Townsville United at Perry Park.

Townsville came to Brisbane riding high in third place, and fresh from a devastating 7-1 win at home last weekend.

Eagles, on the other hand, as the fourth bottom side, were not expected to seriously trouble the Townsville side, whose loss is a serious setback to their semi-final hopes.

Eagles have certainly proved to be the bogey side for Townsville this year, as they drew 1-all in the first round in Townsville.

The underdogs started the match with much more conviction and thoroughly deserved to take a shock seventh minute lead against a lethargic Townsville.

From a corner kick Ivars Melbergs cleverly back-heeled a pass to striker Neil van Kerkvoort, who made no mistake against Phil Figgins from close the six-yard line.

Townsville did not look at all composed until they equalised in the 30th minute with a well taken goal from Chris Young, who ran onto a perfect through ball from mid-fielder Frank Houston.

Both sides had ample opportunities to break the dead-lock in a see-sawing second half as regular gaps opened up in both defences.

Tom Kenny whistled a shot wide for Eagles and a timely tackle by Townsville centre half Hugh Montgomery denied van Kerkvoort his second goal.

Aggressive front runners Mick Geoghegan and Young were continually well served by Boyce's probing runs on the left wing, and they loomed as Townsville's most likely saviours.

But the experienced Bennett was impassable and saved at least three times from the Townsville pair. Young almost stole the winner when he pounced on a back pass but could not work this way past Bennett's diving frame.

Eagles were not short on goalscoring chances either. Melberg cracked a likely winner a fraction wide and Kenny had a golden opportunity with the goal at his mercy but did the same.

With only four minutes left, Kenny made amends for his earlier miss by

supplying a cross from the right wing which recent signing Archie Fraser tucked away with his left foot past the diving Figgins to score his first goal for the club.

Thistle opened the scoring in the 32nd minute when Danny Hill took a Ricky Mangan pass, burst through the Mareeba defence back heeled to Mangan who placed the ball just inside the post. 10 minutes later Dolan found space inside the box, but blasted the paint work off the cross bar. One minute from

halftime Mareeba won a corner, the resultant cross floated in and landed on the edge of the goal area, no Thistle player seemed remotely interested in clearing it, Trovalusci came from nowhere and had an easy task in slotting it home.

After the break Thistle took matters into their own hands and sprayed shots left, right but not centre, for long periods Mareeba appeared content for a draw relying almost entirely on a possible break by the speedy Trovalusci aided by Watson.

18 minutes into the second half Pater-son went through a static defence before being eventually pulled down in the box, from which Fagan netted the penalty kick.

Substitute Sokeni went on midway and showed why he has recently been nicknamed super-sub as his speed was a constant thorn for Mareeba's defence. Keeper John Hardaker brought off the save of the night when he pulled down a great 25 metre volley from Mangan. Both sides were guilty of misses in the dying 10 minutes particularly Mareeba when full-back Stopford made a great run down the right flank, crossed to the far post where Serafini had an open goal, but incredibly blasted over the top, Watson did the identical thing a minute later when it would have been easier to score. 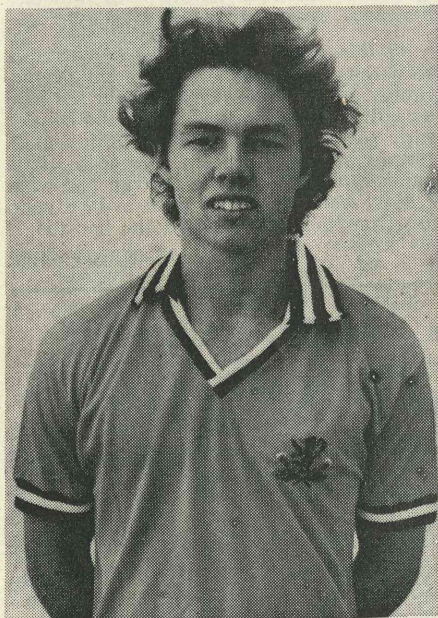

Lawrie did well in the Ipswich schools competition in Queensland before following his brothers into the senior ranks of Bundamba Rovers. A right-half, he played for a while with Leichhardt in Sydney and captained Australia for the 1950 tour of South Africa. He was also captain for three games against China.

**CEC DRUMMOND**, national captain in nine games, this excellent albeit slight full back, toured New Zealand in 1948 and South Africa in 1950 as part of his 18-match international career. A product of the West Sydney juniors, he played for Drummoyn, Grace Brothers and Leichhardt-Annandale.

**ROY CROWHURST**, a brilliant right winger who emerged from the Canterbury juniors in Sydney and who burst into senior ranks in 1928 when the first N.S.W. State League was formed. He toured New Zealand in 1932 and New Caledonia in 1933 and was outstanding against the English Amateurs in 1937. Crowhurst played his club soccer with Metters.

**JIMMY McNABB**, in "Soccer Records", published by Jack Pollard, Sid Grant writes about this great Australian goalkeeper: "Early with Weston, he won interstate selection as a back, but a serious injury to his right ankle changed everything for this agile miner. Desperate to stay in the game, he turned to goalkeeping and within two seasons he was right on top. McNabb was reared in a tough school. His uncle Bill was a boxer who taught Les Darcy; his father, Jack, a road cyclist on rough country roads and his sister, Esme, a leading fast bowler and slogger at vigoro. He was tailor made for the job of keeper. He had hands like Rodney Marsh; eyes like Greg Chappell and the movement of a leopard. He trained until his reflexes were superb. On the field he let everyone know that he was king of the penalty box. He could kick the ball over 70 yards, punch it 50 yards, and throw it 40 yards — that was his strength. He won international and State honours and every worthwhile trophy in the game."

