Glen is one of Thistle's original apprentices when the scheme first started a couple of years ago. "Hunts" was born in Bundaberg and played many games, both junior and senior before coming to Brisbane.

He plays anywhere in the back four, with a decided preference for right full

back, where he may overlap to his obvious delights, as witnessed by the many goals he has put away.

He started his football with the Corinthian Club in Bundaberg playing there for six years, he then played for Eagles Club for a period of four seasons before travelling to Brisbane and appearing in Thistle's colours. His representative honours include representing Bundaberg up to age 15, for the Wide Bay Zone from 13 to 15 years and for Queensland from U15 through to U19.

Australian honours coming his way include selection for Australia at U15,16 and for the U18 schoolboys.

In 1978 he was elected as "Player of the Future" within the Club due to his all-round performances during that year.

Coming from the Wide Bay area and spending a lot of time near the water, one of his obvious delights is fishing, something he doesn't always get a lot of time for during the winter months.

A NEW WORLD

SYDNEY — The dreams of every ambitious young soccer player to reach the top in his sport, while pursuing a worthwhile career, could soon be realised with the founding of the new Australian Institute of Sport.

The Institute will be opened on Australia Day next year in Canberra.

At the forthcoming national under 15 and 16 championships to be held from August 23rd to 30th, application forms will be distributed to boys who want to enter the Institute next year.

The Australian Soccer Federation's Youth Development officer Brian Emery said the Institute would finally allow young athletes to combine training in their favourite sport with the desire for a career.

"Any boy who is in his final year at school will receive a form from the various departments of education, while the A.S.F. will hand out the forms to all competitors at the championships.

"The most desirable thing for us would be to have the whole of the Young Australia side at the Institute," he said.

Mr. Emery said there would be some problems with boys who are already established in first grade sides, like Blacktown City's Ian Hunter.

"Clubs would understandably be reluctant to release their star youngsters for the Institute, but some arrangement about travel could be worked out," he said.

"What we would like to have is a spread of ages among the players we enter into the Institute.

"This would mean we would have boys doing their last year at school, some wanting to do University studies and others with a desire to do Tech courses.

"As a direct result we wouldn't have the situation where at the end of the year a whole new crop of players would move in to replace the old ones."

Mr. Emery said that in May at the under 19 championships, a similar form had been handed out to the 162 players who took part in the tournament.

"We received back 158 of the forms from boys who wanted to attend the Institute.

"And the four who didn't apply were already studying medicine — a course which is unavailable in Canberra," he said.

Mr. Emery said Soccer had been allotted 18 places at the Institute and the final decision on which players would fill the positions would be made jointly by the Institute and the A.S.F.

However, he said to call all the applicants 'players' was something of a misnomer.

"The Institute will also produce referees, coaches, sports journalists and administrators," he said.

"We hope it will improve the quality of soccer all round — not just on the field."

The Coca-Cola National Age Group championships for under 13's, 14's, 15's, and 16's will be held later this month.

The under 13's will compete in Newcastle, the under 14's and 16's in Canberra and the under 15's in Melbourne.

Games will be staged over the week from August 23rd to August 30th.

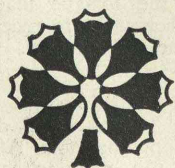

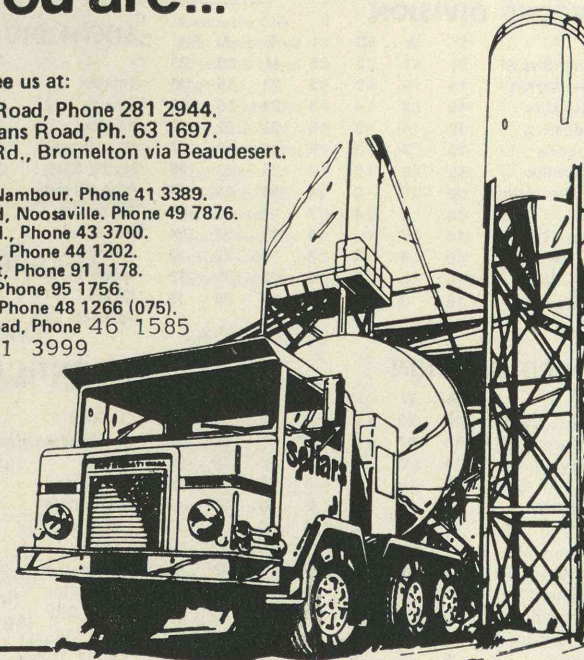

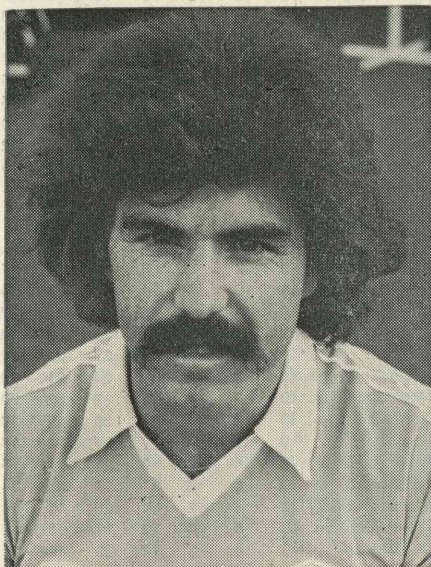