# MARSTON THE GREATEST OF THE PIONEERS

Australia's most capped player pre-Federation was Joe Marston of N.S.W., according to records compiled by soccer historian Sid Grant.

Grant, a soccer writer with Australian newspapers for more than 35 years and a former national team selector, is one of the few men with accurate data about the Soccerroo pioneers.

According to his figures, Marston played 35 games for Australia. 24 of them as captain. Kev O'Neill, a product of Northern N.S.W., is next with 33 games.

Joe Marston is the only national team captain to have become national coach (for the 1-1 draw with AS Roma in 1966). He is now coach of Philips League club Sydney Olympic, having previously coached APIA, Wests and Auburn. Apart from having coached Australia, he has often led N.S.W. as well.

Marston joined Leichhardt at the age of 17 in 1943 and represented N.S.W. for the first time at 21. He went to England in 1951 and spent four years with Preston North End, making 145 league and 11 cup appearances.

He played for the combined English League against Scotland at Hampden Park in 1954, the same year Preston lost 2-3 to West Bromwich Albion in the FA Cup final.

**KEV O'NEILL** captained Australia in two Test matches against Hearts of Midlothian in 1959 and he was, according to Sid Grant, the "iron man" of Australia's 1950 tour of South Africa. O'Neill made 512 first grade appearances in a career spanning almost 20 years. In Northern N.S.W. he played for Cessnock, Kurri Kurri, West Wallsend and Lake Macquarie. Like Marston, O'Neill was a defender. He was the first Newcastle star to move to Sydney after Federation, and he had two successful seasons with Prague.

Other pre-Federation stars included:

**JACK EVANS**, ranks with Marston and O'Neill as one of Australia's greatest defenders. Born in Australia, he started with the old Aberdare team in Newcastle before moving to Sydney where he played for Goodyear, Metters and Leichhardt-Annandale in the thirties, and also rep-

resented N.S.W. A fiery, red-headed, powerfully-built player, he was nick-named "Digger".

**GORDON NUNN**, the greatest international player produced by Queensland. A centre forward from the St. Helens club in Ipswich. Nunn was the star of Australia's 1950 tour of South Africa and with 18 goals, he was one of the top scorers of the pre-Federation Soccerroos.

**JACK HUGHES**, thrilled a crowd of 40,000 at the Sydney Cricket Ground by scoring in the fifth Test against the English Amateurs only 10 seconds after the kick-off in 1937. It was one of 19 goals he scored for Australia in an international career, spanning 19 games. One of four soccer-playing brothers, Jack Hughes came to Sydney from northern N.S.W., to play for Metters.

**BOB BIGNALL**, a product of the N.S.W. south coast, Bignall represented Australia 20 times and was national captain for the 1956 Olympic Games tournament. He played 424 senior club games in his 15 year career.

**FRANKIE LOUGHRAN** born in Belfast where he had a short spell with Bangor before emigrating to Melbourne. In his first Victorian season with the Moreland club, he represented both Australia and Victoria. Only 5ft. 4 ins. tall, Loughran scored one of Australia's goals in its 2-0 victory over Japan in the 1956 Olympic Games. After having played against touring Blackpool in 1958, Loughran was praised by none other than the great Stanley Matthews, No. 1 drawcard of the Blackpool team. Like Matthews, Loughran continued playing well past the age at which most others hang up their boots. His last 14 years — until he "officially" retired in 1975 — were spent with Victorian Metropolitan League club Coburg of which he then became team manager. Yet still he could not stay off the pitch, so he turned out every Sunday morning with Leyland in the Industrial League. Now close to 50 Loughran still has the same appetite for the game that he had during his years as an international.

**BOB LAWRIE**, like Joe Marston, Lawrie went to England to try his luck and had a short spell there with Portsmouth.

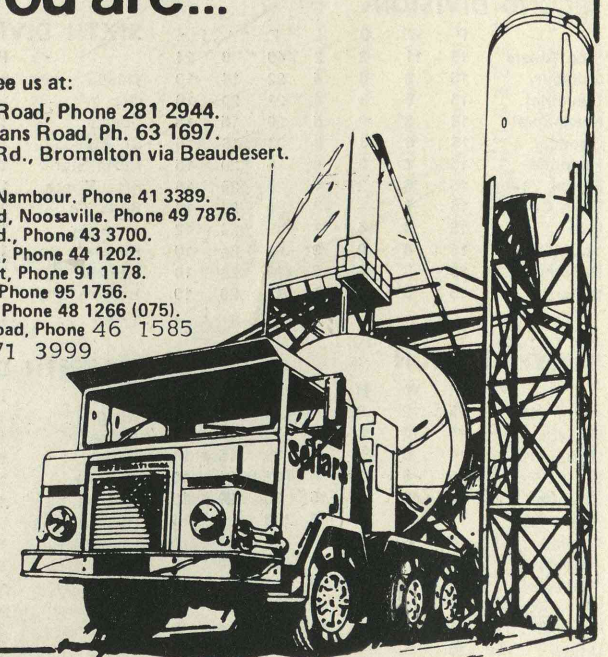

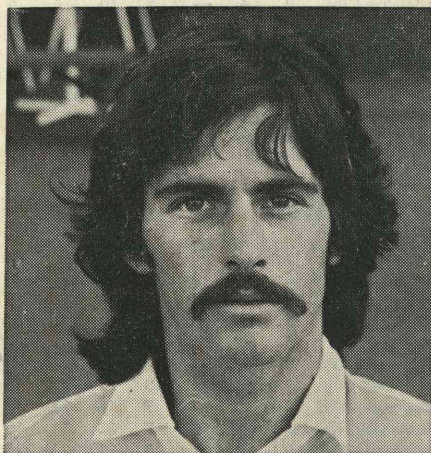
